NAVY CAPITULATES

Naval Forces Silence the Guns of That Place.

A WELL EXECUTED MOVEMENT.

The Warships and Gunboats Did Remarkably Effective Work and the Filipino Were Feared.

Manila, Sept. 25.—The United States cruiser Charleston, the monitor Montebello and the gunboats Concord and Zafro, with marines and blue jackets from the cruiser Baltimore, left Cavite Sept. 18, and proceeded to Subig bay to destroy an insurgent cannon there. Owing to the bad weather the operation was postponed until Saturday, when the warships for three hours bombarded the town of Olongapo and the intramuros where the gun was situated.

From the Charleston, Concord and Zafro were fired into the bay by heavy insurgent fire, proceeding to the cannon, which was utterly destroyed by a gun boat, and then returning to the warships.

The Americans had one man wounded during the engagement.

While waiting to sling his net for better weather the Americans described Filipino reinforcements moving toward Olongapo. At 6:40 a. m. Saturday the Monterey began the advance upon the town, which was about three miles east of the monitor's anchorage. The Charleston anchored and the Zafro followed.

At 7:15 the Monterey opened fire with her secondary and main batteries, the Charleston and Concord joining immediately in the bombardment.

At 7:35 the insurgent cannon was fired, the first shot passing close to the Monterey's smokestack. The gun was silenced twice.

At 9:30 the Monterey advanced to a range of 600 yards, using her main battery. Two hundred or more shells were landed about 11 o'clock under the cannon at 11 o'clock under the cannon at 11 o'clock.

Meanwhile the warships continued to shell the kneeling beach on the insurgent fire upon the saliers from the trenches skirting the beach.

Gunners Olsen exploded fifty pounds of dynamite, in three discharges, in the cannon, which was suffered from the fire of the warships.

Guthrie, Okla., Sept. 25.—The Rogers ranch in Beaver county, Oklahoma, and the Childers cattle ranch in the panhandle of Texas, containing 300,000 acres and upon which 300,000 cattle are grazing, has been purchased by Dr. R. Ellison of Fort Worth, Tex., for the Swift packing-house interests in Chicago. Titles to these great ranches are being examined with a view to purchase by the Swifts.

New York, Sept. 25.—The Quebec liner steamer Marsina, which has arrived from the West Indies, brought with it eight Chinese coolies and their wife and seven sons of the American schooner Newton of Boston, which was abandoned at sea on Sept. 23, during a hurricane in the Gulf of Mexico. The British steamer Fombahli and landed at St. Thomas on the 15th. It carried on board a party of 40 Chinese for San Juan, Puerto Rico, Aug. 15 with a cargo of lumber.
