# United Way Kicks Off Its 2001 Drive

Friona's 2001 United Way campaign kicked off on Tuesday of this week at a breakfast meeting for workers at Olga's Restaurant.

The goal for the 2001 drive is \$39,200, which is similar to the 2000 drive.

Once again this year, the fund drive will benefit the Friona Senior Citizens, with \$7500 budgeted for upkeep of the Friendship House at 15th Street and Washington. Another \$3,000 is budgeted

to assist with the twice-weekly meals that the organization sponsors.

New on the 2001 budget is \$1,400 to assist the Boys State/Girls State program, which is sponsored for a Friona High School junior through the American Legion Post. The money will be used to help with the students' traveling expenses to the convention, which is held in Austin each year.

Otherwise, there are ten

agencies which have been aided by the United Way for a number of years. These include the Boy Scouts/Cub Scouts program, which receives \$6,500, and the Girl Scouts/Brownie Scouts, also budgeted for \$6,500.

Also, the Kids, Inc., Friona program (summer baseball), budgeted for \$3,200; the Friona Meals on Wheels, \$2,000; Red Cross, \$2,500; Salvation Army, \$2,500.

In addition, the Panhandle Community Services organization is down for \$2,000; the Empty Stocking Fund at \$1,200; the Friona Emergency Fund, \$750.00 and the United Way of Texas, \$150.

Cecil Maddox is chairman of the Friona United Way board of directors; Rick White is drive chairman, Marca Lynn Herring is secretary and Larry Knowles is treasurer.

# Charge: Farmer Growing Corn, Melons, Marijuana

A Lazbuddie farmer, William Vernon Puckett, 74, was arrested by the Parmer County Sheriff's Department on Thursday, October 18, after tips and an investigation led to the discovery of a marijuana processing operation at the farm northeast of Lazbuddie.

Puckett lived in a home on the property, which is owned by his son. He was charged with possession, manufacture and delivery of marijuana more than 50 pounds but less than 2,000 pounds. He is out of jail on a \$10,000 bond.

Sheriff Randy Geries, acting on a tip, flew in an airplane over the area and found marijuana growing interspersed with the corn. Geries estimated the field covered about 10 acres.

The Sheriff said the investigation began when several Farwell youth were heard talking about the operation and marijuana was found at a Farwell school.

The Sheriff's department initiated a search warrant at the property and found a cutting, drying and processing operation in barns on the

farm, which is 1 1/2 miles from the Lazbuddie school. Geries said officers found 300 pounds of marijuana in one of

the barns.

The investigation into the operation is ongoing according to Sheriff Geries.

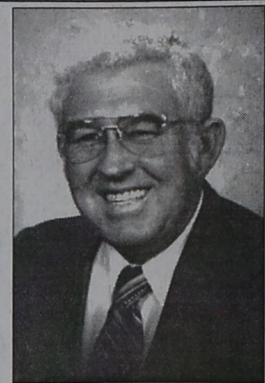

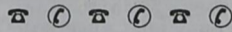

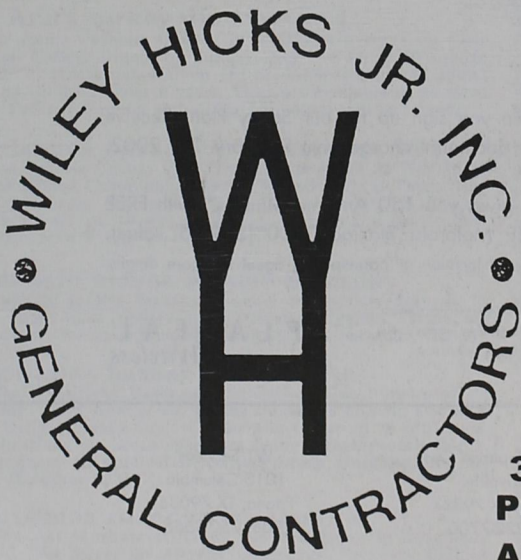

# Chiefs Meet Tough Abernathy On Road

The Chiefs, their coaches and fans have had October 26 circled on the 2001 schedule even before the season started.

The Chiefs meet Abernathy Friday, there, in a vital district game.

Friona edged Abernathy, 29-26 here last October, and the win gave the Chieftains the district title. Abernathy finished second.

This scenario doubtless isn't forgotten by the Antelopes and their fans.

Abernathy comes into Friday's game with a season mark of 7-1 and a spotless district record of 4-0.

The 'Lopes lead the area in offense, averaging 417 yards per game, 112 yards more than the Chiefs. Both schools' defensive average is on the low side. In fact, they're dead even, allowing 256 yards per game--11th and 12th in the Lubbock area.

Abernathy is averaging 34.4 points per game to 26.7

for Friona. The Antelopes have allowed 17.3 points per game, to 16.9 for Friona.

It could be pointed out that the Antelopes' pre-district schedule included three class A teams, Springlake-Earth, Plains and Sudan, and a AA team, Post.

Friona, on the other hand, met three class AAA teams, Muleshoe, Tulia and Dimmitt, plus Oklahoma class 4A Guymon. Muleshoe and Guymon both had high-octane offensive units.

Abernathy QB Matt Pierce paces the Antelopes, having passed for 1,053 yards, tops in the area, including nine touchdowns.

Antelope running back Kenneth McKinnon is the area's leading rusher with 1131 yards. Friona's Nathan Haile is fifth with 788 yards, having played one game less than McKinnon.

Friona leads the all-time series 9-6, but has had trouble beating the Antelopes on their home turf

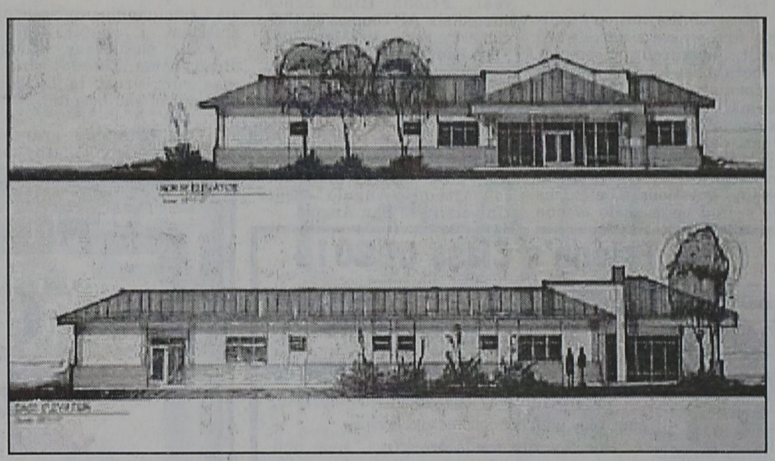

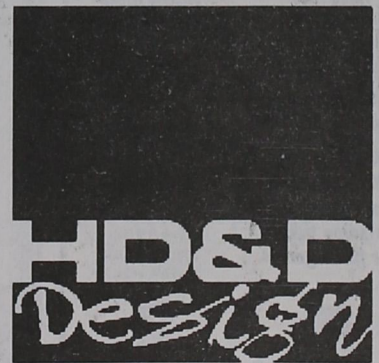

## FHS Senior Receives AP Scholar Award

Friona High School senior Roy Loya has been named an AP Scholar by the College Board in recognition of his exceptional achievement on the college-level AP Exams.

Only about 13 percent of the more than 840,000 students in 13,680 schools who took Advanced Placement Exams in May 2001 performed at a sufficiently high level to merit such recognition.

Students take AP Exams in May after completing challenging college-level courses at their high schools. The College Board recognizes several levels of achievement based on the number of year-long courses and exams.

Loya qualified for the AP Scholar Award by completing three or more AP Examinations with grades of three or higher.

Most of the nation's colleges and universities award credit, advanced placement, or both based on successful performance on the AP Exams. There are 35 AP Exams offered in 19 subject areas, each consisting of multiple choice and free-response (essay or problem solving) questions. The exams are scored on a scale of one

through five with five being the highest.

In the 2000-01 school year, Friona High School offered six AP courses in three subject areas. In May 2001, FHS had 49 students take 76 exams with their fees paid by Friona ISD. Of those 49 students there were 19 who scored a three or higher on at least one exam.

Roy Loya will graduate from FHS in May and hopes to attend Angelo State University in San Angelo.

## YOUR EYES

### Elevated Eye Blood Pressure

Ocular hypertension is a condition in which a person's eyes have a higher blood pressure than is considered normal with no noticeable damage to ocular structure. The term is used to distinguish people with elevated pressure from those with glaucoma, a serious eye disease that causes damage to the optic nerve and possible vision loss. Although ocular hypertension occurs in individuals of all ages and backgrounds, it is seen more often in African Americans, individuals over age 40 and those with family histories of this illness and/or glaucoma. People with nearsightedness or diabetes are more likely to have the condition as well.



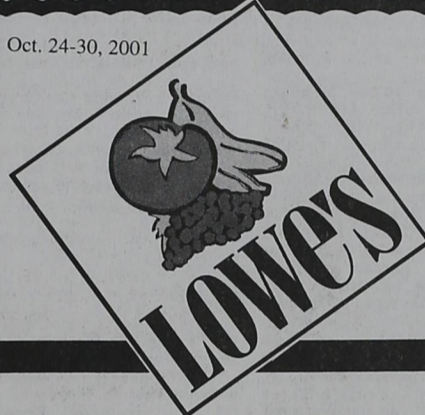
You will not know you have ocular hypertension since there are no symptoms. During your eye checkup, your visioncare specialist will check your blood pressure with an instrument called a tonometer. It is important for your eyecare professional to recognize signs of the condition, since people with ocular hypertension have an increased risk of developing serious vision problems.

# Out Here

"Texas Prop Voting For Dummies"

The State of Texas has a proposition for you.

Matter of fact, come November 6, they have 19 propositions for you. What it is is 19 more amendments to the Texas Constitution to add to the 350+ amendments already hanging on to our state constitution.

It seems that each biennial state legislative session, our elected legislative persons feel obligated to slap another wad of amendments on the state document.

When they put them out for voting though, they don't call them amendments. They call them propositions. And as any adult male knows by now, propositions are turned down more often than not.

If you can tear yourself

away from anthrax, bin Laden, smallpox, bankruptcies and lay-offs, you should go vote November 6 even though you don't have the foggiest idea what you are voting for.

You should vote to show your patriotism if no other reason. We are all in a red, white and blue mindset right now and voting is an unalienable right.

With 19 issues (propositions) to decide on, the special interest groups in Texas are bombarding newspapers like ours with stacks of materials on why we should vote yes or no.

For instance, Proposition 2 would authorize the issuance of \$175 million in

state general obligation bonds to build some roads in the "colonias" along the Mexico border.

The Texas Association of Business & Chambers of Commerce (TABBC) says you should vote yes on Proposition 2. TABBC has one agenda: jobs for Texas. Many of the border shantytowns are not even accessible by school bus.

They say better roads will attract business and help educate the kids which will improve the economy of Texas, especially South Texas.

That is only a warm-up. There are 18 more to consider. Don't lose interest.

Proposition 3 is a doozy. It authorizes an ad valorem tax exemption for raw cocoa and green coffee held in Harris County (Houston). Passing this one would qualify Houston as a coffee port.

One estimate I read was that #3 would mean over \$500 million a year in revenue to Texas. I guess I don't understand why our legislative persons couldn't just pass a bill authorizing this tax exemption and be done with it.

I didn't realize until now that Texas has a "fire fighters pension commissioner." Proposition 4 would increase the term of this commissioner from 2 to 4 years. It doesn't say why this is a good idea, but most experts advise voting "no" on #4 because all other executive posts in Texas are for two years and this one shouldn't be different.

Another one, Proposition 11, would allow teachers to receive pay for serving on local government boards. Some people say it would not be good for teachers to do this because it would take away

from their teaching and could be a conflict of interest.

The Dalls Morning News editors say vote "yes" for #11 but the Lubbock paper says vote "no" for it. Wow, and that is only the first three or four propositions.

This could get really boring. Most voters do not vote when they only have to choose between two candidates. How many will turn out Tuesday, November 6? Maybe 10% or less of all voters?

Most all experts say that Proposition 19 is the most important one. A "yes" vote on #19 will expand a bond fund the state uses to help smaller communities (like

ours) meet basic water needs. The state could issue \$2 billion in bonds for water projects that some towns cannot finance.

We gotta have water out here so get your tail over to the polling place and at least vote "yes" for Prop 19. (If you are a really "with it" person, you can call them "props" instead of propositions.)

So here you are. Clip this out and take it with you. The Dallas Morning News says vote "yes" on all props except #4, 6 and 14. Vote "no" on those three.

The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal says to vote "yes" on all props except #11. That is the teacher one.

Finally, the Houston Chronicle says vote "yes" on all props except #6 and #14. See how easy this is.

You can actually go vote and don't even have to know what you are doing there. Walk in, throw around a "prop" or two, look at these cheat notes and check the boxes.

That's it. Good job. God Bless America!
