I had it for several years when I lived in Dallas. During that time I had it refinished with new varnish and new seat upholstery. The facelift didn't change the memories.

I'm told my great grandpa Walter Allen loved to read newspapers and sat many hours in the old rocker with the Wylie or Dallas papers. He would often narrate as he read, "It says here that...... The right arm of the old rocker still carries an indention brought on by years of Grandpa rubbing his finger back and forth as he sat.

Fast forward to last week. The two little girls from the 1920-21 photo were reunited with each other and with the old rocker here in Friona. Hannah Lookingbill, 90, and her Aunt Lois Spainhour, 91, spent the better part of three days reliving those days of long ago.

The two have been in touch over the years at various family gatherings but it had been over 10 years since they had last seen each other. They are both now widows. Aunt Lois lives in an assisted living facility in Greenville, Texas. Cousin Judy Allen, a retired school teacher who lives in Garland,

# County receives local sales tax

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said the state collected \$1.47 billion in sales tax in September, down 12.5 percent compared to a year ago.

"Declining sales tax collections, which began in February, have continued with September's collections," Combs said. "Weakness is still evident in all major sectors of the state economy, including oil and natural gas, retail trade, and construction. Decreases in monthly collections are expected to continue through the end of 2009."


Parmer County's October 2009 payment totaled \$35,682.89 broken down as Bovina \$5,747.15; Farwell \$6,339.08; and Friona \$23,596.66. In October 2008 the tax payment total was \$40,333.54.

Comparing tax receipts from the same period last year, payments were down -11.53%, broken down as Bovina 11.52%; Farwell -13.46%; and Friona -10.99%.




# Bandy's celebrate 60 years

This divine revelation is viewed as a turning point in Abram's life. It is symbolized by God revealing Himself under a new name.






A Celebration of Life Memorial was held Saturday, October 10, 2009, at 2:00 p.m. in Amarillo, Texas.

APPLICATION AND DRAFT PERMIT. Cargill Meat Solutions Corporation, P.O. Box 579, Friona, Texas 79035, a Meat Packing Plant facility, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for a renewal of Federal Operating Permit (herein referred to as Permit) No. 02613, Application No. 13790, to authorize operation of the Cargill Meat Solutions Friona. The area addressed by the application is located at four miles west of Friona on U.S. Highway 60 West in Friona, Parmer County, Texas 79035. This application was received by the TCEQ on April 23, 2009.

The purpose of a federal operating permit is to improve overall compliance with the rules governing air pollution control by clearly listing all applicable requirements, as defined in Title 30 Texas Administrative Code § 122.10 (30 TAC § 122.10). The draft permit, if approved, will codify the conditions under which the area must operate. The permit will not authorize new construction. The TCEQ Executive Director has completed the technical review of the application and has made a preliminary decision to prepare a draft permit for public comment and review. The TCEQ Executive Director recommends issuance of this draft permit. The permit application, statement of basis and draft permit will be available for viewing and copying at the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality Central Office, 12100 Park 35 Circle, Building E, First Floor, Austin, Texas; the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality Amarillo Regional Office, 3918 Canyon Drive, Amarillo, Texas 79109-4933; and the Friona City Hall, 623 Main Street, Friona, Texas beginning the first day of publication of this notice. At the TCEQ Central and Regional Offices, relevant supporting materials for the draft permit, as well as the New Source Review permits which have been incorporated by reference, may be viewed and copied. Any person with difficulties obtaining these materials due to travel constraints may contact the TCEQ Central Office file room at (512) 239-1540.

PUBLIC COMMENT/NOTICE AND COMMENT HEARING. Any person may submit written comments on the draft permit. Comments relating to the accuracy, completeness and appropriateness of the permit conditions may result in changes to the draft permit.

A person who may be affected by the emission of air pollutants from the permitted area may request a notice and comment hearing. The purpose of the notice and comment hearing is to provide an additional opportunity to submit comments on the draft permit. The permit may be changed based on comments pertaining to whether the permit provides for compliance with 30 TAC Chapter 122 (examples may include that the permit does not contain all applicable requirements or the public notice procedures were not satisfied). The TCEQ may grant a notice and comment hearing on the application if a written hearing request is received within 30 days after publication of the newspaper notice. The hearing request must include the basis for the request, including a description of how the person may be affected by the emission of air pollutants from the application area. The request should also specify the conditions of the draft permit that are inappropriate or specify how the preliminary decision to issue or deny the permit is inappropriate. All reasonably ascertainable issues must be raised and all reasonably available arguments must be submitted by the end of the public comment period. If a notice and comment hearing is granted, all individuals that submitted written comments or a hearing request will receive written notice of the hearing. This notice will identify the date, time, and location for the hearing.

Written public comments and/or requests for a notice and comment hearing should be submitted to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, Office of the Chief Clerk, MC-105, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711-3087, or electronically at www.tceq.state.tx.us/about/comments.html and received within 30 days from the date of newspaper publication of this notice.

A notice of proposed final action that includes a response to comments and identification of any changes to the draft permit will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments, a hearing request, or requested to be on the mailing list for this application. This mailing will also provide instructions for public petitions to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to request that the EPA object to the issuance of the proposed permit. After receiving a petition, the EPA may only object to the issuance of a permit which is not in compliance with the applicable requirements or the requirements of 30 TAC Chapter 122.


Dear Student:


Thank you for sending Flat Stanley to the White House. I am pleased to report that he worked hard, listened carefully, and had a lot of fun!
