ALLIED PEOPLE'S PARTY TICKET.

Entire State Ticket Named by the Allied People's Party—About 100 Delegates Present—J. M. Mallett, of Johnson County, Nominated for Governor.

The Populist State Convention met in Fort Worth on the 13th instant and nominated a full state ticket.

The party re-affirmed its belief in and pledged its support to the principles enunciated in the Omaha, St. Louis and Cincinnati platforms. The party was re-christened the Allied People's Party. The following ticket was nominated:

The platform declares against the adoption of the proposed poll tax amendment to the constitution of Texas and is in favor of changing the scholastic age in the public schools from 8 to 17 years to 7 to 21 years limit.

BOB GARRETT CAPTURED AT NACONO.

Run Down After a Long and Exciting Chase by Deputy Sheriff J. C. Beakly and Placed in Jail at this Place Tuesday Morning.

Deputy J. C. Beakley came in on the hack Tuesday having in custody Bob Garrett who was at once placed in jail on a charge of forcibly restraining the liberties of his step daughter, M. V. Boales, who was recently married to A. L. Norman, a young man who lives in the Dunn community.

Garrett is said to have persuaded Norman's wife, under false pretenses, to accompany him on a journey to Sutton county, but shortly after the couple started the ruse became known to Mr. Norman and he applied to the authorities in an endeavor to get his wife back.

Garrett left a wife and a number of children behind who were to follow him, ostensibly for a moment, Sutton county, but in reality they were making for the Indian Territory, from which place they came to this county a few months ago. From the movements of Garrett's wife and family, Deputy Beakley, who undertook to find Norman's better half for him, was enabled to get some idea as to the real intentions of the fleeing parties, and at once started in pursuit. MILLER NOMINATED FOR REPRESENTATIVE

Secures the Nomination on First Ballot at Convention Held at Midland on 15th Instant—Platform Declares in Favor of Protecting Unexpired Leases.

The convention to nominate a candidate for this the one hundred and first representative district convened in Midland Friday, the 15th instant.

Hon. Ed W. Smith of Big Springs, was made permanent chairman and M. G. Abernathy secretary. The convention was called to order at one o'clock in the afternoon and completed its labors in a few hours.

W. J. Miller, of Big Springs, secured the nomination on first ballot.

The platform declares for the abolishment of the absolute lease line, the protection of the valid leases until their expiration and a modification of the present quarantine regulations, so that cattle free from infection may pass at any time of the year. It also declares in favor of the establishment by the state of a sanitarium for consumptives and for the protection of the public against tuberculosis and that all unorganized counties in the 101 representative district shall be attached to counties in the same, 101 district. A. C. Wilmeth of this place was chosen chairman to serve during the ensuing two years.

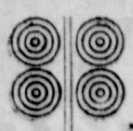
