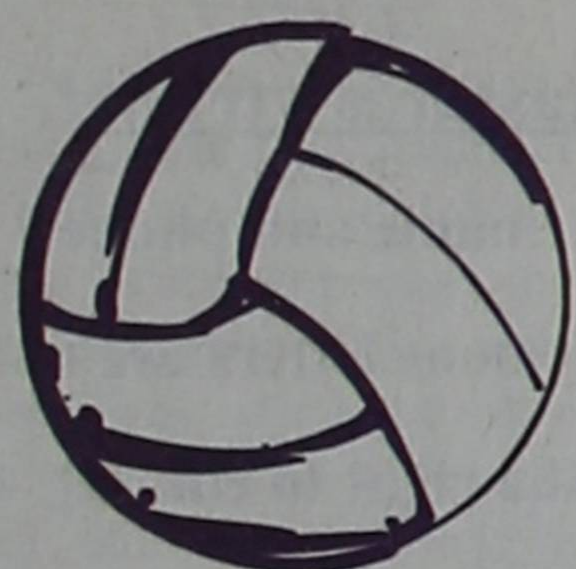
The public is invited to attend. There will be musical entertainment, plenty of food, games for the kids, and fun for all. It will begin around noon until after 7 p.m.

Hospital visitors should use public entrances

Parmer Medical Center requests that all patients and visitors presenting to the hospital or to Friona Rural Health Clinic use the main public entrances, both located directly adjacent to the main parking lot on the West side Cleveland.

The main public entrance to the hospital, open from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m., is on the South side of the new building, while the main entrance to the clinic, open during regular clinic hours, is located on the West side of the clinic building.

All patients seeking emergency services should present to the Emergency Entrance on the North side of the building off of 14th Street.

Please note that the hospital entrances facing Cleveland on the east side of the building are for employee use only and will be locked in the near future. It is also requested that the general public park in the main hospital parking lot directly adjacent to public entrances, rather than park across the street on the East side of Cleveland in the parking area designated for employees.

Council will discuss 2011 tax rate and garbage collection fee increase

The Friona city council will meet in regular session Monday August 8 at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers, 619 Main St. All council meetings are open to the public.

Major items on the agenda will be a report from the Parmer County Appraisal District regarding the 2011 effective tax rate and consideration of an ordinance increasing residential and

commercial garbage collection.

After a report from the tax appraisal district is heard, the council will take action on a proposed tax rate and set dates for required public hearings.

The waste disposal company that serves the city, Allied Waste Service, has requested a rate increase effective November 1, 2011. If the rate increase is approved, the council will take action on an ordinance to increase local waste collection rates and set an effective date.

Agenda item number 8 reads as follows: "Consider and take action on approval of Resolution No. 11.08.08 denying Atmos Energy Corporation West Texas Division's fourth annual rate review mechanism filing, permitting the company to establish a regulatory asset for new depreciation rates which may be considered in a

system-wide rate filing; requiring the company to reimburse cities' reasonable ratemaking expenses; adopting a savings clause; determining that this resolution was passed in accordance with the requirements of the Texas Open Meetings Act; declaring an effective date; and requiring delivery of this resolution to the company and the steering committee's legal counsel."

In simple terms the above resolution says the city will again vote no on an Atmos rate increase request. A coalition of cities across the state have joined together to deny the rate increase, instead of every city having to negotiate with Atmos separately. It saves money on legal expenses. Friona is a member of the group and will vote to deny the request.

Also on the agenda is appointment of Kim Kimbrough

and Susan Teague to an additional two-year term on the Friona Library board and consideration of a 2-foot variance on property at 1611 W. 9th St. requested by Ronnie Stevick.

In other action the council will consider approval of the

accounts payable and discuss and approve the July financial statement. These agenda items are tentative and subject to change. The final official meeting agenda is posted 72 hours prior to the meeting on the front window of city hall.

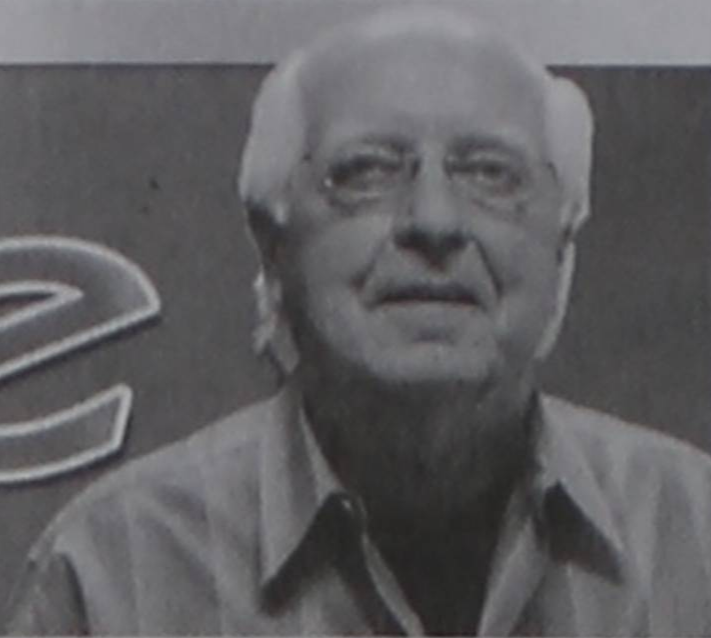

Numbers, numbers, what do they really mean?

Americans today are surrounded by a cloud of confusing numbers on the economy and the federal budget. But what do the numbers really mean? What do they describe? How are they related to the debt ceiling crisis? Below are some of the more frequently mentioned figures - from the astronomical to the pedestrian - and a brief explanation of their background and ramifications.

\$4.5 trillion: The total value of Treasury bonds held by China, Japan, Brazil, Iran and other nations. As economists Stephen Moore and David Malpass have pointed out, this is money that foreigners are not investing in the next Google, Oracle, Wal-Mart or bio-medical company here in the U.S. Instead, this investment is financing Medicaid, unemployment insurance, and other federal government programs.

\$812 billion: The price tag of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, or President Obama's 2009 so-called "stimulus" that was going to bring the U.S. out of recession. The administration's Council of Economic Advisors noted last week that the stimulus has added or saved 2.4 million jobs, at a cost to date to taxpayers of \$666 billion. Even with this home-field refereeing, that's \$278,000 per job.

1,471: The number of waivers granted by the Obama Administration allowing organizations to opt out of parts of the new health care law until 2014. A McKinsey & Company survey estimates that 30 percent of employers will take that a step further, opting out of the law entirely in 2014: they'll pay a fine rather than offer healthcare to their employees.

30 million: The number of barrels of oil released from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve last month by the President, who said at the time this would lower gas prices, then at a nationwide average of \$3.61 a gallon. Americans use 19.9 million barrels a day; the SPR release provided the United States with 36 hours of fuel, and the average nationwide gas price today is \$3.67 a gallon.

24 percent: The unemployment rate for American teenagers. This means that one out of four youths is missing out

on the basic fundamentals of building a productive life: getting up in the morning, putting on clean clothes, being courteous to customers, working within a team, handling responsibility, and gaining the confidence that comes from earning a paycheck. As Jim Tankersley writes in The Atlantic, "The U.S. job market is struggling mightily to bring its next generation of workers into the fold."

9.2: The percentage of working-age Americans who are seeking a job, but remain unemployed.

44.5 million: The number of Americans receiving food assistance from the federal government. This is commonly known as the "food stamp program." But participants today are given an Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) card, which like a debit card, they can use at a supermarket to buy food until they hit their monthly limit of \$134. One out of seven Americans now relies on the EBT card -- including 22 million children.

\$3.68 trillion: The estimated budget for the United States Government, Fiscal Year 2012. Approximately two-thirds of the budget, or \$2.44 trillion, is mandatory spending, including Social Security and Medicare; \$1.24 trillion is discretionary outlays, \$242 billion is interest on the debt. It's difficult to see how any long-term spending cuts can avoid that portion of the budget accounting for two-thirds of the federal budget.


These numbers reveal a grim picture for the American economy, related to Washington's inability to confront spending, budget, and entitlement reform. This last number is emblematic of the situation:

0: The number of meetings the Senate Budget Committee has held to mark-up a Federal budget. This means the federal government simply continues to fund programs, with no investigation of whether the programs are useful, if they should be continued, expanded, or eliminated. This autopilot approach is a major reason we're in the midst of this debt ceiling crisis. Because, when there is no budget, there is no direction - and that leads to all the numbers above.

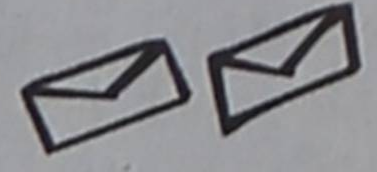

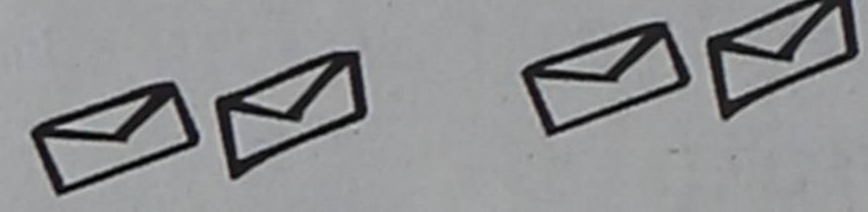


Congressman Randy Neugebauer (R-TX) issued the following statement regarding his vote in opposition to the amended Budget Control Act of 2011:

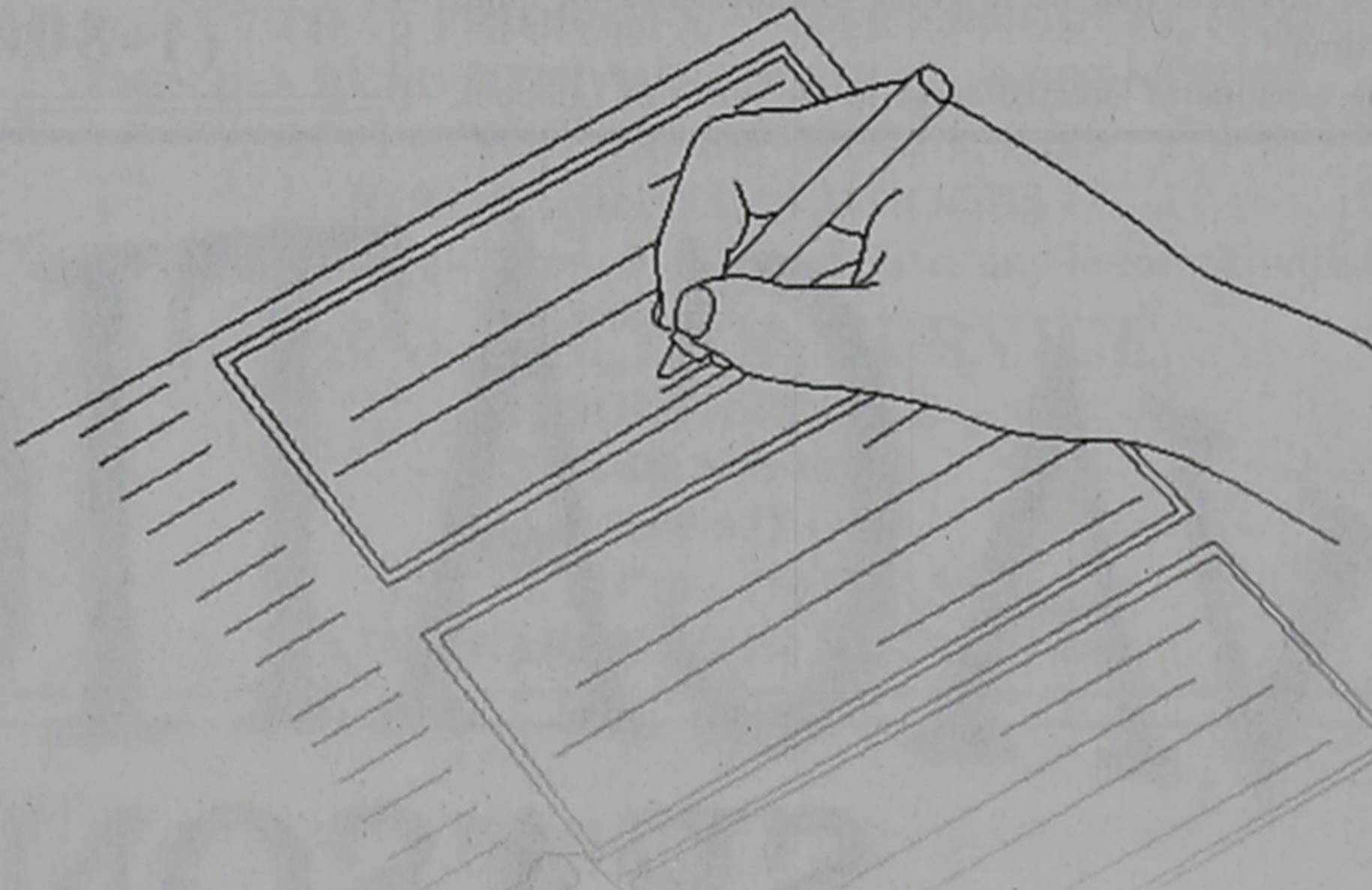



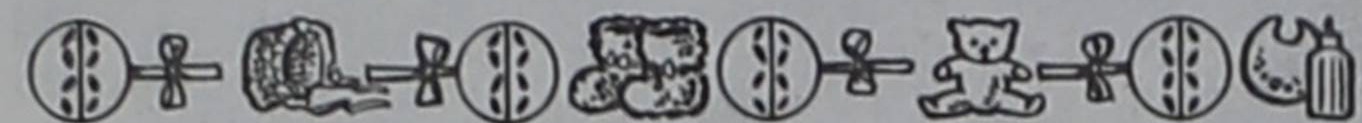

QuickBooks courses in Amarillo and Lubbock

Texas AgriLife Extension Service will offer QuickBooks Premier 2010 computer short courses on August 11-12 in Lubbock and August 18-19 in Amarillo.

"The trainings will run from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day at each location," said DeDe Jones, AgriLife Extension risk management specialist in Amarillo, who will coordinate the event in that city. Jay Yates, AgriLife Extension risk management specialist in Lubbock, will coordinate the Lubbock course.

Both events will be held at the Texas AgriLife Research and Extension Center in their respective cities. They are located at 6500 W. Amarillo Blvd., in Amarillo, and 1102 E. Farm-to-Market Road 1294, north of Lubbock.

"QuickBooks Premier is a double-entry business accounting program often used by agricultural lenders and producers," Jones said. In the two-day course, participants will learn how to enter transactions into the program and analyze costs and profits. No prior computer experience is necessary.

"Registration for each two-day course is \$125 and covers computer-lease payments and teaching materials. Couples are encouraged to attend and will be charged only one registration fee if they share a computer. Class size is limited to 15 to provide a hands-on experience for all participants," Jones said.

Those planning to attend should RSVP by August 8 for the Lubbock session and by August 15 for the Amarillo session. Payment is due upon arrival on the first day of the course.

Drought forces critical cotton decisions

Outside of a tropical rainfall event, the remainder of the growing season continues to look bleak for High Plains cotton producers as drought conditions force them to determine whether to keep watering or call it quits on the year.

With approximately two million acres of dryland cotton already written off, further losses on irrigated acreage could set the stage for one of the highest abandonment rates for the area in the history of Plains Cotton Growers. About 53 percent of acreage was abandoned in 1992, and 2011 could bring an even higher number.

Jason Woodward, plant pathologist with Texas Tech and Texas AgriLife Extension, said that the current status of this year's crop is all over the map, depending on the location. He said some fields have already reached cutout, blooming through the top of the plant. But others, he said, are at seven to nine nodes above white flower, which means that yield potential is still there as long as the water can hold out.

However, water availability is becoming more of a limiting factor each day without rain. Many producers have been gradually scaling back operations as water demand increases and supply decreases.

"The losses from this drought are already staggering, and the failure of this dryland crop is causing the business community to miss out on a tremendous amount of economic activity that typically is generated by producers from planting through now," PCG's Executive Vice President Steve Verett said. "This is only the beginning of the financial effects of this year that we're going to experience for quite some time."

Hope remains in isolated areas to the north of Lubbock

where some rainfall has occurred. Some locations received up to 5 inches of rain, although hail pummeled crops in northern Floyd and southern Briscoe counties.

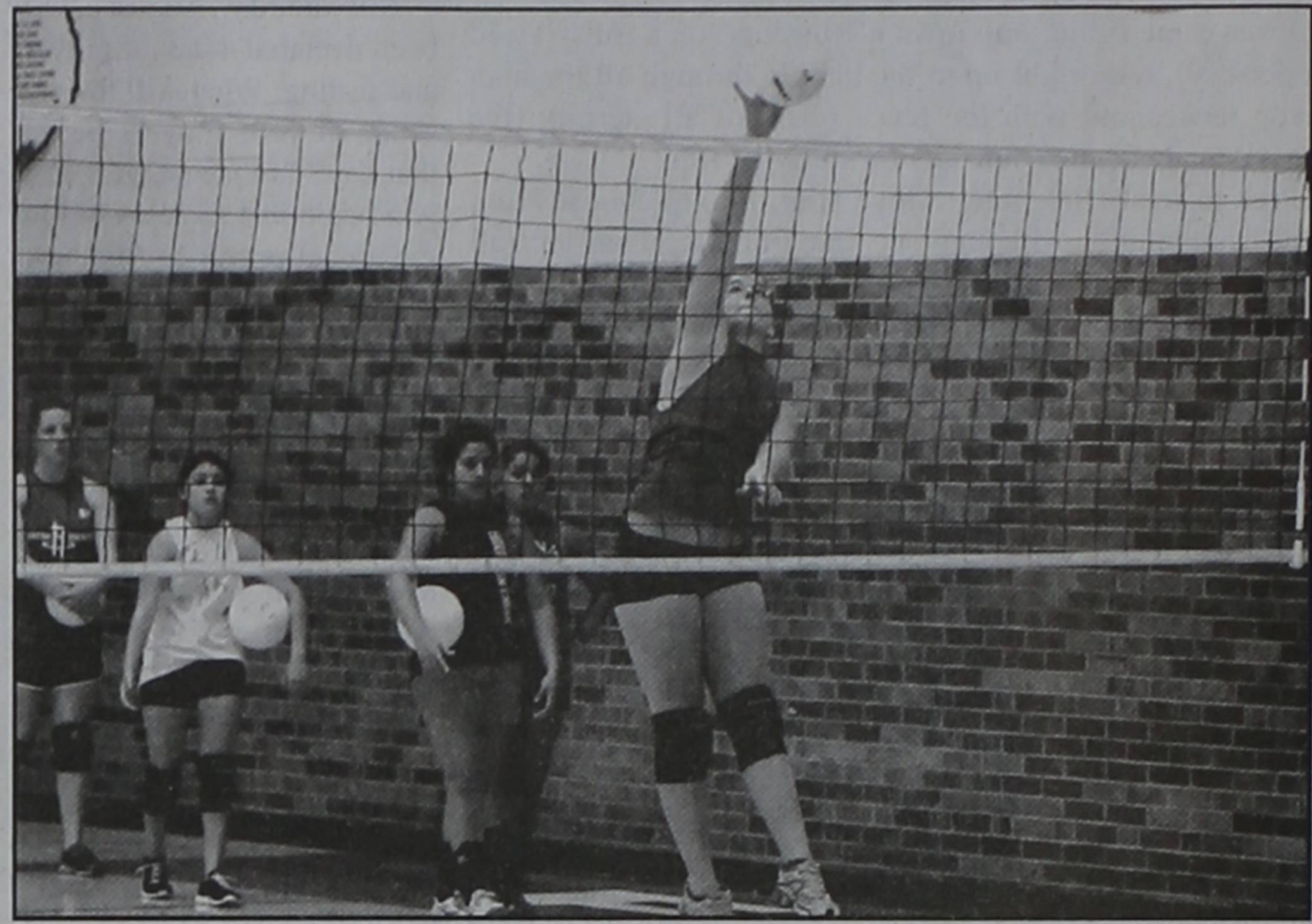
