AUSTRO-GERMANS CLAIM

THE WHOLE RUSSIAN FRONT THROWN BACK

AUSTRO-GERMAN FORCES . JR-SUING FLEEING SLAVS IN WEST GALICIA

Claims Important Successes at Many Points On Eastern Battle Front

Burlin, May 3, via London An Important Austrian victory in the eastern campaign is announced in the communication issued today from Germany army headquarters. The etatement is made that the Austrians have pushed back and broken the entire Russian front in Western Gal

"In the western theatre of Yesterday we successfully attacked in Flanders to the northeast of Pool-Chappelle-Ypres road and took the farm of Fortuin southeast of St. Juliens. In the Champagne district we inflicted considerable damage on the enemy's position by successful

mine operations. "Between the Meuse and the Moselle there were only artillery duels. Last night the French made an unsuccessful attack on the summit of

"A French flying machine landed yesterday at Handlignen in Lorraine and both its occupants were captured. A German aeroplane squadron attacked the airship hangar and railparently with good results.

'In the eastern theatre: During we are pursuing in the direction of Riga we yesterday took four machine guns and 4 rapid firers. We also took creased to 3200. The Russian attacks to the southeast to Kalwarya failed with heavy losses to the enemy. The Russians were driven back at Cazeaniga leaving 830 prisoners in our

Russians also suffered a heavy defeat in which they fost a great number in killed and 100 taken prisoners.

Col Von Mackenzen the allied Austro-German troops yesterday, after bitter fighting everywhere pierced and crushed the entire Russian front in west Galicia from the neighborhood of the Hungarian frontier to the junc tion of the Dnuject river with the Vis. tula. Such of the enemy as succeed ed in escaping are in hasty retreat toward the north closely pursued by the allied troops. The trophies of the victory cannot yet even be approxi mately estimated."

WOMAN SUFFRAGE IN TEXAS BY STATUTE

RESOLUTION IN HOUSE INDI-CATES EFFORT IN THIS DIRECTION

Report Promised By Insurance Committee On Cibson Bill By Thursday

Austin, Texas, May 3.—That an attempt may be made during the present session of the legislature to act a woman's suffrage law wifffout the aid of constitutional amendment and by statuatory law became evident today in the House. "Hope," he said, "in a large ingred-tent, in the composition of human happiness. It is the active element in faith. Faith is the assurance of things hoped for. It is the element of outreaching in faith which makes faith vital. Hope is future. It has nothing to do with the past with its failures and misfortunes and memores, but it reaches away from the past toward the future where those faffures are not to be known again. Hope leaves wisdom from the past Hope refers only to the good evil moment we might wish ties of the word in an abuse of its true meaning. Meetings Continue This Week Daily at 9:30 a. m. and 8 O'clock

Instead, he continued, they are caught in the whire of the times against their will, speeding along without doing justice their homes, their business, their church or their posterity.

Men who rushed thus through life became nervous wrecks physically and unhappy mentally, said Dr. Miller. The devil has few happy old men, he said. Men of today frequently do not the beauties of nature, Dr. Miller continued, and he frevently thanked God that these beauties had been revealed to him. He spoke in pity of the man who could not see the Almighty in the wonders of nature, and told of the happiness of the man who could read God in the stars or catch His song. The verse "Thou hast created man a little lower than the angels," said Dr. Miller, was now translated, in the newer versions, to read "a little lower than God."

"God doesn't call you from the bigness of life," said Dr. Miller, calls you from the littleness and the meanness. He calls you to forsake the little things. Will you say yes to Him?"




