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## DIPLOMATS PLACE SMALL HOPE IN NEGOTIATIONS

### Few Foreign Representatives Expect Mediation Effort Will Meet With Success

## BIG POWERS ADVISE HUERTA TO ACCEDE

### Belief Prevalent However, That He Will Not Accept Invitation To Commit Political Suicide

Washington, April 27.—European diplomats in Washington are pessimistic over the successful outcome of the mediation by the South American governments to prevent war with Mexico. While the action of Great Britain, Germany and France urging Huerta to accept the good offices proffered by the three republics has had an encouraging effect on officials here there are few who believe that success can eventuate from the negotiations.  
At two o'clock Brazilian Ambassador De Gama, Ministers Suarez and Maon entered a protracted conference as to future procedure.  
Although no announcement was made it was reported that no definite plan for a basis for the negotiations had been agreed upon.  
Diplomatic experts not directly interested do not share the optimism shown by some state department officials in the tender of good services of the intermediaries.  
No basis on which negotiations were to go forward had become known in diplomatic circles, where the belief was prevalent that no such basis had yet been evolved and that the South American diplomats would find the formulation of the plan the most difficult part of the negotiations. While the utmost good will toward the effort is manifested it was said by one of the diplomats it looks "as if Huerta is to be invited to step out and commit political suicide and expects him to accept the invitation."

## 100 American Oil Workers Cut Off 75 Miles From Tampico

Washington, April 27.—The navy department today received a request from the oil interests in New York with oil properties in the Tampico district that an American force be sent to rescue 100 employees now in the oil field about 75 miles southwest of Tampico.  
The request states that all of the men are well armed but are unable to get through the lines of the rebels and Federals who are fighting about Tampico.

## Three European Nations Advise Huerta To Accede To Demands

Berlin, April 27.—Germany, England and France have advised Provisional President Huerta through their ministers in Mexico to accede to the demands of the United States. This was announced this morning by the German foreign office.

## MEXICAN PRISONERS TO FORT WINGATE, N. M.

Order Issued For Removal of Those Held at Fort Bliss Since Ojinaga Battle

Washington, April 27.—Orders were issued by the war department today transferring the Mexican prisoners held at Fort Bliss to Fort Wingate, New Mexico. The war department believed it necessary to move the prisoners from the Mexican border so their presence might not excite Mexicans on the other side of the Rio Grande.  
The third squadron of the Twelfth Infantry now at Fort Meade, North Dakota, will be sent to Fort Wingate for guard duty.  
The Mexican soldiers and other refugees from the battle of Ojinaga have been held at Fort Bliss since they crossed the border.

## AMERICANS ALL SAFE IN CITY OF MEXICO

French Ambassador Receives Assuring Message From French Legation There

Washington, April 27.—French Ambassador Jusserand announced here today that the French legation in Mexico City had informed him by telegraph that all Americans in Mexico City are safe.  
The dispatch said that there had been anti-American demonstrations but that they were not serious.  
Roosevelt Expected at Manaus.  
Manaus, Brazil, April 27.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt was expected to reach here today when he planned to form a junction with members of the various groups into which his South American expedition was broken up. A great reception has been planned for the former American president's arrival.

HUERTA PERMITS REFUGEES TO LEAVE MEXICO CITY TODAY FOR VERA CRUZ

## AMERICAN FLAG IS HOISTED

Appropriate Ceremonies Mark Raising of Flag Over Admiral Badger's Headquarters

Vera Cruz, April 27.—The American flag was hoisted at noon today with appropriate exercises over the headquarters of Admiral Badger.  
There was great rejoicing here today when word was received that General Huerta had agreed to permit another refugee train to leave the capital and that about 250 refugees, including Americans, would arrive in Vera Cruz tomorrow. News in importance was the expected arrival late today of the brigade of troops from Colquitt.  
Because of the number of lives which may depend upon them it is considered probable here that there will be no extension of the lines by the American troops around Vera Cruz.  
There was great activity today about the activities, camp near the railway beach. Should the machines be required everything is in readiness.  
Vera Cruz stores are doing a flourishing business but their stock of provisions is rapidly being depleted. Hotel accommodations are strained to the limit by refugees and American officials today continued their efforts to induce women and children to leave for the United States.  
Food stocks are getting low.

## AMERICANS PERMITTED TO LEAVE MEXICO CITY

None Have Been Anywhere in Mexico Within Past Few Days According to Reports

Washington, April 27.—After a conference with President Wilson, Secretary Bryan announced that all arrangements had been made to permit Americans to leave Mexico City. Seven hundred American men and women are preparing to leave. Secretary Bryan said he knew of no American citizens having been killed in Mexico City or elsewhere in the Mexican republic in the last few days.  
Through the efforts of the British minister at Washington and British legation at Mexico City the American ship that Mexicans were detained at Vera Cruz has been removed. Mr. Bryan said that efforts were still being made to secure the release of the thirty-three Americans held at Acapulco and those held in on the railroad between Mexico City and Vera Cruz.  
Senator Stone, chairman of the foreign relations committee conferred at length with Secretary Bryan following the latter's conference with the president.

## COLQUITT CONSIDERING OFFER OF VOLUNTEERS

L. P. (Pink) Hammond, the oil entrepreneur who last week wired Gov. Colquitt offering to raise a company of volunteers for border or Mexico service, has been notified by the chief executive that his offer is under consideration at Austin. Mr. Hammond believes that a large company could be raised in this city if needed. If the report is true, however, that such troops would be on the same footing as the regulars, regarding all matters here, it is likely that anything will be done here. Mr. Hammond says he would be unwilling to agree to enlist for that long, wishing to remain in service as long as needed, but no longer.

## HUERTA WILL ACCEPT OFFER OF MEDIATION

Tells Diplomats in Mexico City He Is Ready To Entertain Proposal For Settlement

Washington, April 27.—Word that General Huerta has accepted the offer of the friendly offices made by Argentine, Brazilian and Chile was conveyed to President Wilson this morning.  
Huerta's formal acceptance has not yet been received but he has informed the diplomats in Mexico City of his willingness to do so.

Torrential Rains Extend From Dallas To Childress, Stamford and San Angelo

Dallas, Texas, April 27.—Torrential rains which have put streams bank full have been over North Texas this morning that the spring gushes would reach the proportion of the floods last December.  
At Dallas the Trinity River was at a thirty foot stage and was predicted to go to 38 feet.  
Today's rains showed them more widespread extending from Dallas to Childress, Stamford and San Angelo. Lightning, hail and wind accompanied the rain.  
There was some property damage here today by a downpour which filled lowlands and entered warehouses and residences in the poorer sections of the city.

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## CONFERENCE WITH JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER EUILLE

## DEBS SAYS GUNMEN RULERS OF COLORADO

Socialist Leader Declares Flag is Not Worthy of Being Respected—Denounces Militia

Terre Haute, April 27.—The war in Colorado is of far greater concern to the American people than the threatened war with Mexico, said Eugene V. Debs in a statement here Sunday. Continuing he said: "The bloodshed atrocities perpetrated by our own soldiers and under our own flag in Colorado during the past week are a disgrace to the nation and a crime against civilization. If the American flag stands for the hutchering of helpless women and the roasting alive of their babies then not only is Huerta justified in scorning it but every decent self-respecting American citizen should repudiate it with loathing contempt."  
Constitution is Dead  
"The constitution of the United States is dead in the state of Colorado. Government by gunmen has been set up there by the mine owners backed by Rockefeller and Standard Oil. The state militia is under the command of notorious man killers in the pay of the mine owners and with the American flag flying over them these renegade assassins in uniform turned their machine guns on the tented city of the miners at Ludlow, mowing down women and children indiscriminately and to make the horrible massacre complete they set fire to the tents and literally roasted alive a score of women and children who were unable to escape."  
There is not a vestige of lawful government in the mining district of Southern Colorado. The mine owners are the state and the people are absolutely at their mercy. To protest is to be threatened with violence or silenced by the bullet of a gunman. I am speaking of my own personal knowledge, having myself covered the ground. The press as a rule is quite subservient to the mine owners and the reports which go out of there are censored so that the country at large is kept in blissful ignorance of a state of affairs which if known to the people would shock and horrify them and provoke a storm of revolt.  
Spectacle is Revolting  
"Neither Huerta, Villa or Zapata have been guilty of the unspeakable outrage of charging upon a parade of unoffending women and slashing them with sabres nor of setting an old woman 82 years of age, whose only crime is her sympathy with the suffering miners and their half starved wives and children and flanking her as if a foul dungeon and guarding her as if she were a wild beast."  
"And yet, the Wilson administration is blissfully unconscious of the fact that the mine owners of Colorado have repudiated the constitution of the United States and set up a government of their own, that the soldiers of the state are Rockefeller's private army, that the flag of the nation has become the symbol of murder and rapine and that there is no more liberty for the common people in Colorado than there is for the peasants in Mexico and the serfs of Russia. Bryan and Wilson are extremely sensitive about the flag in Mexico, but the mine owners can use it with impunity as the black flag of their piracy and assassination."  
"When the national administration restores the constitution and civil government and suppresses the monstrous crimes that are perpetrated under its own flag and within its own borders it will be time enough to order out the army and navy to command in respect of other nations for our flag."

## CONFERENCE WITH JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER EUILLE

Washington, April 27.—President Wilson has made a personal appeal to John D. Rockefeller to bring about a settlement of the Colorado coal strike and end the violence which has already cost many lives. The great financier who owns a large part of the mines affected by the strike in response to the president's message declared that he had turned over to his son, John D. Rockefeller Jr., the management of his affairs and that he would send his son to Washington to confer with Chairman Foster of the House committee on mines and mining.

New York, April 27.—John D. Rockefeller and Chairman of the House Mines Committee Foster conferred here today over the Colorado strike situation.  
Mr. Foster's progress was rapid. Mr. Rockefeller has been a long time in accomplishing his purpose. I do not expect to see Mr. Rockefeller again today. I will return to Washington this afternoon.

## CONFEDERATE MILITIA REOCCUPIES CHANCELLOR

## NEUVO LAREDO FEDERALS HAVE DISAPPEARED

Laredo, Texas, April 27.—Reports from General Wharton today seem to indicate that the strike militia has been completely broken up here and the attempts to turn the international bridges.  
A rumor today that the Federals had been routed with loss of life by an engagement with United States troops at Amargosa, forty miles north of Laredo, proved groundless.  
Rebilled guards are being maintained at all river points.  
Three hundred constitutionalists today occupied Nuevo Laredo.

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## "Death To The Gringos" Was Mexican Rallying Cry At Tampico

Galveston, April 27.—The battleship Connecticut and torpedo boat convoy Dixie came into port Sunday bringing the last of the "Mexican" refugees from the last of the "Mexican" districts. Five of the Americans were taken aboard but they would not get ashore until Monday. There are 200 on the Connecticut and 50 on the Dixie. On board the battleship Esperanza, that came in from Tampico last night, were 377 Americans who had fled from Mexico. There are about 2,100 American refugees held here, in quarantine on the ships, but their release is expected either today or Tuesday.

**The Story of the Riots**  
The story of the anti-American riot in Tampico last Tuesday night, when German officers and sailors went to the rescue of the American refugees, escorted twenty women and children aboard the German cruiser Dresden, was told by refugees on their arrival Sunday. Officers of the battleship Connecticut said that only for the assistance of the German sailors there would have been undoubtedly bloodshed. Tuesday morning the United States warships Dolphin, Des Moines and Chester dropped down the river at Tampico and steamed to the outer harbor. It was feared that the commencement of the American ships would inflame the Mexicans into an attack upon refugees who were gathered in the town.

**Vera Cruz News Posted**  
It was a little after 2 o'clock that afternoon when a Mexican soldier tacked up an official notice at the municipal palace stating that the American forces had landed at Vera Cruz and appealing to the Mexicans to take up arms and defend their country.

The news spread quickly. Armed Mexicans were seen here and there, and word was sent by Americans to the refugees to assemble in central places. After dark Mexican armed the plaza, where fierce speeches were delivered and parades formed.

**"Viva Huerta" and "Death to the Gringos!"** cried the crowd, while the refugees barricaded themselves in the Southern hotel. Stones were thrown and windows smashed. Then the German officer Dresden, sent a terse note to General Zaragoza in command of the port of Tampico, that if he could not stop the rioting that "I will see to it personally that it is stopped."

**Another Mob Formed**  
Within fifteen minutes officers of the Connecticut and today, the Mexican rurales appeared on the streets, and the crowd dispersed. Two hours later another mob appeared, filling the streets in front of the Southern hotel.

An attempt was made to batter down the hotel doors. Only thirty refugees had arms to meet any attack. A detachment of police broke up the crowd, and early on Wednesday morning, while it was yet dark, a German officer with a squad of four sailors from the Dresden, went to the quarantined refugees and escorted eighteen women and children to the Dresden. In that little band was a young refugee who had walked two miles from the Panico district with a two-day-old baby in her arms.

**Ships Fly Foreign Flags**  
On Wednesday morning the general transfer of Mexican refugees from Tampico was commenced. Two American yachts, Wakiva and Wild Duck, under foreign colors, brought the refugees down the river to the American warships.

The Wakiva took down the American flag and hoisted the English color, while the yacht Wild Duck flew the German flag.

Refugees said the American flag would surely have been fired upon. An English officer was put aboard the Wakiva to aid in the transfer of refugees.

Firing was heard in Tampico last Friday when the Connecticut sailed. Refugees said they expected that the Mexicans would destroy their homes after looting, and that the oil field tanks would be set afire.

**CHURCH WORKERS PLAN FOR SCOVILLE MEETINGS**  
Committees Appointed at Conference Sunday Afternoon—Dr. Scoville Expected Here Sunday

Preliminary organization of workers for the Scoville revival meetings which are to start next week was perfected at a meeting of church workers at the First Christian Church Sunday afternoon. At this meeting it was decided to divide the city into districts and to hold cottage prayer-meetings daily in the districts during the progress of the meetings. W. T. Whis was appointed chairman in charge of the arrangements for these meetings.

A band of 100 personal workers will be organized. These workers will be under the direction of Mrs. Willie Gray and Mrs. J. L. Downing, heads of the two missionary societies of the church. A committee on entertainment to procure quarters for the workers who will come here with Dr. Scoville and to make other arrangements for entertainment was appointed. It is planned to rent a furnished house for these workers. The members of this committee are: G. R. Walker, J. W. Pond and W. H. Thatcher. A finance committee comprising P. H. Pennington, W. Bradley and Sam Sproules was appointed. Other committees will be appointed as the need arises. The vanguard of the Scoville workers is expected here early this week and Dr. Scoville himself is expected Sunday although it has not been definitely announced that he will arrive on that date.

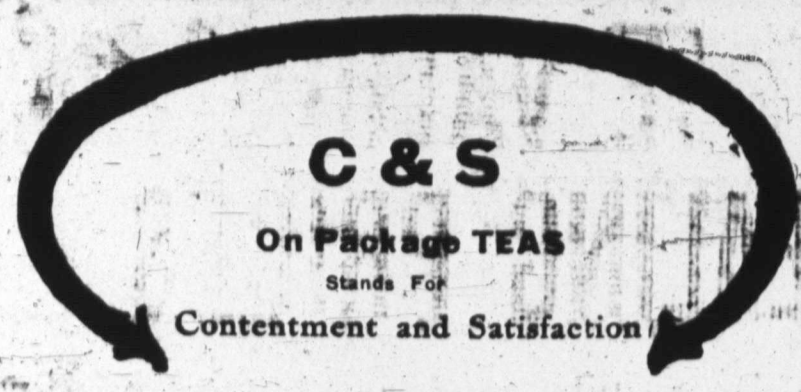

WICHITA FALLS' RECIPE.

Recipe For Heavenly Mash. (By Miss Annette Koenig)

One trial of this recipe will convince you that the name is justified. To a pint of strawberries add one pint of sugar and a pint of alcohol or brandy and place in a large stone or earthen jar. About a week later add a pint of stoned cherries and a pint of sugar. Again a week later add a pint of oranges cut in small pieces and another pint of sugar. Keep in a cool place and as the fruit season advances add a pint of any desired variety with the same amount of sugar, however no more alcohol or brandy is needed. The amount can be doubled or trebled according to the size of the family and the amount of fruit one has. Keep weighted with a plate and covered with a clean cloth. It can be served with cream or made into a salad with Jello. Strawberries, raspberries, blackberries, cherries, peaches, oranges, pears, plums, pineapples, apples and other fruit may be used according to taste, being careful to omit very seedy varieties.

Wichita Falls, Texas, April 27, 1914

The population of Texas is now 4,257,854, according to an estimate just issued by the census bureau at Washington, which is a very substantial increase over the census of 1910.

The wheat fields of Wichita and adjoining counties now present a most beautiful sight. The rains have come, it seems, just at the right time, and in the proportion needed, and wheat farmers are jubilant. There is hardly anything that can prevent the making of a record-breaking wheat crop this year.

A letter to the Times from a Frederick grain dealer says: "General rains throughout Southwest Oklahoma insure a bumper wheat crop." That is about the same kind of report that is coming from all parts of the country surrounding Wichita Falls. The crop prospects were never more promising. Another good thing is that when we do have a good crop year, it is generally followed up by three or four more good years in succession. Now that we have had our four or five bad crop years, we are ready for the change, and are now confidently expecting four or five years in succession of good crops, which means the country will prosper as never before in its history.

This is certainly a great country for free speech. Last night a man stood on one of our most prominent streets with a crowd around him and denounced the President of the United States from most everything from a murderer of men, women and children right down the line to a common thief, but to the credit of his audience there was only one man in it who seemingly approved of that kind of free speech. It is such speech-making as delivered by that man that has a tendency to manufacture anarchists, and doubtless the man who applauded that speech was then ready to take the life of the head of our Nation, had the opportunity presented itself, and would have done it knowing that it meant the forfeit of his own. There is a limit to most things, but there seems no limit to free speech. A man can employ most any kind of language that he can lay his tongue to in denouncing the rulers of our nation, and yet be within the law. But fortunately, this country is only afflicted with a very few of that kind of men. Just how they manage to make an honest living is difficult to determine, or perhaps they make no pretensions along that line, and have about concluded the world owes them something and they are only expected to exert their lungs to collect it. To our way of thinking this is the best governed country on earth, and those who think and talk as that curbstone orator did last night should either conduct himself as a loyal American citizen or leave the country for the country's good.

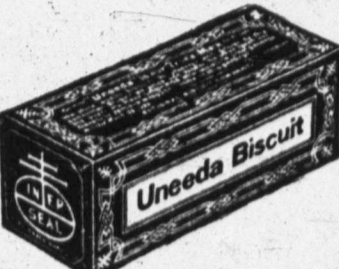
The question as to whether or not the people of Texas shall again vote on statewide prohibition will be voted on in the July primaries, at which election only Democrats will be permitted to vote. The Republicans, Socialists, or members of any other political party are not supposed to vote in that primary. If a majority participating in that election decide in favor of submission, it matters not how small that majority may be, those who favor it will naturally think that the question of statewide prohibition will be submitted in 1915. In order to submit the question of state-wide prohibition, which involves an amendment to the state constitution, it requires that the resolution calling for it shall be adopted by a two-thirds

able that any one of them will fail of re-election. The pro Democrats contend that it matters not how the majority of the Democrats of a Representative or Senatorial district may vote on the question as to whether or not the matter of statewide prohibition shall again be submitted in 1915, the legislators are not to be governed by the majority of their constituents, but by a majority of the Democrats of the state. The anti-pro Democrats take the opposite view by contending that the legislators shall be governed in that particular matter by a majority of the Democrats of their districts. There is no law or power that can be invoked that will compel them to change their views. This probably explains why so many prominent anti-prohibition Democrats like Sam Sparks and others of equal prominence are supporting Col. Tom Ball for governor. Col. Ball agrees with their views on nearly everything except prohibition, and in declaring against National prohibition, statutory prohibition, and the five or ten mile law, has removed elements of danger to the cause of anti-prohibition that they had good reason to fear. Mr. Ferguson's views on the question of prohibition may coincide with theirs more than do the views of Col. Ball, but Ferguson disagrees with them on nearly everything else, not the least of which is the "Bailey question." Little as may now be thought of this, the Bailey question is cutting some figure in this gubernatorial campaign. As substantial evidence of this, note the language used at Tyler last Saturday by the gentleman who introduced Mr. Ferguson to his audience. Tyler is the home of Cone Johnson, and in introducing Mr. Ferguson the gentleman said: "I want to introduce to you as our next governor the man who carried Bell county against Bailey." While Mr. Ferguson made no reference to Bailey during his speech no one can hardly doubt but that he knew in advance what was going to be said by the gentleman introducing him. Before the campaign is over, we confidently expect that prohibition will be sidetracked or eliminated almost entirely, and the "Bailey question" substituted.

New Way to Make Apple Dumplings

O'SHAUGHNESSY SAYS AMERICANS ARE SAFE.

Veracruz, Mexico, April 27.—Nelson O'Shaughnessy, Charge d'Affaires of the American embassy at the City of Mexico, who reached Veracruz Friday night, talked Saturday regarding the situation. "Although anti-American feeling is unpleasantly in evidence," he said, "I was not subject to the slightest discourtesy, personally or officially before leaving. "The feeling seemed not to be especially vicious and I question if any of my countrymen who remain in the capital and exercise ordinary precautions will be endangered, at least so long as Huerta remains in control of the situation. "If Huerta leaves the capital, it is a question what would happen, although most of the Americans remaining have strong friends among the Mexicans, who would protect them. "The situation in other places is more of a problem, although I am inclined to think Huerta will give them all the assistance in his power to get them to the coast. "Huerta's stand on the Tampico incident was a surprise to me. I confidently expected that he would go to any reasonable length to avoid trouble with the United States. I should say he was badly advised by some persons in his confidence, which is, in itself, not surprising. "I question if there is any chance of Huerta's resignation, but public sentiment in Mexico is so fierce that

his supporters may desert him at any time. Everyone knows, of course, that Huerta is in no shape, financially or otherwise, to offer any strong organized resistance to our troops if they press on into the interior."

ZOLA STORY AT THE EMPRESS THEATRE TODAY

The name of Zola is one familiar to multitudes of people and his views on the labor question and his philosophy has made him famous wherever labor exists. In his novels he has a way of getting down to the plain facts of life in all of its lack of beauty and excitement. These facts in a manner that will not offend the most sensitive and delicate natures. What is deemed by some critics as the greatest of all Zola's books, "Germinal" or "The Toll of Labor" will be shown today at the Empress.
The story of "Germinal" briefly told is as follows: Lantier, a poor wandering workman, obtains employment in the mines at Montsou. France. He falls in love with Catherine, the daughter of a foreman in the mines. This brings him into conflict with Chaval, a friend of the foreman's family.
The engineer, Negrel, finds the shoring timbers up the earth in a bad state and ready to fall. The company posts a notice saying that because the work is to be repaired the price received by the miners will be decreased. A mass meeting is called for at the Cabaret Raseneur and Souvarine, an anarchist workman advocates violent measures. Lantier opposes this and suggests concerted action.
In the meantime Catherine, though in love with Lantier, dares not go back on her word to Chaval and marries him.
Chaval treacherously carries full information of the strike proceedings to Mr. Hennebeau, the chief director of the company and accepts pay for be-

ing a spy. The strike is now on amid general enthusiasm.
Chaval, taking advantage of the growing misery among the miners, urges some of them back to work. While they are in the mines the other strikers cut the elevator ropes. The imprisoned miners finally escape by ladders but have to run the gauntlet of the charged strikers who still hold the mine.
Chaval goes to Hennebeau and denounces the miners' leaders, especially Lantier.
The strikers' movement is finally crushed and instigated by Chaval they vote to resume work. Lantier, emerging from his refuge, tries in vain to dissuade them but his influence is gone and bowing to the majority he also goes back to work. Souvarine, alone implacable, determines upon desperate measures. He releases the bolts binding the barriers that hold back water from flooding the mine and the floods break loose. He is drowned in the cataclysm that follows. Some escape, others, among them Lantier, Catherine and Chaval are caught. They have little food and when, after long hours, Catherine attempts to give a little of her lunch to Lantier, Chaval furiously opposes. Chaval finally attempts to deprive his wife by force of her morsel of food. In righteous rage Lantier strikes him and kills him.
The workmen unite in the work of rescue. By imprudence, however, an explosion takes place which kills many of the rescuers. Among those killed is Catherine's brother. When the workers finally pierce the intervening walls they find only Lantier alive for Catherine lies dead in his arms.

### RAINS CAUSE DELAY RAILROAD TRAFFIC

TRACKS SOFTENED AND MINOR WASHOUTS REPORTED AND TRAINS ARE LATE

### A WIDE AREA IS COVERED

Irrigated Farms West of City Under Water and Damage Will Be Heavy There

Northwest Texas is thoroughly soaked, railroad traffic is delayed by washouts and lowland farms are under water, as a result of heavy rains throughout this section Sunday afternoon and Sunday night.

In this city, there was a steady down pour lasting practically all night, amounting to one and a fifth inches at 8:30 this morning. Probably a quarter of an inch more has fallen since that time.

The rain extended far north into Oklahoma and was reported from all points on this division of the Denver and from all stations on the Valley, including the Stamford and Northwestern branch. All of western Oklahoma and Northwest Texas was visited.

The Wichita River, which had risen several feet as a result of last week's rains, was rising again this morning, but was still far below the flood stage of last winter.

About 100 acres of irrigated farms are under water today and truck crops there are ruined. Water is standing several inches deep and in many places throughout the irrigated district and the loss there will be heavy.

One washout on the Wichita Valley just north of Abilene and two on the Denver near Childress and Quanah caused some delay in traffic, though repairs were quickly made. The south-bound Denver did not go through this city until the middle of the forenoon.

In this city the rain was accompanied by a brisk wind in its early hours, but no material damage was done.

### CHILD WELFARE CONFERENCE CLOSES

Washington, April 27.—The international Child Welfare Conference will close tonight. Today's entire session was given over to discussion of the general subject of the relation of the state to child welfare. Judge Ben B. Lindsey of Denver fame, was slated for an address, the most comprehensive he has undertaken on the subject of probation and child welfare.

Mrs. E. A. Downing of Denver, reported on the playgrounds movement of the congress.

Following this the United States government's work in behalf of child welfare was reported by various officials of the department of agriculture, the department of labor, the department of the interior and the public health service. Pure foods, good roads, boys and girls clubs, supervision of health, vital statistics, the work of the children's bureau and the bureau of education was discussed.

### LAKE DAM IN DANGER PRECAUTIONS TAKEN

FORCE OF FIFTY MEN STRENGTHENING THE WATER STOP. ENDED EMBANKMENT

### DANGER IS NOT IMMEDIATE

Even if Dam Breaks There Loss Would Not Be So Great—High Wind Might Cause Break

With the water almost up to the high stage of last December, a force of fifty men is on duty at Lake Wichita this morning, strengthening the west end of the dam, with earth filled sacks and otherwise taking precautions against any breach. The water is still rising at a rapid rate and will probably go above last winter's high mark.

Little apprehension is felt for the safety of the main structure of the dam, but at the west end where the dam is nothing more than an earthen fill, there is some danger, especially if a high wind should come up after the fall stops. It is there that a close watch is being kept night and day and nothing is being left undone.

The water company had planned to build up that portion of the dam, following the high water of December, but the stage of the lake has been too high ever since to permit any work. As soon as the water will permit, the company will strengthen the earth embankment and will protect it with rip-rap. It will probably be many months, however, before the water is low enough to permit this.

Manager Lawton does not fear any real damage unless there should be a high wind, which would be dangerous if the water should continue to rise.

A torrent of water is pouring out of the spillway and going down Holiday creek, but with the continued rains, water comes into the lake considerably faster than the spillway can carry it off. If the west end should go, it would result in a flood of the irrigated farm district as far as the city section.

What would happen if the central part of the dam should break is a matter of conjecture, but such a break is considered a remote possibility.

### CYCLONE HITS PEACOCK, MUCH DAMAGE IS DONE

Business Section of Town Destroyed in Storm Sunday Afternoon—No One Killed

Advice received at the Wichita Valley headquarters today, tell of cyclone damage at Peacock, on the Stamford & Northwestern branch in Stonewall county. The town was practically blown away, every business house being wrecked and most of the residences blown down.

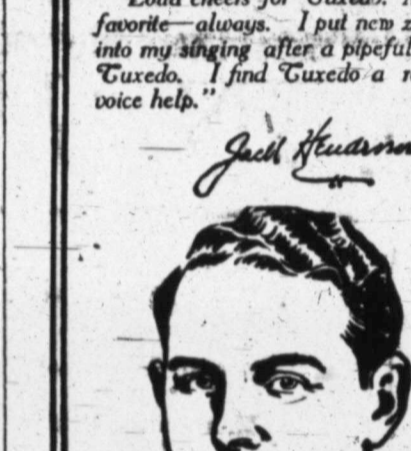

WITH BULLET IN HEART  
MAN RECOVERS INJURY.  
Vienna, April 27.—Alive and well with a bullet in his heart, is the report made of an unusual if not unprecedented case in medical annals, by Dr. Finsterer, of the Viennese Society of Physicians and Surgeons. Dr. Finsterer called to attend a young man brought to an emergency hospital. He had attempted suicide by shooting himself. He was unconscious but still alive. By means of the X-Ray it was seen that the bullet was actually in the heart. It was loose in one of the heart chambers and with every movement of that organ the bullet moved about. After consultation with Prof. Hechenezy, the famous surgeon, it was decided to sew up the hole in the heart where the bullet entered and that without attempting to remove the bullet. This was done. After two weeks it was certain that the young man would get well. Four weeks later another X-Ray examination showed the bullet had been "healed in" near the lower edge of the heart and gave the patient little or no trouble.

So we know we are right.
