MANIFESTO BY RUSSIAN GRAND GREAT PANAMA WATERWAY NOW OFFICIAL STATEMENT DECLARES GERMAN PLAN DOUBLE AT.

French Mobilization Satisfactory and Allies Co-ordinating To Fullest Extent

Paris, Aug. 15.—An official communi-cation issued late today reviews the situation to date. It says:

"In order that opinion in France and elsewhere can have a just view and not be lost in the details of news, it is of advantage to lay down in broad lines and without seeking to judge in advance developments or events and to classify the result required. We know of from the declaration of German strtegists such as Bernhardi-Falken hayne and Von Der Goltz that the Ger man plans provided for a quick attack on the French line upon our troops to the north of Nancy. equally well that a second sharp and quick attack was to have been by passing through Belgium and then immediately striking at the French of this double plan is found in the individual cards of mobilization directing the German reservists from the fifth to the fifteenth day of mobiliza cities such as Rheims and Marne

That directed against Nancy was not attempted in its entirety; the Germans finding our forces too strong, renound ed the plan. We know also that the failure of this quick attack through Belgium because of the resistance of the forts at Liege, the valor of the Belgian army and the intervention of our country, has kept the Germans eight days upon the Meuse.

The war office alludes to the reg tarity of the French mobilization, the concentration and co-ordination of the French movement with the English and Belgian allies. It continues:

"The Russian army having accelerat ed its mobilization will be able to op erate at the same time with the Fre English and Belgian armies. The Servian army now controls Herzegovina and this will cause Austria-Hungary to hesitate to continue to send her troops which during the last eight days have been on the way toward Alsace. Finally, the English and French squadrons onti of the seas."

"Cables are different from wire-less," says Colville Barclay, the British charge d'affairs, "it takes several hours to communicate the movements

hours to communicate the movements of a ship for instance, by cable to the home government. Then the message must be relayed by wireless, all of which takes more time. The actual order is given on the territory of a belligerent to its vessel."

If the censorship was established at the cable offices it might seriously interfere with the sending of code messages to embassies and consulates. It is believed the Russian ambassador discussed this phase of the subject with the secretary of state.





The first is that providing for the initiative and referendum, amending Section 1. Article 3. The second is to amend Article 1, Section 7 of the Constitu tion, providing for authorizing counregular sessions of the legislature, to \$1200 per annum for the first year, special session held during the second year. The regular sessions are the salary of \$1,200 for the first year in the year next succeeding that in proposed amendment also provides for compensation of mileage to and from the seat of government at the rate of 5c per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, regardless of railways or water routes. The present mileage allowed members of the legislature is 20c per mile. This pro posed amendment will be designated on the ballot as "Amending Section 24. Article 3 of the Constitution, in creasing compensation of the legislature and extending length of regular session." For the past several years legislative positions have gone "a begging," and in a great majority of the districts, men who were capable of making laws for this State have refused to become candidates, for the reason that the compensation was not

sufficient. The result has been that these positions have, and are now, generally speaking, being filled by politicians of the peanut stripe. ACTION UPON BANK LAW AMENDMENT IS DELAYED

Washington, Aug. 15.—An effort to
remove limitations imposed by the federal reserve act on the discount ing by banks of acceptance based on import and export business was delayed in the House today by Representative Wingo of Arkansas who declared the measure should be con-sidered by the banking and currency committee. The bill probably will be put through early next week. Under the federal reserve act, member banks may rediscount with the federal reserve banks acceptance, based on the exportation and importation of goods having less than three months to run provided the amount of such redis counts at that time shall exceed onehalf of the capital and surplus of the discounting banks. Member banks may discount for customers similar acceptance up to six months up to the one-half of their capital and surplus. The Glass bill authorizes the federal reserve board in its discretion to remove the limitations as to amounts of acceptance to be rediscount and would allow reserve banks to rediscount six months ac ceptances.





HISTORY OF THE CABLE BETWEEN U. S. AND EUROPE

By Associated Press. Then

Fifty-six years ago today the world's first submarine cable message flashed under the Atlantic Ocean from Eng land to the United States. The even signalled the opening of the Atlantic Cable. The historic message, which shot under the seas from Queen Vic-toria of England to President Buchanan of the United States, was a mes-sage of courtesy and friendship. The president replied in part: "May the Atlantic telegraph prove to be a bond of perpetual peace and friendship be-tween the nations, and an instrument designed by Divine Providence to dif-fuse religion, civilization, liberty and law throughout the world." The fol-lowing day was given up to celebra-tion in the two countries. In the United States the cities lying east of the Mississippi celebrated with the firing of guns and the ringing of bells. In New York the citizens were awakened early in the morning by a cannon salute of 100 guns. The salute was repeated at noon. Church dignataries met and held religious services; the populace paraded with bands of music while all the church bells rang con-tinuously. The buildings were decorated, some having banners picturing the Queen and the President grasping ands over the legend "reciprocity." The flags of the two nations were en-twined over their heads. That night the city was brilliantly illuminated.

Today there are about 280,000 miles of cable submerged in the oceans, of cable submerged in the oceans, gulfs and estuaries of the world. These are divided into over 2500 cable systems, thirteen of which are owned by the United States go vernment. More than three score of these systems connect with the United States tems connect with the United States and Europe and are carrying more than 25,000,000 words between England and America every year. They are carrying the news of the world almost as soon as events occur, and are conveying business and social messages between the nations that are bound by its ties in a bond of friendship that has not been disturbed by war since the first message was dispatched. Today certain messages canbe despatched to England from New York at the rate of a few cents a word; a half century ago messages cost at a half century ago messages cost at the rate of twenty words for \$100. These messages travel at a marvelous rate. Recently a test of the time required to send a commercial message of nine words around the world made a record of 16 1-2 minutes. It traveled a distance of 28,613 miles and was relayed sixteen times. At the opening of the Pacific cable in 1900, President Rosevelt sent a message around the world in 9 1-2 minutes. But, unlike the test of commercial message, it had the "royal right of way," and the op-erators at relay stations had been forewarned not to delay its despatch.

Mendoza, who styles him-self the real leader of the Liberal party, in that he is the duly elected chairman or president of the Liberal National committee, believe they will be able, when the time comes, to swing the votes of enough Porras folowers to do as they like in the way of legislation. It is pointed out that there is much dissatisfaction with the orras administration, even among its losest adherents.

The importance of the centrol of the National law making body is apparent when it is remembered that this body elects five "designados" or vice presidents of the republic. They are not elected when the president is hosen by popular ballot, but by the assembly immediately after the dential election, when it holds its first nder the new administration.

A president may not suchimself within six months after leaving the office. The control of the assembly permits him to say who shall be the first vice president. STRICT NEUTRALITY DEMANDED FORTY-EIGHT YEARS IN SERVICE

Battleships Must Not Stop—War De-partment Boat Passes Through Be Succeeded By General

By Associated Press.
Washington, Aug. 15.—With the passage through the Panama canal oday of the war department liner Ancon the great waterway becomes "free and open to the vessels of com-merce and war of all nations on terms of entire equality" in accordance with the provision of the Hay-Pauncefort treaty. Vessels drawing not more than thirty feet of water may make the passage; it would be possible to put some of the big American dreadnoughts through at

Any of the foreign warships now in the Atlantic and Pacific waters also could make the trip, but the naval plans of the European powers which have vessels off both coasts" of the United States are not known here. No embarrassment will face the United States should one of the vessels of the belligerents seek passage. Strict rules are laid down in the reaty for the protectoral neutralization of the canal and every detail will be under the direction of Gov-ernor Goethals and his staff.

Except in case of absolute necessity vessels of belligerents must make an uninterrupted passage through the canal. They may not They may not through the canal. They may not coal, revictual or embark or disem-bark troops in the canal zone. These provisions also apply to the terminal waters at both ends of the canal within a limit of three miles. Twenty-four hours is the limit of time a helligerent vessel may remain within the canal, except in cases of distress and a vessel of war of one belligerent annot depart with twenty-four hours from the departure of a vessel of war of another belligerent. All of the plants and establish-

ents that are part of the canal are immune from attack or injury by any bolligerent. Vigilant American pilots will see that no foreign vespels make observations of the canal

STUDENTS ENROLLED
