Shapleigh of EI Paso, the latest report shows Texas at or nea the bottom in iust about every quality of life categoory that can be considered good, and leading or near the front of the pack in most categories that are bad or ugly. For longtime observers of state government, of course, this
really isn't much in the way of news. It just reinforces the real-
call home. Aealth care that have all the proposed cuts in educaion and healh care hat have
legislative session.
Without recting
Without reciting all the statistics I will note one that should be particularly galling for parents and business people, including some of the governor's top political donors. Texas is 50 th-dea and older with a high school diploma
This clearly is not the fault of teac ors, or anyone else in the education profession school administra is the fault of the state's political leaders who, despite tons of rhetoric, have refused to adequately and equitably fund the state's school finance system. And, if the governor and legislative leaders have their way they will retreat even further from hat responsibility this session.
Yes, education requires more than money. It also requires dedicated teachers, strong curricula, and administrative ef-
ficiency. But dedication does not pay the teachers' bills, buil classrooms, buy textbooks, purchase computers, and equip science labs. And efficiency goes only so far.
It is not part of this report but Texas ranks 37th among the
states in per-pupil expenditures on public education. states in per-pupil expenditures on public education. Texas' horrible graduation rate also is directly impacted by
some of the other poor statistics on the state's report card, nosome of the other poor statistics on the state's report card, no-
tably the fact that Texas leads the nation in the percentage of children without health insurance and is fourth in the percentage of children living in poverty.
Simple survival-not a high school diploma-is the No. priority of children and families constantly struggling with illness and hunger.
Nond sondures per capita expenditures per capita. That may make some short-sighted
politicians proud but it is shortchanging millions of their con-stituents-their taxpaying constituents. (That's the end of Mr. Robison's rant. Hope you feel better now about teacher unions. Im told most Friona teachers do not belong to TSTA. See you next week. Ron)
