

Dear Editor,

What is faith? Faith is whatever you center your life around. If you organize your life around making money then money is your faith, or god. If you center your life around God and living his way the very best you can, then God is your faith.

The first faith above is idolatrous and leads to self-destruction. The second faith is true faith for it is creative and builds up life. But both are faith, for each one is the central organizing principle in someone's life.

But even true faith always has an element of doubt within it. Take biblical Abraham for an example. He was absolutely certain he had experienced something of God, and a call from God to be, do, and find something more. But his journey of faith was always a journey that struggled with doubt about whether he was getting the call of God right. Scripture says that after Abraham experienced God's call "he went out from his homeland, Babylonia, to he knew not where".

Thus we can be absolutely certain that we are centered around God in out inner being. But we can never be absolutely certain that we have the details, doctrines, and definitions of walking in God's way of life all figured out. These will need to be worked on and worked at, all the rest of our lives. And new levels of understanding should always be evolving within us. At best, our understandings will be only partial truths of the Infinite.

This understanding of what faith is, keeps us humble. Faith is not what doctrines we believe. It is what centers and governs our whole life. If this is understood and held to, it would stop so many wars, hatreds, divisions and ugly attitudes of arrogance.

My papa at age 86 has had a very interesting life. 

Railway art at PPHM

With the expansion of the railroads, the West became an increasingly appealing destination for travelers who were intrigued by paintings of a landscape and culture both exotic and quintessentially American as seen in Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway (ATSF) advertisements.

Plains Historical Museum's Foran Gallery on June 23 in an exhibit called Training the World to Travel West: Paintings of way Collection.

At the turn of the 20th century the ATSF, now known as the Burlington Northern & Santa Fe Railway (BNSF), initiated an innovative art program intended to establish a distinctive corporate identity and promote tourism in a grand advertising west, ATSF hired artists to paint images of picturesque scenes loss of a great Lion. along its routes.

ings either by trade or direct purchase. While the railway purchased many paintings with cash, it frequently took artwork in exchange for train tickets, meals, and accommodations. By purchasing paintings outright, the Railway could prevent any of flexibility in its advertising.

The ATSF Railway promoted its Southwestern routes through reproductions of paintings in books and travel brochures, and on calendars, posters, menus and postcards. Many of these appreciate the support we receive for our fundraising projects. items were used to decorate the walls of train depots and ticket offices, as were the original works themselves.

Training the World to Travel West focuses on categories that emerged naturally from the breadth of the collection: scenes of the Grand Canyon—the most prominent and celebrated landmark on the Railway; the land and culture of the Pueblo Indians of the Southwest; and the work of women artists.


WTAMU sophomore lands internship in Washington D.C.




7 on 7 Action
