Secretary McAdoo issued a state-ment flatly charging that the decline of government 2 per cent bonds to 35 1-2—a new record—was due "al-

Almost all the entire issue is used as security for National bank notes. At the present price, however, the disncy between the market value and the issues of notes against the bonds is covered by what is known as the 2 per cent redemption fund, deposited by the banks with the treasury to care for retirements of Na-

"Two Per Cents Worth Par."

Secretary McAdoo announced it was not his intention to require the banks to charge off the present de-preciation below par, but that the banks might continue to put the bonds at par in their statements to the conller of the currency, at least "until some material change in conditions should compel the adoption of another course." In his statement, Secretary McAdoo declared 2 per cents were worth par-notwithstanding their decline in the New York market and continued:

FOR SUPPRESSION LIQUOR LAW VIOLATIONS

Srvice Would Be Entirely Disassociart ed From State Renger

Austin, Texas, July 29.—A secret service for Texas disassociated from the Ranger force and devoted to the exclusive work of suppressing viola control of the comptroller is provided for in an amendment to the administration appropriation bill adopted in the House today. The appropriation carries \$25,000.

Two blue sky bills were introduced, one was offered by Ratliff and the oth er by Ridgell.

SCHOOL IN HINDU VILLAGES

Methods ary Primitive and Room Usually is Abandoned Temple or Berrowed House.

The old-fashioned primary schools for Hindu village boys and girls are known as "pial" schools, and are very primitive. 

It is more effective, at high temperatures, so to 90 fahr, being best. About 2 pint is poured into each receptacle and the pans are placed in the bins at the top. The gas being heavier than air naturally penetrates the mass of potatoes, reaching those at the bottom. The bin should be tightly closed for from 24 to 36 hours with good assurance that the germinating pow assurance that the germi er of the seed is not destroyed. The utmost care should be taken that no fire, such as that from a cigar, electric fan, stove, or even a gas light or lamp should be brought into the vicinity. Otherwise, as the gas is very inflammable a fire may result or a serious explosion may follow.


