MORE DETAILS CONCERNING LIFE OF MRS. MARY CLAPP.

In a letter to friends here Miss Etta Soule who is at Hattiesburg, Miss., where her grandmother, Mrs. Mary Clapp, well known here, died a week ago today. Gives additional details concerning the life of that worthy woman. Mrs. Clapp and her husband who died four years ago, made their home here with Mrs. Soule's mother and father for many years going to Hattiesburg to live with her daughter, Mrs. Cochran, upon the death of Mrs. Soule's father, Mr.

Clapp died at Hattiesburg about four years ago.

Mrs. Clapp was born in Dublin, Ireland in 1826. When about eight years old she with her parents sailed for America. Her mother died early and was buried at sea. Her father settled in Massachusetts where at Hattiesburg she was married to William Clapp. They with their children moved to Emporia, Kansas, in the pioneer days living there until they came to Wichita Falls to make their home with Mr. and Mrs. Soule.

the same) what she suffered. I know that words could not describe it. It was intense, excruciating but her patience and fortitude were remarkable—such sweetness and gentleness through it all. The physician who attended her said that in all his thirty years practice he had never seen a case of such prolonged suffering."

Miss Soule writes that she and her uncle will return to Wichita Falls soon.

Mr. Lowry is an active editor of twenty years' experience and Mr. Davis is an editor who is still persona grata in the Sulphur Springs printing offices. Furthermore, each of these candidates for Congress at Large is an orator who can think on his feet, and a joint debate between them would be something distinctly different from the commonplace patter of the politicians. The vote in the city and county elections on yesterday was very light at all the voting boxes in this city. More than 25 per cent of the tax-paying citizens availing themselves of the opportunity to vote on the question of issuing \$50,000 worth of bonds for the establishment of a joint city and county hospital, but the large majority of those who did take time enough to go to the polls favored the proposition, which is another evidence of the progressiveness of the people of this city. At this writing it is not known how the tax-payers of the county voting boxes outside the city voted on the proposition, but the indications are that it has carried, and that the bonds will be issued for the construction of the public hospital. In this election only a majority of those voting is required to carry the proposition. With returns in from but three small boxes, the vote stands about four to one in favor of the issuance of the bonds.

"I don't know what all this fuss is about, but it is enough for me to know that William Jennings Bryan is on one side and Wall Street and Tammany Hall on the other, and the Texas delegation stands with Bryan." The above is about the substance of the language made use of by Cone Johnson, who headed the Texas delegation to the Baltimore convention at the time Bryan was making the fight of his life, and he won, and the result of that fight was the nomination of Woodrow Wilson for the presidency. Friday the President sent the name of Cone Johnson to the Senate for confirmation appointing him to the position made vacant in the department of state by the promotion of Joseph W. Peck. It carries with it only a salary of \$5,000 per year. For awhile it looked as if the President had lost sight of Mr. Johnson. Many thought he was deserving of a cabinet position, and if not that, an ambassadorship. This, however, may come later. There are yet three more years of the Wilson administration, and if he wants to succeed himself the chances are that he can do so with but little effort on his part. While the position tendered Mr. Johnson is an important one, he is capable of going up higher, and doubtless will be promoted to

The Times is glad to note that the city council on Friday accepted the proposition made by the Scotland Realty Company to donate about 42 acres of ground on the north side of the Wichita River for a city park, with the agreement that the city is to clear the site of under brush, drain, and build roads around and through it, and set it in bermuda grass. This park site is located about four blocks west of the new bridge on Burnett street, and has on it about 500 native shade trees. With a few hundred dollars expended in making the improvements mentioned it can be made into a beautiful play ground and park. Perhaps when this is done it will be an inducement for the Traction Company to extend its line to the park, thus making it more convenient to be reached by the public, or those who cannot afford automobiles or other conveyances. This is the second plot of ground that has been donated to the city during the past year. The other being a tract of five or six acres located near the west end of what used to be Crescent Lake. This ground was donated by Messrs. R. E. Huff and W. M. McGregor, and the city is making such improvements as required by the donors. It may be several years yet before the necessity of public parks or play grounds will be felt by Wichita Falls, but if the growth of the city continues as now, her population is sure to double within the next few years, and then the gifts of these park sites will be appreciated more than now. The city government, in the judgment of this paper, has acted very wisely in accepting them.

know he had slipped a pocket knife from his hip and severed the rope which tied his hands behind him. ADVENTURES OF KATHLYN

Thereupon he leads in Kathlyn the white captive. She is bound and placed upon the smoking pile. The preparations are made for her final resignation—but she does not resign. As the fire is started, the natives and to decorously retire, their flight being accelerated by the appearance of a mad elephant. It happens to be Kathlyn's erratic mount. It recognizes its mistress and reaching up to the top of the pyre, takes her from the flames that are now biting her garments. As the mad beast rescues the fair one and rushes away the scene dims.

She orders clay and water and at once begins modeling a reproduction of the idol from memory. When the natives behold this completed work of art, they fall to the ground in abject obedience and she stands intrenched more strongly than ever in their reverence. Thus she again saves her life by her ready wit and her facility of accomplishment.

WHAT THE WOMEN OF TEXAS ARE DOING

A LAST DIRECTION FROM MRS. ELI HERTZBERG.
Dear Friends of the Federation—There still seems to be some misunderstanding regarding dues to the General Federation. Last week several clubs sent me incorrect amounts. This duplicates the work and delays the election of clubs to membership. Please read this carefully. A club of less than twenty-five members shall pay the sum of two dollars and fifty cents.
A club of twenty-five members or more shall pay ten cents per capita. Then, too, be kind enough to send checks and not money orders.
Again, I would ask that all names of delegates, alternates and visitors to the Biennial be sent to me without delay.
This information is very necessary, for if the number justifies, it is planned to start sleepers from prominent points concentrating at a designated center, and operating on special train to Chicago.
I will kindly ask the clubs that have received application blanks from me, to consider that the time for being elected to membership in the General Federation is near at hand, and I request that same be forwarded to me at once.
Bear in mind, that Texas must bring in the largest number of clubs, especially at this time. I am sure that all clubs who have already re-

ported in this first institution of its character in the State, as a nucleus of a most useful establishment. The home will be ready for occupancy by April first, work having already begun on the furnishings. Mrs. Portervel states that the institution will be run on the honor system, being confident that the girls will become so interested in learning the useful lessons of life that none will want to leave.
The Oliver Hazard Perry Chapter of Austin, the Daughters of 1812 have held a number of very interesting meetings this winter. Mrs. Milton Morris is State president of the Daughters, the Texas organization of which was effected by Mrs. Z. T. Fulton in June, 1903. 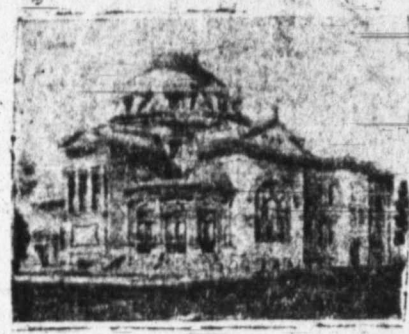

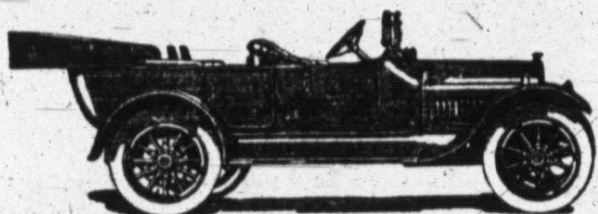

CITY WILL BE VISITED BY COLORADO TOURISTS

Special to the Times. Colorado Springs, March 21.—Colorado will pay Texas a social visit this spring. Plans have been definitely completed by Pueblo, Trinidad, Canyon City, Colorado Springs, Manitou and other Colorado cities for a sociability auto run from these cities by way of the Colorado to the Gulf highway through Texas to the Gulf of Mexico, returning by way of Oklahoma and Kansas. The tour will start probably on Monday, May 4 and about a dozen cars from these cities in Colorado will participate.
