

during the 1996-97-98 seasons. When Kendrick broke the record, it had stood for 30 years, held by Tony Perea. Whereas Haile has started since his sophomore seaso, Kendrick played only one full game as a soph. Meanwhile, Bandy has gained 1,698 yards rushing, leaving him 1135 yards shy of the record. The Chieftains might have the opportunity of having two players in the same backfield breaking an outstanding record. Bandy was second in both the rushing and scoring categories. He rushed for 895 yards on 112 carries, 8.0 yards per carry on 112 carries. Bandy scored 74 points as runnerup to Haile. He had 12 TDs and one two-pointer. It was the sixth straight

100 points in a season. In 1996, '97 and '00, the Chieftains had two players go over the 100-point total. Sophomore QB Brock Field completed 23 of 63 passes for 441 yards and four touchdowns. He suffered only two interceptions. Haile also led in receiving, with eight catches for 95 yards. On defense, senior linebacker Frank Dominguez led in tackles with 86. The 179-pounder also came up with a "lineman's dream" when he returned a fumble 60 yards for a touchdown against Lockney. Adam Bandy also had a long fumble return-a 61-yarder. Haile led a fourth category, interception returns, with a pair, which he returned a total of 124 yards, 62-yd average-an impressive statistic. Haile was second in
