

My Good Old Boy Bill was inducted into the Panhandle Press Hall of Fame in Amarillo for his over 40 years in the newspaper business, and then just three days later he was named Friona's Man of the Year. That was almost more than his old ticker could take. He has never been one of those "big ego" guys, but he certainly is enjoying the notoriety that comes with these two fantastic honors.
And if all that wasn't enough, it was followed up with Buddy Peeler's "Bill & Carol" day on KNNK and a steak dinner for two at K-Bob's in Hereford. So I guess it also pays to be the wife of the Hall of Fame-er and Man of the Year. Our son Rick want't able to travel all the way from California for the honors, but he tells us that he's having a shirt made up that says "Im the son of the Man of the Year!"
You may not know that at the end of every year, the newspapers for that year are bound into a large hard-back volume, like a very big book, measuring 14 X 23 inches. With both the Friona and Bovina papers, Bill has published 67 books (volumes) in the 39 years we have lived in Parmer County. A large portion of the history of Friona and Bovina is contained in those volumes.
Our week of honors and awards started out rather precariously. When we reached the Ambassdor Hotel in Amarillo after picking up son Stan at the airport that Friday (April 6), it was really windy. Since Bill lost the sight in one eye, his depth perception is really screwy; so he has to be especially careful going up and down steps and stairways. Just ask all the folks who were on the FSB Seniors' bus tour of New England last Fall about Bill and stairs. (By the way, I want to take this opportunity to thank all of you sweet souls who have helped Bill get up and down the bleachers at the football games when he has to go all the way up to the press box.) 

As soon as it is apparent that the Physician decides that a transfer is in the best interest of the patient, we notify the receiving Physician, so the patient has an accepting doctor and destination. Then we notify Friona PD, they than page the EMS. This decision is the Physician's to make. We are not ALWAYS aware of the personnel status, unless we are notified. We run on a 7/24/365 schedule also. Schedules are made for four weeks at a time. We service Parmer County as you do, and do the best job we can. It's easier to work together when the left hand knows what the right hand is doing. This has nothing to do with ego. This has to do with taking care of the people of Parmer County in the best way possible and give them the care they deserve, in as timely as manner as possible. We run abe difficult to provide, because of rising costs, lack of funds and decrease in personnel, (that includes nursing). Granted, there are politics everywhere, but at whose expense? As for the helicopter, it should be used for 1 life or 1 limb threatening transfers, not because coverage can't be found. There was a time when there was only one ambulance and no paramedic. And we were still able to make transfers out of town. We're not saying that the addition of another ambulance and paramedics has not increased continuity of care, we're just saying that these resources should be utilized in a way that everyone has access to, and use of the medical care they deserve

utilized in a way that everyone has access to, and use of the medical care they deserve. We nurses care very little for politics, egos and self-righteous attitudes, we do want to take care of our patients in the safest, fastest and most effective way possible. As for the "6 hour" window of opportunity, the medication should be given within 6 hours of the occurrence, not when the occurrence, not when the effective. We realize that patients are brought in by other EMS and Friona is more often relied upon to transfer those patients to other facilities. Maybe the issues in question should be brought up, discussed and hopefully an answer can be found that will benefit everyone. The EMS, the hospital, but most of all, the people we are here to take care of. The article went on to say that Motorola reported its first quarterly loss in 16 years. They have cut 22,000 jobs since December and said more positions will be slashed. Motorola lost \$533 million in the first quarter of this year. They had a profit of \$448 million in the first quarter last year. That is almost a \$1 BLLLION swing in revenue in one year. They lost about \$2.75 million a day every day including weekends. I wonder if any of those 0,000 people they are firing include the brilliant executives who got them in the mess in the first place. 





Local Girl Reports On European Trip

BY JONI JOHNSON Recently I had the opportunity to travel to London, England with a group of students and teachers from West Texas A&M University. The Ag Commodities class that I am taking was given a chance to isit London by the teacher Dr. Don Williams. We left Tuesday, March 13, from the Amarillo International Airport, stopped in Houston to change planes and then left on the nine hour flight to the London Gawick Airport. We arrived Wednesday around 10 a.m. After arriving we went to petroleum Exchange and watched the New York Market open and also watched the traders trade commodities.

watched the traders trade commodities. Thursday, our group met with the International Grain Council and learned about the rapidly changing international trading environment. The IGC only has a staff of fifteen people but they know everything that is going on in the world even right down to our high gas prices and the effect that may have on corn production. After the meeting with the Bank of England. here we learned about how the bank can change the interest rates; how the currency is made;; and change the interest rates; how the currency is made;; and that about 400,000 tons of gold is stored under the building. This night I also had the chance to see "Cats: and "Phantom of the Opera" in the theater in Leicester Square.

In the theater in Leicester Square. Friday, we had a meeting with the U.S. Meat Export Federation at the U.S. Embassy. This was the best meeting I got to attend because we were able to learn first hand the effects of the foot and mouth disease. The Embassy told us that they will not know the full effects of the foot and mouth disease and the mass slaughters on the economy for at least two to three years. We learned that in order to try to contain the disease everything within five miles of the largest infected areas will be killed, healthy or sick. These extreme measures are being taken because only 5% of sheep that have foot and mouth will show any signs of the disease. I was able to bring back several newspapers which show the devastation these farmers are facing, especially the sheep



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

Don't make hasty decisions based on today's headlines. There are at least two good reasons why you shouldn't rush to sell your beleaguered stocks. First, if the media have been spotlighting a company's bad news, it's likely that the stock price isn't just down-it may be way down. And as you'll recall, the basic rule of investing is to "buy low and sell high." If it's at all possible, you'll usually want to avoid selling a stock when its price is low.

A cornea transplant replaces the scarred or cloudy cornea with a clear one that has been received from a cornea donor shortly after death. Once you and the doctor decide you need a corneal transplant, your name is put on a list at the local eye bank. Surgery is often done on an outpatient basis. The operation is painless. Anesthesia is either local or general, depending on your age, medical condition and eye disease.
