Four candidates will be on the ballot for three positions. Voters can cast three votes for one candidate, or two and one, or one vote each for three candidates. The candidates are Antonio Rocha, Mitchell Smiley, Andy Montana, and Brent Loflin.



National Day of Prayer on May 3

On Thursday, May 3, 2012 at 7:00 a.m., the Friona Christian Ministers, are encouraging all people to join in observing the National Day of Prayer at the Depot in the City Park.

The National Day of Prayer is a vital part of our heritage. Since the first call to prayer in 1775, when the Continental Congress asked the colonies to pray for wisdom in forming a nation, the call to prayer has continued through our history, including President Lincoln's proclamation of a day of "humiliation, fasting, and

prayer" in 1863. In 1952, a joint resolution by Congress, signed by President Truman, declared an annual, National Day of Prayer. Further, in 1983, the Supreme Court affirmed the right of state legislatures to open their sessions with prayer in Marsh vs. Chambers, and in 1988, the law was amended and signed by President Reagan, permanently setting the day as the first Thursday of every May.

RE: The Affordable Care Act, AKA Obamacare

Dear Mr. Carr:

I have been reading the Friona Star since 1960 and have been a subscriber since 1967. I have been a reader of your editorials for the past several years. Some I agree with and some I do not.

Your recent editorial on the Affordable Care Act has stimulated me to reply.

Attached to this letter is a copy of the article "Impacts of the Affordable Care Act", which appeared in USA Today. I believe it is a fair analysis of what the Act does and does not do. As you will see, there are several measures of the act which do enhance the ability of normal everyday Americans, and especially those who are disadvantaged, to obtain affordable health care.

There are many in this country who raise their voice in opposition to this health care change and wish to maintain the status quo. However, these are almost universally individuals who are covered by Medicare or other insurance programs.

When you have adequate health care coverage, unless you look beyond your own environment, you will not see the overwhelming need for health care reform. In some parts of the country, 50% of the patients who present to the hospital have no health care coverage. Many or most of these are hard-working Americans who work 40 or more hours per week, but do not have benefits through their employer or through any other source. They are literally a hospital admission away from total bankruptcy.

Please review the article I have enclosed. Feel free to share it with your readers. In your editorial you did quote Fox News. Yes, there are fines and penalties built into the health care law. However, what Fox News does not tell you is that other portions of the law specifically prohibit the IRS or any other governmental agency from filing civil or criminal processes to collect these fines.

One of the arguments before the Supreme Court is that how can a fine be a fine if you are never going to collect it. If you get all of your information from Fox News it is much like viewing a landscape with one eye closed. It may be occasionally fair, but it is never balanced.

Impacts of the Affordable Care Act

Two years after President Obama signed the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, some provisions have taken effect while others still have two years to wait.

In a recent poll by he non-partisan Kaiser Family Foundation, two in three Americans said they have not been affected by the law yet. Only 14% said they have benefited; 21% said they have been affected negatively.

Here's a look at some provisions with the broadest impact:

Already in Effect

Pre-existing conditions. People uninsured for at least six months can join a new federal or state insurance plan. Children with pre-existing conditions must be covered.

Lifetime limits. Insurers cannot impose lifetime dollar limits on essential benefits, such as hospital services. More than 20,000 people hit their lifetime limits in 2008.

Preventive care. All new health plans must provide certain preventive services, such as mammograms and colonoscopies, without deductibles or co-payments. This affected about 54 million people in 2011.

Young adults. About 2.5 million young adults without private insurance can stay on their parents' plan's until they turn 26.

Seniors. About 4 million seniors who reached the Medicare prescription drug coverage gap received a \$250 rebate check in 2010. More than 3.5 million who hit the coverage gap in 2011 have received a 50% discount on brand-name drugs. More than 32 million seniors have received free preventive services, such as annual wellness visits.

Early retirees. Employers are eligible for federal assistance to provide health coverage to early retirees not yet eligible for Medicare.

Medicaid. States are eligible for federal aid to cover certain additional low-income individuals and families.

Small business tax credits. Up to 4 million small businesses are eligible for federal tax credits if they offer insurance coverage to their workers.

Health care costs. A study by Aon Hewitt estimates that the law raised costs by an average of 1.5% in 2011. Projection for 2012: 0.6%.

Effective in 2014 and beyond

Insurance exchanges. Federal and state health insurance exchanges will offer a marketplace of insurance options for people without employer-sponsored coverage.

Individual mandate. Most people will be required to buy insurance or pay a penalty.

Pre-existing conditions. Insurers will be prohibited from denying coverage to anyone because of a pre-existing condition.

Annual limits. Insurers issuing group plans and new individual-market plans will be banned from imposing annual limits on essential benefits.


Medicaid. The program will be open to Americans with

incomes up to 133% of the federal poverty level-now about \$15,000 for individuals and \$30,700 for a family of four. Tax credits. People with incomes up to 400% of poverty—

now about \$44,680 for individuals and \$92,200 for a family of four-will be eligible for tax credits.

Newly insured. The Congressional Budget Office estimates that by 2016 the law will increase the number of Americans with health insurance by 30 million to 33 million.



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


Lions Club News

Friona Reading Recovery shows positive results Reading Recovery trained teachers have worked one-to-one

with more than 5,000 first graders having difficulty learning to read and write during the last nineteen years. The Dumas Site includes the districts of Borger, Dumas, Friona, Gruver, Pampa and Spearman. The Friona Reading Recovery site has been implemented since 1995, serving 318 children.

A celebration of teaching 5000 students was recently held in Dumas. Seventy-five administrators, former students, and Reading Recovery teachers were in attendance. Festivities included former Reading Recovery students sharing their success stories, observation of Reading Recovery lessons, and the release of 100 balloons with each balloon representing fifty students.

In attendance from Friona were current Reading Recovery teachers, Connie Johnson and Jenny Riethmayer. Also attending the Celebration were Kenny Austin, Superintendent; Autumn Sloan, Friona Primary Principal; and Jennifer Sundre, 3rd Grade teacher. Mrs. Johnson will be retiring at the end of May after serving struggling readers in our community for 30 years. She has worked as a Reading Recovery teacher since it began seventeen years ago. Jennifer Sundre will be taking Mrs. Johnson's position.

Reading Recovery delivers measurable results in weeks not years. After a full series of lessons, 84 percent of the students have been able to read at or above grade level. Reading Recovery has required data collection and research since its beginning, making it the most fully researched and documented intervention in the world.

Independent reviews of research by the What Works Clearinghouse and the National Center on Response to Intervention have validated Reading Recovery's effectiveness. In addition to this strong research evidence, the International Data Evaluation Center at The Ohio State University collects and reports

Dairy study on how breed and herd longevity are related

Texas AgriLife Research is trying to help the dairy industry determine how breed and conformation affects dairy cow longevity.

Dr. Pablo Pinedo, AgriLife Research ruminant animal health scientist in Amarillo, is conducting a study funded by the American Jersey Cattle Club Research Foundation after producers have noticed a decline in longevity of dairy cows worldwide.

"Today's high involuntary culling rates are a concern on dairy farms from both an animal well-being and an economic point of view," Pinedo said.

While Holstein herds have been predominant in Texas and New Mexico, large cheese-processing plants in the northern Texas Panhandle and in Eastern New Mexico have prompted the use of Jersey genetics, increasing the number of large, pure Jersey and multi-breed herds in those areas, he said.

In his study, Pinedo intends to use Jersey, Holstein and crossbred cattle all under the same conditions in the same operations to provide what he characterized as "a unique opportunity to analyze and compare the dynamic of culling in different breeds." The objectives of this study are to:

- Describe the dynamics of culling risk of Jersey cows considering age, stage of lactation, milk yield, reproductive status, herd milk yield and herd size.

- Explore associations between culling dynamics and breed traits such as udder conformation, foot and leg, body depth, etc.

- Identify management related risk factors. - Compare the productive life among Jerseys, Holsteins and their crosses in multi-breed dairy herds in the Texas High Plains region.

The study will analyze lactation records from cows calving since January 2007 to the present from large herds located in the Texas High Plains and Eastern New Mexico, Pinedo said.

"We hope our results will help dairy producers implement efficient strategies to manage critical points affecting cow survival," he said. "This information will also provide a precise comparison on the productive life between Jerseys and Holsteins under the same conditions, supporting the decisions process regarding the future replacements."

Pinedo said this information should serve dairy producers throughout the region, assisting them in making rational and cost-effective management decisions when selecting cows and sires for improved survivability.

The study is expected to be conducted over the next year, he said.

Studying drought tolerance in wheat

Maybe it's in the shoot, maybe the root. Texas AgriLife Research scientists are on a quest to find where different wheat varieties popular in the High Plains get their drought tolerance.

Dr. Shuyu Liu, AgriLife Research small grains geneticist in Amarillo, is working with a group of scientists on an Ogallala Aquifer Program-funded project to identify key genetic regulators of drought tolerance.

"We are trying to understand the drought-tolerant mechanisms in wheat varieties," Liu said. "In this study, we are looking at three widely planted varieties in the High Plains, TAM 111, TAM 112 and TAM 304.

"Based on breeders' observation, they found that TAM 111 is very good at both irrigated and dryland," he said. "TAM 112 is much better under prolonged dryland conditions, such as 2011. TAM 304 is very good under irrigated conditions, but not under dryland."

Breeders' observations from the field and the physiological traits collected in the last few years show these three cultivars have different responses to water stress; however, the basis of their adaptation remains unknown, he said.

Determining the mechanisms of adaptation to drought conditions is very important, Liu said, because in 2011 alone, drought stress resulted in the loss of more than 240 million bushels of winter wheat with a cost of about \$1.33 billion in the Southern Great Plains.

"We conducted this experiment in the greenhouse to understand how these three varieties respond to water differently and at different stages," he said. "Currently, we are at the harvesting stage. We have already collected samples from different growth stages for laboratory analysis and now we will collect samples to estimate grain yield and shoot and root biomass on each of these three varieties. In the lab, we will do gene-expression studies to understand what kind of gene is behind each of these varieties controlling their different drought-tolerance mechanisms."

Dr. Srirama Krishna Reddy, AgriLife Research post-doctorate research associate in Amarillo, said, "We want to understand what mechanisms exist in the plant - whether in the root system or the shoot system. Several physiological and molecular tools will be used to discover the mechanisms behind the drought adaptation."

This wheat study was planted in late November and includes the two drought-tolerant varieties and one drought-susceptible variety, Krishna Reddy said. "We started this study with three different blocks," he said. "Leaf samples from two other blocks were harvested for gene expression analysis using microarray technology. With this last block, we are going to look at the grain yield and the harvest index under prolonged drought conditions and irrigated conditions."

Liu said at the same time they have been conducting this greenhouse experiment, all three varieties have been growing in the field and many data will be collected by the stress, physiology and breeding groups at Amarillo, such as yield and its components and canopy temperature.

"At the end, we will combine the greenhouse data, field data and lab data together to figure out what the difference is for the drought-tolerant mechanism among these three varieties," he said.
