

charlie and maxine are black and entitled

In 1870 Hiram Rhodes Revels (R-MS) and Joseph H. Rainey (R-SC) were the first blacks to serve in the House and Senate respectively.

Today, Charles Rangel (D-NY) and Maxine Waters (D-CA) are under investigation by the House Ethics Committee for illegal activities. Congresswoman Barbara Lee (D-CA), chairwoman of the Congressional Black Caucus (CBC) says that Charlie and Maxine have not done anything illegal, they are jus t dumb. I might add they are also belligerent and arrogant, as are many politicians.

Former Congressman J.C. Watts of Oklahoma, who is black, said of the Congressional Black Caucus, "They are race hustling poverty pimps."

Representative William Clay (D-MO) says of the CBC, "We are concerned with the needs of the black population and will not allow white Americans to infringe on those objectives."

The Congressional Black Caucus was founded in 1969. It receives donations from corporations. Between 2004 and 2008 the CBC received \$55 million in such donations. Most of that money went to social events and their headquarters building on Embassy Row in D.C.

In 2007 the CBC spent more on catering a single social event than it spent on scholarships. In 2008 the CBC spent \$350,000 to a decorator for its annual prayer breakfast. Contributors to the Black Caucus include breweries, the rent-toown industry, and cigarette manufacturers.

The Congressional Black Caucus seems to be a racist group operating within the government without criticism. Chances are a group called the Congressional White Caucus would be sued in federal court yet the Black Caucus is allowed to operate openly and with corporate donations.

Elected folks like Charlie Rangel and Maxine Waters believe they are entitled because they are black. If that sounds racist so be it. Rangel was indicted by the House Ethics Committee on eleven counts of tax evasion, failure to report income, and other allegations.

The CBC Chair Barbara Lee issued a statement saying Charlie is just a dumb, sloppy bookkeeper. He has now hired people to help him keep his finances straight. Charlie has been in the House 40+ years. You would think by now he

would know how to balance his checkbook since he was the chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee responsible for spending billions in government money.

Maxine Waters is up next on ethics violations for steering government bailout money to a bank where her husband was on the board. She says she did no such

thing and is being picked on because she is black. Because she is a black Congresswoman she is entitled and she is arrogant.

Nothing is likely to happen to Charlie and Maxine because racism is alive and well inside our government. We will see how it all plays out when the new Republicans take office in January. Happy Thanksgiving!



Last week I parked my 5th wheel in the Friona RV Park for a few days while visiting my parents. I wanted to drop you a note and thank my "Back Home" community.

You probably are aware that my dad is ill. It is comforting to know that he is with the Friona community. During the days I visited, I witnessed how Friona hasn't changed when it comes to taking care of their own. Thanks to all who are praying for and looking after my dad.

Thank you Friona for building that little Panhandle RV oasis at Reeve's field (where as a kid I had my fair share of motorcycle crashes). It was really handy to be able to "set up camp" just minutes from my parent's home. Please don't tell too many people about the park. I don't want it to get so crowded that I can't find a vacant slot the next time I visit.

I also wanted you to know that you can be pretty proud of your current crop of youth. I had the pleasure of meeting a few while I was "rigged down" in the last RV slot - the one with the big fire ring.

About 8 p.m. Thursday evening I heard a commotion. Looking out my RV window I discovered about 25 to 30 kids had started a fire in that ring and were standing around it, right outside of my living room window! I noticed familiar names on the back of some shirts, so I went out and introduced myself as a member of the FHS class of 1975.

I talked to a Welch, a Frye, and a Smiley; all who have fathers that I know from high school (especially Welch). I told them all I could tell stories about their dads, but they told me that I didn't have too; everyone else already has (don't ya just love small towns). I let the kids know they were not bothering me; that I was once them, and I went back inside.

I sat in my lazy-boy and listened to them for a little while; RV walls are very thin so you hear a lot from the outdoors. Not much has changed in 35 years, the conversations high school kids have while standing around a fire are still pretty much the same. The only difference is the music and the addition of cell phone texting while talking.

By 10:20 p.m. they were all gone. The last four to leave carried water using Styrofoam cups and a bucket and put the fire out before driving off. Of course a few had to "peal out" as they departed (who of us from the 70s would not have). They all treated me very respectable; the Welch kid shook my hand - a good group of kids. The only thing I would tell them to do different is pick up their trash before they leave.

I moved my family from Friona in 1986, so I have been gone for 24 years. I told these kids that some people can't wait to grow up and get out of Friona, some have to leave and some will stay or soon return. But having grown up there, it does not matter how long you are gone, when you return you are always among friends and family, even when you are standing around a fire with the next generation.







November sales tax received

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs reported that state sales tax revenue in October was \$1.62 billion, up 6.6 percent compared to October 2009.

"Total sales tax collections have now exceeded year ago amounts for a seventh consecutive month," said Combs. "Once again growth was posted in major sectors like the oil and gas industry, retail trade and construction. We will need to keep monitoring revenue from these and other sectors to see if tax collections maintain an upward trend."

November sales tax allocations to local governments represent September sales reported to the Comptroller in October by monthly tax filers and July, August and September sales reported to the Comptroller in October by quarterly tax filers.

Parmer County's November 2010 payment totaled \$52,361.21, broken down as Bovina \$9,057.18; Farwell \$8,344.86; and Friona \$34,959.17 In November 2009 the tax payment total was \$51,554.47.

Comparing tax receipts from the same period last year, payments were up 1.56%, broken down as Bovina 7.88%; Farwell -32.16%; and Friona 13.29%. For the year, Parmer County cities have received a total of \$458,357.31 as compared to \$455,998.48 for the same period last year, a 0.51% change.

Due to the Veterans Day holiday, local governments will receive their November sales tax allocations on Monday, November 15. The Comptroller's December local sales tax allocation will be made on Friday, December 10.



Conservation payments help Parmer County producers they are funded for the full

The Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) will begin issuing Conservation Stewardship and Conservation Security Program payments this month to nearly 1,000 farmers and ranchers in Texas to help maintain and improve the natural resources on their land.

The Conservation Stewardship Program is a voluntary program that encourages agricultural and forestry producers to address resource concerns by undertaking additional conservation activities and improving and maintaining existing conservation systems.

County crop update

As we continue to get closer to Thanksgiving many of our producers are finishing their harvest. There is still some standing corn to be harvested which was planted late but much of the corn crop has been harvested.

A large percentage of the cotton crop continues to be harvested. The recent freeze will help to get the remaining cotton ready to harvest.

Much of the crop is either in a module or being ginned.

Most of the area gins are running full time to help keep up with cotton being harvested. The recent killing freeze should also aid in getting the remaining grain sorghum ready for harvest. This past week's moisture will also benefit the fall wheat crop. Many producers are getting some cattle turned out on irrigated wheat.







From there, David goes a safe distance away and calls out to Saul with hopes of getting his attention. David did get Saul's attention, and confronted Saul about his wicked, murderous treatment toward him. This really got Saul's attention, caused him slight sorrow for his actions, which persuaded him to go back home and not chase David.

There will be times in your life when you need to speak out against sin and wickedness. When those times come, keep these things in mind. First, don't be surprised at the wicked, sinful, fallen world we live in. The Bible is so clear regarding the wickedness of man, and that we live in a fallen world. Second, don't allow the wickedness to rub off on you, rather guard your heart and mind. It is easy to stoop down to sinful levels, but very difficult to remain blameless and faithful in the heat of the confrontation. 



Scrubs and Grub, medical care foodstuff

The new recipe book from the staff and auxiliary at Parmer Medical Center was unveiled at the Country Market last weekend. You can get a copy or several copies at the hospital for \$10 each. Check with the front desk.

We'll be publishing some of the recipes in the weeks ahead. Sections in the table of contents include appetizers & beverages, soups & salads, vegetables & side dishes, main dishes, breads & rolls, desserts, and cookies & candy. There are pages in the back full of cooking information, pantry basics, herbs & spices, baking breads, how to buy vegetables and fruits, measurement info, counting calories, quick fixes, and napkin folding instructions.

To begin the series we've selected a recipe from PMC administrator Lance Gatlin. It is called Quiche. Pretty simple title (on page 46). You will need pie crusts and hashbrowns. Doesn't sound like a quiche but we will take Lance's word for it. Quiche omelet might be a more appropriate name for this concoction.

Quiche

By Lance Gatlin

- 2 frozen pie crusts (or homemade)
- 1 pkg hashbrowns 6-10 slices cooked
- 6-10 slices cooked bacon garlic to taste
- 1/4 cup onion diced (or to taste) 8 oz cream cheese
- 8 oz cream 1 cup milk
- 1 cup n 4 eggs
- 1 cup cheese of choice, shredded salt & pepper to taste

Preheat oven to 350. Begin cooking bacon and set aside to cool then crumble.

Brown hashbrowns in saute pan.

Layer bottom of pie crusts with hashbrowns to taste. I pack mine tight about 1/4

to 1/2 inch thick. Saute onion and garlic to taste and set aside with bacon.

Combine cream cheese and milk in sauce pan; stir over low heat until smooth.

Gradually add cream cheese mixture to eggs, mixing until well blended.

Add cheddar cheese, crumble bacon, and onions to mixture. Salt and pepper to taste. Pour the mixture over the hashbrowns and pie crust bottom. Bake for 30-40 minutes or until set. Let cool and enjoy.
