POLA AUSTRIA'S ADVANCED BASE

CITY ON ISTRIAN PENINSULA, DUAL MONARCHY'S CHIEF NAVAL STATION

MOST STRONGLY FORTIFIED

One of Best Protected Ports of the World and Its Strong Menace To Italy

Recent dispatches from Rome seem to indicate that there is to be yet another battle front in the great world struggle, which front would stretch from a point where Austria, Italy and Switzerland meet, to the Italian border on the north Adriatic, around the Gulf of Venice, and thence along the coastline of Trieste, Istria and Dalmatia to the line of Montenegrin soldiers at the rocks of Montenegro. In connection with the possibility of such a situation, the National Geographic Society tells the story of Pola, the formidable Austrian war port, removed but a few hours steaming across the Adriatic from the rich eastern coast cities of Italy.

"Pola, the chief naval station and arsenal of the Dual Monarch and one of the best-protected ports in the world, may soon become known wherever war correspondence is read as the most vital strategic point on a new wide sweeping battle front. For Pola is the Heligoland of the Austrians toward their Italian neighbors, and in case of a rupture between these peoples, it would be Austria's most powerful advanced base.

Harbor Land Locked.
"Pola lies at the southern apex of the Istrian peninsula about 53 miles south of Trieste. Its almost completely landlocked harbor is one of the finest of Europe, and upon its rocky, well guarded surface a great fleet could hide safely at anchor. The harbor has an area of three and one-third square miles, while beyond the channel entrance is a forewater dominated by the guns of the Brionian Islands.

"History begins for this little known city with its first capture by the Romans in 178 B. C. Pola has been a war port since its appearance in the ancient chronicles. It was since the strongest and widest of these Istrian pirate retreats, where the rebellious spirits of the Roman world empire gathered, and whence they made their raids upon the rich commerce that flowed from every eastern Mediterranean port to Rome. The Romans destroyed the place. Under the Emperor Septimius Severus, 193 A. D., it again became an important war harbor city and grew to 50,000 inhabitants.

HOPE ESSENTIAL TO HAPPINESS

Rev. Smith Delivers Third of a Series at the First Methodist Church

ject "Something to Hope" preach attitude Rev. C. C. Smith preached the third of a series of sermons on human happiness at the First M. E. Church last night, taking as his subject "Something to Hope" and preaching from the text: "If in this life only we have hope in Christ we are of all men most miserable." 1 Cor. 15:19.

"Hope," he said, "is a large ingredient in the composition of human happiness. It is the active element in faith. Faith is the assurance of things hoped for. It is the element of outreaching in faith which makes faith vital. Hope is future. It has nothing to do with the past with its failures and misfortunes and memories, but it reaches away from the past toward the future where those failures are not to be known again. Hope leaves wisdom from the past and sees a more perfect day coming. Hope refers only to the good. In an evil moment we might wish some disaster upon some one who has wronged us but we can scarcely hope that such calamity will come. Such use of the word is an abuse of its true meaning. Hope is associated only with benevolent thought and feeling and as such is certainly to be a factor in producing the happiness which we are discussing. Hope has to do with our desires when they have been first subjected to the Divine Will. One whose mind heart and will have been fixed on God will not hope for something which he finds to be against God's will even though his natural impulses prompt him to desire it.

"Hope is full of inspiration. We know something of the power of hope over the body. It is a well known fact that when an invalid loses hope his chance for winning in the battle for health becomes very poor. This same principle holds in the moral life. When a man loses hope for his moral well-being for his soul, there is little chance to help him—no chance unless hope can be kindled anew. Hope then is the spring of all healthy living both physical and spiritual. Hope is the spring of all noble action. We have a motive for everything we do and though at times the motive may be very ill defined in our thoughts, there is still a motive. We would not have hope in back of everything that we do that is worth while. We are hoping for some good to come of it. Man is so constituted mentally that he must have some object in view. There is no way to explain the intense activity of those apart from the pursuit of some end which they hope to obtain. The man who is alert and active in business is impelled by hope. Take this moving factor out of his life and he slackens his pace and eventually becomes indolent. If there is nothing to be gained by effort why should he try? This is the way we reason. We hope to get something out of it. It is like a dead engine shoved onto the tracks with the motive power gone. He has the machinery for action but no motive. A man may follow an unworthy object and find a degree of happiness in the pursuit of it. The contrary thing has the power to bring on happiness for a long time. When we discover the fact that our chief object of devotion is transient and insufficient we lose hope in it and must reach out for something else and so on continuously until we find the abiding in which our rest content. We must be content on something which has an abiding quality. The thinking man looks over everything that the earth has to offer and finds nothing that can long abide. He may find that which has furnished the chief object of devotion for some men all through their natural life but he has seen their pass on and leave their gods behind. There is nothing of our own invention or in the earth around about us but what is plainly of a passing character. What shall man do? He must have an anchorage for his hope somewhere or else all worthy effort will die out. If there is nothing to come of effort there will be no effort. Only when he has fixed his hope upon the unchanging one is there a sense of security and an assurance of a worthy outcome to worthy effort.

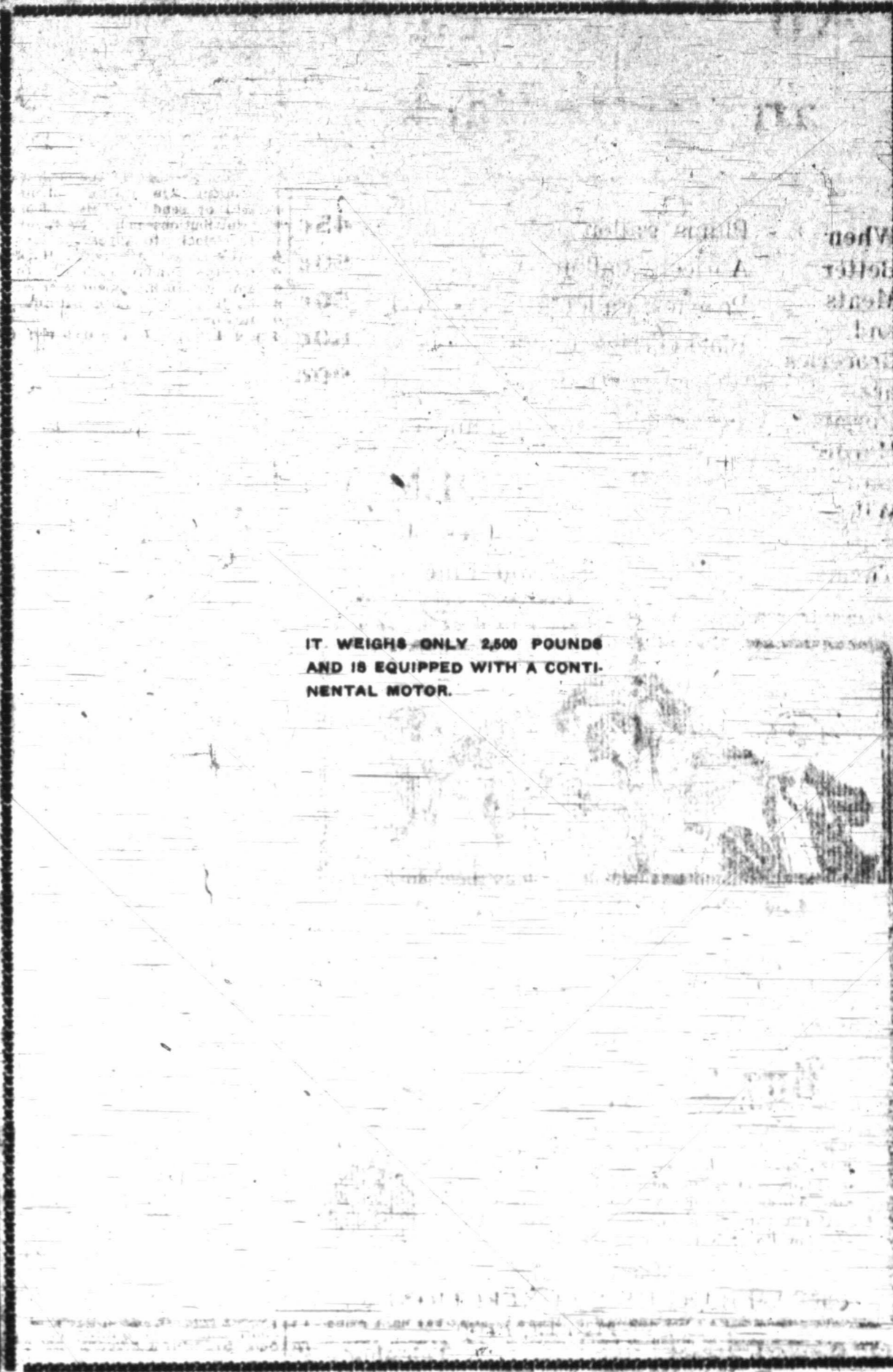
When man has a consciousness of some family anchored in God then he sees the drifting away of earthly things and still the unmovable. It is hope that makes the life of life tolerable. At best there is much of sorrow and many hardships in this life. It can not be otherwise in the very nature of things. Hope in God carries men over the hard places. It is God's good; God will bring me through the ordeal cleansed in soul. Some day all the ills of life will be passed and joy shall reign. Thus reason the soul who has hope in God. Many are living a sacrificial life and their hope were denied them they would not have reason to make the sacrifice. The most beautiful of lives would be left without a purpose to live. But since they see him who is invisible they endure, counting that the afflictions which are but for a time will work for them an exceeding glory. Hope is the secret of all sacrificial living. We hope for a future when there will be no ill to endure and we hope that we shall be as we must suffer shall of itself be of some value to the world.

"Hope is a vital factor looking to eternity. God has set eternity in our hearts and it is a considerable concern to humanity whether or not that eternity is to be happy. Hope of reward is strong in all religions. It is not the largest motive for serving God but it is an inconsiderable motive. It does not prove a man selfish if he has a hope that in recognition of a righteous life God should count him worthy of eternal life. The masses of mankind have some hope of a better life. In a vague way they hope sheds a divine radiance over all lives. It is our privilege not only to have this indirect radiance but to have the full assurance of hope and be happy. We have at best a sense of incompleteness in this life. Our divinely inspired hope that we shall have an opportunity to complete what is only begun here makes life worth living well today. All the big things of life seem to overlap into eternity. We need more years in which to mature the finer qualities of the soul. Happiness is inseparably connected with all of these and the thinking man can not rest content apart from them. How can an intelligent man be happy when he knows that everything to which he has given himself is soon to pass away. His supreme pursuit when attained is only a bubble that vanishes with the grasping. The man who follows any call of earthly joy as his supreme good will find with the Wise Man that it is all vanity and vexation of spirit.

"Something to hope therefore gives motive and earnestness and worthwhileness to life. It is the moving power back of all noble living. It gives meaning to life. When we have hope we have something to live for. Hope furnishes a reward for living commensurate with the cost of right living. Hope gives meaning to immortality. We care nothing for immortality apart from hope. We might even say that immortality apart from hope is something far worse than ceasing to be. If we go into the great beyond without hope we might indeed hope that instead of going into eternal living without hope we might go into eternal nothingness. Hope to be vital must center in the unchanging. God only is unchanging. We must fix our hope in him if we would have the feeling of security so necessary to our happiness. Such a hope will enable us to endure trial, will make all of earth's joys brighter, will cast a halo of light around us and make our path a way of peace."

HAD SYSTEM IN HIS WORK How Sir Walter Scott Gave to the World Prose and Poem That is Immortal.

Walter Scott rose at five o'clock and was writing away rapidly at six, so that he "broke the neck of the day's work before breakfast." This was his regular program. While he was bathing and dressing, his thoughts were "hammering" in his brain, so that he dashed them off "pretty easily" when the pen was in his hand. With no interruption except for breakfast, he worked steadily till eleven or twelve o'clock. By this system, very rarely broken, he could afford a ride after lunch, and at one o'clock, rain or shine, he would mount his big horse for a gallop over the hills. The pictures he saw of these rides are in his books, and so is the joyous outdoor spirit. One of his first poems, "Marmion," was practically written on horseback, the lines coming into his brain while he trained his regiment, raced over the moors or plunged through floods. And just as he would not let his horse cheat his outdoor life, he would not let it cheat his children or his friends. Adriane Gilbert observes in St. Nicholas. When Irving visited him, he had to excuse himself after breakfast to correct proof; but often he wrote in a room filled with people. Perhaps he used manuscript sheets the same size as letter paper, so that he might write his books and yet seem to be writing a common letter. 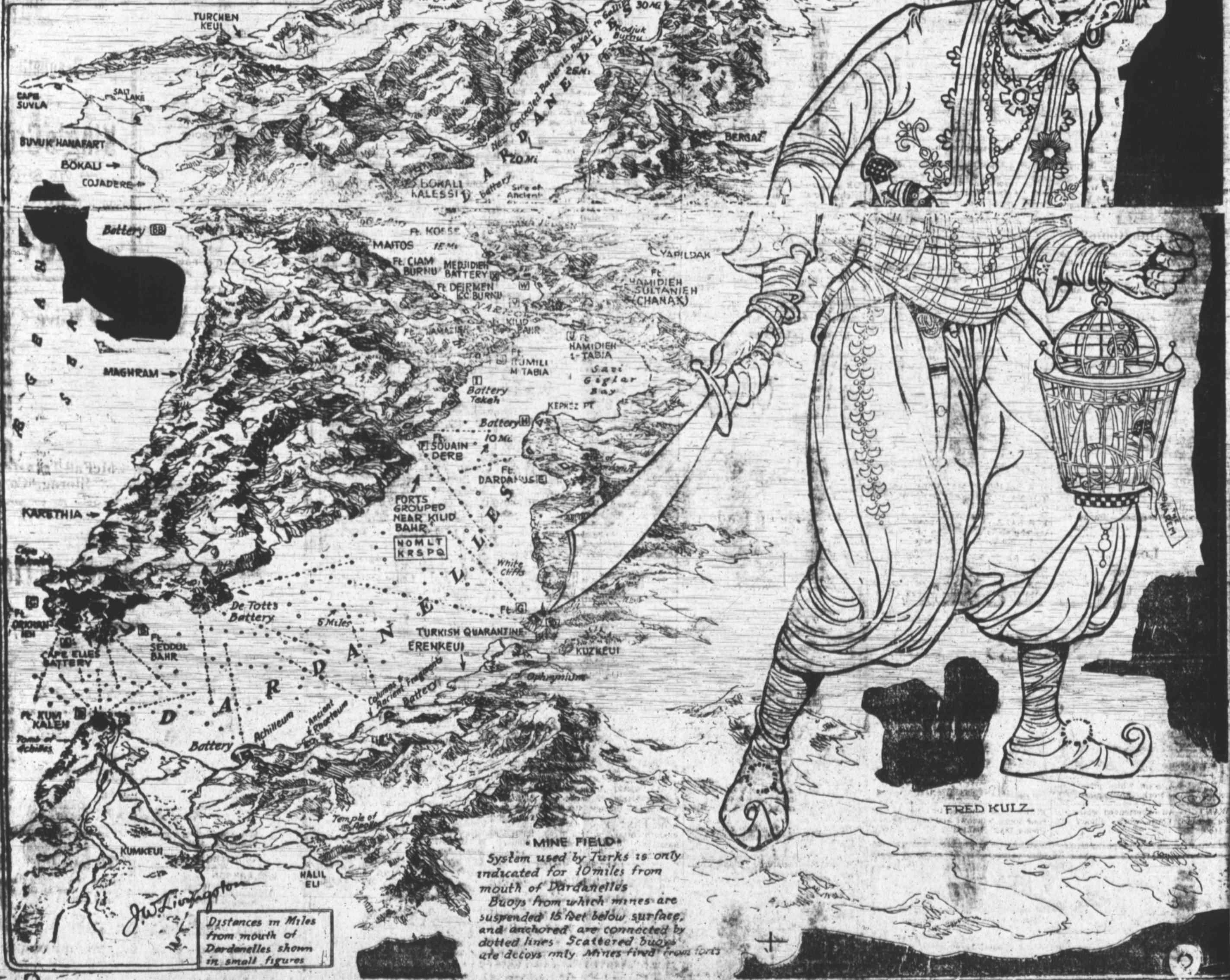
