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PRESIDENT ORDERS FEDERAL TROOPS SENT INTO COLORADO

PROCLAMATION COMMANDS ALL VIOLENCE TO CEASE

Secretary Garrison Prepares Order For Movement Of Troops Into Strike Torn Districts

Washington, April 28.—President Wilson today ordered United States troops to take charge of the strife torn scenes of the industrial war in Colorado. In a proclamation to the people of the United States he commanded that all violence and disorder cease. The proclamation reads: "By the President of the United States of America, a proclamation. Whereas, it is provided by the Constitution of the United States that the United States shall protect every state in this Union, on application of the legislature, or of he executive, (when the legislature cannot be convened), against domestic violence; and whereas, the Governor of the State of Colorado has represented that domestic violence exists in said state which the authorities of said state are unable to suppress, and has represented that it is impossible to convene the legislature of this state in time to meet the present emergency;

The Text Of President Wilson's Proclamation

Washington, April 28.—President Wilson has decided to order regular troops into the strike zone in Colorado. This decision was reached after the President had gone over the Colorado situation with his cabinet during the greater part of a two hours' session and a proclamation will be issued later today ordering the troops into the district where industrial strife is in progress. The number of troops will be decided upon in a conference with Secretary of War Garrison. At 2:30 o'clock this afternoon Secretary of War Garrison left the White House to go to the war department where he will prepare the order for the movement of the troops. A proclamation was being prepared by the President in the meantime.

"And whereas, the laws of the United States require that in all cases of insurrection, whenever in judgment of the President it becomes necessary to use military force to suppress such insurrection or obstruction to laws, he shall forthwith by proclamation command such insurgents to disperse and retire peaceably to their respective abodes within limited time. "Now, therefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States, do hereby admonish all good citizens of the United States, and all persons within the territory and jurisdiction of the United States against aiding, countenancing, abetting or taking part in such unlawful proceedings and I do hereby warn all persons engaged in or connected with said domestic violence and obstruction of laws to disperse and retire peaceably to their respective abodes on or before the thirtieth day of April, instant. Signed, "WOODROW WILSON, President. "W. M. J. BRYAN, Secretary of State."

650 State Militiamen Face Force Of 2000 Armed Strikers

FLETCHER SEIZES BRITON'S PROPERTY

TAKES POSSESSION OF TERMINALS WHICH HE CONSIDERS ESSENTIAL

GEN. MAAS DRAWING BACK

Federal Commander and His Men Are Making Their Way Into Interior

Vera Cruz, April 28.—Rear Admiral Fletcher last night seized the piers, yards and buildings of the terminal company here, a British concern, control over which he regarded as essential to the re-establishment of order and normal business in Vera Cruz. The admiral had been endeavoring to rent the property but considered the rental quoted by the management as exorbitant. Prior to the seizure the superintendent ran up a British flag over the water station but it was taken down.

That Huerta has decided to try conclusions with the American forces in the vicinity of Vera Cruz is indicated by reports brought to Vera Cruz today by refugees passengers from Mexico City, who report General Maas, former commandant at Vera Cruz and his men making their way farther into the interior. Sleeping on the bare stone flagging of the jail, with insufficient food and threatened every night with assassination by the drunken guards is the experience of Americans and other foreigners confined in the Cordova prison. Their release today was promised by General Maas in reply to a request sent by American Consul Canada whose messenger returned this morning. W. B. Meeking of Harvard University brought the story of the prisoners after spending three days at Cordova. Among the prisoners, he said, was an American woman with a three-months old infant. There were several other women and children and the total of all nationalities held in the prison was 85, he said.

BRITISH GOVT. SAYS ADMIRAL WITHIN HIS RIGHT

London, April 28.—The seizure of the English owned terminals by Rear Admiral Fletcher at Vera Cruz last night is accepted by the British government as being within the admiral's rights. It is stated today that if the terminal company presents its claims to the British foreign office they will be laid before the American government in the regular course of events.

ENVOYS CONTINUE SESSION UNTIL 2

NO ANNOUNCEMENT FORTHCOMING AS TO THE NATURE OF THEIR DELIBERATIONS

COMMISSION IS SUGGESTED

Some Diplomats Believe Commission Will Be Appointed to Govern Mexico

Washington, April 28.—The Cabinet held a session of more than two hours but no announcement was made as to the progress of the mediation negotiations. "The tension seems to be lessened," said Secretary Bryan as he returned to the state department. "Americans are being moved out of Mexico City without interruption." Secretary Garrison insisted the negotiations did not affect the orders of the troops at Vera Cruz. General Funston's instructions were to land immediately upon arrival.

The South American envoys were in continuous session until 2 o'clock this afternoon. In the absence of any definite statement speculation took a wide range among the diplomats not directly connected with the negotiations. Some of them suggest that one of the possible plans would contemplate a commission representing all factions to take charge of Mexico pending the election of a president and the founding of a stable government.

U. S. SOLDIERS ON LOOKOUT

Mexicans Will Likely Get Hot Reception When They Attempt To Cross Rio Grande

Washington, April 28.—Two federal generals and their commands who were driven back by the constitutionalists after fleeing from Nuevo Laredo are attempting to cross the United States border about thirty miles north of Laredo, according to a State department report today. It is supposed here that the federals are part of the company which attempted to dynamite the international bridge between the Mexican town and Laredo. They afterwards left to the south to join other federal forces.

LEFT TRAIL OF DESTRUCTION BEHIND THEM

Laredo, Texas, April 28.—The constitutionalists in command at Nuevo Laredo today reported to the American authorities here that the federals who Friday evacuated the town were trying to reach the Rio Grande above Laredo. United States troops at Minero have been advised to keep a sharp lookout Army officials said that nothing had been seen of the federals. The federals left a trail of destruction behind them as they moved away from Nuevo Laredo according to the reports brought in by the engineer of the locomotive which pulled the abandoned troop train back to Nuevo Laredo this morning. He said they had completely destroyed the towns of Sanchez and Latria. The inhabitants of these towns fled to the hills.

WANTS OPERATIONS OF FEDERAL TROOPS LIMITED

President Wilson Asks That Colorado Make Preparations to Reassert Authority

Washington, April 28.—The president in a telegram to Gov. Ammons requested that the state legislature which is to be convened May 4th consider the whole situation so that means may be provided for the state to reassert its authority and to limit the operations of the federal troops. The president also asks that the state militia be withdrawn temporarily while the federal troops occupy the district.

MEXICANS OFFER \$500 TEXAS RANGERS HEADS

Gov. Colquitt Will Not Withdraw Militia Until Regiment of Regulars Arrive

Austin, Texas, April 28.—There is a standing reward of \$500 among Mexicans for the heads of any Texas rangers brought into the Mexican soil, according to information received today by Gov. Colquitt. The information came from the Madeno ranch on the Rio Grande. Gov. Colquitt said he would make an investigation of the report. Gov. Colquitt said today that he proposed to keep the state troops at Brownsville on duty until the actual arrival of the regiment of infantry promised by Secretary of War Garrison. That while conditions were apparently quiet the withdrawal of the militia before the arrival of the regulars might result in an attempt by Mexicans to cross the border.

The order of Odd Fellows was first established in Pennsylvania in the early part of the last century, April 28 being observed as the actual birthday of the organization.

HUERTA ACCEPTS MEDIATION PLAN

SPANISH MINISTER REPORTS HUERTA'S UNCONDITIONAL ACCEPTANCE

PEACE ENVOYS IN SESSION

Try Some Middle Ground Upon Which Both Sides Can Unite As Basis For Peace

Washington, April 28.—Spanish Ambassador Riano in charge of Mexico's affairs at Washington today informed Secretary Bryan that General Huerta had unconditionally accepted the principal of mediation as involved in the proposal of the Brazilian, Argentine and Chilean ministers. The envoys of the three governments also have the acceptance of the United States. They met at the Argentine legation this morning in an effort to compose the Mexican crisis. With the acceptance of "both" governments before them the three envoys occupied themselves with considering the attitudes and desires of each side and seeking to find some middle ground on which both sides could stand.

The sessions are all private and are surrounded by every safeguard to prevent premature discussion. The sessions are expected to continue this afternoon and tonight. The White House declined to make any statement as to what proposal it had submitted to the envoys. It was announced that nothing would be said which might in any way embarrass the mediators. At the regular cabinet meeting this morning the matter was a subject of discussion.

MRS. ROBB'S BODY TAKEN TO GIRARD, KANSAS, TODAY

Capt. H. C. Robb of the Salvation Army left this morning at 6 o'clock to accompany the remains of his mother, Mrs. M. L. Robb, who died yesterday afternoon at Girard, Kan. The deceased was sixty-six years old and death was caused from grippe, from which she had been suffering since the first of January. She will be buried by the side of her husband in the Girard cemetery. For several years she had made her home here with her son, who is the only immediate surviving relative and had won many friends who regret very much her death and who sympathize deeply with Capt. Robb and his family in their loss.

YOUNG MEN'S FORUM WILL DISCUSS ULSTER TROUBLE

The hotel men planned to visit also Brussels and Ostend today. A reception at the former city had been arranged by the Hotel Proprietors Association of Ostend. Sightseeing and inspection of the great hotels of Brussels will be the program in that city. The Americans were to leave Brussels late this evening for Cologne where they will be honored guests at receptions there tomorrow.

DEFENDANT WANTED TO HIRE COUNTY ATTORNEY

The examining trial of George Calvin, the negro charged with assault to murder in connection with the shooting of Judge P. A. Martin, today was being bound over to the grand jury in the sum of \$1000. Stories told by some of the witnesses do not agree with the statement made by the defendant as to the details of the shooting.

After his hearing, the negro took County Attorney Dan Boone aside and tried to hire him as his lawyer in the case.

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WOOD ALCOHOL IS CAUSE OF BLINDNESS

Drinking of Liquid or Inhalation of Fumes Liabls to Cause Death or Blindness

Wichita, April 28.—Carolyn C. Van Blarcom, secretary of the National Prevention of Blindness, speaking before the organization here today, said that "preventable blindness" recommended that the label "may cause blindness or death if swallowed or inhaled" be universally used in the sale of wood alcohol.

"In 1913 year in New York City alone twelve persons were blinded and three killed by wood alcohol," she said. "A teaspoonful of this poison may cause total blindness, a larger quantity often causes death. Only within recent years has wood alcohol become so dangerous to life and sight. Formerly it was a dark, bad smelling, bad tasting fluid which no one was tempted to drink. A process is now known by means of which this color, taste and odor are removed. Wood alcohol when purified in this way looks, tastes and smells like good (grain) alcohol, and may easily be substituted for it in white whiskey, cordials, brandy, essences, extracts, patent medicines, etc. As much blindness and death have been caused also by breathing the fumes of wood alcohol as by swallowing the liquid. These fumes come from wood alcohol used in various trades—for example, in varnishing furniture, lead pencils and the inside of valves; in dyes for coloring artificial flowers; in shellac for stiffening hats; in the manufacture of photo engravings; and from stoves and lamps in which wood alcohol is burned."

Miss Van Blarcom urged that schools for midwives should be established, declaring that "ten thousand of the blind persons in this country were blinded when they were infants because of improper care."

"So far as we are able to learn," she added, "the United States of America is the only civilized country in the world in which the life and health and future well being of mothers and infants are not safeguarded as far as possible by statutory requirements for at least the training and licensing of midwives."

"In every rural community in the United States," she said, "we need for each five hundred to one thousand families a public health nurse, who has had special training in midwifery. It is misery which results from the barbarous treatment of our mothers and the slaughter of our infants. To the nurse who has made a study of this subject for ten years the fact that in one neighborhood there were nearly four hundred successful deliveries, with no loss of life and a very small percentage of injuries to mothers, answer the question."

A nurse should be a member of the faculty in every school, according to Miss Helen W. Kelly, superintendent of the school nurses of Chicago. "The ideal condition," according to Miss Kelly, "would be to have a nurse in each school as a member of the faculty, charged with the responsibility for the health of teachers and pupils, with authority over all agencies affecting the hygiene of the school. She would be the instructor of hygiene, physiology, first aid and the elements of home nursing."

Such rapid strides were being made she said that since 1901 when New York was the first city to employ a school nurse, there are over 500 cities and towns which have established school nursing.

PERILS OF PAULINE

Owen, having reached the field, is very much annoyed at the delay and finally hires an automobile to go out and meet Pauline and Harry. He discovers them on the road and taking Pauline into his car he hurries to go out and meet Pauline and Harry. He does not arrive in time, as the aviator with whom they have made arrangements has already started.

The picture here show the airship coming towards the finish line when suddenly it crumples up and falls to the ground. Feliz Diaz Has Few Friends Left In Mexican Capital

Mexico City, April 23.—Admirers of Felix Diaz are very few in the Mexican capital. The enemies of his revolution, of course, execrate him, but he finds as much criticism among his former supporters as he does among those who have always opposed him. "Lack of nerve and ability" is the charge generally brought against him. No man in Mexico has had more opportunities to make something of himself and to take a hand in the destinies of Mexico than Felix Diaz, for even though he was only the nephew of old President Diaz, the president felt even more kindly to Felix than he did to his own son, who was thoroughly incapable of assuming responsibility of any sort. "I tried to make a statesman," they say old Porfirio remarked of Felix, "and he wasn't big enough for it. I tried to make him a financier, and gave him every chance in the world, but he couldn't rise to the opportunity. I tried to make him a soldier, but he failed. Then I gave him the little job of being chief of police of Mexico City and he was happy."

Felix Diaz's seizure of Vera Cruz, before the downfall of Madero, is a story that is full of instances of his inability to make the most of opportunities. In the customhouse, when Felix Diaz gained control of the town, was the sum of \$3,000,000. Diaz never learned it was there until after he had been captured by Madero and his revolution had failed. "Fool!" cried old Porfirio Diaz in Paris, when he heard of this incident. Felix was ready to stand for the poor, but he wouldn't take money from a government he was trying to overthrow.

There were 10,000 rifles stored in Vera Cruz which Felix Diaz might have seized, but with his usual superficiality, he didn't know of their presence in the town until it was too late and he was in need of rifles and ammunition at that moment. From a military standpoint Diaz also made a characteristic and fatal mistake when, after seizing Vera Cruz, he did not send out scouting parties to cut the railroad lines between the capital and his seaport stronghold. Over these lines, within a few hours after his revolution, troops were rushed to overthrow him, and Felix Diaz wound up in jail with a death sentence hanging over his head.

Mexicans, like all other folks, the world over, love a winner. But they have seen Felix Diaz fall in everything he undertook and they were not surprised to see Huerta, after Madero had been overthrown, seize the presidency and send the weak Felix away on a foreign mission. Almost everything is fair in war and Mexican politics, but there are thousands of former supporters of Felix Diaz who have never been able to forget that, after Madero had saved Diaz's life, Diaz turned about and assisted in taking the life of Madero. Among all classes in Mexico, except for a few politicians who might profit by his success, the opinion is general that almost any candidate for the presidency who might be selected from present Mexican leaders would be more efficient than Felix Diaz.

FORT WORTH MAN HELD UNDER HUERTA'S ORDERS

Vera Cruz, April 27.—According to word received here from Mexico City, K. M. Van Zandt Jr., the president, and all the trustees and officers of the American Club there are under arrest, as are all officials of the Mercantile Banking Company and the Mexico City Banking Company. The officers of this banking institution were arrested because of their refusal to contribute money to the Mexican government.

The American grocery store was burned and an attempt made to burn the American Club. Three other American stores were looted. The government appears to be encouraging the demonstrations against Americans, although the burning and looting is held in check by the police.

Among those detained are M. C. H. Adramonte a Civil War general; W. L. Vail, J. B. Buchanan, William A. Parker, C. G. Ray, E. Marr and Chas. Yeager, the club manager, who also is a veteran of the American Civil War. All officials of the American Mercantile Banking Company and the Mexico City Banking Company also are in custody in the capital. The officers of the banks were arrested because they refused to contribute money to the Mexican government.

A number of American women in Mexico City who otherwise might have come to Vera Cruz on the delayed train refused to leave their husbands. The order against leaving Mexico City appears not to have applied to them.

Claims Wireless Kills Birds.

San Diego, April 28.—Humanity's Officer Muters today sent a formal appeal to the government to make its big wireless station at Point Loma stop killing pelicans. Pelicans used to be thick in San Diego harbor. Now there are only a few of them. Muters is sure the powerful radio waves which the station sends out do the mischief. He says he has seen scores of birds suddenly stricken in mid-air fall dead into the water. The waves might be toned down, he thinks, so as to do less damage.

Wichita Falls, Texas, April 28, 1914

There have been excessive rains in many parts of Texas. As a result the streams are bankful with water and many are out of banks. Doubtless some damage will be done by the overflowing of the streams, but the rains were needed for crop raising purposes, and will serve to make this a most prosperous year for the farmers. They need it, as the past three or four years many parts of Texas has suffered greatly from the continued droughts.

Just think about it. One wheat farm alone in the Wichita Falls country will require at least 12,000 pounds of binder twine in the harvesting of the 6000 acres of wheat on it this year. This wheat will yield at a low estimate an average of at least 15 bushels per acre, or 90,000 bushels, and if it sells for what it is or will be worth, it ought to bring at least \$90,000. A whole lot of wheat, and a whole lot of money.

Other news services in Mexico have about as much chance to scoop the Associated Press as a one-legged man has to win a hundred yards dash against a Marathon meet champion. Dallas Times-Herald.

There is no doubt but the Associated Press has handled the Mexican affair by far better and quicker than all other news gathering associations combined, and its reports can generally be relied on, but in exciting times like the present experience has taught us not to rely implicitly on the old reliable A. 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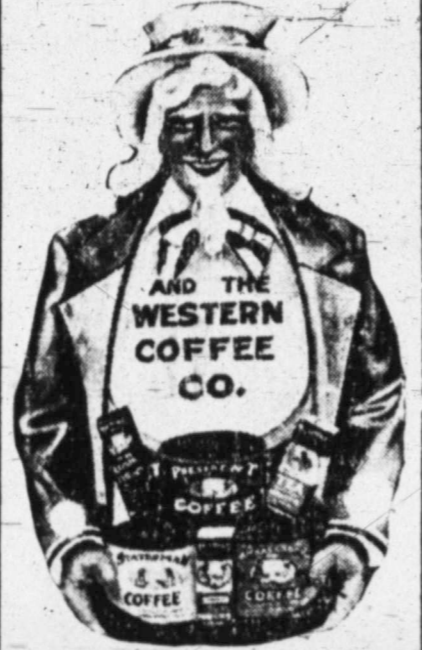

SAVE MONEY BY PLANNING MEALS:

St. Louis, April 27.—The real problem of home cooking is the preparing of appetizing and wholesome meals, with due regard to expenditure of time and money. Meals should be planned several days ahead, each meal and the program for each day hanging on the preceding one. In this way desirable combinations can be made with little or no waste. If the meal is prepared without planning the housekeeper must use what she has on hand and a badly balanced meal and poor combinations often result. If a market is near and the telephone is used in ordering she is apt to get an expensive price of meat which can be cooked nicely while the meat and vegetables left over from the preceding day are often wasted as no thought had been given on how to combine them.

It is not necessary to spend much time figuring perfect balance of food principles in family meals but it is necessary to have a general idea of composition of foods and to be careful that not too much protein, fat, sugar or starch be served in a meal. The following examples, often served in poorly balanced meals, will illustrate this point: Beef, macaroni and cheese, peas—too high in protein. Beef, cheese, custard—too high in protein. Pork, fried potatoes, rich pudding—too high in fat.

Light meat, potatoes, sweet potatoes, corn, rice pudding—too high in starch. Meat, candied sweet potatoes, jelly cake, preserves—too high in sugar. The tendency of well to do American families is to serve meals containing too high a proportion of fat and protein, also to serve too much. The total food value should depend chiefly on the amount of physical activity taken by members of the family. The menu for a farmer's family should contain more heavy, rich foods than that of a family where occupations are sedentary.

That good digestion depends to a considerable extent on pleasurable taste in eating, has been proven scientifically, as well as by experience of the ages. "Appetite is the best sauce" and outdoor exercise gives good appetite. But not everyone can have a keen appetite at all times, so pleasing combinations are important from a health standpoint. Foods have the following characteristics by contrast: Heavy or light; moist or dry, strong or mild flavored; crisp or soft; acid or sweet, hot or cold. A meal should have contrast or variety, it should not be composed all of one kind of food, as all heavy or all strong flavored dishes. Mild flavored foods like bread and potatoes can be eaten in considerable quantities in a meal, but the appetite rebels at large quantities of turnips, cauliflower, cabbage, same or cheese. In simple combinations the strong or all strong flavored dishes are used in quantity than mild edibles such as bread and cheese, macaroni and tomatoes, baked beans and ketchup. As in the other arts it is not possible to give definite rules for planning successful meals, but with careful observation the housekeeper should succeed in planning appetizing

CHAMBER COMMERCE IN BUSY SESSION

ENTERTAINMENT AND INVITATION TO CONVENTION ARE DISCUSSED

A NEW INDUSTRY PROPOSED

Committee Appointed to Investigate Merits of Gin Machinery Proposal

Several matters received the attention of the Chamber of Commerce directors at their session this morning. The entertainment and invitation to the convention of the district convention of Mothers' Clubs will draw heavily on the town's supply of automobiles, as fifty will be required for the former and fifteen for the latter. The condition of the roads over which the editors will ride in the autos was also brought up and it was decided to ask the commissioner of each precinct to have the roads in his section dragged Thursday or Friday so as to be in as good shape as possible by Saturday. The directors decided to ask the Modern Woodmen of America to hold their next triennial state meeting in 1917 in this city. A proposition to sell the moving picture films, to the Chamber of Commerce was referred to the advertising committee and a proposition to establish a plant for making improved gin machinery was referred to a special committee. Secretary Miller reported that everything was in readiness for the editors, except that some more machines were needed and he asked all the directors to help in securing the full number of fifty which will be required from this city. This led to a discussion of the condition of the roads and it was decided to ask the commissioners to act individually as to have the highways in as good condition as possible. The stretch of road on the south side of the river bridge, which as usual is in bad condition, was asked to be repaired by the city. It was announced that the Katy's "big special" would reach this city at noon and it was decided that an effort should be made to have as large and representative gathering as possible present to hear Mr. Evans, District Deputy McConnell of the Modern Woodmen of America, asked the support of the directors in bringing the 1917 meeting of that order to this city. He was promised the back-

ing of the organization and was authorized to take the secretary or assistant secretary to Temple with him to help land the meeting. Mesdames C. W. Sulder, J. W. Lee and J. W. Culbertson appeared before the directors to ask for assistance in giving the delegates to the District Mothers' Congress here Friday and Saturday, an automobile ride over the city. It was thought that fifteen machines could be secured outside of those going on the Electrica trip and the directors pledged that number. Mr. Bell, representing the concern which has been taking moving pictures in this city, asked the directors to buy the films, saying he believed they could be used to advantage in advertising Wichita Falls. The matter was referred to the advertising committee with power to act. R. P. Webb of this city explained the workings of a new machine to handle boll cotton, saying it seemed to him to be nearer perfect than other inventions of the kind. The inventor, he said, was willing to build a machine in this city for demonstration and if it worked satisfactorily, to organize a company here. The directors went into the matter at considerable length, then referred it to a special committee of J. A. Kemp, T. B. Noble and A. L. Huey. Adjournment followed. Those present were: Messrs. Huff, Pennington, Huey, Gardner, Smock, Noble, Hines, Kemp, Marlow, Blair, Hardy, Boyd, Bridwell and O'Reilly.

PLACES BIG ORDER FOR BINDER TWINE

W. S. CURLEE, MANAGER OF DALE RANCH, ORDERS 12,000 POUNDS FOR WHEAT CROP

6,000 ACRES SOWN IN WHEAT

Harvest Expected to Start Between 20th and 25th of May—Outlook is Promising

W. S. Curlee, manager of the Dale ranch, located twelve miles east of the city, has placed an order for 12,000 pounds of binder twine that he figures will be required to bind the wheat on that ranch this year.

Mr. Curlee says there are 6,000 acres planted to wheat this year on the Dale ranch and he is confident it will make an average yield of from 15 to 20 bushels per acre. He expects the cutting of the grain on the ranch to start between the 20th and 25th of May.

The grain will be hauled to Mallett and Petrolia, placed in box cars and marketed in this city.

The Dale ranch is the property of E. H. Kempner of Galveston and is rented to farmers on the lease system, the landlord furnishing the seed wheat and the binder twine in addition to the land.

Mr. Curlee is also the manager of the large farm located on the north side of Lake Wichita, known as the Ly-sight farm, and belonging to J. A. Kemp and associates. On this farm there are 1,000 acres of wheat, which is even better than the wheat on the Dale ranch.

CONTINUANCE DENIED ALSO CHANGE OF VENUE

Trial of J. Frank Norris on Charge of Arson will be Tried Now in Tarrant County

Fort Worth, Texas, April 28.—In the Seventeenth district court Monday, Judge James W. Swayne overruled both motions made by the county attorney in the case of the State vs. J. Frank Norris, charged with arson for a continuance and for a change of venue. The judge ruled that the county attorney had not used diligence sufficient to obtain the two important witnesses named in his motion for a continuance as being necessary before the state could go to trial. He overruled the motion for a change of venue on the ground that as far a trial could be obtained in Tarrant county as in any other county, and that the case was as widely discussed in other counties as in Tarrant county, but said, "When the examination of witnesses begins, should it appear to the court that a jury cannot be obtained, the court may change its ruling, but testimony of witnesses must first be heard."

In the motion for a continuance the county attorney alleged that K. K. Taylor and Mrs. K. K. Taylor, who reside in Tarrant county, Texas, are witnesses in behalf of the state, and that they, K. K. Taylor and Mrs. K. K. Taylor, are absent from this court, and that the diligence which has been used to obtain their attendance and the attendance of each of them as witnesses at this trial was made by the signing out of a subpoena in behalf of the state and having the same issued by the clerk of this county and that the witnesses were directed over to William H. H. sheriff of Tarrant county, who made the return on the subpoenas that these witnesses cannot be found. That the testimony of the witnesses, K. K. Taylor and Mrs. K. K. Taylor is material for the state.

Witnesses Away on Visit

It is further alleged in the motion that the witnesses, without knowing this case had been set for trial, went on a temporary visit to the state of Louisiana, and that they will return within thirty days, that the evidence of both witnesses is what material in the interest of the state, and to be forced into trial at this time without their testimony that the interests of the state would be neglected.

In support of the motion, and made part of the records of the case, the county attorney had attached to the papers a clipping from the Feliciana Record, a newspaper published in Jackson parish, Louisiana, of date March 28, showing that the two witnesses were guests of friends and relatives there.

In the motion for a change of venue County Attorney Baskin alleges that because of an existence of a combination of influences in favor of the accused, that the state cannot safely go to trial, and that the ends of justice will be subserved by a change of venue in the case.

Allegations on which the county attorney bases the charges are that the defendant appeared before the grand jury and was indicted for perjury and also that a subsequent grand jury indicted the defendant for arson, and also that another indictment for perjury was returned against the defendant. That his honor, after two grand juries had returned indictments against the defendant, instructed the grand jury not to investigate either side, but to investigate both

sides, if any investigation was had, and that said grand jury that was convened indicted the defendant on the charge of burning the Baptist church parsonage, the other indictments were for burning the Baptist church and for perjury.

That the defendant was acquitted of the charges of perjury and burning the Baptist church. That the trial of the two cases was generally discussed among the people of Tarrant county, and that the people of Tarrant county took sides one way or the other, and that it will be impossible to get a qualified jury in this case.

Expelled From Conference

It is further alleged in the application for the motion for a change of venue that since the court received a verdict of not guilty and that since the trials for perjury and arson, the defendant has been expelled from the Baptist conference of ministers of Fort Worth, Texas, and that by reason of such expulsion he is no longer a member of said Baptist conference, and that by reason of said expulsion a great deal of discussion has been going on among the people of Tarrant county to such an extent that the county attorney shows to the court that in all probability neither the state nor the defendant can obtain a fair and impartial trial, to which letters of Fort Worth the defendant entitled. That since the trials of the defendant and since his expulsion from the Baptist conference of ministers of Fort Worth, the defendant has circulated over the county among citizens who will necessarily have to vote as jurors, if they qualify in this case a paper printed and written and containing what purports to be his side of the issue for which he was expelled from the Baptist conference of ministers of Fort Worth, and that the circulation of said paper, edited by the defendant, has created considerable discussion among the people in this county and that the people in this county have formed and expressed opinions as to the guilt or innocence of this defendant to such an extent that a fair and impartial trial cannot be had of this case in this county.

Another allegation in the motion alleges the indictment of three other parties to the destruction of the church and that this case will have a bearing on the case against the defendant. Wherefore the county attorney prays that a change of venue be granted so that the ends of justice may be subserved.
