## OWNERSHIP BY THE GOVERNMENT

THIS IS RECOMMENDED AS PRAC TICABLE FOR TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH LINES.

Postmaster General Burleson Submits Recommendations of Investigators in the Senate.

By Associated Press. Washington, Jan. 31.—Postmaster General Burleson today submitted to the Senate the recommen lation of the departmental committee which . he appointed to investigate the practicability of government ownership of telephone and telegraph lines. The report declared that "the only way to afford to the people the complete and modern postal facilities that the constitution makes it the duty of the government and the special state of the second

ing out these suggestions:
First. That Congress declare a government-monopoly of all telegraph, telephone and radio communication and such other means for the transmission of intelligence as may hereafter develop: Second. That Congress acquire by purchase at appraised value the commercial telephone network except the farmer lines.

Three. That Congress advise the postmaster general to issue in his discretion and under such regulation as he may prescribe, revocable licenses for the operation, by private individuals, associations, companies and corportations of the telegraph service and such parts of the telephone service as may not be acquired by the government;

The recommendations are signed by Daniel C. Roper, first assistant postmaster general; Merritt O. Chance. chief clerk, postoffice department and John C. Coons, superintendent of the division of salaries and allowance comprising the committee: The report says the United States is "alone of the leading nations which has left to private enterprise the ownership and operation of the telegraph and telephone facilities." The report lat-

er says: Private Ownership Discussed. "The private monopoly has no incentive to extend fts facilities to unprofitable territory, but the governthe equalization of rates. In fixing rates, the policy of this government is to superimpose no charge for taxa tion but only to see to it that the service as a whole is self-supporting The private monopoly on the other hand, must make a profit and in providing for this, tends to increase its

rates to the highest point that will

not by so greatly restricting the vol

ume of business, impair the aggregate

"It is obvious that the longer the acquisition by the government of these facilities is deferred the greater will be the cost. Moreover, it economic waste to permit private and owns the Principal theatre in enterprise to building up vast properties that must eventually be taken over by the government in resuming its constitutional monopoly at a cost out of all proportion to the value of the part of such property that may be utilized to advantage in the postal system. Traffic Is Restricted.

"So far as the public generally

concerned the entire telegraph service is owned and operated by two telegraph companies. Telegraph fa cilities have not been extended to the small towns and villages along with the governmental postal facilities, nor has the cost of the service been re duced in the inverse proportion that would seem warranted by the in creasing volume of business transac ed. Neither has the volume of bush ness in this country, in proportion to the population been as great as in countries where this facility is own ed and operated governmentally 'According to the best available data, the capitalization of the long distance and toll lines represents ap porximately \$200,0000,000 and the capitalization of the entire commercial telephone network approximately \$900,000,000. The cost to the govern ment would be less than the apprais od value, since it would be undesir able for the government to purchase real estate holdings of the comuntil accommodations could be pro vided in the postoffices and stations, The report was sent to the Senate in response to a resolution introduc

ed by Senator Norris. License System Advocated. ### OVER FIFTY FIREMEN OVERCOME BY SMOKE

Burning Tobacco Made Fight Against New York Fire One of Great Difficulty.

New York, Jan. 31.-Smoke from masses of burning tobacco overcome fifty firemen in a four hour battle with flames tonight in a four story building on the upper East Side Fire Chief John Kenlon said that because of the smoke the blaze was the most serious of its kind in the department's history. The property doss was estimated at \$50,000, suffered by three wholesale tobacco com-

The firemen, working in relays dropped unconscious one by one and were dragged away by their fellowworkmen while others took their places. A dozen ambulance surgeons from hospitals used pulmoters to revive the men, all of whom stubborn ly went back to work except fifteen who were removed to their quarters and four who were taken to hospi-At one time the force was so depleted that the chief sent to headquarters for fifty fresh men and a searchlight engine. The building was searched after the fire but no bodies were found, although early reports said two out of six persons known to have been in the building were un-

## INFLUX OF FOREIGN BUTTER CAUSES DROP

Large Importations Cause Wholesale Prices to Decline 10 Cents

New York, Jan. 31.-An influx of foreign butter from all parts of the It world, due to the reduction of tariff from five to two and one-half cents a pound, has caused a decline in the New York wholesale price of ten cents a pound, since the first of the year. Butter has been coming here from as far off as Australia by way of San Francisco; 300,000 pounds from Australia have been laid down here within the last two or three weeks. Butter also has been shipped from the Argentine and Siberia.

These shipments have created marked uneasiness in the wholesale market. Today the best grade was selling at twenty-six and a half twenty-seven cents a pound, whole-The American demand has sale. caused a rise of two or three cents a pound in some foreign markets. . It generally admitted here that the price of butter in this country will be kept in the future at a lower average than ever.

## INGS NOT CLARK VOICES MADE PUBLIC

## REPORT IS WITHELD

Rumored That Nantucket Continued To Steam Toward Lost Ship After Warning Signals

By Associated Press. Norfolk, Va., Jan. 31 .- Declaring the sinking of his vessel was due to the negligence and carelessness of those in command of the steamer Nan tucket, Captain E. E. Johnosn, who commanded the Monroe late today filed a libel against the Nantucket. He claims a million dollars damage. The libel was filed in United States district court here.

Captain Johnson alleged the Mon roe was proceeding at half speed or less before the accident, and had stopped after hearing fog whistles. He says the Nantucket came upor him at such speed that a collision was unavoidable, although he had or-dered his ship ahead at full speed to avoid the on-rushing bow of the oth er vessel.

By Associated Press. Norfolk, Va., Jan. 31.—Investiga-tion of the sinking of the Old Dominion liner Monroe by the steamer Nantucket, with a loss of forty-one lives, was completed today by Unit ed States steamboat inspectors who will not make public their findings before Wednesday or Thursday next week. Meanwhile testimony officers and members of crews of both ships is being kept secret.

It is said witnesses testified Cap tain Johnson stopped the Monroe's engines when he heard the Nantucket's answer of the siren signal and that the lost ship was practically standing still when the Nantucket rammed her amidships and sheere her in two. Other witnesses testified it was said, that the Nantucket continued to steam toward the Monroe after the lost ship had blown her whistles three times. It is said the testimony shows that Captain Berry, the first officer, and the quartermas ter of the Nantucket, were all in the pilot house of their ship when the two vessels came together and that the Monroe look-out saw the lights on the Nantucket's masts about

minutes before the crash occurred. Whistles Blown Frequently. The Monroe met light fogs inter mittently after passing out of the cape and had stopped frequently while they surrounded the ship. The Monroe was equipped with an auto time whistle and this was

blown at intervals of one minute When the heavy fog wrapped the vessel near Winter Quarter Lightship, it is said, the Monroe stopped and after bolwing her fog horn every minute gave two blasts, to which the Nantucket responded. She then repeated the two blasts twice and almost before the last one had died away, the bow of the Nantucket plowed its way into the Monroe's starboard just above amidships at an angle of about forty-five degrees.

#### STORY TOLD BY ONE OF THE MONROE'S SURVIVORS

By Associated Press. New York, Jan. 31.—(Folo No folk)-The father of Thomas Harrington, one of the Monroe survivors, who lost his wife in the disaster and who has refused to talk until today. met him here this afternoon. The father said:

"Tell them what happened, Tom We all want to know and it will get it off-your mind."

Then in a dull monotone the young man said he and his wife had a stateroom on the side where the Monroe was rammed. When the shock came he said, "we got up and dressed and wasted time that might have saved the poor girl's life." By the time reached the main saloon, said, the ship had keeled so that the side wall was their floor.

"There was a lurch," said Harring "and Margaret was thrown ton. twenty feet and lodged under the bench built along the side of the cabin, I slid and serambled after her. When I took hold of her she scream ed and pointed to her poor right arm. was broken and hanging limp.

" Don't touch,' she screamed, 'fo God's sake, let me die.' I told her she would have to come and she would feel better about it later. O. God, she was right and I didn't know it and I got her loose. Then the shin sagged back again and there was a rush of water that washed us out to the deck. I managed to get off our outer clothes. Then we let go and the ship went away from under us." Harrington was picked up by oat while swimming, holding wife's hair in histeeth. She died soon after being rescued.

SPEAKER OF HOUSE CAMPAIGNS

### HE REVIEWS WORK DONE HEARINGS ARE CONCLUDED

Says When Legislative Program Is Finished Great Work Will Be Accomplished

By Associated Press. Muscatine, Iowa, Jan 31.—Pride in what the Democratic party has accomplished and confidence in the administration program to complete carrying out the party's platform promises was voiced here tonight by Champ Clark, in a campaign speech for Henry Zolmer, Democratic nominee for Congress to succeed the late Representative I. S. Pepper. The

speaker said: "We proceeded as promptly as possible to the work of revising the tariff downward. In my judgment it is the best tariff bill ever put on the statute books. If there were no other good features, the income tax section would make it rank among the very best tariff bills."-

He defended the caucus system of putting the bill through the House, declaring "the-bill was debated until everybody was worn to a frazzle. Referring to the currency bill he said for "one of the worst currency systems in the world-and it is believed and hoped that it will, to a very threat. large extent, prevent panics. It is claimed it lodges too much power in the president's bands and that it will not bear the light of day. Power has to be lodged somewheer. The only question is whether it is better to lodge the immense power conferred in your currency bill in the presi dent of the United States, chosen by the people and who has their terests at heart or in the hands of some private citizens. I choose the former.

Work Yet To Be Done.

"We have had a great variety of men in the White House, but the honesty of all of them has been above question. We intend now to redeem certain other promises by enacting laws on trust, farmers' banks and perhaps the Philippines. When we more constructive legislation on the statute books than nearly any other ongress that every sat

Mr. Clark said the Mexican situaion was being handled by the president who knows "more about the question, probably, than any other man in America. It seems to me the people of the United States ought to upport him and his policies. I think he deserves credit for troing to keep the country out of trouble with Mex-I have no sort of doubt that the president and Democrats in Congress will work in harmony for the glory and prosperity of the republic."

## ANTI TRUST BILLS FAST TAKNIG FORM

Members of Committees of Both Houses Predict Legislation Will Be Ready By March 1.

Washington, Jan. 31 .- Winding up a week of consideration of administra ion anti-trust legislation bills, mem bers of the House and Senate con mittees predicted today that the bills suggested in President Wilson's mesage would be ready for Congress be fore March 1. Hearings before the House judiciary committee and Interstate Commerce committee would not be prolonged and the Senate Inter state Commerce committee will receive suggestions by mail from men interested instead of conducting

formal bearings. Besides perfecting the interstate rade commission bill and drafting tentative measures to supplement the Sherman anti-trust act the commitees have two other important mat ters to dispose of: these are to draft bill to give the Interstate Commerce Commission supervision of issuance of railroad securities; to termine on terms of an amendmen of the tentative trade relations bill which would prohibit holding com panies.





## TEXAS REPUBLIC - OWNERSHIP BY OVERLOOKS BET

OFFERED MORSE TELEGRAPH IN -DIDN'T ACCEPT

Offer Is Withdrawn Twenty Years Later After Texas Had Been Taken Into the Union

Austin, Texas, Jan. 31,-The wisdom of the fathers is a phrase that has passed into proverb (and out of Joe Bailey several hundred times). and yet the historical student delving into the records of bygone years or casionally runs up against a fact that illuminates the stubidity and some imes the meanness of the most illus-

For instance, just the other day E. W. Winkler, state librarian, uncovered indisputable documentary evi dence in the archives of the state capitol that Samuel Morse offered his electro magnetic telegraph to the Republic of Texas in 1838 free of charge as a gracious gift to have and to hold to use and to enjoy and to capitalize, then and forever, and that he wise fathers of the Republic stuck the offer away in a pigeon hole where it collected the dust of twenty ears, forgetting, meanwhile, Morse and his fool invention, until the said Morse in his own handwriting withdrew the offer formally by letter dat-August 9, 1860, Poughkeepsie, N.

How Investigation Started.

The investigation of this curious historical fact was started by Geo. G. Maynard, curator, division of me chanical technology (Smithsonian institute). He was musing over an after dinner cigar on the evening of December 13 when a vague remembrance wandered into his head of someone's telling him that soon after Morse started the telegraph business. he assigned the rights to use his invention to the Republic of Texas Unable to decide whether or not this was a dream, he dictaphoned to Geo. Foster, editor of the Southwestern Telephone News, Dallas, asking he knew anything about the mat Mr. Foster gave it up and passd the letter on to the secretary of the Texas Historical Association: That gentleman got out from under y passing the query on to E. W Winkler state librarian.

Mr. Winkler soon uncovered the following letter dated "Navy Department, Houston, April 27, 1839, addressed to his Excellency M. B. La mar, president of the Republic

"Sir: I have the honor to present to your Excellency a copy of a cor-respondence of Mr. S. F. B. Morse and myself which occurred during my residence as minister at Wash ngton, in which that gentleman tendered the perpetual use of his Elec-tro Magnetic Telegraph to this Republic; likewise an original letter, accompanied by a drawing of the Electro Magnetic Telegraph, so far as t was then completed with a request that they be placed for the present the secret archives of the nation have the honor to be your Excel lence's obt seryt. Although the offer was made more than twenty years ago, Texas neither while an ndependent state, nor since it has become one of the United States, has ever directly or impliedly accepted the offer. I am induced, therefore, to believe that in its condition as a gift it was of no value to the State, but on the contrary has rather been an embarrassment. In connection, however, with my other patent it has become for the public interest as well as my own that I should be able to make complete title to the whole invention in the United States. therefore, now respectfully withdraw the offer then made, in 1836, the better to be in a position to benefit Texas, as well as the other states of the Union, Sevt. Saml F. B. Morse."

phone Tather than telegraph lines is recommended because telegraph service can be more readily superimposed on telephone fines than telephone service on telegraph lines. It is pointed also that because of the great cost involved, it would be unwise from a commercial viewpoint for the government to acquire telegraph lines by purchase. The report says telegraph business is on the wane as compared to the telephone busi ness and in the decade from 1910 to 1910 the average daily telephone connections incerased 287 per cent and the number of telegraph messages

only eighteen per cent. Telephone Lines Preferred. The telegraph companies, the com mittee said, already have lost most of their short distance business owing to the development of the toll telephone service and probably will lose much of the long distance business when toll rates become adjusted on a cost basis. Another objection to acquiring the telegraph lines is even the duplicate of rival companies would be inadequate, because the lines have been extended only to profitable territory.

The cost of acquiring the telegraph facilities alone is estimated at about \$225,000,000 against about \$200.000; for long distance and telephone lines alone. As there are some 3000 proprietors of telephone lines payment would extend over a period tha would allow ample time to market the bonds, the report says.





f mandamus by Judge Martin in the district court Saturday morning County Tax Collector Harry Daugh erty receipted for taxes tendered b the Texas, Corsicana Petroleum, Guffey and Producers Oil Companies, or property renditions made by them not including the taxes assessed against leases. Under an agreement with representatives of the panies healso received checks from hem for taxes assessed against the eases, the checks to be held pending the decision of the state supreme panies from the decision of the low er courts.

Mr. Daugherty accepted service on he mandamus writ which was issued upon the petition of the Texas Company represented by Mathis and Kay m which the other companies joined.

Previously the oil companies had made tenders of money for taxes assessed against their renditions not the taxes on the leases which had been refused by Mr. Daugherty who was acting under the nstruction of the commissioner ourt, he having no option but to col lect the taxes assessed on the rolls a they were turned over to him,

The taxes of these four companie totaled about \$13,000 and coming J on the last day made the receipt Saturday very heavy.

'A final decision in the state preme-court on the validity of taxes assessed against leases may nnounced next Wednesday and i expected without fail some time dur

ng February. When the tax assessments were made the oil companies declined to ssessment whereupon ommissioners assessed them and the axes on the leases were placed or the rolls. The oil companies sought o enjoi nthe tax collector from placig the taxes on the rolls. - Judge Martin declined to garnt the injune he court of civil appeals which up neid Judge Martin. The oil com panies then carried the matter in he state suprmee court from which a final decision is expected soon.


