Government Offering Every Aid Those Who Will Leave the Southern Republic

Washington, Sept. 6 .- The United States government today broadened the powers of its consular representatives in Mexico to such a degree that it is believed there will be no further obstacle to a more general withdrawal of American citizens from the danger zones of the southern republic. American consuls in Mexico who previously had been instructed to funrish first class transportation to any who desired it on condition that they later would reimburse the state department; today received added instructions to give Americans whatever transportation they desired and they would be expected to reimburse the government only if they were able and at their

The adoption of this liberal policy resulted from the possibility that many Americans would needlessly linger in the trouble torn districts unless every facility for their de-parture was afforded. Some Wash-ington officials commented for the first time on Huerta's des that if the American government was reluctant to give the refugees first class transportation he gladly would

WELL SUPPLIED WITH FEED

otton Better Than Believed, Soris Good Corn Yields, and Other Encouraging Reports

Wichita county farmers have harrop is fair, they have plenty of feed stored and considerable more to harvest, and cotton will do better than many people believe.

That is the situation here, in the

opinion of J. W. Campbell, district agricultural agent, who has been over his section in the past few days. Mr Campbell says that very few farmers will have to buy any feed as many of them had a supply left over from last year, while others have made good crops of milo maize and kaffir corn in spite of the drought.

Mr. Campbell is unable to make any estimate of cotton. He says a few fields will make a fourth and a third to the acre, but most will be considerably below that. In some places it will take twelve to twenty.

res to make a bale, Corn has done surprisingly well in some places and Mr. Campbell him-self was astounded at the yields that were recorded. While not allowed by names, he knows of one farmer who had forty acres that averaged forty-one bushels, another with twenty-six acres that averaged forty and several others with good yields, as follows: Ten acres averaging twenty-seven; ten acres, averaging twenty; seveneen acres, averaging twenty-one; een acres, averaging thirty-five; fifteen acres, averaging thirty-one: five acres averaging twenty-one: thirty acres, averaging twenty-five and thirty-five acres averaging thirty-

Mr. Campbell tells of one farmer who has fifty acres of mile maize and kaffir corn, upon which he is pasturing a hundred head of hogs.

Campbell considers this a valuable hint. There are some good fields of Raffir corn and milo maize in this vicinity. Mr. Campbell says; one of seven acres will average seventy-four bushels and one of ten acres will make forty-five bushels.

> But if the commission form is more efficient, is it not liable to be more dangerous? If the commissioners have pow er to do more good, will they not also have more power to do harm? Of course, if the commissioners are always honest and capable men, theer can never be any trouble. The same is true with the aldermanic system. In the final analysis, it seems to me, that form of government will succeed best that will arouse most popular in-terest in it. When the people run bales of hay on his uncle's ranch. their government, all is well; when they neglect it, graft and inefficiency

Let us have the commission form of government, if that is the form which stires the peoples interest. Let us not, however, attach too much importance to conspicuous success of commission government in Galveston, Houston and other clites where its success may have been due to the intense public interest in the experiment rather than in any inherent merit in the system.





The territory of Europe adapted to the production of fruits and vegetables is so restricted and un-suited to large production, that buyers come from Northern Europe to California growers are regarded as invincible in their methods, for they have driven the European oranges and lemons practically out of the American markets, and are introducing California wines into Europe in competition with the wines of Italy; France and Spain. I think the methods of California growers are the ones for our people to study. I have already mentioned the methods of marketing farm products in both Denmark and Ireland and Frank Woozencraft, in a very able paper to the Texas Farm-and Ranch, has de-scribed the marketing methods of the farmers of Holland. I will now de-scribe the marketing methods in Germany and England, giving a study of the food markets of Berlin as an example of the one, and of London, as an example of the other.

There are wholesale meat markets and wholesale fruit and vegetable markets in each city. An idea of the size of these markets may be gained when I say that in London twentyfive thousand tons of meat pass through the markets daily. means the carcasses of about one

hundred thousand animals, besides fowls. Acres of buildings are requirvegetables and fruits are even larger wholesale markets. The city of Berlin, being about



HAS SOLUTION RAIN PROBLEM

ING PRECIPITATION

Suggests High Tower Through Which Warm Air Could be Forced Into Cold Current

To The Editor of The Times: Round Rock, Texas, Sept. 4 .-There is an old adage "that necessity is the mother of inventions." I believe the time will come when it will be possible to cause it to rain when needed on all arid and semi-arid regions. Perhaps the reason it has not been accomplished is the superstition of man in what is termed, trying to improve on God's meth-od. Now I believe the Lord placed man here on earth to use anything that is good for mankind. We dam up streams to catch storm water and that is good for mankind. We dame up streams to catch storm water and harness electricity and other things which were not given direct to maniferigation is good as far as it goes, but there are thousands of acres which cannot be irrigated. What we have to do is to combine the elements that produce rain and the land that now is arid can be made to blossom like the rose. Thousands of farmers are just existing and that is all for the want of moisture to make crops grow, and as soon as man can lay superstition aside the rain problem will be solved. Why should not man make a machine to force the warm air that is next to the earth caused by the reflection of the sun on the earth up to the cold atmosphere above. We know through science and by observation that a warm current of air striking a freezing atmosphere will produce moisture. Take a pitcher of ice water and as soon as it comes into contact with warm at it will cause most ter and as soon as it comes into con-tact with warm air it will cause mosture to collect on the outside. Clouds

are caused by the warm atmosphere Several years ago the secretary of agriculture, Uncle Jerry Rusk, had an experiment tried near San Antonio and at the time had all sorts of fun poked, at him, but Uncle Jerry was on the right track. The way FORMER WICHITAN SEEKING PATINC PRECIPITATION

The way they did was by shooting bombs up into the air. He did not have much success. The reason is the much success. success. The reason, I think, they had the explosion at the wrong end. Also it is claimed by Mr. Post of Post City, that he produces rain by MIX AIR CURRENTS exploding the explosives on the ground. Now this way is not a pracilcal way, on account of the expense and damage. Therefore it would take too much explosives to drive enough of the warm air to the height necessary. What we need is a ma-chine or apparatus to force the warm air upwards in a greater volume. Now my idea of this solution will be to make a steel tower of sufficient height and strength to support a large pipe or tube, running to full height of tower and when the hu-midity is great the air to be collected by a powerful suction fan or blower, such as used by gins, only on a larger scale. These towers could be built to a sufficient height that the warm air forced up to the

cold atmosphere would produce rain. Lots of people will think this a huge Lots of people will think this a nuger joke or imagination, but the time will come when they will see differently, if, not by my idea it will be by some other way.
