Veterans Day honors those who sacrificed for freedom

In 1921 an unknown World War I American soldier was buried in Arlington National Cemetery. This site, on a hillside overlooking the Potomac River and the city of Washington, D.C., became the focal point of reverence for America's veterans. This memorial gesture took place on November 11 giving universal recognition to the celebrated ending of World War I fighting at 11 a.m., November 11, 1918 (the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month). The day became known as Armistice Day. In 1954 Congress passed the bill proclaiming November 11 as Veterans Day.

The Friona High School Annual Veterans Day program will be held Friday November 9 at 9:30 a.m. in the Friona High School gymnasium. All veterans, families, and community

members are invited to attend.

All veterans living in our community will be recognized during the program. Veterans are asked to arrive early and register as they enter the gym area. FHS flag girls will assist with registration. Veterans and their families are invited to sit in special seating on the west side of the gym floor.

Other highlights of the program will be musical presentations by the Friona High School Band and the FHS Choir. The Clovis ROTC will post the colors. Friona High School students will present information on the history of Veterans Day and school graduates who are presently serving in the armed forces will be honored.

A special recognition will honor the veterans of our community who have passed

away during the past year.

All veterans, their families and all community members are invited to a reception in the school cafeteria immediately following the program. The re-

ception is hosted by Friona FCCLA members.

Woman dies in pickup rollover

First responders were called to the scene of a one-vehicle rollover at 7:46 p.m., Friday, November 2, on County Road 19, about 4 1/2 miles northeast of Friona.

According to a report from Amarillo DPS, a 1997 Nissan pickup was southbound on the county road when it apparently drifted into the west ditch, overcorrected and went into a sideways skid, hit the east ditch, then rolled 2-3 times into a wheat field, landing on its top. Passersby saw

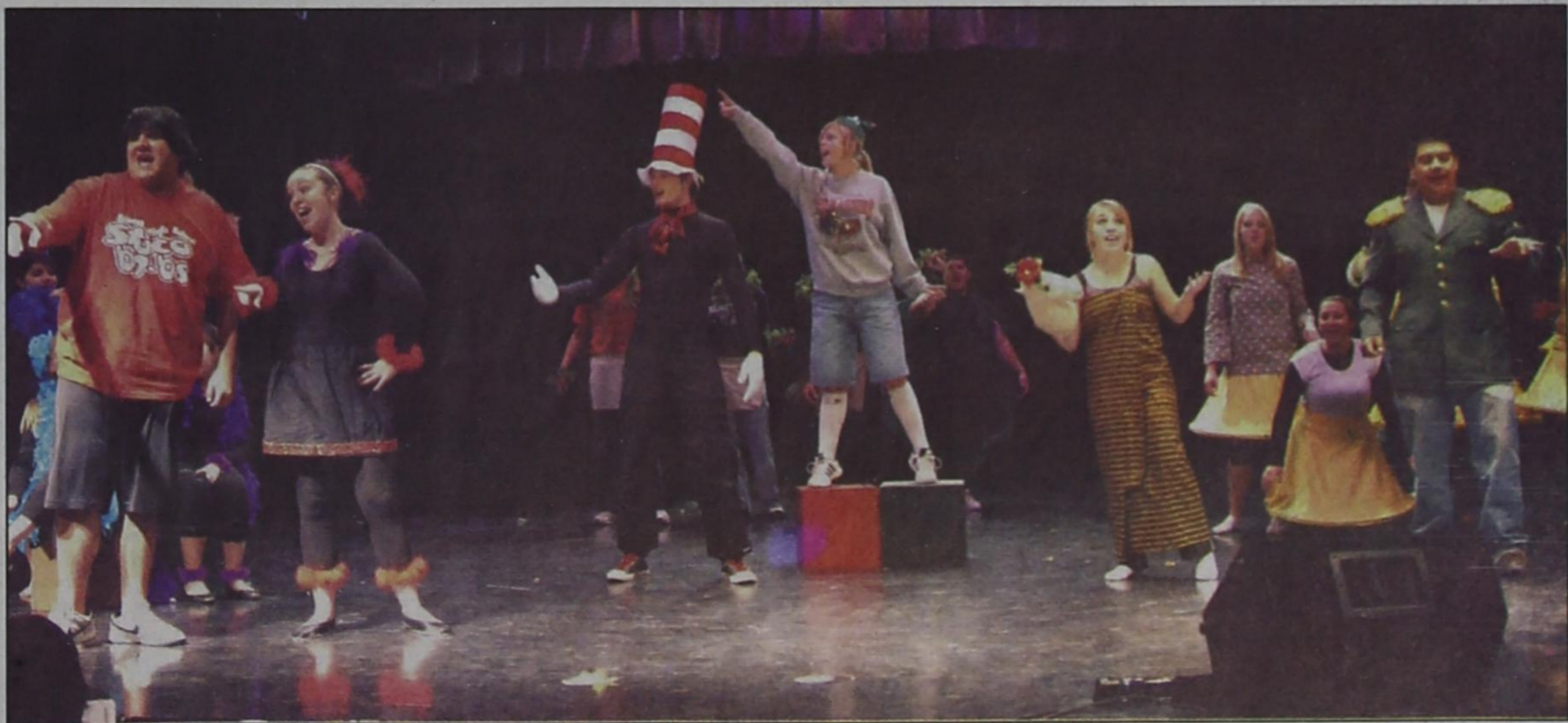
the headlights of the overturned vehicle in the field and reported the accident.

All three female occupants of the pickup were not wearing seatbelts and were ejected from the vehicle. Pronounced dead at the scene by Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace Vi Hutto was Sandra Bowman, 32, formerly of Friona who showed a current address in Clovis, according to the trooper report.

Bowman's daughter, Shaina Carranza, 14, of Friona and Kourtney

Boardly, 14, of Bovina, were passengers in the pickup. Both girls were injured and transported to an Amarillo hospital by helicopter from Parmer County Community Hospital.

DPS Trooper James Perez investigated the accident assisted by Trooper Trey Ellis. Also assisting were the Parmer County Sheriff's Department and the Friona Police Department. Both of the Friona EMS ambulances were dispatched to the scene along with the Friona Volunteer Fire Department.

State nutrition programs now administered by TDA

Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples announced the U.S. Department of Agriculture Nutrition Programs, formerly administered by the Health and Human Services Commission, have moved to the Texas Department of Agriculture effective Monday, October 1.

TDA becomes the administering agency for the programs, which will be part of TDA's Food and Nutrition Division. Since July 2003, TDA had administered the School Breakfast Program, the National School Lunch Program and the Seamless Summer Program for all Texas public schools.

TDA will now administer the School Breakfast Program and National School Lunch Program for private and faith-based schools, Summer Food Service Program, Special Milk Program, Child and Adult Care Food Program, Food Distribution Program, Commodity Supplemental Food Program and the Texas Commodity Assistance Program.

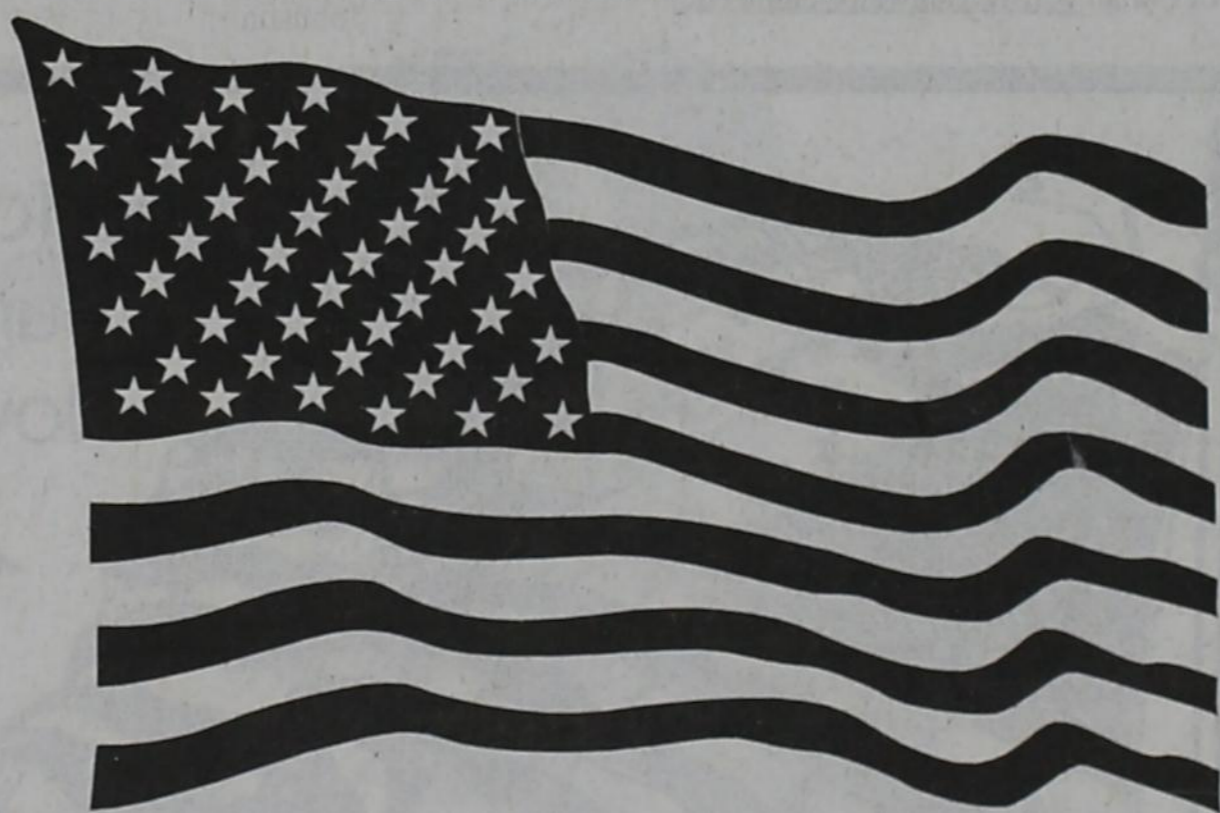
"The Nutrition Programs impact the health and well-being of both children and adults in

Texas," Commissioner Staples said. "By centralizing nutrition programs under one state agency, we will be able to enhance the level of service to our Texas clients who need and use these valuable programs."

Diane Bottoms, who was director for Special Nutrition at HHSC, will serve as deputy assistant commissioner in TDA's Food and Nutrition Division. Bottoms will be responsible for the transferred programs. She joins Fred Higgins, TDA's assistant commissioner for Food and Nutrition, and Angela Olige, deputy assistant commissioner for Food and Nutrition. HHSC's Special Nutrition staff were also transferred to TDA.

"Diane and her staff bring a wealth of experience and knowledge that will serve the children and people of Texas well," Commissioner Staples said. "They share TDA's commitment to fighting childhood obesity, encouraging good nutrition, supporting a healthy lifestyle and promoting Texas agriculture to aid us in this effort."

Chiefs dump Dimmitt 34-6 head for final at Muleshoe

The long awaited and much anticipated Chieftains-Muleshoe Mules football contest will kickoff Friday night November 9 at 7:30 p.m. at Muleshoe. However the game will not have the pre-season anticipated shootout for the district championship.

The Mules are on top of District 2-2A. Other than a close loss to Idalou earlier in the season the Mules remain undefeated. The Chiefs district record is 3-2 with losses to Bushland and Tulia.

In order for Friona to make the playoffs they need to beat Muleshoe and the Tulia Hornets

need to lose to the Highland Park Hornets. Highland Park has scored only one touchdown all season. A win by Tulia sends them to the playoffs as the number two seed in Division II. Muleshoe is the Division I big school in 2-2A.

In a non-battle last Friday, the Chiefs cranked up the offense to hand a 34-6 loss to the Dimmitt Bobcats. After a scoreless 1st quarter, the Chiefs put 17 points on the board in the 2nd quarter. Sawyer Reed scored on an 8-yard run. Later Gerardo Garza was good on a 30-yard field goal and Dillon Welch scored on a 3-yard run.

Rodrigo Vazquez was 4 for 4 on extra points in the game.

Garza increased the score in the 3rd quarter to 20-0 with his second field goal, a 20-yard boot. Later in the 3rd Reed launched a 36-yard touchdown pass to Ritchie Casas. The scoring was capped off in the 4th quarter as backup quarterback Justin Dominguez caught Ryan Schwab on a fly pattern and reeled off a 25-yard TD pass.

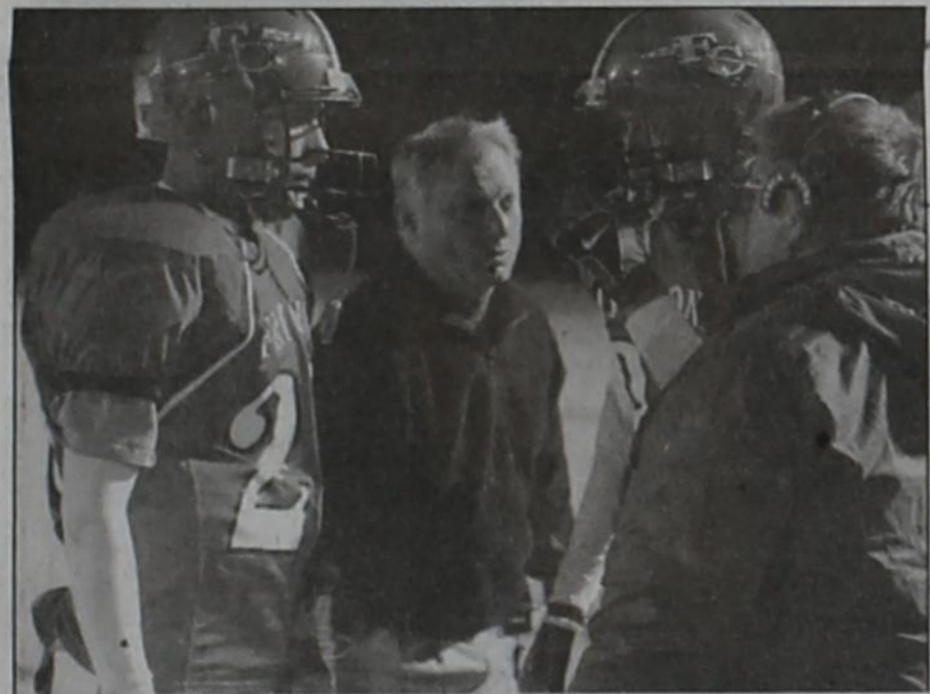
The Bobcats were unable to mount an offensive charge against the Chiefs defense, led by solid play from Chris Haile, Alex Dunnam, Trent Hudson, Matthew Stanbery and interceptions by Gerald Padilla and Sawyer Reed.

Reed completed 5 of 14 passes for 129 yards and a touchdown. Dominguez completed 2 of 3 attempts for 51 yards and a touchdown. Reed rushed 13 times for 97 yards. Dillon Welch had 9 carries for 25 yards, Joey Mendoza 7 for 38, Gerald Padilla 7 for 25, Raul Licerio 3 for 9, and Dominguez 3 for 17.

In receiving, Ritchie Casas caught 3 passes for 77 yards, Schwab caught 3 for 96 yards, and Dominguez caught one pass good for 7 yards. The Chiefs amassed 391 offensive yards, 180 passing and 211 rushing.

Coach Bob Ferguson said everybody is healthy for this week. Dillon Welch is still favoring an ankle problem but will play. "We are going to suit up, go play and have fun," Coach Ferguson said about the Mules. "They are fast and good," Ferguson said. "They have 5-6 players that can score and their quarterback (Garrett Riley) is very accurate so we'll have to focus on the coverage and the defensive line to pressure the quarterback."

Game time in Muleshoe is 7:30 p.m. The Muleshoe junior class is hosting a Thanksgiving dinner in the high school cafeteria prior to the game and all Friona fans are invited to participate. Tickets are \$8 per person for turkey, dressing, and all the trimmings.

Our Life Story

By John Lee & Almajo Holley Witten

Every month, a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home or Friona Heritage Estates, writes a story about his/her life's history for the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times", for printing in this issue. This month we feature John Lee and Almajo Holley Witten.

Lee was born in Big Springs, Texas to George Thomas and Roxie Alice Green Witten. He was the younger of two boys growing up in Colorado City, Texas and graduated from high school in 1938. 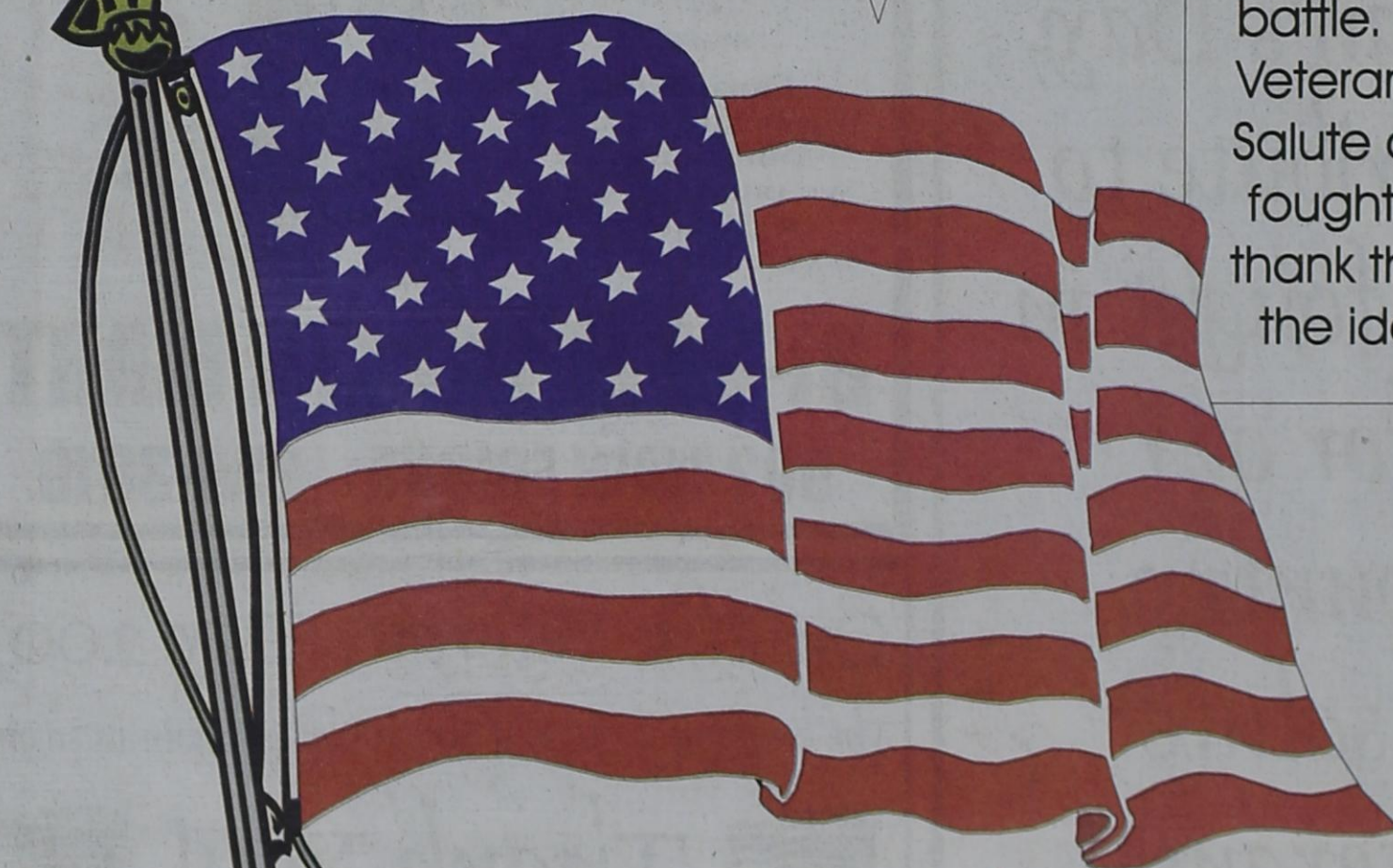
