

Thus she claimed \$50,000 from the Daily Express and a like amount from the Daily Mail. The Express took the thing quite calmly, but the Daily Mail turned to savage irony in its news story. The Mail said it could only express in all humility its gratitude to the pious plaintiff for her Christian forbearance in claiming so small a sum as \$50,000. And so it is not only a lesson in the love of God but also in human responsibility in the matter of sin and salvation. Father, Give Me the Portion. What sort of man would make such a prayer? First, a self-centered man. "Give me" was on his armor. He was thinking only of himself, forgetful of any obligation he might have at home, of any service he might render to his father. His idea was that his father and the world owed him something, and he was out to get it. That is a true picture of sin. It is essentially selfish. The thing that Jesus had to combat and against which he was always preaching was selfishness. It was the secret of every step that led the prodigal to the waste and the shame of his life. 

As the result of co-ordinated Red

Cross chapter efficiency, no authenticated case of starvation as a result of drought has been uncovered. Large quantities of new and used clothing were distributed. In direct

consequence many school children resumed their studies, who had been kept at home for lack of sufficient protection from the elements. In some instances, rural schools that had been closed were enabled to reopen as a result of Red Cross relief. States involved were: Alabama. Arkansas, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, North Carolina, North Dakota. Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Vir-

ginia. Many of these States had been hard hit by a succession of floods, crop failures, low prices and economic depression, and drought constituted a climax to the cycle of distress

"Wherever I went," wrote one observer, "I made a point of asking what would have happened if the Red Cross had not been able to respond. In widely scattered points, from leading citizens, came the answer that undoubtedly there would have been many deaths directly from starvation, with epidemics preying upon the undernourished."



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

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
