Council approves purchase of ten lots for apartment construction

The Friona city council met in regular session Monday April 8 at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers, 619 Main St. Councilman and mayor pro-tem Jim Atwell presided. Councilman Greg Lewellen was absent.

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. with the pledge of allegiance and invocation. The first business item was a public hearing for comments on the proposed ordinance making Main St., from 4th to 11th streets a business district and restricting any usage for trailer parks, courts, and similar usage. There were no public comments.

Due to the election date of May 11 and the necessity of ballot canvassing, the May meeting was moved from May 13 to May 20. All council meetings are open to the public.

Council reviewed the city's investment policy and after discussion, approved First National Bank as the city depository bank. Based on bids received from Friona State Bank and First National Bank, the council was unanimous in awarding the agreement to First National.

Bids from Whiteface Ford and Stevens 5-Star were considered for a new city pickup. Whiteface, with a bid of \$21,404 was awarded the bid. Stevens' two bids were \$23,018 and \$24,221. Freeman Company was awarded the seal coat bid for city streets

seal coat bid for city streets.

A recommendation from the plan-

ning and zoning board was discussed regarding the Main St. business zone ordinance. The council accepted the P&Z recommendation and approved the ordinance. In other action, Eldon Reeb was appointed to the Friona Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) board replacing J.B. Douglas who resigned and moved to Amarillo.

Mr. Douglas also resigned as Friona mayor and his resignation was accepted by council vote. Mayor pro-tem Atwell said, "Mayor Douglas was a strong asset to the community and we appreciate his service and wish him

In a major decision, the council approved the FEDC's purchase of 10 lots

on the city block bounded by 6th and 7th and Ashland and Woodland. The lots were purchased for \$3,500 per lot from Connie Whaley Slagle and Doris Whaley Sutton. Plans call for a Clovis developer to construct duplex/apartments on the lots to assuage the shortage of housing in the city. Plans are still tentative but one report said up to 24 three bedroom, two bath units could be built on the property.


Police Chief Frank Mooney gave his activity report. He said the city is currently one officer short but interviews are scheduled next week. On a govdeals.com website, Chief Mooney said they sold four vehicles and still have a 2007 Dodge Charger to sell. He

is meeting Thursday (4/11) with the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) about a grant to fund a school resource officer.

Warrant/fine collections are up this year, he said, attributing the increase to the city's impound policy. Citizens caught driving without a driver license or insurance have their vehicles impounded and pay a fine and storage fee. Warrant collections in 2012 were \$21,546. So far in 2013 collections are

\$37,529.

Future council members Alan Monroe and Bruce Fleming were present as observers. They will be sworn in at the May 20 meeting. Also present was mayoral candidate Rick White.

the healthcare marketplace coming soon

Your health insurance may be headed for trouble. Or maybe not.

Depends on who you believe and how much you know about the Affordable Care Act, a/k/a Obamacare. Something has to reveal itself by October 1, 2013 when the so-called healthcare marketplaces open for enrollment. Coverage starts January 1, 2014.

The state of Texas declined to have a state-operated insurance exchange. If a state decides not to undertake an insurance exchange the federal government will operate it for them. Either way it is likely to be a total boondoggle. Nevertheless, the Obama folks remain positive that their new healthcare program will be a good deal for the common man/woman.

Bob Moos has the unwieldy title of Southwest public affairs officer for the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. I decided to reprint Mr. Moos' recent positive news release that explains how wonderful the coming Health Insurance Marketplace is going to be for folks who are uninsured.

Here is his take on the subject. Of course Mr. Moos does not say how much it will cost taxpayers to operate the exchanges, hire navigators to explain it, and more layers of government employees to process it. You be the judge.

A new way to buy health insurance is coming soon By Bob Moos

Whether you're uninsured or just want to explore your options, you'll soon have a new way to find health care coverage that fits your needs and budget.

The Health Insurance Marketplace will give you access to affordable, comprehensive coverage. You'll be able to go to one website to learn about insurance plans available to you, check on their benefits and out-of-pocket costs and then comparison shop.

Most workers will still get coverage through their employer, and older people will still have Medicare. But if you're one of the many Americans who have had difficulty buying insurance for themselves because of cost or poor health, you'll welcome the Marketplace.

The private, individual health plans sold through the online exchange will provide a package of 10 essential benefits, including emergency services, hospital care, lab services, prescription drugs, doctor visits, preventive care, rehab services and maternity care.

The benefits are similar to what's typically covered in an employer-provided plan. Yet many individual insurance plans currently don't offer such an array of services.

You'll also choose one of four levels of coverage: bronze, silver, gold or platinum. Bronze plans will have the lowest premiums but the highest out-of-pocket costs. Platinum plans will have the highest premiums but the lowest deductibles and co-payments.

With a bronze plan, for example, the insurer will pay 60 percent of the costs, while you'll be responsible for the other 40 percent. With a platinum plan, the insurer will pay 90 percent of the costs, and you'll be expected to take care of the remaining 10 percent.

When you're shopping at the Marketplace, everything will be clearly spelled out for you. You'll see what your monthly premiums, annual deductibles and other out-of-pocket costs will be before you decide to enroll. You'll make apples-to-apples comparisons between health plans.

You'll have guaranteed coverage regardless of a pre-existing medical condition. Insurers won't be able to deny you coverage or charge you more because you have, say, cancer or diabetes. It will also be illegal to charge women more simply because they're women.

When enrollment through the on Jan. 1.

Marketplace begins on Oct. 1, you'll use a single application to figure out whether you or your family are eligible for a low-cost plan through Medicaid or the Children's Health Insurance Program or qualify for a new kind of tax credit.

With most tax credits, you must wait until you file your income taxes to get a break. But the credit available through the Marketplace can be used right away to lower your monthly premiums. It will be sent directly to your insurer, so you'll pay less out of your own pocket.

Generally, the premium tax credit will be available to individuals and families with incomes between 100 percent and 400 percent of the federal poverty level. That's between \$23,550 and \$94,200 per year for a family of four. You also may qualify for other breaks on your out-of-pocket expenses, depending on your income.

It's not too early to find out more about how you can make the Marketplace work for you. Visit www. healthcare.gov today to learn about the advantages of health insurance and how to choose a plan to fit your needs and lifestyle.

In the fall, you'll be able to get information about all the plans in your area. You'll enroll yourself directly through the website or, if you have questions, you can call a toll-free hotline. There will also be specially trained people in your community to give you personalized help.

These "navigators," as they'll be called, won't be associated with any particular insurance plan, and they won't receive any sales commission from insurers, so you'll be assured of completely unbiased help. They'll have only your best interests at heart.

The Marketplace will give you control over your health insurance options and, for many people, offer a break on costs. Coverage starts on Jan. 1.

Expanding background checks at gun shows will not prevent the next shooting, will not solve violent crime and will not keep our kids safe in schools. While the overwhelming rejection of President Obama and Mayor Bloomberg's "universal" background check agenda is a positive development, we have a broken mental health system that is not going to be fixed with more background checks at gun shows.

The sad truth is that no background check would have prevented the tragedies in Newtown, Aurora or Tucson. We need a serious and meaningful solution that addresses crime in cities like Chicago, addresses mental health deficiencies, while at the same time protecting the rights of those of us who are not a danger to anyone. President Obama should be as committed to dealing with the gang problem that is tormenting honest people in his hometown as he is to blaming law-abiding gun owners for the acts of psychopathic murderers.




Death and Taxes

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

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

Stay Calm and Cardio!

The goal of cardio is to get your heart rate up and keep it up for a sustained period of time. Regular cardio (aka aerobic) exercise is one of the best things you can do to improve your overall health. Cardiovascular diseases (high blood pressure, coronary heart disease, heart failure, stroke, congenital cardiovascular

defects) affect 36.9 percent of Americans, killing over 815,000 people each year. That's more than cancer, chronic lower respiratory disease and accidental deaths combined. Two out of every three people with diabetes die from cardiovascular disease. Depressing stuff!

Cardiovascular diseases and type 2 diabetes are closely related to lifestyle factors such as obesity, sedentary behavior, poor nutrition, stress, and lack of sleep. The good news is that with lifestyle changes, such as adding exercise to your day, you can significantly decrease your risk of these diseases!

Cardio does not have to be complicated. You do not have to run a 5K every day, be bored on the treadmill or spend big bucks. Lots of choices are out there for a good workout: walking, cycling, jogging, running, stair climbing, elliptical machines, jumping rope, swimming, cardio-kickboxing, zhumba, aerobics (step, dance, aqua), buy an aerobics DVD (\$10 at WalMart)... So which one is the best? The one that you enjoy and will work hard at. If you wake up every morning dreading your workout, you probably won't get it done. Do the things you enjoy! Mix it up—as long as you are getting in thirty minutes three to five days a week working at a moderate intensity (at least 60% of your maximum heart rate), it doesn't matter what you pick or how you combine them.

If the dirt is blowing, hop on the treadmill while you watch your favorite TV show. If it's beautiful outside, enjoy it with a walk or bicycle ride. The new walking trail at Reeve's Lake is a great place to get out and enjoy! Bonus: Research has shown that walking with walking poles will burn twenty percent more calories. You can purchase them at Target, sports stores or online. I've seen them range in price from \$20 to \$200; I'm sure the \$20 set serves as well as the \$200 ones. If you don't have a 30 minute time block, cardio for 10 minutes three times during the day; these sessions can provide the same benefits. Remember to ALWAYS warm up and cool down to prevent injury, soreness and stiffness.
