CONGRESS WOULD DECLARE WAR ON HUERTA SOUTH AMERICAN COUNTRIES OFFER MEDIATION AMERICANS IN MEXICO IN A GRAVE PLIGHT

MEDIATION ATTEMPT OFFER

American Diplomacy Makes First Attempt to Secure Peaceful Settlement

SANGUINE WILSON IS

Leaders In Congress However Agree With Wilson That Effort Should Be Tried

Washington, April 25:-Pan-American diplomacy made its firs attempt to solve the Mexican crisis by peaceful negotiations tonight. The United States government accepted from Argentine, Brazil and Chile a formal offer to act as intermediaries in the present situation, but reservedly pointed out that an act of agression by the military forces or hostile demonstrations toward Americans might upset hopes of immediate peace.

Coincidentally with the acceptance of the mediation offer ad ministration officials announced there would be no cessation of preparation by the army and navy for future emergencies and no orders would be issued to the naval forces at Vera Cruz or the ships at sea changing original plans.

HUERTA'S ELIMINATION IN PLAN

No further steps, however, to secure reparation for the indignities which gave rise to the present situation will be attempted GOVT. AT WASHINGTON AROUSwhile the effort is being made to bring about a settlement through diplomacy. Although the offer made by the three South American countries did not reveal their plans, it was learned that they contemplate a broad settlement of the Mexican problem through the climination of Huerta which the United States has insisted on from the beginning.

Notification of the offer for intermediation, was sent not only to the diplomatic representatives at Argentine, Brazil and Chile in Mexico City but to Gen. Carranza and the constitutionalists in northern Mexico. President Wilson summoned Senators Stone, Shiveley and Lodge of the Senate foreign relations committee and Chairman Flood and Representative Cooper of the House committeet Americans. - Refugees arriving tee on foreign affairs to discuss the new turn in events, the first real effort after a day of worry and anxiety over the stories of Americans held up in their flight from the Mexican capital.

PRESIDENT WILSON NOT SANGUINE

From those at tonight's White House conference it was learned left their positions near shore and while the President was not sanguine of the success of the intermediation plan, he felt it to be the duty of the American government to avail itself of the offer of the three great South American countries. The matter had been formally discussed by the three diplomats among themselves and the joint note was presented in person to Mr. Bryan early today. UNITED STATES ACCEPTS GENERAL MAAS THREATENS TO **EXECUTE SEVEN AMERICANS** WHOM HE HAS ARRESTED

New Orleans, April 25-Wireless advices from General Maas of the Mexican forces, had found seven American prisoners guilty of certain charges and that he proposes to execute them. Consul Canada at Vera Cruz, the wireless says, has notified him and the state department at Washington of the reported intentions of General Maas to execute certain American prisoners. It was further stated that General Maas had about thirty-three prisoners, including fourteen women and seven or eight children. The consul sent a messeger to General Maas appealing to him in the name of humanity to release the women and children.

The nature of the charges against the seven Americans was not indicated by wireless, or whether they were give en a trial.

STRONG UNDERCURRENT IN **CONGRESS FOR DECLARATION**

Growing Sentiment In Favor of War Cannot Much Longer Be Repressed

Congress Saturday Discussed Appointment of Committee to Present Its Views To Wilson

Washington, April 25 .- Though the Mexican crisis has been inder suspension in Congress for several days while the President and his cabinet executed plans of reprisals against the defiance of General-Huerta there is an impelling undercurrent of feeling in both Senate and House for a declaration of war, which was tempered somewhat tonight by the acceptance of offers of mediation from Argentina, Brazil and Chile. Leaders in Congress for several days have been discussing informally the necessity for an unequivocal declaration of war, for a sweeping campaign in Mexico and for the ultimate establishment by force of American arms, of peace and constitutional government in Mexico.

STORM EXPECTED TO BREAK MONDAY

No swell from the undercurrent reached the surface today, however, but Congressmen in both houses had predicted a storm would break Monday or soon after American troops reached Vera Cruz to support the naval forces there. Members who were most restive over the situation tonight, after learning of the intermediation proposals, that no further aggressive action toward Mexico should be forced until it should become apparent that the good offices of South American nations to compose the situation, would fail.

Although was evidence in the Senate of the feeling of dissatisfaction with present conditions, the most remarkable evidence was given in the House. During a day devoted under the surface to a discussion of Mexico, most of the leaders were in conference and sentiment developed was strongly in favor of war. In the conferences more than a dozen of the most prominent men of the democratic side participated. Speaker Clark, Majority Leader Underwood, Chairman Flood of the foreign relations committee, Chair man Fitzgerald of the appropriations committee and Chairman Hay of the military committee, figured in all of them.

DISCUSSION OUTSPOKEN SATURDAY

The discussion was so outspoken that there was talk for a time of the appointment of a committee to consist of Speaker Clark and Mr. Underwood which should call on President Wilson and inform him of the sentiment of the House as being for war. Developments of the day, however, interfered with this plan and the conferences ended without definite conclusion. Out of many conferences, the attitude of the house leaders became exceedingly clear ed. They said that war should be declared, that the United States should send the army into Mexico and "go through with what it has started" that in this way only can peace be established on a sound and permanent basis.



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

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

ty given to details of the loss of the Titantic last year, and the very recent destruction of the liner Volturno in midocean, the great mass of people whose life is restricted to dry land are beginning to be interested in maritime affairs.

The handling of steamers, the dangers of the sea, the duties and responsibilities of the officers and crew of a vessel, are all topics of enlivening conversation after such a disaster as has just been added to the roll of the tragedies of the sea. The great major ity of people not directly connected with maritime affairs have a very slight frequently erroneous idea of these matters.

Conflicting reports of well-meaning survivors, who give testimony of a very few facts of the wreck or disaster which they have been through. tend only to confuse the reader who is seeking for reasons and facts. The reticence of surviving officers does

not help to make things any plainer. Another feature which retards the general spread of knowledge about nautical affairs is the failure of seafaring men to realize that things which seem like a-b-c to themselves are absolutely foreign to the understanding of the average landsman. Hero or Coward.

According to the reports which cir ulate after any marine disaster, the captain is either held up as a hero or ursed as a coward. Yet when the najority of people have forgotten the ase, a well-informed, sober-minded body of men acting as a board of inquiry and wading through a mass of testimony get down to a few kernels of established facts.

And the truth is usually found that he captain was merely trying to carry out his duty as the master of his

If he holds back a mob of frenzied passengers at the point of a revolver rom committing suicide by pilling into the small boats in hundreds, he is merely doing what any police offi-

The captain of a vessel is the maser in fact as well as in name. On the high seas his orders are law and the courts of the nations uphold him. Any refusal on the part of the crew of a vessel to do their duty as ordered by the master may be construed as mu-

In the older days of the sailing vessels and long trips, the powers of the captain were often abused and frequently crews were compelled to endure tremendous and even incredible abuses. In more recent times no captain dares seriously to misuse his authority, for, while a refusal to perform duties on board ship still constitutes mutiny and is severely punished as such, a sailing master can also be made answerable for illegal acts committed at sea.

With much authority the captain of a vessel also has to bear a similar measure of responsibility. No matter what happens on his ship or to it, the ship. this one man must answer for it. On one of the thousand-foot mon-

ster steamers which now rip their way across the Atlantic in a trifle over four days, this means not only the navigation of the boat, but also a detailed knowledge of the condition and working of every piece of equipment on board, the executive control of a large force of men and the safety and happiness of a thousand or more passengers.

When a vessel is lost the master, if he happens to come out alive, is pretty sure to lose his license. Althoughthe loss may appear to have been unavoidable, the unfortunate captain is very likely to be sidetracked to some minor berth, if he doesn't lose his papers outright.

This probably explains why so many shipmasters, especially elderly ones, finding their vessels piled up on the shore or sinking, have quietly gone to their cabins and escaped the admiralty court via the 32-caliber method.

Never Touches the Wheel. The unprecedented growth in diin the past 20 years has greatly in-

creased the burden of responsibility that is placed upon the commanders of these ships. So acute has this situation become that the largest steam ship companies are trying to meet it by having several captains under a commander or commodore upon their newest ships.

Yet marine authorities admit that

TH the widespread publici vessel will finally devolve upon the one man who heads the other three or

Having attained the rank, of captain in the company's service, the others are perhaps a little better as officers than the usual complement of subordinates, but even this may be disputed.

The routine duties of handling and navigating a big steamer are always a source of the most curious interest to passengers making their first trip

On the coastwise steamers which have their navigating bridge or pilot house on the upper passenger deck, the officers are often annoyed beyond the limit of their patience by passe gers whose curiosity leads them to crowd about the windows of the pilot house and ask numberless questions

On the larger ocean steamers this bother is avoided because the bridge from which the vessel is controlled is built well apart from the passenger accommodations.

In the popular mind the captain's job is to steer the vessel from one port to the other. So it is, in a manner, but not in the way that the landsman believes.

On anything larger than a harbor excursion steamer the captain is seldom seen to touch his hand to the wheel that controls the rudder. Neither does his first officer or other navigating officers. A petty officer ranked as a "quartermaster" is engaged for that particular duty. These men have practically no oth

er duties and really have little to do with the actual navigating of the ship. They are given a certain "course" to steer, by the senior officers, who know the vessel's position and how she should be headed to reach her proper

This ability to find the way across an ocean absolutely devoid of tracks or guide posts is one of the greatest mysteries to the unitiated. Navigation is really a highly complicated science requiring the use of astronomical principles and the higher mathematics.

But it has been so simplified by the se of rules and formulas, and by the publication of elaborate tables that masters are able to find their position at sea with the "sextant" or "hogyoke," as it is familiarly called, as accurately as an accomplished mathe-

The sextant is an instrument of great precision, with which the navigator is able to measure the angle between the horizon and any heavenly body, sun or stars. He also makes use of a very accurate chronometer. or clock, which keeps Greenwich

With these two instruments and his tables and formulas he can get the latitude and longitude of his vessel at frequent intervals. In the hours or days between observations the vessel is navigated by compass, and her distance measured by a patent log which records the miles traveled. Her direction and progress from the last "observed" position are plotted on the chart so that her officers can point at any instant to the exact position of

AT GALVESTON BRINGING STORIES OF ESCAPES

But For Intervention of German Cap-Americans Might Have Been Massacreed

By Associated Press.
Washington, April 25.—Unconfirmed rumors of the killing of Americans mobs in Mexico City, the arrest American railway employes at Orizaba and reports that American military authorities considered the situation in Mexico City and throughout the Mexican republic as grave, aroused the activities of the Washing ton government today.

While the autnorities were exerting every effort to verify reports from Mexico City, Secretary of State Bryan conferred with the Brazilian ambassador over the arrest of the Americans at Orizaba and informed him that he had requested the Brazifian consul to seek the release of the Americans. Ambassador De Gama urged the Brazilian minister in Mexico City to do all he could. Officials here were much excited

over the report of the assassination of American citizens in the Mexican capital Serious events there, it was pointed out, might aggravate the present situation and serve to arouse sentiment that would mean more aggressive activities in Mexico on the part of the government.

It was further pointed out that mob violence could not be claimed by this government as a hostile act owing to the anti-American feeling which the occupancy of Vera Cruz has aroused, as Huerta could claim that he was powerless to control the feelings of





Orders Coming In Slowly, at Ball Bros. Plant But Big Rush Is Expected Later On

The late freezes had their effect or the demand for fruit jars in Texas and the Southwest this spring and shipments from Ball Brothers plant here have been considerably below the figure expected. Dealers evidently, believe that the fruit crop was seriously curtailed by the cold weather of March and until the fruit begins to make its appearance the demand for jars is apt to be light. While it is not believed that the crop was hit as hard as dealers think, the effect on the jar market at present is very

Work is nearly finished on the liner furnace at Ball Brothers, and it will be ready for operation within less than a month. During the summer the cap factory will be installed here so that next fall will see the jar and its apportentances manufactured in this city. At present the zinc caps are shipped from Indiana.

Machinery will be installed at Denison within the next few weeks for the handling of the glass sand, which has been discovered there. Conveyors and other equipment will be placed for loading the sand on the cars for

shipment to this city.

Another piece of work planned by Ball Brothers for the coming summe is the installation of what are known as Owens machines; these are an improved type of jar making machine doing six times the work of those now in use. They will not, however, result in any material reduction in the force of men employed.

Some damage was done in Wichita Falls Friday afternoon by a rain and windstorm which, prevailed for hall No serious damage was done by either wind or rain but a number of trees were uprooted, sev eral signs were blown down and two out houses in the factory addition were wrecked. Several ventilators on the jar factory were blown down and some other damage of a similar nature was reported from the western part of the city where the buildings are more exposed.

About half an inch of rain fell during the windstorm, the water being blown almost horizontally and giving the appearance of a much - heavier rain than really fell.

Lake Wichita yesterday was pour ing over the spillway in greater, vol-ume than that of last December and there were no indications of subsiding. The water company is keeping close watch on the dam and has a force ready to repair any break that may be made, though there is little fear of any damage. The rains served to make the water supply doubly sure, although the lake was already at a stage that-left little to be desir

Friday's rain reached several parts of Northwest, Texas that were not visited by Thursday's rain, all stations on the Denver from Quanah to Fort Worth reporting good rains; Burkburnett, which was missed Thursday, got a good shower. Valley points as far south as Weinert were also visited.

AMERICANS REPORTED

Vera Cruz Newspaper Says Mobs Are Killing Americans In the Federal Capital

y Associated Press. Vera Cruz, April 25.—The El Victamen, a Vera Cruz newspaper, today says that four Americans have been killed by mobs in Mexico City. It declares that it has received this information direct from the federal capital. According to its report three of the Americans were taken out of street cars and killed in the street while a fourth was killed at the Y. M. C. A., by members of a baseball team to which he belonged. The information is not confirmed rom any other source.






