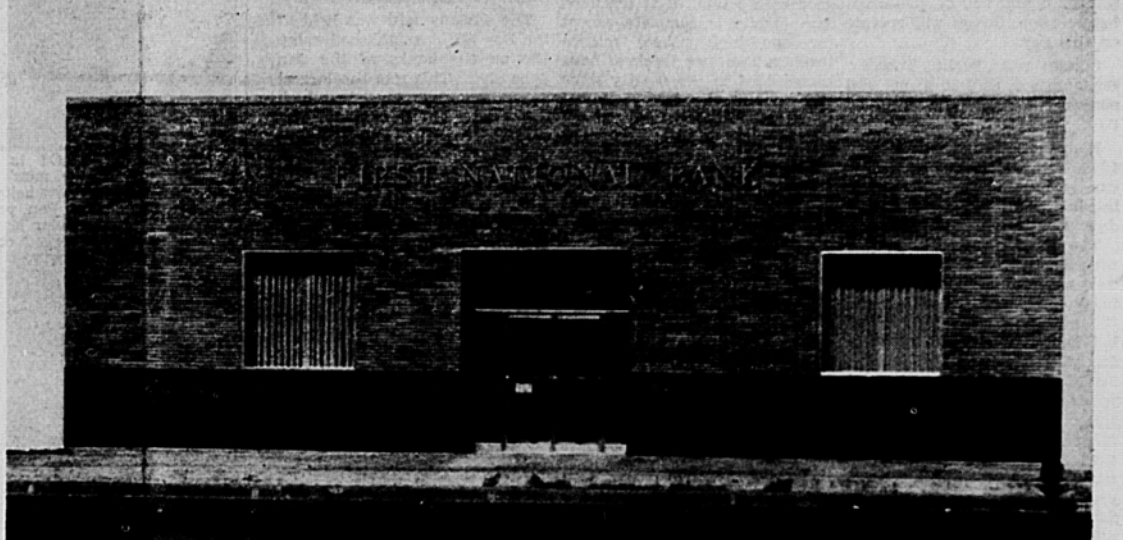

Baird's Oldest Continuing Business To Hold Open House Sunday

The newly remodeled and enlarged First National Bank of Baird will celebrate its face-lifting in a formal Open House on Sunday, August 27th. Visitor will be welcomed through its doors between the hours of 2 to 5 P. M.

The beautiful new building sports, not only a new exterior and a new look inside, but has some added facilities. The Departments are now completely separated, with private offices for President Bob Norrell and the Directors, spacious book-keeping department in the rear, drive-in window service, separate room for snack bar, new vault, making a sum-total of more than twice the space for customers and employees alike. Now in its seventy-ninth year of service to Baird and Callahan County, Baird's First National has never changed location. Some of the old timers may recall when the entrance was at the north-east corner, facing what is now the Jones-Franke Pontiac. This was changed in 1923 when some remodeling was done inside and out. The entrance was moved to face east. In 1940, to keep pace with the changing times, the bank was remodeled again. The contract

Ninety-Four Years of Service to Bank Customers

for the latest remodeling was signed with Frank & Winfree of Denison, on Feb. 20, 1961.

To better appreciate the overall progress of the county's oldest bank (also one of the oldest in the state) you would have to trace its history back to the early 1880's.

In January of 1883, five years prior to the incorporation of the City of Baird, General F. W. James and A. G. Wills became partners in a private business concern, the Baird Bank. This was the beginning of a successful history. The original bank was housed in a small stone building on the present site, and a part of the First National's new home.

General James was the first president, and his partner, Mr. Wills, the first cashier. James was not only one of the pioneer bankers of the Wild West, but was recognized as one of West Texas' most progressive and successful, though conservative, financiers.

Accordingly, in 1885, he associated some of Baird's leading citizens, securing more capital and formed a corporation. His application for a charter was approved on January 2, 1885 and the Baird Bank became the First National Bank of Baird.

The bank's first officers were F. W. James, president; A. G. Wills, cashier; W. L. Gilliland and Sam Cutbirth, vice presidents.

Judge Otis Bowyer was the bank's first depositor and its first Attorney, which position is now being held by Randall Jackson.

Powell received an assistant, Fred Lane; 1903, Henry James became vice president; 1905, Tom Thornton replaced Powell as cashier; 1907, J. B. Stokes elected president and later the same year B. L. Russell became cashier, with new assistants, W. S. Hinds and C. B. Payne; 1909, J. B. Harmon became president, and J. F. Dyer and Tom Windham elected directors; 1911, J. W. Turner became assistant cashier; 1912, directors were J. F. Dyer, Henry James, B. L. Russell, W. S. Hinds and Tom Windham; later the same year, W. S. Hinds became cashier on the same date his father, W. A. Hinds, succeeded B. L. Russell as director.

There was no change in the bank's personnel until January 12, 1915, when J. B. Cutbirth was added to the bank's directorate. In August of the same year, as quoted from a 1923 edition of The Baird Star, "... genial Bob Norrell, who had been a faithful and trusted employe of the bank since 1908, became assistant cashier. ..."

In May of 1923, Ace Hickman succeeded the deceased J. B. Cutbirth as a director and still holds that position today. Succession of directors to the present are: 1925, A. R. Kelton; 1928, Bob Norrell; 1945, Fred Cutbirth and Frank Windham; 1949, Howard Farmer; 1951, Fleming James, following the death of his father Henry James whom he succeeded; 1953, Randall Jackson.

Present employees are: Mary Payne, secretary; bookkeepers, Don McBride, 1960; Euloss Corn, 1952; Alene Hodson, 1950; Burma Warren, 1947; Mrs. Mae Lewis, and Lucy Curtis, 1945; teller Mrs. Viva Peek, 1942; assistant cashiers Fred Goble, 1947 and James Eubanks, 1948.

Fred Goble became assistant

cashier in 1952 and James Eubanks in 1954. Vice president Howard E. Farmer has been with the bank since 1920, becoming assistant cashier in 1927, director in 1949, cashier in 1951 and elected vice president in 1959.

President Bob Norrell has worked for the bank since 1908, becoming assistant cashier in 1915, cashier in 1927, director in 1928, vice president in January, 1951 and President, July 1951. The combined total experience of Bob Norrell and Howard Farmer is 94 years of banking.

The First National had a competitor in the '80's called the Callahan County Bank, founded by W. A. Hinds and Joe Rushing. The First National Bank purchased that bank in 1885 and absorbed its business. At that time, the latter was a small, struggling institution. In its published statement of condition, December 24, 1885, its deposits, subject to check, amounted to \$143,900.42; its cash resources totalled \$75,866.99, and it owned no borrowed money.

Since that modest showing 76 years ago, the First National has increased its total resources to over five million, and deposits reaching to about four and one-million; or an approximate increase of 3,125% in deposits and 6,600% increase in resources. The tight figure total was predicted in 1923 by the editor of The Baird Star, who also stated that he believed that the total might reach nine figures by termination of the bank's charter in 2021, "... if this old world lasts that long."

The conclusion, of course, is obvious: The First National Bank of Baird has grown and prospered through the efforts of progressive, yet conservative and far-seeing men, and will continue to keep pace with Baird and Callahan County.

The remodeling of the elementary building includes a new roof, new metal windows, a new ceiling, new floors, a new heating system, new lighting, and four new restrooms, making the building completely modern in every respect. The high school addition includes a science laboratory and a new classroom built on the east end of the present high school building.

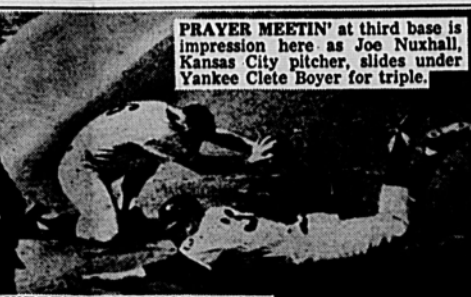

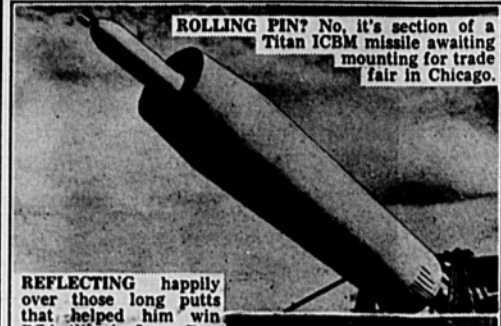

The Department recommended immediate attention of work crews to cutting rank weed growth in vacant lots, and to in-

that some three or four percent of the general population is affected.

Ragweed pollen can but does not travel very far from its point of origin. Therefore energetic weed cutting campaigns within city limits before pollen sacs burst can be helpful in reducing the amount of pollen released to the atmosphere.

A system of filtering air entering the home can be helpful too, the experts say. Or, a physician can advise countermeasures after he has determined the offending substance.

Three Texas areas - El Paso, Dallas and Houston - conduct routine pollen counts for their respective regions.

Symptoms of the malady include watery eyes, running nose, throat irritation and persistent sneezing. The severity of attacks is affected by the wind and weather. Rain in the early part of the day hinders the dispersal of pollen, but does not completely stop it.

Pollen sacs do not open when they are damp or wet, so hay fever control at this time of the year is a question of either cutting the weeds or hoping for rain during the pollen shedding season.

Ragweed is considered by the authorities to be responsible for

the cause of at least 80 per cent of the hay fever in the United States. Pollen from the plant, which is fairly well distributed over Texas, is much in evidence from mid-August through October.

Estimates indicate that some six to seven million people in the United States suffer from hay fever. No estimates are available for Texas, but researchers agree

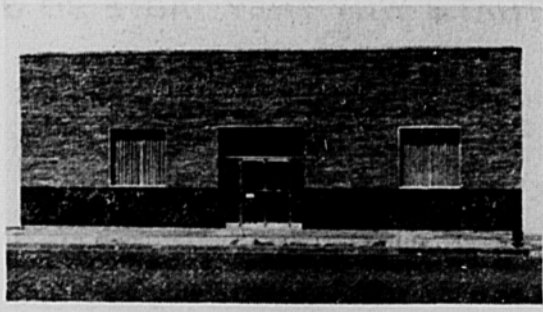

Highlights
AND Sidelights

Ben Ramsey's appointment as Railroad Commissioner - after a decade in which his name has been synonymous with the Lieutenant Governorship - carries with it several major political implications.

First, it's a pretty safe bet that the quiet-spoken East Texan will not be in the field of candidates for the Governor's chair. Pre-campaign speculation has had Ramsey in practically every gubernatorial race in re-

cent years.

Second, it leaves the 1962 race for the Lieutenant Governorship wide open. At least a half-dozen likely prospects already have been mentioned.

Third, it puts Sen. Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi automatically in charge of the Lieutenant Governor's duties. He was selected by his colleagues as President Pro Tempore of the Senate shortly before Gov. Price Daniel's announcement of Ramsey's appointment.

There could be several "Lieutenant Governors" before the election this year. This depends on how many legislative sessions occur between now and then. Texas' Constitution provides

that a President Pro Tempore shall be elected at the beginning and at the end of each session. Gov. Daniel has announced that he will call another special session before the end of the year. So it will be up to the Senate to elect a man who will assume the duties of Lieutenant Governor for that session. Then another will be chosen for the interim between its windup and the beginning of the next one. And so on!

Meanwhile, Reagan is first in line of succession to the Governor's office.

Ramsey's appointment to the \$17,500 a year Railroad Commission post came as no surprise in political circles.

Appointment is for the unexpired term of the late Olin Culberson, which runs until January 1, 1963. Then, if Ramsey desires a full six-year term, he will have to stand for election. Ramsey joins Ernest O. Thompson and William J. Murray, the present chairman, on one of the most important agencies in the state government. The Railroad Commission not only regulates all Texas oil and gas production, but all highway and railroad freight and passenger rates in the state.

ANOTHER SPECIAL SESSION ASSURED - At the close of the called special session which voted a teachers' pay raise averaging \$810 per year, Governor Daniel announced he will call another session sometime before the end of the year, to act on several matters.

He said he will submit such subjects as loan shark control legislation, a law to include banks in the recently passed abandoned property act, juvenile delinquency legislation, and controls over municipal annexation.

The short session, in addition to the teachers' pay raise, also provided additional money for the operation and maintenance of school buses and for administration.

A law requiring runoffs in congressional elections when one candidate doesn't receive a majority was passed in the dying moments of the session.

Although the major objectives of the Texas State Teachers Associations have been reached, there are more to come. These include a sick leave plan

for teachers; provisions for assistant superintendent units for large school systems; using average daily attendance, instead of scholastic census, as a factor for determining distribution of the State's available school funds to local districts; more driver education teachers; compulsory attendance for all children, six through 16, for the whole school year; and creation of regional film libraries.

Incidentally, the \$810 teacher pay raise doesn't necessarily mean every teacher in the state will get such a raise. Some districts are already paying their teachers more than the state minimum. In such cases it's up to the district to decide whether a raise is in order.

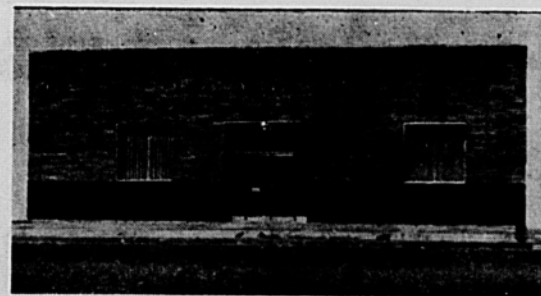

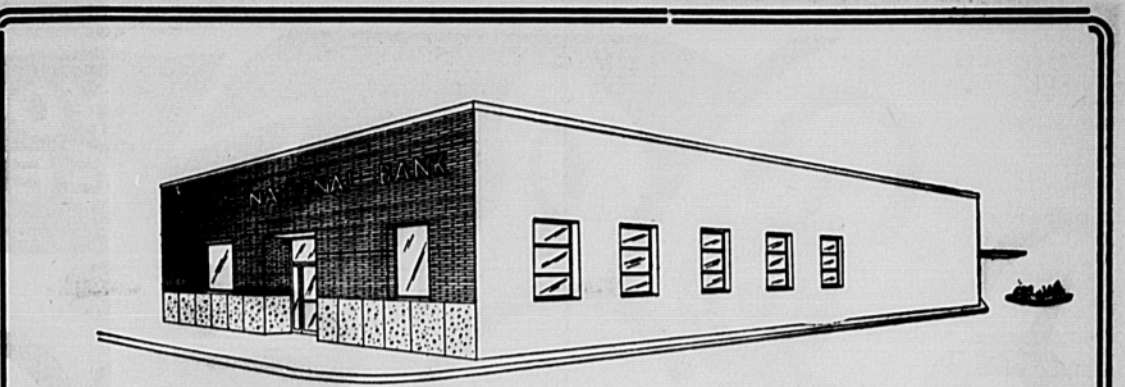

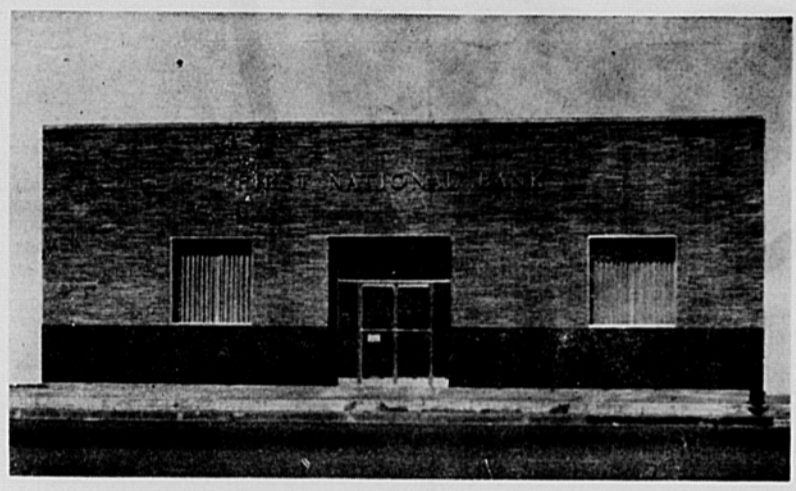
