## Post Office Helps Count Livestock

Rural mail carriers from the Baird and Clyde post offices will leave some livestock cards along their routes beginning November 16th.

"Information reported on the cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms," said postmasters Jones and South.

Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes.

This means that not every box will get a card, and for this reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings.

Carriers assisting with the survey are: Baird - Terrell Williams, Rt. 1; L. C. Gillit, Star Route 1; and Mrs. H. M. Burks, Star Route 2; and Clyde - Clark Tabor, Star Route 1 and P. L. Poole, Route 2.

Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for the Texas and National pig crop report and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

The first Jim Ned score was made when Ronald Smith passed 15 yards to Donald McMillon, and Smith plunged for the conversion. Donald McMillon scored the second TD for the host team with a 2-yard plunge and the conversion try was good on a pass to Frank Allyn to end the first half scoring.

Calvin Barnes scored both Baird touchdowns, scoring the first from 1 yard out and passing to Tommy Higgins for the conversion. Early in the fourth quarter, Barnes scored on a 15-yard run and again passed to Higgins for the conversion.

Roy Hadston passed to Ronald McMillon to cap the final drive of 70 yards, and the conversion try failed.

The Bears wind up their season's play Friday night when they host the Gorman Panthers at 7:30 p. m. Gorman has not lost a game this year, and the Bear's district record is 1-2. Jim Ned's district record is 2-1, losing to Gorman.

A membership drive is planned through the grades - first through the eighth. The Class securing the most members will be given a prize. Dues for the year are 50c per member.

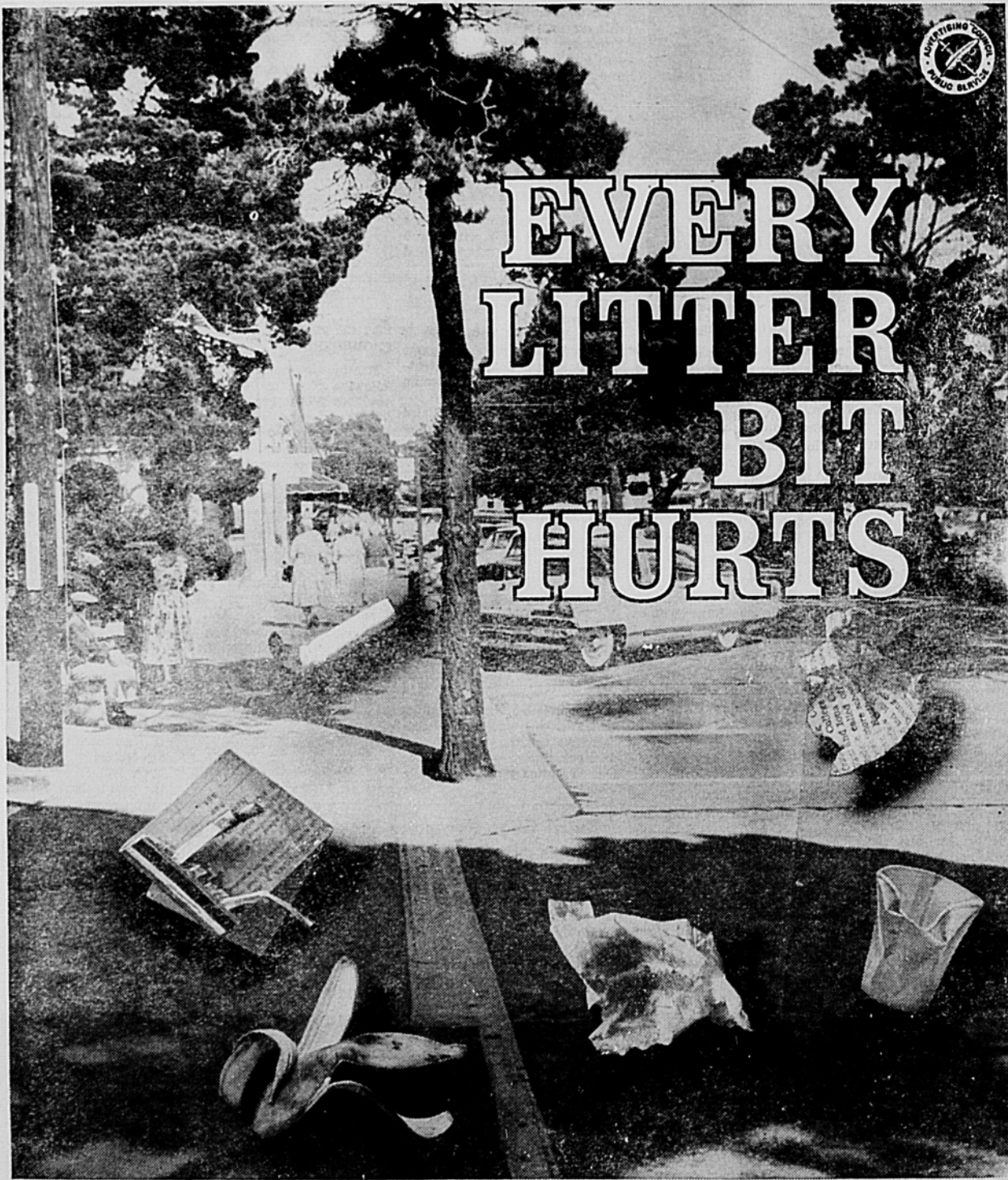

**National Debut For Debbie Sue As March of Dimes Poster Child**

Debbie Sue Brown, a five-year-old winsome young lady of Clarkston, Wash., who is annoyed because she must wait a few years before marrying the boy next door, was selected this week as the 1962 New March of Dimes Poster Child.

Debbie Sue won out over hundreds of small children, afflicted with birth defects, arthritis or polio—health fields embraced by the program of The National Foundation—March of Dimes. The Poster Child lives a life both exciting and glamorous. If physical condition permits, there usually are visits to the White House, to Senators, Governors and other prominent persons as well as radio and television appearances during the New March of Dimes in January.

She will star in a January TV special, "The Scene Stealers," and her picture will appear nationwide on thousands of March of Dimes posters, coin collectors, and mail appeal envelopes.

Debbie Sue, high-spirited and active today, although doctors once believed she wouldn't survive the open spine with which she was born, lives in a valley of the Clearwater Mountains near the banks of the Snake River.

She is brown-eyed and blonde, the daughter of Jack C. Brown, a state highway surveyor, and Barbara Brown, who have a younger daughter, Carla, one year old.

Debbie Sue's birth defect of an open spine was not immediately apparent. But a few days after birth her grandmother, Mrs. Fred Bening, a registered nurse of nearby Orofino, Idaho, recognized that a serious disorder was present; and the parents then drove 400 miles at headlong pace to Seattle's Children's Orthopedic Hospital. (The mother collapsed on arrival and was herself hospitalized.)

At the hospital the parents were told that Debbie Sue's spinal defect was of such severity that the infant probably could not live beyond three months. If she were alive at

six months, however, she was to be brought back.

"We drove home sadly," Mrs. Brown relates, "trying to adjust ourselves to the tragedy of losing our beautiful baby. But our spunky Debbie Sue had no idea of leaving us at three months. At eight months, we returned to Seattle where her spine was mended. When she came out of surgery, she was so mischievous that she succeeded in wrenching free from the blood-transfusion tube and the needle used for intravenous feeding. Doctors told us she must lie face down on the night train riding home. Instead, she insisted on sitting up, jabbering without end and keeping all the passengers awake."

The Asotin County Chapter of The National Foundation—March of Dimes promptly offered assistance and, since 1958, it has financed much of the cost

of Debbie Sue's treatment, braces, medicines and the check-up trips to Seattle, the breadth of the state away. Happily, in her case serious crippling has been averted.

At least 250,000 infants are born yearly in the United States with birth defects—some even more severe than Debbie Sue's. The National Foundation, with March of Dimes financial support, is seeking the answers to this largest unmet childhood medical problem in the nation today.

When the 1962 New March of Dimes National Poster Child isn't scooting around the Lewis and Clark countryside with Daddy on his motorcycle, she plots how to provoke a proposal from Stevie, the six-year-old next door. Although it will be some time before she can consider marriage, Debbie Sue's idea is to get her man committed now.

The men succeeded in closing the gate on something over a hundred head, but the others scattered, some of them going back to the Hall pasture on the Bayou. Extra help was secured and after all night and day work they were gathered again, and delivered to Mr. Farmer on Wednesday."

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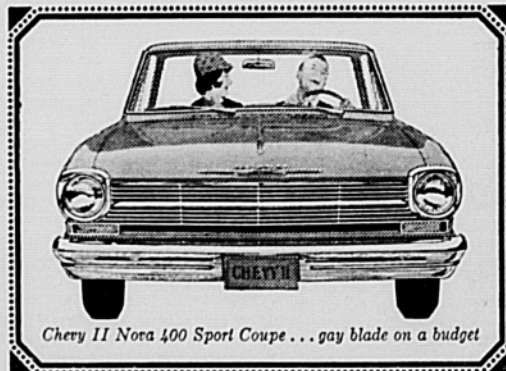

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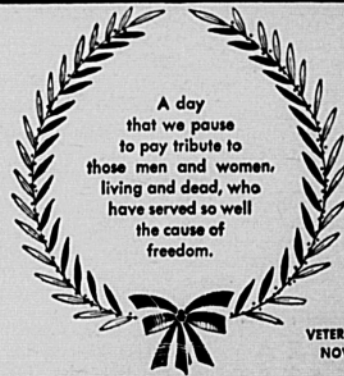

**Temple Hospital To Get New Home**

Scott and White Hospital and Clinic is going to get a new \$10 million home on a 300-acre site at Temple.

Bids will be opened November 28 on the first phase of the project, expected to cost between \$10 million and \$12 million. The nursing station will include an enlarged school of nursing and other medical facilities.

A brand new concept of design will keep nurses within a half-dozen steps of every patient in the 253-bed hospital. This will be possible by building the hospital in three circular wings, each six floors high. The nursing station for each floor will be in the center of the wing, and the door to every room will open to face the nursing station.

Between the three circular wings will be the diagnostic and research center of the memorial institution. In addition to latest medical equipment and services, there will be examination and consultation rooms for 60 specialists. Arrangement of the building permits quick and easy use of the clinic facilities by doctors and patients in any part of the hospital wings.

Ground will be broken for the new medical center Dec. 2, with Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson leading an array of speakers which will include the president of the American Medical Association and the head of the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn.

**Ranger To Host Pecan Show**

The ninth annual Eastland County Pecan Show will be held in Ranger December 8 & 9, according to H. W. Sims, president of the County Pecan Growers Association.

Mr. Sims made the announcement after a committee composed of C. E. Smith, Rising Star; C. T. Barton, Pioneer and B. B. Freeman, Cheaney, checked the results of the balloting in the determination of a site for the show.

Invitations for the show had been extended the group by the Ranger and Cisco Chambers of Commerce and the Eastland Jaycees. Those eligible to vote for the show were exhibitors at the 1960 show and paid up members of the Pecan Growers Association, Sims said.

It will be the second time the pecan show has been held in Ranger, according to R. V. Galloway, manager of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce. It was held here in 1958, he said in commenting on the affair.

Other officers of the pecan growers association include Doss Alexander, Pioneer and Ben McKinnis, Eastland, sec'y-treasurer.

"Most of the planted orchards on our deep, sandy soils have a wonderful pecan crop this year that will be top quality nuts. Some of the native seedling groves in the creek bottoms have a shy crop, though," Sims reported, when asked about the present crop.

**Traffic Death Rate Higher Than 1960**

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reported today statistics indicate at this time that traffic deaths in Texas will run one percent higher this year than in 1960 - which means 20 to 25 more motorcyclists than last year.

A total of 2,254 traffic deaths was recorded for 1960.

Quoting from an analysis by N. K. Wierner, DPS Statistical Services Manager, Garrison said "At this time, motorcyclists are running slightly higher for 1961 than for the same period of 1960. The 234 traffic deaths this past June was 52 more than in June of 1960, and 48 more than the past 15 year June average. "Statistically speaking, we might show an improvement in October 1961 over October 1960, and we might hold our own in December. But November of 1961 will very likely have more motorcyclists than November of 1960."

Garrison emphasized that the traffic death picture could well change before the end of the year. Stressing that most fatal accidents involve at least one traffic law violation, he pledged to do everything possible to hold down violations and appealed for "the all-out cooperation of the motoring public to hold the line against traffic death by obeying the laws of safety that were enacted for their protection."

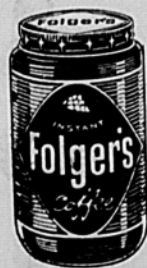
