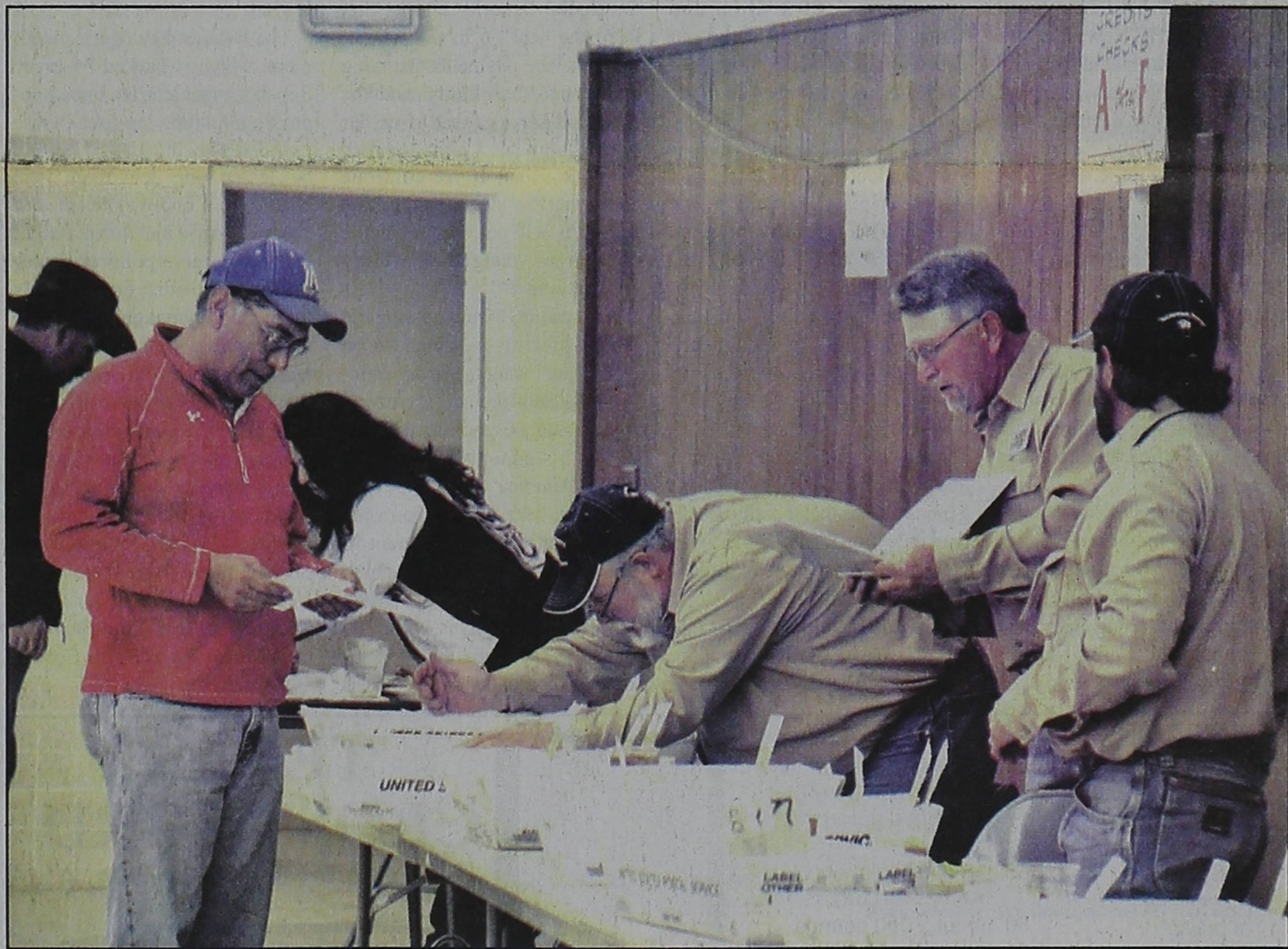

Director election, amendment votes highlight WTRT membership meeting March 26

The 59th annual meeting of the membership of West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative will be held Tuesday, March 26, at 6 p.m. at the Hereford Bull Barn.

Headlining this year's business will be the election of directors for the Milo Center and Tharp exchanges, and an up or down vote on eleven proposed amendments to the by-laws and articles of incorporation of the Cooperative.

The three-year terms of office of directors Brent Carlson of the Milo Center exchange and Lance McClaran of the Tharp exchange are expiring and subject to election. Both incumbents were first elected in 2010, and will seek re-election.

Carlson is a 1999 graduate of Hereford High School and received an Ag-

riculture Economics degree from Texas Tech in 2003. He has been engaged in farming near Milo Center since that time. He and wife Joanna have two sons.

McClaran is a 1995 graduate of Bovina High School. He farms near Oklahoma Lane. He and wife Trisha are the parents of three children.

Among proposed by-laws and articles of incorporation amendments are designation of seven districts that make up the territory served by the Cooperative with one director from each of the seven districts. District 1 would be the Dawn exchange, District 2 the Tharp exchange, District 3 the Hub exchange, District 4 the Oklahoma Lane exchange, District 5 the Milo Center and Westway exchanges, District 6 the Parmer and Summerfield exchanges, and District 7

the Frio exchange.

Other proposed amendments would make a certificate of membership non-transferable, designate the Corporation's purpose as furnishing communications services in rural areas, designate and clarify the powers available to the Corporation, bring by-laws in compliance with articles of incorporation concerning seven members on the board, allow removal of a director by the board without scheduling a special meeting of the members or waiting until the annual meeting, designation of the membership requirement to use communications services rather than just telephone service, designation of capital refunds as based on member purchases of communications services, elimination of a discrepancy in existing language and applicable

law concerning proxy voting, providing information on address of the Corporation's principal office and designating a registered agent as required by the Texas Utilities Code, and clarification that only a majority vote of members voting is required to amend the by-laws.

Annual meeting activities will begin at 6 p.m. with registration and the serving of a barbecue beef and sausage meal by Rafter G of Umbarger.

During the business meeting members will hear a report from Amy Linzey, general manager concerning the business activities during the past fiscal year and threats to continued rural telecommunications services.

Tenure awards will also be presented to WTRT and WT Services, Inc. employees in recognition of a cumulative total

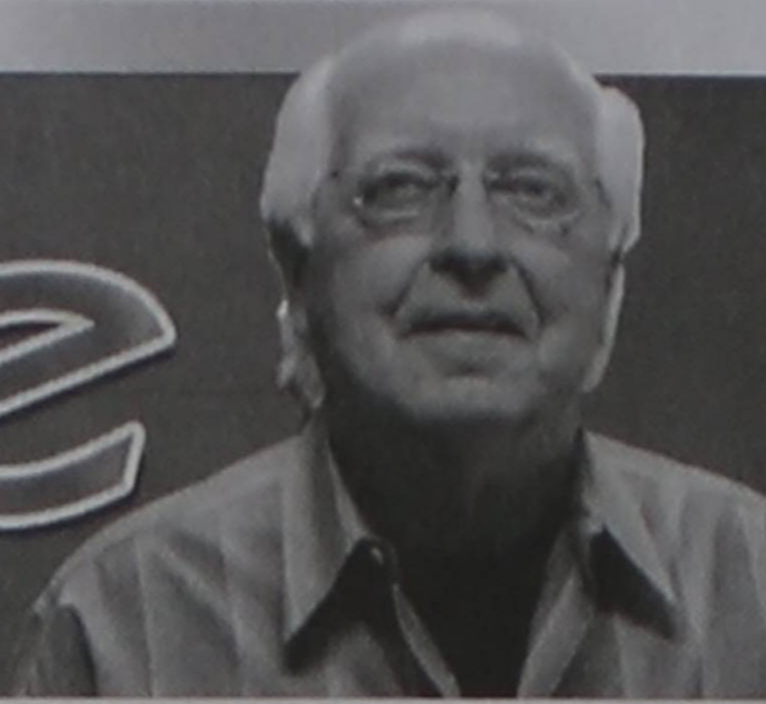
of 165 years of service to members and customers.

Among WTRT employees who will be recognized are Manuel Cantu, Mitchell Sanders and Javier Bravo of the construction crew, five year awards; Billy Seiver, construction crew foreman, and Michael Marquez, bookkeeping assistant, 10 years; Connie Matthews, payroll clerk, 20 years; and Tony Wilcox, installation and repair crew, and Larry Watts, plant foreman, 30 years each.

WT Services, Inc. employees to be honored include Barbara McAlpine, Amarillo Radio Shop secretary, five years; Cherry Wells, WT Services Friona customer service representative, 15 years; and Paul Hamilton, telephone system sales and installation and maintenance technician, 30 years.

telecommuting has upsides and downsides

Leon Hale is 91 and still writes a weekly column for the Houston Chronicle. He has been writing since the 1950s. Former Farmer County resident (and historian) Hugh Moseley lives in Sweeny, Texas and often sends me copies of Mr. Hale's folksy columns. Guess Hugh thinks us old guys enjoy hearing from each other. I have been in email contact with Mr. Hale. Nice down to earth gentleman. Here is one of his latest columns. Hope you enjoy it.

For a couple of days, the word telecommuting got back in the national news.

Any time that term shows up in print, I pay attention. Because that's what I do. I telecommute.

You know what telecommuters do. We are workers who don't go to work. We stay at home, or anyway somewhere other than the office, and send our work in.

I was a telecommuter before I knew the meaning of the word. Back in the '60s, I was living 100 miles from the paper and mailing my stuff to Houston. One day, I was having coffee with a college English prof, and he told me I was a telecommuter.

That term sounded electronic to me, so I denied the charge. I said no, I just put a stamp on my stuff and mail it in.

The prof said I could send it to the paper by carrier pigeon and I would still be telecommuting. He said the prefix 'tele' simply means distance and has nothing to do with the method

of sending work from one place to another.

That being so, then I've been a telecommuter for close to 57 years. Because the last time I went to an office to do a day's work was in 1956.

I hope that doesn't sound like bragging because it's not. In fact, if I had my working life to do all over again, I wouldn't be a telecommuter. I'd put on a clean shirt every morning and go to the paper like everybody else. I'll tell you why a little farther along.

The reason telecommuting returned to the news was a decision by Marissa Mayer, chief executive officer of the big Internet corporation Yahoo! She proclaimed that all the firm's many telecommuters should get up and come to work in the office.

That story drew wide attention because many big corporations all over the planet for years have been reporting huge advantages from employee telecommuting. Increased productivity, mainly. And all sorts of savings, especially on real estate.

But I'm mostly interested in what workers have to say about telecommuting, and I don't hear much about that.

The main objection I've heard is that stay-at-home workers are seldom promoted. Maybe when the bosses don't see you every day, they fail to think of you when it's time to hand out promotions.

That's no problem for the telecommuters who aren't interested in being promoted.

That sure includes me. I've had the same job practically forever and have never wanted any other. I always thought I had the best job on the paper. Why would I want a promotion?

But if I were gunning to climb a corporate ladder, I'd avoid telecommuting.

When I first started working at the kitchen table, or on roadside park benches, or wherever the deadlines stopped me, I did have doubts about myself. Would I be able to do the work, without anybody pushing me?

I shouldn't have wasted the worry. I don't believe I've ever written a paragraph without feeling an editor standing behind me, checking my grammar, whispering about how much time I've got left.

Home can be a distracting place for a telecommuter. Especially during child-rearing years. You get mixed up with skinned knees and driveway basketball games, and to catch up you'll sometimes need to go to work at 5 a.m. when the house is quiet.

So for me, working at home hasn't been bad, but it hasn't been all good either. If I somehow needed to start all over now, I'd say no to telecommuting and here's why:

I've missed having co-workers and the satisfaction of being part of a team. I've needed to work near them and learn what they know. Hear them complain, and predict, and gossip. Find out more about their lives, and to make more friends among them.

You can't get that done staying at home.

It's About People, Not Numbers

U.S. Sen. John Cornyn

During his 2012 budget negotiations with House Speaker John Boehner, President Obama famously declared that "we don't have a spending problem." This past week, responding to a question about our \$16 trillion national debt, he told ABC News that "we don't have an immediate crisis." When asked in the same interview if he would offer a budget that would eliminate the deficit, his answer was a blunt, unequivocal "no."

For their part, Senate Democrats have returned from a four-year budgeting hiatus to unveil a plan that would raise taxes by up to \$1.5 trillion, increase spending by 62 percent, and add \$7.3 trillion to a national debt that already eclipses our economy. Not surprisingly, their budget does not balance.

Since President Obama took office, his tax-and-spend policies have given us \$6 trillion dollars in new debt, chronically high unemployment, rising insurance premiums, and a credit-rating downgrade. These are the policies

that gave us a failed "stimulus" program and a government takeover of our health care system that continues to discourage job creation. With the federal government's unfunded liabilities surpassing \$100 trillion and annual interest payments on our debt exceeding \$200 billion, we simply cannot afford more of the same.

Make no mistake, this debate is not just about numbers in a ledger. It's about people. It's about the longevity of a great nation and its ability to care for its citizens. As a B-17 pilot in World War II, my father fought to ensure that his children and grandchildren could grow up in a country of prosperity; a country where hard work is dignified and opportunities abound for all. He and countless other members of that greatest generation left their country better than they found it. As I look to his grandchildren — my two daughters — I cannot help but wonder if they and their children will be able to say the same of my generation.

Every dollar this administra-

tion taxes and borrows is a dollar ransomed from the prosperity and well-being of future generations. This has created a growing economic burden that threatens the programs that Americans rely on: the Social Security checks that keep the heat on in the winter; the Medicare payments that bring comfort to the elderly, and the Medicaid services that assist our citizens who need their country's help the most. If we continue down the President's path, these programs will not exist when the children and young adults of today enter retirement.

As a parent, I want nothing but the best for my children. As an American, I want to see my country prosper and protect her citizens. As a senator, I cannot stand by and watch this administration wage war on America's youth.

This is why I have sponsored a Constitutional amendment to require the federal government to balance its budget. We must ensure that our country lives within its means, lest we rob future generations of the quality of life that is

an American's birthright. This is a moral obligation, and if we fail to meet it we will have spoiled the gifts of American prosperity that have been nurtured and handed down to us, generation after generation.

The Balanced Budget Amendment, which is backed by every Republican senator, is a sincere approach to putting our fiscal house in order. The alternative couldn't be clearer: more debt, more fiscal cliffs, and a one-way ticket to a European-style meltdown. Rather than wage more political battles while we jeopardize our children's future, policymakers must face these issues with the honesty, the moral clarity, and the determination they demand.

Senator Cornyn serves on the Finance and Judiciary Committees. He serves as the top Republican on the Judiciary Committee's Immigration, Refugees and Border Security subcommittee. He served previously as Texas Attorney General, Texas Supreme Court Justice, and Bexar County District Judge.

It Doesn't Have to Hurt

What do you think of when you hear the words "physically fit"? No pain, no gain? 500 crunches a day? Marathons? Jillian Michaels? P90X? Cabbage diets? Do you feel guilty, knowing you should be exercising and eating cleaner? It seems like "healthy" can bring on some negative emotions, but it truly doesn't have to hurt. No extreme behaviors necessary either.

Ok, so you do want to start living healthier (without the hurt of course), but with all the fitness hype out there it's hard to sort the good advice from the crazy tabloid stuff. The book, Switch-How to Change Things When Change is Hard by Chip Heath and Dan Heath, relates that resistance to change often comes from a lack of clarity. Not knowing what to do can keep you spinning your wheels. Another point the writers make is that with too many choices, people often develop decision paralysis. More options, even good options, can cause us to overload and get stuck. The intent of this column is to help readers jump into the fitness arena motivated to make healthy changes without being intimidated by what to do and by the many choices of how to do it.

This week, let's start out with a quiz (www.webmd.com) for fun and to plant some fitness seeds in your brain. Just some things to think about this week (see, that doesn't hurt!). In the coming weeks, we'll start setting out the stepping stones for a successful fitness journey.

1. Which is the most balanced exercise plan?

- A. Walking, weight-lifting, and yoga
- B. Running, weight-lifting, and tennis
- C. Running, kick-boxing and yoga
- D. Running, weightlifting, and cycling

2. T or F You'll get more fit doing 30 straight minutes of exercise than by doing 10 minutes three times a day.

3. Talk to a doctor before beginning an exercise program if:

- A. You're over 65
- B. You're taking prescription medication
- C. You've had high blood pressure
- D. All of the above

4. T or F You can target specific parts of your body to lose weight.

5. T or F It's better to work out in the morning than in the afternoon or evenings.

Answers:

- 1. A. Walking, weight lifting, and yoga

This combination would be the most balanced exercise plan because it has three different types of exercise: aerobic/cardio (walking, jogging, cycling, swimming, tennis, basketball) boosts the strength of your heart and lungs; strength or "resistance" training (weight lifting, resistance band exercises, etc.) help to keep your muscles and bones strong, and help with balance and coordination; and flexibility exercises (yoga, stretching, tai chi) can improve your range of motion and reduce your risk for injury.

- 2. False.

The CDC recommends at least 150 minutes a week of moderate-intensity cardio/aerobic activity or 75 minutes of vigorous-intensity aerobic activity, or some combination of both. It's fine to spread

out your exercise over the course of the day. Stick to a minimum of 10 minutes at a time, though.

- 3. D. All of the above.

Ready to start exercising? Great -- just check with your health care provider first. It's particularly important if you're over 65, taking prescription medication, or have a long-term health condition such as heart disease, diabetes, or arthritis. You should also check with a doctor if you have had dizziness, shortness of breath, or pain in the chest, neck, jaw, arms, or other areas.

- 4. False.

Spot reducing is a myth: You can't target specific parts of your body for weight loss. To lose fat and weight from a specific area, you have to do regular physical activity that works your entire body.

- 5. False.

The best time to exercise? Whenever you can make it a part of your regular routine. Research shows that your body will adjust to whatever time of day works for you. Some studies suggest physical performance peaks in late afternoon. Other studies suggest that morning workouts may help you sleep better. The most important thing is to pick a time of day you can stick with.

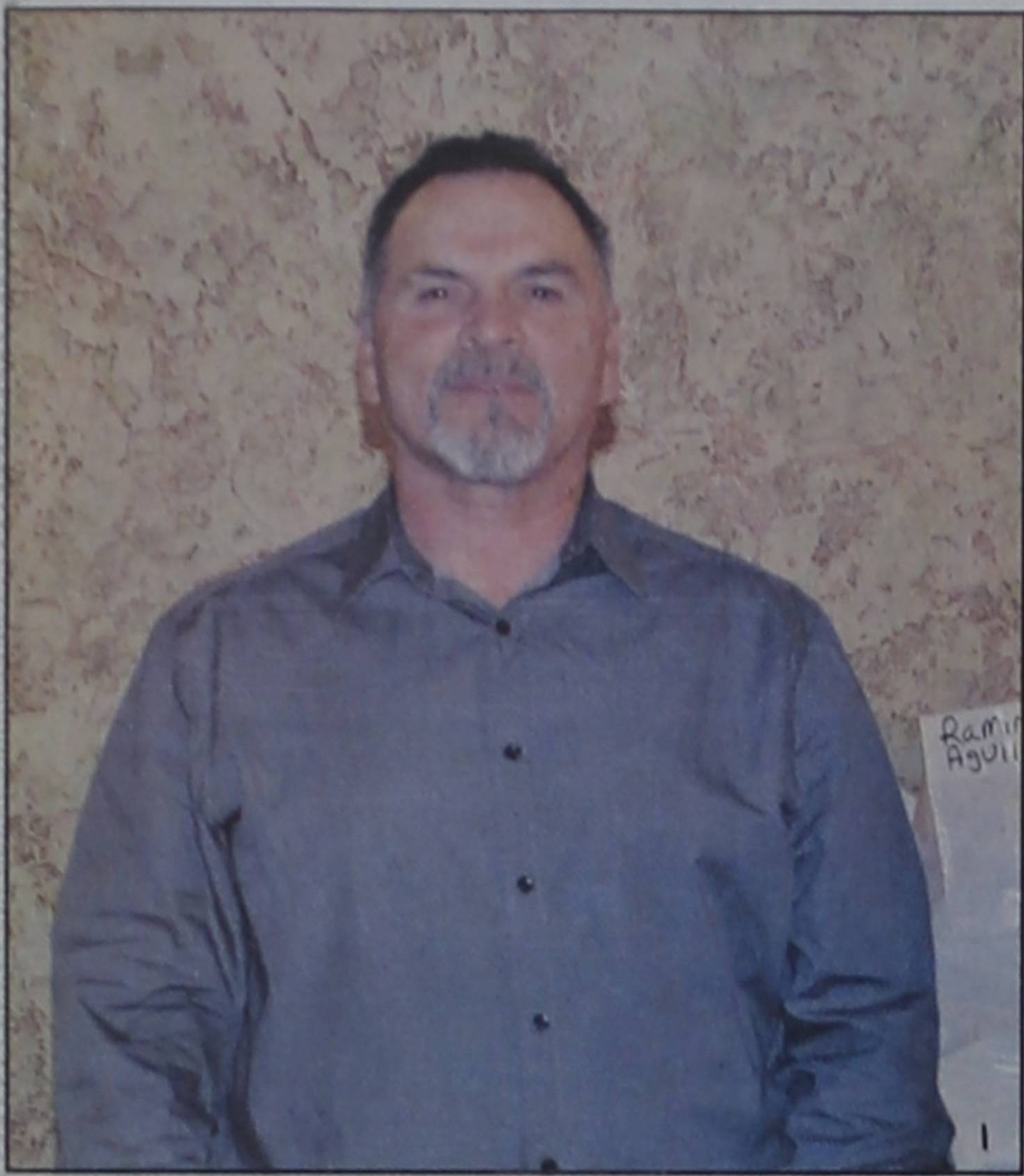
