City Council meeting agenda: where's the money?

The Friona city council will meet in regular session Monday September 13 at 6:30 p.m. in the council chambers at 619 Main St. All council meetings are open to the public.

The agenda for Monday's meeting will be primarily about money, i.e. budget and taxes. The city's fiscal year ends September 30. Departmental budgets and tax

rates for the October 1, 2010-September 30, 2011, fiscal year will consume most of the council meeting.

Public hearing time is set aside at the start of the meeting to hear public comments regarding the proposed tax rate of \$0.79 per \$100 valuation and comments on the 2010-2011 budget.

The council held three meetings in August, the regular

meeting August 9, a special meeting August 23, and a budget workshop August 30. The minutes of those meetings will be considered for approval.

Proposed budgets for Prairie Acres Nursing Home and the Friona Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) will be considered. Approval of appointments to the FEDC

board of directors will also be discussed.

Item 10 on the tentative agenda reads: "Consider and take action on approval of Ordinance 2010.09.13A adopting budget and making appropriation for support of city government for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2010 and ending September 30, 2011."

In other business, the council

will consider a request from Abraham Castanon requesting water service outside the city limits and vote to change the next council meeting to October 18 since the second Monday, October 11, is a Columbus Day holiday.

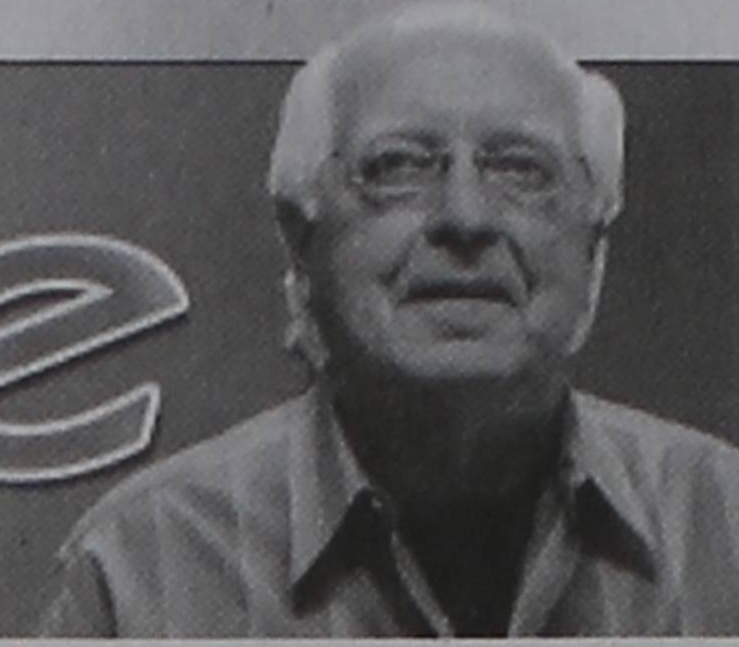
Before adjourning the council will consider the city's accounts payable and August 2010 financial statement. The items presented

here are from the tentative council agenda and are subject to change. The final agenda is posted on the front door of city hall 72 hours prior to the meeting.

Friona city council members are Jim Atwell, Martha Barker, Mark Osborn, Cheryl Weatherly, Charlie Pope, and Mayor J. B. Douglas. The city manager is Patricia Phipps.

Hello there ya'll! We are excited to have you back for a visit.

This is a weekend that a lot of people have been working on for several years it seems. A big hello and welcome to the 500+ ex-students, faculty, and visitors that will be here for the Maize Days and All-School Reunion activities.

My hometown is Hillsboro, Texas. Although I left shortly after high school, I have returned for several class reunions over the years, most recently my 50th. It brought back a flood of memories to revisit my old high school and the downtown buildings where I spent so many hours and days, and drive by the homes we lived in.

I hope this return to your hometown will be filled with many pleasant memories. I can tell you that people who live here, and read the newspaper,

enjoy hearing about former folks like you and where you are and what you are doing these days.

Thanks for coming home one more time!

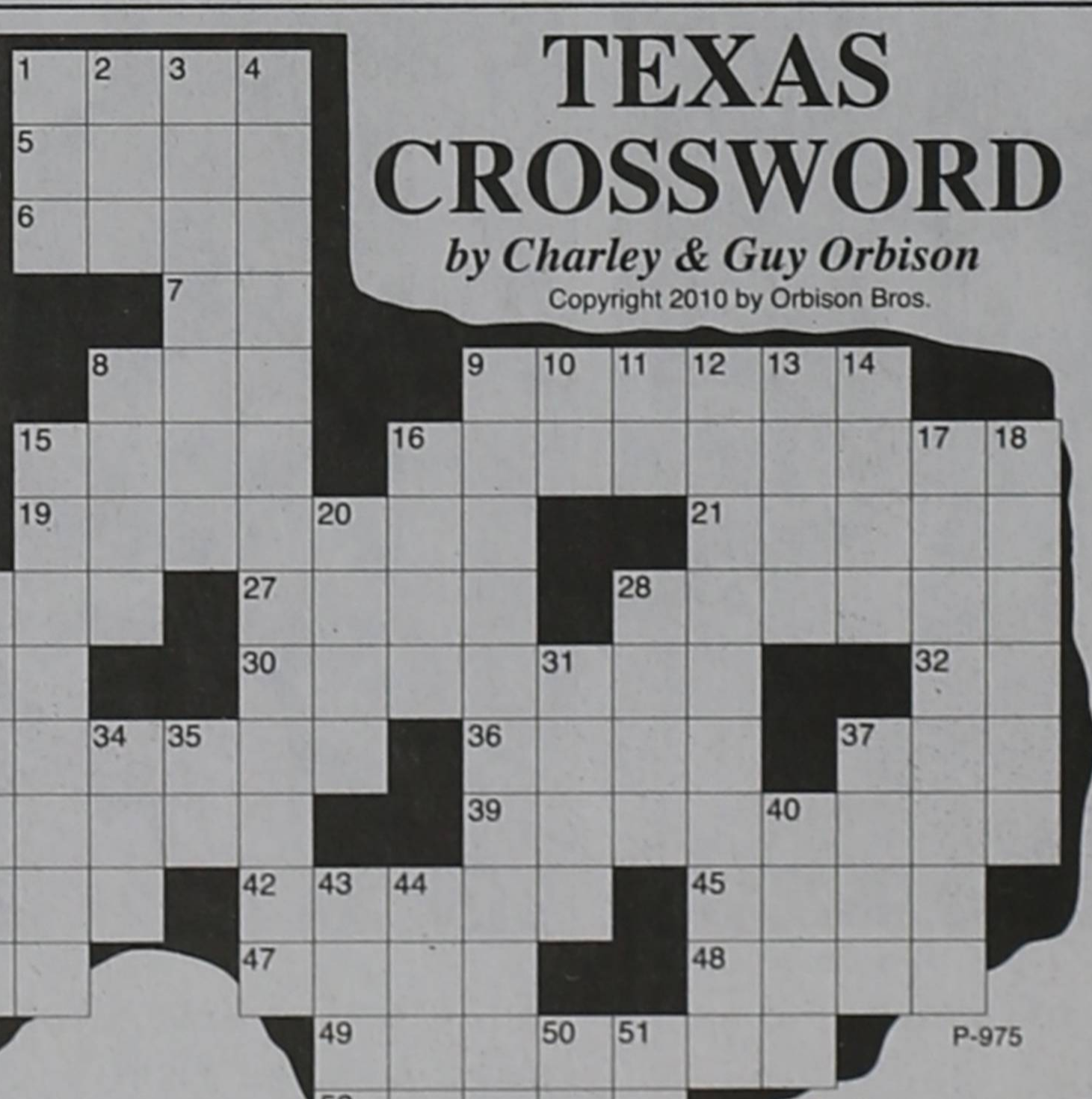

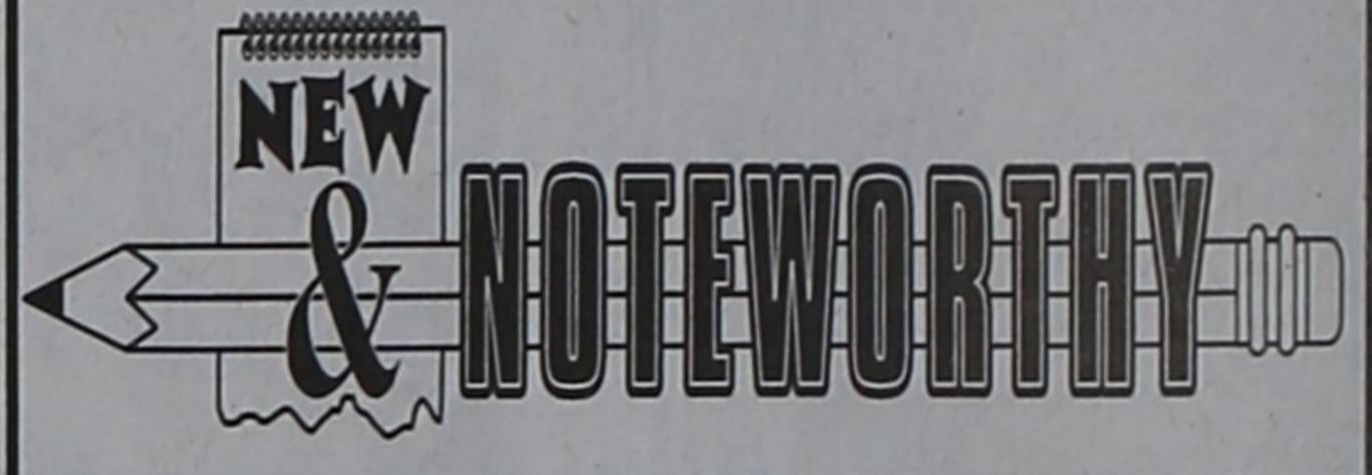

The big cookie search

From the Church Supper Magazine Cookbook. "I search all year for new cookie recipes to try and I give them as gifts to loved ones. I make hundreds of cookies each year." That is from Linda Kappelt of Linesville, Pennsylvania who submitted this cookie recipe to the magazine.

Aren't cookies fun? You will need some parchment paper and a ruler. The folks at church will love you.

Chocolate Coconut Slices

Makes about 3 dozen

- 6 tbsp butter softened
- 1 cup confectioners' sugar
- 1 egg
- 2 oz unsweetened chocolate, melted and cooled
- 2 tsp vanilla extract
- 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 tsp baking soda
- Filling:
- 1/3 cup cream cheese, softened
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 1 cup flaked coconut
- 1/2 cup finely chopped pecans

1. In a small bowl, cream the butter and confectioners' sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in egg, chocolate and vanilla. Combine the flour and baking soda; gradually add to the creamed mixture and mix well. Refrigerate for one hour.

2. In another bowl, beat the cream cheese and vanilla until smooth. Stir in coconut and nuts. Refrigerate for one hour.

3. Shape dough into an 8 1/2 inch x 6 inch rectangle. Shape coconut mixture into an 8 1/2 inch log; place on dough. Wrap dough around filling, sealing the seam. Wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate for 2-3 hours or until firm.

4. Cut into 1/4 inch slices. Place 2 inches apart on parchment paper lined baking sheets. Bake at 375 for 10-12 minutes or until set. Remove to wire racks.

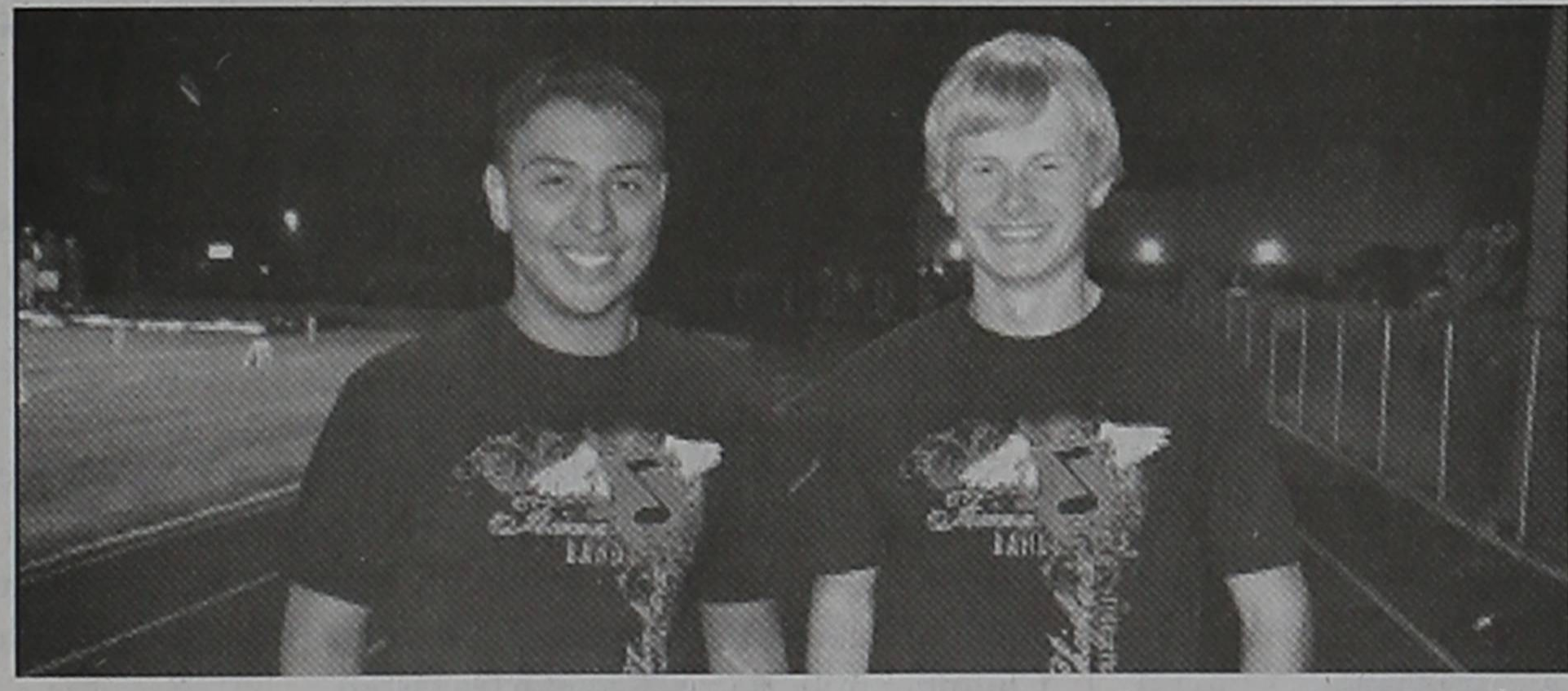

The Noon Lions will have a burgers and fries tailgate party for the Chieftains vs. Bushland game on Friday October 8. As always the club appreciates your support.

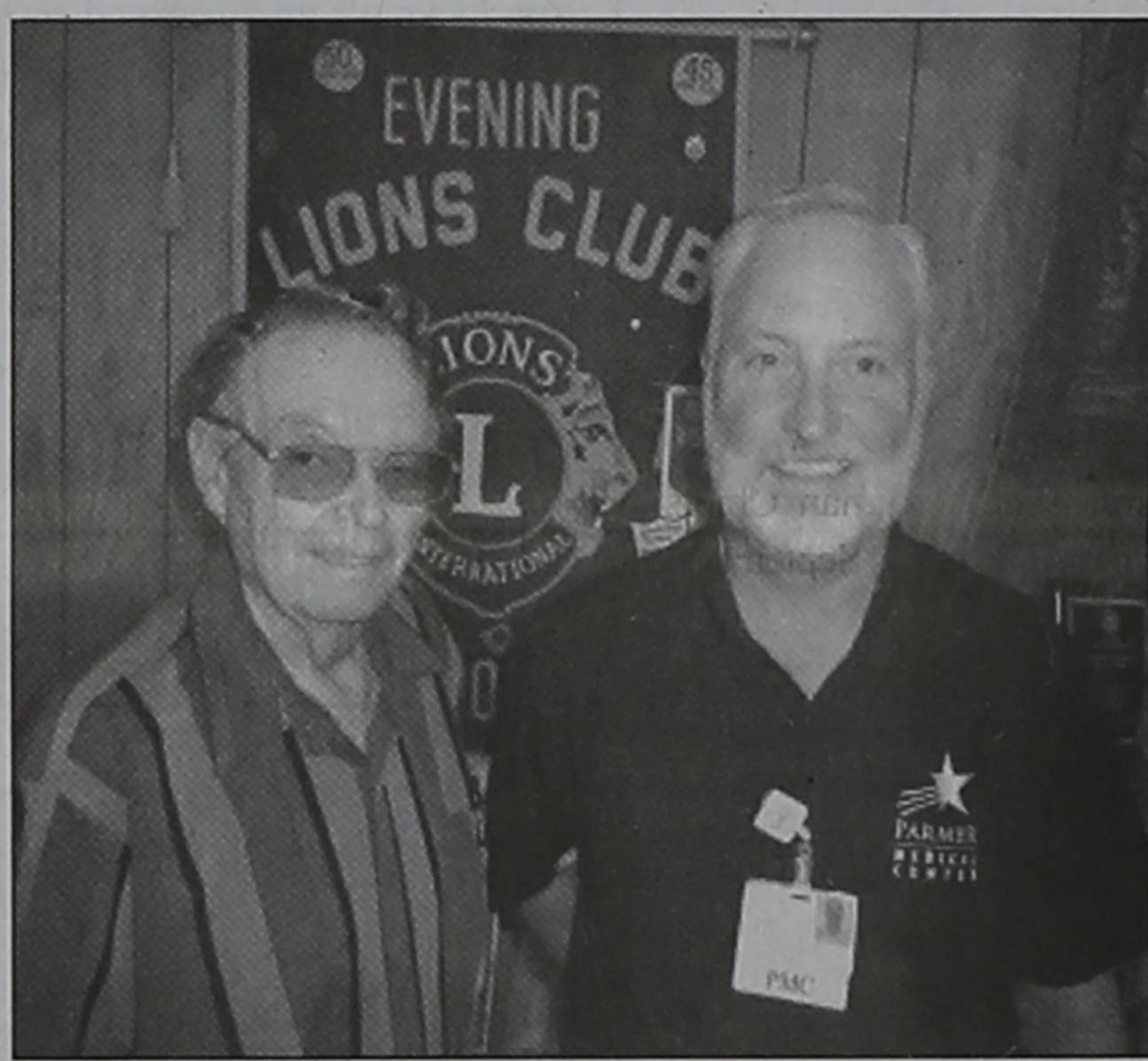

The 9th grade Chiefs beat Bovina 12-0 last Thursday. All the scoring came in the 3rd quarter as Omar Ramos scored on the first play through the middle for a 61-yard TD run. The point after failed.

On Bovina's first series in the 3rd quarter the Chiefs held and Sergio Soliz tackled the punter for a 15-yard loss giving the Chiefs the ball on their 5-yard line. Palacios caused three fumbles and the Chiefs Omar Ramos and Brad Stowers each recovered one. Ramos had 8 rushes for 105 yards, Stowers carried 3 times for 29 yards, Sergio Meza was 3 for 23, Michael Garcia 4 for 16, Alex Ovalle 2 for 14, and Eddy Garcia 2 for 2 yards. Ramos also blocked a punt.

Brad Stowers completed 2 of 7 passes, both to Ramos, for 28 yards. The freshman Chiefs will play at Idalou at 5 p.m. Thursday, September 9.

JV Chiefs beat Stratford 22-16

Friona's JV Chieftains met the Stratford Elks junior varsity Thursday September 2 in Canyon.

Coach David Towner said, "The boys played extremely hard against a very physical Stratford team. We had different players step up and make plays when the team needed it. We will work next week to correct the mistakes we made." The JV plays Idalou there on Thursday September 9.

Friona scored first on a 52-yard touchdown pass from Francisco Martinez to Marco Terrones, with Terrones adding the two-point conversion. Stratford went ahead briefly as the Chiefs got a holding penalty in the end zone for a safety, then Stratford scored on a 2-yard run to give the Elks 10-8 lead.

But Friona came back with a 44-yard touchdown run by Martinez to go ahead 14-10. Then Stephen Dominguez scored on a 5-yard run with the 2-point conversion by Stephen Dominguez to pull ahead 22-10. The Elks managed one final touchdown but it was not enough as the Chiefs came home with their second win, 22-16.

The Chiefs amassed 175 yards rushing and 63 passing for a total of 238 yards. The defense held Stratford to a total of 162 offensive yards. The JV record is now 2-0.

After a Stratford first quarter score, Chieftain quarterback Brenner Barnett connected with Caleb Monroe on a 19-yard touchdown pass to even the score at 7-7. Ernesto Monreal kicked the point after.

The Elks scored first in the second quarter to take the lead again, but senior running back Zack Fair outran the Elks defense to score on a 60-yard run and Monreal's kick tied the game 14-14. The Elks would add another score in the quarter to take the 21-14 lead into the half.

Other Chief rushing totals and carries are: Duncan Welch 3 for 45, Chris Garcia 6 for 21, Brenner Barnett 3 for 15, and Monreal 5 for 5 yards.

Barnett completed 6 of 22 pass attempts. Monroe caught 4 for 70 yards and Fair caught 2 passes for 16 yards. Monroe also punted 5 times for 148 yards, a 29.60 average.

Recording unassisted tackles for the defense were Monroe 3, Alan Tafoya 2, Monreal 2, Dominique Kellum 2, and Diego Licerio, Raul Anchondo, and Barnett 1 each.

The Chieftains host Idalou Friday September 10 in a homecoming game. Kickoff is at 7:30 p.m. Friona has an open date next week before opening district play at home vs. the Childress Bobcats Friday September 24.

Friona State Bank trip to Switzerland, Austria, Bavaria

On Monday, July 19, 2010, twenty-six members of the FSB Senior Club left for a nine day journey to Switzerland, Austria, and Bavaria. The ultimate destination was the small Bavarian village of Oberammergau and the historic Passion Play which dates back to 1634. The Friona travelers were joined by others from Pennsylvania, Ohio, Arizona, California, New York, and Dallas.

We left Dulles Airport for an overnight flight to Zurich, Switzerland, but not before we were delayed by a thunderstorm. Boarding was halted for an hour because of lightning after about ten of us were already on the plane. Some of us on the plane saw our luggage sitting uncovered on the tarmac getting very wet in the downpour. Unfortunately, our luggage was not waterproof – and neither were our clothes!

We arrived in Zurich about 9:00 a.m. on July 20. Our tour manager Rebecca met us and announced that we would take a short tour of Zurich before proceeding to Engelberg and our hotel. We took a walking tour of The Altstadt, or Old Town. None of the cities that we visited allow tour buses in the older parts of the cities, so we walked in every city to see the historic sites.

The most notable sight was St. Peter's Kirche, which dates from the 13th century and is Zurich's oldest church. The clock face on the tower measures 28.5 feet, which is the largest clock face in Europe. Rebecca warned us that Zurich is a very expensive city, and five of us discovered how true that is. We shared two salads, two pizzas, and each had a bottle of water, and it cost 80 Swiss francs, the equivalent of \$80.

After lunch we traveled by bus to Engelberg where we would spend the next three nights. Engelberg, the "City of Angels", is a mountain resort located at the foot of Mt. Titlis, the highest mountain in the region. When we arrived, Eve Thonney, who was a foreign exchange student at Friona High School, during the 1962-63 school year, met us for a short visit. Eve stayed with the Ernest Osborn family in Friona and came to visit with Valoris Osborn and Karen Renner, as well as Sharon White and Marca Herring, who were in school during the year that Eve was in Friona.

Engelberg was the location from which we traveled to both Bern and Lucerne, so most of the exploration of the town was done on one's own. Some members of the group attended an organ concert at the Benedictine Monastery one evening. Others of us attended a concert where all of the performers were local people. A group of children performed some folk dances and then played musical selections on brooms and washboards. There was a group of yodelers who both sang and yodeled, but the highlight was a quartet of men who played the Alphorn, a long, wooden horn curved on the end. They played several songs, but the one that we all recognized was "Tequila"!

On Wednesday we drove to Bern, the capital of Switzerland. Our first stop was the Bear Pit. The bear is the mascot of the city, as the founder, Bertold V, named it after the first animal he killed in the local woods. We were fortunate that it was not too warm yet and we were able to see a mother bear and two cubs playing near the Aare River.

From there we went to the Rose Garden, which overlooks the city and the trademark red roofs of Bern. We had a traditional cheese fondue lunch, and then we went on a walking tour of the Old City. We saw the Houses of Parliament, Einstein's House, and the Cathedral, which dates from the 15th century. The highlight of the tour was the clock tower which has been keeping time since 1530. It is quite elaborate with marching bears, fools, and knights that strike bells as a gilded rooster crows. An astronomical clock on

the same tower keeps track of the day, month, zodiac, and the moon.

On Thursday we traveled to Lucerne. Our first stop was the Lion Monument, which is an image of a dying lion carved out of a sheer sandstone face. It commemorates the Swiss guards who died defending Louis XVI of France in 1792. We then walked across the Chapel Bridge, built in the 14th century, destroyed by fire in 1993, and rebuilt after the fire. Many of the buildings in Old Town are decorated with frescoes depicting scenes of life from the Middle Ages.

Thursday afternoon we rode on gondolas to the top of Mt. Pilatus. On the way up we saw farm houses and cows with bells. It started raining before we reached the top, so we were not able to see much. We rode down on a cogwheel train through four tunnels and an incline of almost 50%. We saw several cows grazing on the hillside and one of our fellow passengers wondered if Texas cows would be able to stand on a hillside without falling over.

On Friday we left Switzerland for Innsbruck, Austria, via Lichtenstein, one of the four smallest countries in Europe. We had the opportunity to have our passports stamped in Vaduz, the capital, for three Swiss francs and to buy postage stamps which are considered small works of art and are prized by collectors. Lichtenstein is ruled by a prince who lives in a castle overlooking the city. When he is at home, his flag flies along with the country's flag. Had he been at home he could have watched some of us having a picnic lunch in the rain.

Shortly after leaving Vaduz we entered Austria, the third country that day. When we were about an hour outside of Innsbruck, we drove through a tunnel that was 8.68 miles long. We drove through many tunnels on this trip as the highways go through the mountains rather than around them.

After checking into the Hotel Innsbruck we took a driving tour of the city. We saw the ski run built for the 1964 and 1976 Winter Olympics and discovered that Innsbruck has a Triumphal Arch. This arch was commissioned by Empress Maria Theresa to celebrate the wedding of her second son to a Spanish princess. When her husband died unexpectedly the day after the wedding, the Empress had motifs of mourning incorporated into the design. Legend says that his death was the result of his partying too hard at the wedding. We also saw the Golden Roof, which was built for Emperor Maximilian I as a place where he could sit and enjoy tournaments in the square.

That evening for dinner we ate three foods that became symbolic of Austria and Bavaria for us. The first was pancake soup as an appetizer, which is a clear broth filled with very thin strips of pancakes. The second food was boiled potatoes served with pork schnitzel, and the third was apple strudel. Most of us tired of the pancake soup and boiled potatoes, but we never turned down the apple strudel.

"Raindrops on roses...these are a few of my favorite things". By the end of Saturday in Salzburg, most of us did not count raindrops as our favorite thing! We started our day in Salzburg in the beautiful Mirabell Gardens where the group was photographed. It was raining lightly. After the photograph, we walked through the gardens with a local guide who pointed out the steps which is the site of one of the scenes in *The Sound of Music*.

Then we left the gardens and walked toward the Salzach River and Old Town. We saw the house where Mozart lived as a young man, as well as the house where Christian Doppler, the discoverer of the Doppler Effect, was born.

As we crossed the river and walked into Old Town, it began raining harder. There were many tour groups besides ours, plus

the other people who were in town, so it was quite crowded. Because most people either carried an umbrella or wore a hooded jacket, it was difficult to stay with the right group, and four of our group members were lost for about two hours.

Fortunately, one of those who was lost had a satellite phone and was able to call our tour manager to be rescued. We saw Mozart's birthplace and lots of interesting shops. Many of the shops were marked by wrought iron guild signs dating from the Middle Ages.

After lunch we rode a funicular to the Hohensalzburg Fortress overlooking Salzburg. It was built in the 11th century and is the largest unconquered fortress in Europe. We climbed about 250 steps to the top of the tower where we had an unbelievable, if rainy, view of the city.

We had dinner that evening at the Stiftskeller St. Peter, a former monastery. Charlemagne ate here in 803 making it the oldest restaurant in Europe. After dinner Rebecca called taxis to take us to the bus, so we would not have to get wet again. There was a misunderstanding about where the taxis were to take us so nine of us ended up in a deserted bus lot. Fortunately for us, one of the men had a satellite phone and was able to call Rebecca, so she could rescue us. A tour manager's worst nightmare – losing nine members of her group in a city where they neither speak the language nor know where they are supposed to be!

We had some free time on Sunday morning so many of us walked around Innsbruck looking in the shops. We listened to a band playing in front of the Imperial Palace. One of the trumpet players reminded us of Dr. Alexander!

Sunday afternoon we went to Seebold, a ski resort close to Innsbruck and rode around the area in horse-drawn carriages. Next we went to a restaurant for a demonstration on how to make apple strudel. Peggy Monroe, Kriste Haile, Linda Brown, and Karen Renner volunteered to assist in the demonstration. Kriste mixed the crust while the others peeled apples. Then we all got a piece. Delicious! Sunday evening we attended a dinner show with singers, yodelers, dancers, and musicians. It was a good ending to our time in Austria.

On Monday morning we left for Bavaria and Oberammergau, which means "over the Ammer River". We stopped for lunch near Neuschwanstein Castle, which is the model for Walt Disney's trademark castle. It was built by King Ludwig II who died shortly after he moved in.

We arrived in Oberammergau early in the afternoon. It is a small town with only about 5,000 people. It is known for its buildings with painted facades that depict different fairy tales or religious themes, its woodcarving, and of course, the Passion Play.

The Passion Play was begun in 1634 when the townspeople promised God that if they were spared from extinction from the Black Plague, they would perform a play

honoring the life and death of Christ every decade from then on. The town survived and this year marked the 41st production of the play.

One must be a resident of the town to have a part, and the entire town is involved in the production. The theater holds 4,700 people, which almost doubles the population of the town. The town was very quiet on Monday afternoon as the stage is dark on Monday and Wednesday. We did not stay in Oberammergau, but drove on to another small town, Bad Kohlgrub, to spend the night.

On Tuesday morning we drove back to Oberammergau. We had lunch then went to the theater for the first act. Intermission was at 5:00; we had dinner then went back for the second act. The performance was awesome! The actors, the singers, and the musicians are

small town people, yet they displayed so much talent. We were very impressed at the magnitude of the performance. It was definitely the highlight of the trip.

On Wednesday morning we got on the bus for the last time. Our bus driver Markos was wonderful. He was a good driver first of all, but he was also polite and helped all of the ladies off the bus, and sold us bottled water for one dollar, one euro, or one franc – whichever we happened to have! He drove us to the Munich Airport where we stood in line for over an hour before we received our boarding passes. The fabled German efficiency was not apparent at the check-in lanes at the airport! We finally made it through security and customs and boarded the plane for the states. It was a grand adventure.
