



Council appoints interim administrator

The Friona city council met in regular session Monday March 12 at 6:30 p.m. in the council chambers on Main St. Councilmen Mark Osborn and Charlie Pope were absent. Mayor J.B. Douglas, council members Jim Atwell, Martha Barker, and Cheryl Weatherly, city manager Patricia Phipps and city attorney Slater Elza were present.

Although there will not be a city election May 12, the city will manage the election for the school board. The council approved a resolution assigning Mary Ford and Rebecca Ramos as election judges. For the city, there were three seats open and three candidates filed so a city election will not be needed. For the school board there were three

seats up for election and four candidates have filed so a school board election will be held May 12 at the council chambers, 619 Main St.

After reviewing and approving the monthly accounts payable and financial statement, the council denied a request for variance for a trailer house at 210 Woodland. To approve a variance request, approval from neighbors in the area is considered. In this case neighbors protested the variance.

The council accepted a bid for sealcoating from Freeman Construction of Vernon, Texas. The bid was \$1.595 per square yard. The bid was a joint bid with Bovina and the approval is contingent on approval by the Bovina city council at its next meeting.

The council went into executive session at 6:45 p.m. to discuss the appointment of an interim administrator for Prairie Acres/Heritage Estates. He is a native of Donley County and brings 33 years of business experience to the position. He was the admin-

istrator of the Community Care Center in Clarendon for several years before resigning to care for his wife as she battled cancer. She passed away about a year ago. The mayor and the council expressed their confidence and appreciation to Mr. Johnston and welcomed him to Friona. The next meeting of the city council will be Monday, April 9 at 6:30 p.m. All council meetings are open to the public.







Parmer County producers encouraged to discuss CRP land options

Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) State Conservationist Salvador Salinas urges producers to contact their local NRCS field offices to discuss options for expired or expiring Conservation Resource Program (CRP) contracts and to check on eligibility for USDA benefits.

"The majority of the state's expired or expiring CRP contracts are located on the South Plains and Panhandle regions," Salinas says. "It's important for landowners to understand USDA conservation compliance before putting a plow in the ground. Producers should know the options available to them."

Landowners are encouraged to visit with NRCS conservationists in the Parmer County USDA Service Center to discuss management decisions and options for their land. NRCS offers USDA programs that can provide technical and financial assistance for grazing or haying existing grass cover, making enhancements to target wildlife, or other management options.

"Developing conservation plans with private landowners is our daily routine," says Earl Behrends, County NRCS District Conservationist. "We are committed to providing this service to all producers interested in our assistance. We are specially trained to discuss landowner opportunities with expired or expiring CRP land.

Most of the CRP land is located in the historic range of the Lesser Prairie Chicken, which is currently being considered for listing as an endangered or threatened species. Lesser

mentation of a grazing plan developed by NRCS and the participant agrees to maintain the land in grass cover in exchange for a per-acre payment. Under GRP, the land may be used for grazing or haying purposes.

Landowners may also apply for a conservation easement to protect the land in perpetuity. GRP 20-year rental contracts and easement applications place priority on CRP land that are within 12 months of expiring. GRP also offers cost-share assistance for practices needed to restore the grazing values.

Landowners with expiring or expired CRP land may also be interested in applying for the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP). CSP is a voluntary five-year program that offers payment to producers who sustain a high level of conservation on their land. Under CSP, landowners have a variety of land management activities to consider.

NRCS also reminds landowners that if land is converted back to crop production, it may be necessary for them to apply certain conservation practice alternatives on their land to ensure compliance with the Highly Erodible Land and Wetland Provisions of the Food Security Act of 1985. Conservation compliance could involve the implementation of a crop rotation that includes high residue-producing crops like wheat or sorghum, or the installation, repair and maintenance of structural practices like terraces.

For further assistance in evaluating your land and planning practices for expired or expiring CRP land, contact your local Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)

Prairie Chickens are ground-dwelling birds, native to rangelands of the American West, including the South Plains and Panhandle region of Texas. Over the decades they have experienced a significant decline in population and habitat.

NRCS and its conservation partners are helping farmers and ranchers enhance, restore and protect habitat for this bird with financial assistance through the Environmental Quality Incentive Program's (EQIP) Lesser Prairie Chicken Initiative (LPCI). Through the LPCI, NRCS offers landowners financial assistance for conservation practices that promote healthy grazing lands and are also beneficial for the Lesser Prairie Chicken. These practices include prescribed grazing, upland wildlife habitat management, brush management, prescribed burning and range planting.

"In 2011 this was a very successful initiative for improving the Lesser Prairie Chicken habitat in Texas," said Salinas. "Producers entered into 127 contracts and enrolled 114,131 acres for which over \$2.9 million were obligated in the targeted counties."

Another option to improve and protect the habitat would be enrollment in the Grassland Reserve Program (GRP). Under GRP, a landowner may enter into a rental agreement for a period of 10, 15, or 20 years. The agreement requires imple-


County sales tax received

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced that the state sales tax revenue in February was \$2.01 billion, up 14.8 percent compared to February 2011.

"Sales tax revenue in all major industries was up, indicating growth in both business and consumer spending" Combs said. "Rapid growth in tax collections continued from oil and natural gas sector, while revenue from retail trade, restaurants and telecommunications was also up significantly."

The sales tax figures represent monthly sales made in January. Parmer County's March 2012 payment totaled \$39,923.47 broken down as Bovina \$6,496.63; Farwell \$8,135.17; and Friona \$25,291.67. In March 2011 the tax payment total was \$39,447.99

Comparing tax receipts from the same period last year, payments were up 1.20%, broken down as Bovina -11.06%; Farwell 15.43%; and Friona 0.77%. For the year, Parmer County cities have received a total of \$143,821.47 as compared to \$140,39.55 for the same period last year, a 2.44% change.

Monroe, DeWit named all-district


