

Red Cross, roofing, and tank painting on council agenda

The Friona city council will meet in regular session at 6:30 p.m. Monday July 8 in council chambers at 619 Main St. All council meetings are open to the public.

A public hearing will be held at the first of the meeting for public comments on the 2013 drinking water quality report.

Other items on the agenda include: departmental reports from the Friona library and Friona Police department, financial statements for June 2013 and 3rd quarter 2013, accounts payable for June 2013. In other business the council will discuss authorizing the city manager to solicit bids for tank painting and rehabilitation of the one-million gallon tank at the north well field, and to solicit bids for the roof at the Friona Public Library. The council will discuss and take action on statement of agreement between the Texas Panhandle Chapter of the American Red Cross and the City of Friona. Council will also discuss an amended land lease and wind easement between the city and Scandia Wind. Two other items will conclude the agenda. Kathy Sandoval and Ann Kelley will be considered for appointment to the Friona Library advisory board for a two-year term and a carport variance at 1411 Euclid, requested by Eufemia Cardenas and Arturo Ortiz will be considered. The council will go into executive session for the annual evaluation of the city manager. After the executive session the council will return to regular session and consider action, if any, in the executive session discussions.

Free voter ID cards available

Pursuant to a U.S. Supreme Court ruling, new voting requirements passed by the Texas Legislature in 2011 will take effect immediately. Photo identification will now be required when voting in elections in Texas. On June 26, 2013, the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) will begin issuing Election Identification Certificates (EIC) to individuals who do not already have an acceptable form of photo identification (ID) to present when voting. Applications for the EIC will be accepted at DPS driver license offices across Texas.

If an applicant already has any of the following documents, they are not eligible to receive an EIC:

- Texas driver license unexpired or expired less than 60 days
- Texas personal identification card unexpired or expired less than 60 days
- U.S. passport book or card unexpired or expired less than 60 days
- Texas concealed handgun license unexpired or expired less than 60 days
- U.S. Military identification with photo unexpired or expired less than 60 days
- U.S. Citizenship Certificate or Certificate of Naturalization with photo

To qualify for an EIC, applicants must be:

- A U.S. citizen;
- A Texas resident;
- Eligible to vote in Texas (show a valid voter registration card or submit a voter registration application when applying for the EIC); and
- 17 years and 10 months or older.

Beginning June 26, individuals may apply for an EIC by visiting a Texas driver license office and completing an EIC application (DL-14C). Applicants must also bring the following items to the office to verify U.S. citizenship and identity.

The EIC receipt an individual receives will include their photo and can be used for voting until the permanent card is delivered by mail.

The EIC is free of charge to qualifying applicants and is valid for six years. There is no expiration date of an EIC for citizens 70 years of age or older.

The EIC can only be used for the purpose of voting in an election and may not be used as personal identification.

Residents with a documented disability may apply at their county voter registrar for a permanent exemption from the photo ID requirement. If approved, they will not need a photo ID to vote. Also, if individuals are voting by mail, they do not have to submit a photo ID. They are free of charge and valid for six years. We have published a press release from the DPS in this issue of the Star that outlines how to get an EIC. Somehow I think many will view this as racist because it requires people to put forth some effort to become a legal voter in Texas. Some racism is blatant. To prove the point all you have to do is prowl around on Facebook and Twitter where some of the most vile racist comments are made. Example: many have declared on Twitter if George Zimmerman is acquitted they would kill him. I haven't heard Rev. Sharpton or Rev. Jackson condemning these racist threats.

be forgiven. He paid a price. The social media racists then turned on Rev. Jackson, calling him some pretty raunchy nicknames.

It is obvious that many people want to keep the racism issue alive. They taunt and promote racism and stir the pot to keep it boiling. The Democrats don't mind voters getting passionate about racism. As we celebrate the Fourth of July, I encourage all Texans to take a moment to reflect upon what was at stake in that Philadelphia meetinghouse some 237 years ago, when a group of revolutionaries gathered to indict a tyrant and declare their independence. Our founders recognized that liberty, endowed by our Creator, is the birthright of all mankind. Today, as we gather with friends and family, we give thanks for the sacrifices that countless Americans have made over the generations to guard this right and see to it that it is fully realized by all citizens.

As we mark this day, let us recommit ourselves to America's founding ideals. Our experiment in self-governance will always bring new challenges and fresh debates. At times these debates will be loud and raucous as sincere ideologies clash. But we must never lose sight of our common love of country and the fundamental truth that we are all each others' equal.

Texans are no strangers to the high cost of protecting the revolutionary ideals handed down to us by our founders. The Republic of Texas was born in a revolution of its own, and with over 100,000 members of our armed forces calling Texas home, our state has long been on the frontlines of liberty.





King's Manor founders BBQ

All proceeds benefit the King's Manor Founders benevolent fund to assist residents who have outlived their means.









Is Your Desk Deadly?

Emerging research is finding that people who spend most of their day sitting have as much as a 50- percent greater risk of dying prematurely from all causes and an 80-percent greater risk of dying from cardiovascular disease EVEN THOUGH they may be exercising 30 minutes every day. What you are doing the other 23¹/₂ hours of your day may be cancelling out the health benefits of your workouts.

Excessive sitting leads to weaker muscles, a sluggish central nervous system, increased fatigue, decreased insulin sensitivity, higher blood pressure, decreased activity of enzymes that break down fats in the blood, and increased cholesterol and triglycerides. Wow--That does sound toxic.

But, what to do? You can't quit your job. Movement is the antidote. Start by moving more at work. Stand up when you talk on the phone. Standing triples the energy requirement of doing a similar activity sitting. Take a few minutes every hour to walk around the office or stretch. Instead of phoning or emailing a coworker, walk to their desk to discuss matters. Park further away from the door. Take a 10 minute walk (or more) before work and during your lunch hour. Use a stability ball for a chair. Using the stability ball will improve balance, and strengthen abdominal, low back and leg muscles. Treadmill desk anyone? Treadmill desks are becoming increasingly popular as science continues to prove the detrimental effects of sitting.

At home, keep that exercise regime going strong. The average adult sits for 90-percent of their leisure time. Find ways to sneak activity into your routine. All movement counts. Doesn't have to be 30 minutes at a time. TV commercial breaks can be a great time for mini workouts. Take an evening stroll. Stand while you catch up on Facebook. Don't take life sitting down!

retirement. We thank him for 26 years of dedicated service to the High Plains Water District," said Board President Lynn Tate of Amarillo.


"We appreciate Carmon McCain's willingness to serve as interim manager, and have confidence in his abilities," Tate said.


He will serve in both positions until a new manager is named.



The alleys are serviced by trash trucks. The drivers will report any new trash in or around dumpsters and the city will investigate to see who is in violations.

Residents found in violation of any of the city codes may be assessed a fine plus the cost of cleanup.

You do not have to wait for the city to get involved if a problem exists. We can all work together to keep our city a clean and safe place to live.


