# DENOUNCED

### As In Belgium, Most Of Serbia

Is Now Occupied By Enemies



Owing to the rapid advance of the Teutons from the north and northwest and of the Bulgarians from the north and northeast, vainly opposed by the Servians, most of Servia, both old Servia, as it was constituted before the first and second Balkan wars, and new Servia, as it was calarged at the expense of Turkey, is now held by the invading enemy. The main Servian army, under General Putaik, which has been operating in the north, has been encompassed on every side but one and, being cut off from the south by the Bulgarian advance beyond Tetovo, must depend upon the rough roads through Montenegro and Albania for any supplies from the soa. In the south must depend upon the rough roads through Montenegro and Albania for any supplies from the sea. In the south the Servian position is almost as bad. The success of the Bulgarians' flank in attack on Babuna Pass and their advance from Veles have prevented the hoped for junction of the Servian and French forces. This left the Servians only two lines of retreat, one into Albania, where they may be harassed by unfriendly tribes, and the other across the Greek border, where they were in danger of being disarmed and interned. It was to prevent the latter eventuality that the entente powers put forth every effort.






