Comptroller sends sales tax allocations

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced that the state
sales tax revenue in December was $\$ 1.81$ billion, up 9.4 persales tax revenue in December was
cent compared to December 2009 .
"This marks the ninth consecutive month of year-over-year improvement in sales tax revenues, with increases posted
across the board," Combs said. "There were increases in the across the board," Combs said. "There were increases in the
oil and natural gas and manufacturing sectors reflecting reoll and natural gas and manufacturing sectors refeccing re--
covering business spending. Sales tax in the retail trade and restaurant sectors were also up. As I outlined in this week's Biennial Revenue Estimate, we forecast growth in sales tax revenue for the current fiscal year as well as the next two fiscal years."
December state sales tax collections and January allocations to local governments represent sales that occurred in November.
Parmer County's January 2011 payment totaled $\$ 43,830.92$ Parmer County's January 2011 payment totaled $\$ 43,830.92$
broken down as Bovina $\$ 7,753.37$; Farwell $\$ 7,772.98$; and Friona $\$ 28,304.57$. In January 2009 the tax payment total was \$31,195.61.
Comparing tax receipts from the same period last year, payments were up $40.50 \%$, broken down as Bovina $52.45 \%$; Far-
well $13.84 \%$; and Friona $46.78 \%$. For the year, Parmer Counwell $13.84 \%$; and Friona $46.78 \%$. For the year, Parmer Coun-
