NAVY OFFICERS RESIST WINE PROHIBITION ORDER

Washington, D. C., April 7.—Secretary Daniels' order barring the use of alcoholic liquors in the navy, effective after July 1, next, was generally discussed in naval and other circles here Monday. The order, one of the most sweeping ever promulgated by the navy, will bar all alcoholic liquors from every ship and shore station of the navy.

Surgeon General Trausted recommended it after an exhaustive investigation.

While declining to discuss for publication the effect of the order, naval officers privately expressed the belief it may fail of its purpose—to prevent the decrease of drunkenness within the navy. In effect, the order does no more than abolish the wine mess. No distilled spirits are sold in the wine mess—only wines and beer.

Officers contend it is absurd to suppose that men ever become drunkards on beer or champagne. They express the opinion that the order will curtail their personal liberty and prevent their affording visitors from foreign navies the wines which they are accustomed to on their own vessels.

When asked yesterday to comment on the order, President Wilson said it was strictly a department matter. It is understood that the president was not consulted by Mr. Daniels before he issued the order and some profess to know whether it had the president's approval.

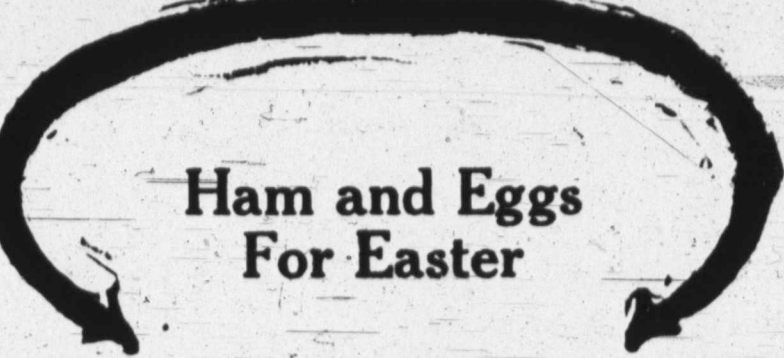

It now seems almost certain that the constructive Democratic convention scheduled to take place at Fort Worth next Tuesday, the 14th, will be a fluke. So far but few county or precinct conventions have been held, and it now looks as if the convention was going to be called off entirely, leaving the gubernatorial contest to be fought out in the July primaries, with Ball and Ferguson as the two leading candidates.

As was expected, Underwood defeated Hobson for the United States senatorship in Alabama. Had Hobson attended to his duties at Washington as a member of congress as did Underwood, the people of Alabama might have given him a majority over Underwood, but the facts were that Underwood was accepting a salary as a congressman and was doing practically nothing to earn it. The people are getting tired of that kind of public servants. The triumph of Underwood over Hobson proves that much.

The city election today is bringing out a strong vote, and at this writing the indications are that the total will be close to the 1500 mark. This is as it should be. It shows that our people are taking interest in city elections, and when that is the case we nearly always get good officers. It used to be in Wichita Falls that a city election would not bring out more than from 20 to 30 per cent of the total voting strength. Only a few did the voting—the rest did the paying. It is different now, and the Times hopes that at future elections the people will take as much interest in them as they have at this one. The majority should rule, and it makes no difference to the Times who are the successful candidates—in today's election, its sympathies will be with the defeated, and it will do what it can in its humble way to support the administration, chosen by a majority of our people, and help to make it a success. No issues are involved. All the candidates, without exception, are among our best citizens, and it really makes but little difference who the successful candidates are, the Times believes they will give the city a clean administration.

Dallas is rejoicing over securing one of the twelve regional banks, and all Texas rejoices with her. Texas was entitled to one of these banks, and it is indeed gratifying to know that she has not been ignored by the Democratic administration, which shows again the greatness of the man who is our president. Had he been a small man he would have resented the action of the Texas bankers taken at their meeting last summer at the Hotel Adolphus in Dallas. There were over two hundred bankers present at that meeting, held just at a time when President Wilson was bringing everything to bear that he possibly could for the adoption of the new currency bill. The Texas bankers, however, were opposing the bill. At that notable meeting a resolution was introduced, applauded and adopted, denouncing in unmeasured terms the proposed new currency bill. President Wilson himself was denounced as "a scheming politician" who was about to wreck the country in order to curry favor with the people. Owen and Glass, authors of the bill, also came in for their full share of denunciation. It is really amusing now to read some of the interviews given out by these same bankers who met last summer to denounce the President as "a scheming politician." They now regard him as the country's greatest benefactor. Quite a change of sentiment.

THE STORM INCREASES

Houston Post. We were deprecating in yesterday's issue of the Post the criticism being unjustly visited upon the organization committee of the Federal Reserve Bank System by cities that failed to secure a bank. There were probably one hundred cities striving to secure one of the new institutions, and it was impossible to please them all. When the maximum allowed by the new law was but twelve. As we said yesterday, it might have been still better, the strength and value of the system considered, to have had but eight reserve banks.

Now New Orleans has gone so far as to hold an indignation meeting, which is ill-advised and unjust. Washington is angry because a bank was awarded the capital of the Confederacy and denied the capital of the Republic. Baltimore is dissatisfied, so is Pittsburgh, Omaha, Louisville, Seattle, Portland, Cincinnati and Denver. The truth of the matter is, the importance of the locations of these banks has been greatly overestimated. There will be a number of branch banks in each of the twelve districts, which will serve local interests quite as well as the main banks.

The reserve bank is a banker's bank and has no direct dealings with the public. It will not accept deposits from the public, nor loan money on deposit to individuals, but only to banks and trust companies.

Trade territory will in no wise be affected by the location of a reserve bank. The commercial and industrial institutions of each locality will still continue to do business in their natural territory. No city's status as a financial center will be affected. The banks will have the same relationships with other banks and trust companies that they have now.

The merchants and manufacturers borrowing money from the banks of cities which failed to secure a reserve bank will continue to do so, and the banks of such cities will continue to keep accounts in the trade centers as they do now. There is really no occasion for dis-appointment and ill temper, no occasion for the bitter criticism being heaped upon the heads of McAdoo, Houston and Williams. The banks of New Orleans may obtain through the branch bank that will undoubtedly be located there all the advantages they could possibly have obtained from a head bank. The banks of Washington or Baltimore will obtain from the Richmond reserve bank all the advantages they could have obtained if the reserve bank had been located in Washington or Baltimore.

The Dallas banks will enjoy no advantage as a result of the location of the reserve bank there that will not be enjoyed by the bankers of Houston, Waco, San Antonio, Fort Worth or Galveston. The banks of Dallas will enjoy no greater advantage as a result of the location of the reserve bank there than they would have obtained had the bank been located in Houston, Fort Worth or Oklahoma City. We hope, therefore, that those who seem to misunderstand the reserve bank situation will proceed to cool and investigate how little foundation their disappointment has. Houston as the largest banking center of the twelfth district will have more to say about the Dallas reserve bank than the Dallas banks will have, and will secure greater benefits from that bank than any other banking center in the district because it is the largest banking center.

IRRIGATION POLICY MAPPED OUT FOR GOVERNORS

Denver, April 7.—Preliminary to the big irrigation meeting called by Secretary of the Interior Lane to be held in Denver April 9, governors or their representatives of the western states began a two days session here today. The meeting was called by Governor E. M. Ammons, of Colorado, after Secretary Lane had issued the call for the later conference. Ammons and Governor J. M. Carey of Wyoming, prime movers in the conference planned to have their western colleagues formulate some irrigation and reclamation policy to be presented at Thursday's conference. It is hoped that if a general program can be agreed upon by the western states and the representatives of the federal government who attend the irrigation conference, such a program can be enacted into law. The governors will hold another session tomorrow. Representatives are present from Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, North and South Dakota.

STRIKE SYMPATHIZERS DRIVE AWAY MINERS

Fort Smith, Ark., April 7.—A crowd of men numbering from 1,000 to 2,000 according to reports, took possession of the Bache-Denman Coal Company's mine near Midland late Monday afternoon, pulled the fires from the boilers, chased away the workmen, flung an American flag on top of the tippie, blew off the whistle and marched away led by a band. Two men employed as guards were badly beaten. It is said the mine began operating under the open shop policy today. Heretofore it has employed 200 union men.

COTTON SEED MEAL AS FEED FOR DAIRY COWS

Prof. J. W. Rigway of the dairy husbandry department at the A. & M. College of Texas, in answer to questions asked by farmers, and stockmen made the following replies:

Cottonseed meal (raw) makes a very satisfactory feed for dairy cows, provided they are not fed in too large quantities. I would never advise feeding over six or eight pounds daily. A good grain or concentrated ration for dairy cows consists of equal parts by weight of corn, pressed cottonseed cake and wheat bran. For every 2 1/2 pounds of milk, feed one pound of this mixture. As an illustration, if your cow is giving three gallons of milk daily, then she should have ten pounds of the above mixture, five pounds at a feed. In connection with this grain or concentrated feed, she should have as much Johnson grass hay as she will eat up clean. Cottonseed meal can be used if preferred, feed instead of the cake, three pounds of meal being substituted for each pound of cake, which will get practically the same results with only a slight if any increase in cost.

The age at which it is advisable to breed dairy heifers depends greatly on their development. Unless a heifer is exceedingly developed I do not advise breeding to calve earlier than 22 to 24 months of age. Usually about the fourteenth month is the best time at which to breed. I think that the practice of breeding at eight months should be discouraged, because it will result in small cows and small cows cannot and do not produce as much milk as larger cows.

A great many dairymen questions are answered and much valuable information is given in the proceedings of the last annual meeting of the Texas Dairyman's Association.

The county situation follows: Clare went from dry to wet; Roscommon and Ingham from wet to dry. Six others stayed dry, two by small majorities. Another was conceded to the drys by vote and two remained wet. Michigan, as the result of the election, has thirty-four dry counties and forty-nine counties are wet. The important counties which chose to remain in the "dry" column today did so by a smaller majority than two years ago.

GOSSIP FROM THE STATE CAPITAL

(By R. Bedichek)

Austin, Texas, April 7.—The shacks upon the University of Texas campus, temporary structures to take care of the abundant growth of that popular institution, have caused much pain to those who have the welfare of the University at heart. That this is a more growing pain, and not a symptom of constitutional ailment, is becoming more and more apparent.

Shacks in Desperation

The regents, put to their wits end to meet the emergency of unexpected and enormous yearly increases in the student body, hit upon the plan of building temporary shacks of economical structure, if ingenious and commendable design. They still look shamefully like "dairy barns" as one of the regents expressed it, especially in comparison with the magnificent white stone library building, from a standpoint of architectural beauty, surpassing anything of its kind in the south, and would be an ornament to any University campus in America.

Shacks Endorsed

Everybody knocked the shacks. It was quite the fashion. There was none so poor to do them reverence, until, at a dinner of the Austin Alumni Association, Dr. E. P. Schock came out in a ringing endorsement of these same disreputable looking structures. In the course of his remarks, he said:

"At present we have before us another misconception which we have nursed to a large growth and it now confronts us as a menace just as the other before mentioned. I refer to the shacks, more accurately speaking, not to the shacks themselves, but to our opinion about them—to the opinion about them that we are instilling in the minds of the people. Forced by necessity, the University authorities had to consider several years ago the alternative of enlarging the University either with brick or mortar or with students and faculty. They chose the latter alternative. We have with us a student body organized in a manner second to none in the world. The magnificent system of self government which we have is training a host of future citizens in a manner which will have a marked effect upon the future citizenship of this State. The process of building with brick and mortar cannot be compared in the least—this process of 'live' building is taking place also in the faculty in which, according to the plans of our president, some of the world's greatest scholars are gradually collected. The funds at hand do not permit of the simultaneous growth of both the living University and the brick and mortar University, and even if the people of this state will give us what we may reasonably ask for, for the erection of proper buildings, even then, temporary building will be necessary for quite a while to come in order to accommodate the sudden rapid growth of the living University. Would you wish to see the latter stunted simply because you don't like the shacks? This is not the only institution that has had to tide over a temporary need for building by means of shacks. One of the greatest, if not the greatest, State University in the land, namely, the University of California, which enjoys remarkably liberal appropriations for its support, it has twenty-seven temporary structures and only six permanent structures. During last summer four large temporary shacks had to be put up to furnish quarters for carrying on the work.

University of Illinois Will Follow Suit
And then, Dr. James, president of the University of Illinois, in addressing a mass meeting of faculty and students of the State University the other day, declared that our regents had not only eluded their own predicament, in building the shacks, but had at the same time solved a problem which has been vexing the administration of nearly every University in America. He declared that the average science laboratory is out of date in ten years, and he welcomed a style of structure that could be burned down at the end of a decade. He said further that one of the first things that he should do upon returning to Illinois would be to recommend the building of shacks, just like ours, on the campus of the University of Illinois.

So it seems shacks are not so bad after all, and necessity still proves herself to be the fecund mother of invention. While the University of Texas is hampered in its development for lack of funds, still it has discovered in its extremely a method of experiment (a) development that will prove invaluable in the years to come.

There will be short talks by Floyd Miller, subject to be selected; by Burton Statton on "Progress in Banking Methods;" by Charles Crowell on "The Cost of War." The subject for debate will be, "Resolved, That Wichita county should vote \$300,000 in bonds for building good roads;" affirmative, S. Hevner and P. O. Settle; negative, Henry, Arnold and L. F. A. Hein.

WICHITA COUNTY WHEAT LOOKING LIKE READY MONEY

Recent rains have given wheat in Wichita and Archer counties, a season such as has never been seen before, according to J. W. Campbell, district agricultural agent for these two counties, who was in town today. Wheat fields are looking like ready money already, he says, and the outlook for an oat crop is also good. The new building of the Southwestern Telegraph and Telephone Company at Ninth and Scott, a picture of which appears herewith, is rapidly nearing completion. This will be the only strictly fire-proof structure in the city. Concerning it, the March number of the Southwestern Telephone News says:

"Owing to the rapid expansion at Wichita Falls it has become imperative for the Southwestern Telegraph and Telephone Company to secure larger and more commodious quarters.

"With this end in view, property was purchased some years ago, and shortly before the first of 1914 a contract was closed with F. H. Crites & Company covering the construction of the building now in course of erection at the corner of Ninth and Scott.

"This structure when completed, will be a monument to the Southwestern Telegraph and Telephone Company and a credit to Wichita Falls.

"The building is to be three stories and basement in height, facing sixty-five feet on Ninth street and forty-three feet on Scott avenue, and is to be of reinforced concrete and brick construction and will be absolutely fire-proof throughout.

"The second floor will be occupied by the different machine and apparatus in connection with the telephone business together with spacious rest rooms and a cafe in which the employees can secure a first class meal at a very reasonable price.

"The entire third floor will be taken up by the operating department, in which will be placed switchboards of the very latest type.

Not Guided On How They Would Settle Individual Question But By General Views

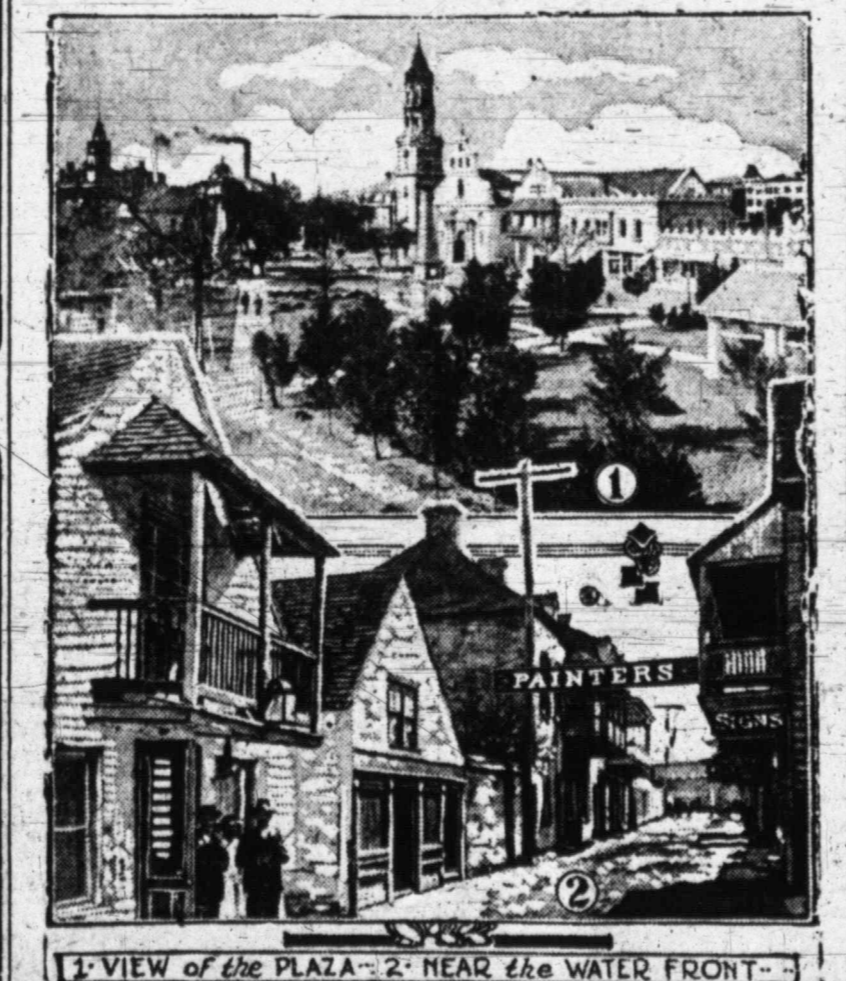

Washington, April 6.—President Wilson today enunciated the principle that is guiding him in the selection of government officials. He said he did not believe in choosing men who would settle questions in a certain way but would select men on the basis of character and their general views.

To him, he said, it seemed that justice was the hardest thing in the world to obtain and that it required more courage to deal out justice than anything else.

Mr. Wilson was referring to the appointment of W. M. Daniels to the Interstate Commerce Commission. Confirmation of his appointment was obtained after a vigorous contest in the Senate. The President referred to him as a just and enlightened man.

SCENES IN ST. AUGUSTINE WHERE FIRE COSTS \$1,000,000

St. Augustine, Fla., April 5.—The entire water front section of St. Augustine was wiped out by fire which started early in the morning. The city was put under martial law. The fire has destroyed many of the buildings along the bay front, and four of the smaller hotels—the Clairmont, the Magnolia, the Munson and the Florida House—have been either destroyed or damaged. Troops were on guard to prevent looting while the firemen battle against the flames. An unidentified woman leaped from the third floor of the Florida House and was removed to the hospital with a broken back. She is unconscious and cannot possibly recover. The guests in this hotel were panic stricken. One of them, A. Libby, also leaped from the second floor, breaking his leg. The famous Vedder House was totally destroyed. It contained the priceless collection of the St. Augustine Historical Society. The area so far burned is inclosed within Charlotte, Treasury, Hypollita and St. George streets. In that district practically all the buildings have been destroyed or badly damaged. The loss will total over \$1,000,000.
