Cucumber salad made simple

How much simpler can a recipe get. Most everybody has done a cucumber salad. This one has a small twist with some bell peppers. Barb Jones of Panama, Illinois submitted the recipe to American Profile magazine. She says, "To make this salad more colorful use 1/2 green bell pepper and 1/2 red bell pepper." Got celery seeds? You're gonna' need them.

Cucumber Salad

Serves 12.

3 lg cucumbers thinly sliced

1 lg green bell pepper thinly sliced 1 cup thinly sliced onions

1 tbsp celery seeds

1 tbsp salt

1/2 cup cider vinegar

3/4 cup sugar

1. Combine cucumbers, bell peppers, onions, celery seeds, and salt in a large bowl. 2. Cover with plastic wrap and let stand one hour at room

3. Drain cucumber mixture in a colander, shaking off

excess liquid. Return mixture to bowl.

4. Add vinegar and sugar; toss gently. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate 6 hours to overnight. The salad may be stored in the refrigerator up to three weeks.

Amarillo hotels offer rooms for cancer patients

ment possible for local patients traveling to Amarillo by supporting the American Cancer Society's Guestroom program. In 2007-2008, the Ambassador Hotel donated 97 rooms, totaling more than \$14,500, to the Society's Guestroom program.

Getting the most successful cancer treatment means a patient must sometimes leave home to be at the medical center where the most effective treatments are available. However, many patients forego this option because they cannot afford the costs associated with travel, all in addition to the already mounting burden of medical bills and interrupted employment.

The Society's Guestroom Program offers cancer patients traveling more than 50 miles to Amarillo a free or discounted hotel room. It's a cooperative effort between the Society and local hotels.

"The response of the hotel management has been heartwarming," said Terri Prescott, community manager in health initiatives for the American Cancer Society in Amarillo. "The Ambassador Hotel has gone out of their way to generously accommodate nearly every patient that we have referred. They





Free air sniffs along I-40 nab marijuana

Wednesday March 11 was not a good day for the marijuana trade along I-40. DPS troopers made four arrests, all for marijuana trafficking, and one big cash haul.

At 1:36 p.m. troopers stopped a Chrysler for speding. The drive, Arthur Hughes Shaw, 54, of Monarch Beach, California was on his way from Phoenix to North Carolina. Troopers were suspicious and asked for consent to search but Mr. Shaw refused so they called in the K-9 unit. The dog alerted on the vehicle and a subsequent search revealed 6 bundles of marijuana in the trunk.

In Potter County at 4:16 p.m. troopers stopped a 2008 Mercury. The driver, Thomas D. Roy of Round Lake, New York, was on his way from Las Vegas to New York. Troopers suspected him of criminal activity but he also denied consent to search. So the troopers called the K-9 and another free air sniff was conducted. A subsequent search found 261 pounds of marijuana valued at \$84,825 concealed in the trunk.

Another stop at 4:25 p.m. in Potter County was on a 2009 Cadillac. The driver, Andre Jones, 33, and passenger Ruben Wilkerson, 26, both of Akron, Ohio, were on the way to Phoenix. Troopers noted signs of criminal activity and smelled burnt marijuana (oops!).

A probable cause search of the Cadillac turned up \$67,990 in currency in the men's luggage, plus 22 grams

Again in Potter County, troopers stopped a Honda SUV for speeding. (Rule number one when hauling marijuana: don't speed). The driver, Nicholas Maiolo, 63, of Bayfield, Colorado, was traveling from Tucson to Fairfield, Ohio. He gave consent to search and troopers found 87 pounds of marijuana valued at \$28,275 in the cargo area.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced state sales tax revenue in February totaled \$1.74 billion, down 2.6 percent compared to February 2008.

"State sales tax collections declined in February as important sectors such as retail trade and construction continue to struggle," Combs said. "While state sales tax revenue has grown 2.8 percent through the first half of fiscal 2009, further declines are expected as the economy continues to weaken."

State sales tax revenue for February and March payments made to local governments represent sales that occurred in January. The Comptroller's next sales tax allocation will be made on Friday, April 10.

Parmer County's March 2009 payment totaled \$36,778.84 broken down as Bovina \$6,186.07; Farwell \$7,106.60; and Friona \$23,486.17. In March 2008 the tax payment total was \$35,470.60.

Comparing tax receipts from the same period last year, payments were up 3.68%, broken down as Bovina 10.92%; Farwell -11.09%; and Friona 7.24%.

For the year, Parmer County cities have received a total of \$126,383.84 as compared to \$120,712.73 for the same period last year, a 4.69% change.



They plan to continue celebrating, with a trip to Europe, later in the Spring.






