Council will seek bids for surplus property

The Friona city council will meet in regular session Monday, March 11, 2013, at 619 Main St. The meeting begins at 6:30 p.m. All council meetings are open to the public. A public comments item is included at the beginning of each meeting.

After approval of previous minutes, the council will consider and take action on a resolution appointing the election officials for the May 11, 2013 city officers election, set the rate of pay for election officials, decide the maximum number of clerks for the polling place, and designate an early voting board.

Deadline for sign-up for the three expiring council seats was Friday,

March 1, 2013. City manager Patricia Phipps advised that only three candidates signed up so a council election will not be necessary May 11. The ria. three council members to be sworn in at the May 20 council meeting will be incumbent Charlie Pope and newcomers Alan Monroe and Bruce Fleming. Outgoing council members Jim Atwell and Mark Osborn decided not to seek re-election to the council.

The council will consider authorizing Police Chief Frank Mooney to seek bids to sell surplus property via an online auction at govdeals.inc. Property to be sold includes: 2005 police car, 1985 fire truck, 2000 Ford utility pickup, 2001 Chevrolet Blazer,

two cages for 1990 Crown Victoria, one laptop computer w/bag, and one push bumper for 1990 Crown Victo-

Consideration and action will be taken authorizing the city manager to solicit bids to purchase a new utility pickup for the city public works department.

Approval of accounts payable for February and the February financial statement will complete the agenda. Items mentioned here comprise a tentative agenda for the Monday meeting and are subject to change. The final official agenda will be posted on the front window of city hall 72 hours prior to the meeting.

The City Council would like to thank you for your letter.

TxDOT plows state highways and pushes the snow to the right of the pavement. They continually run across as many roads as quick as possible and then they start again. They do an excellent job cleaning the highways but this snow does end up in the intersections on Highway 60, Main Street, and 5th Street.

Kirk Frye and the county crew help the City by cleaning streets around the hospital and all the schools. This is a big help to the city.

We would also like to thank the farmers for coming to town and helping clean their neighbor's driveways. Neither the City, county, nor the State can clean personal property.

Of the six men on the City crew, two of the public works employees head to the sewer plant and the four water well plants and 17 wells making sure the plants are up and running. One of the public works men gets on the grader, one on the front end loader, and the other two get on the two backhoes.

They start cleaning around the city hall making sure the EMS trucks can get out of the bays. Some will be at the police department and the fire department doing the same thing. We also clean the Prairie Acres and 14th St. in case a transport is needed for one of the residents. We then start clearing the intersections so citizens can get on Highway 60, Main St., and 5th Street.



TxDOT sent a notice that they will begin a project to add curb ramps along several state roadways, including in Parmer County. They will add or upgrade ramps to meet the Americans With Disabilities Act at several intersections. In Bovina they will be working on US 60, FM 1731, and SH 86. In Friona they will be working on Business SH 214 (Main St & 5th St), and US 60/SH 214. Traffic should not be affected by the work. It

involves breaking out curbs and installing ramps. Cost will be \$1,488,393.00 to install ramps along busy highways seldom, if ever, used by wheelchair accessible folks.

One can see many amazing things at a little dribblers game. There are intense coaches trying to translate the game of basketball into something understandable to a first grader. And, of course, there are the parents: some nervous, some happy, some mad, and yes, some just as clueless to the rules of the game as the participants. Now that you have the picture in your mind, let's go back to the game. Junior shoots, and misses, and shoots again. You hear in a loud, intense voice from the bench, "Junior, use the backboard!" Junior shoots again, this time focused on that little orange square on the backboard and makes it. 
Kalley Preston makes up distance during the 800m run at last Friday's Friona track meet. She won the 400m dash and was 2nd in the 800m run.








FCCLA/Leadership Enhancement Opportunities students




