EXPECTED TO COME UP AT THIS TERM OF ARKANSAS FEDERAL COURT

## MYSTERIOUS DEATH FEATURES

Being Investigated—Three Former Officials of Revenue Department Involved

By Associated Press. Fort Smith, Ark., Jan. 10.—Three former officials of the United States internal revenue department and four other men alleged to have been involved probably will go to trial at the term of the United States district court which opened here today, on charges growing out of the so-called "Moonshine Conspiracy," by means of which it is alleged, the government has been defrauded of thousands of dollars through the manufacture and sale of illicit whisky.

Government officials would not predict the exact date on which the cases would be called but it was known that the government is anxious to clear up the prosecutions at this term of court. The defendants, too, were said to be ready to put their fate in the hands of a jury.

Those called for trial are James L. Surber, Atlanta, Ga., former superintendent of the Georgia revenue division; J. W. Grider, Sonora, Ark., and Newton C. Spradling, Aurora, Mo., former government whisky gaugers; J. B. Thomas, a Fort Smith saloon keeper; Moses B. Brook, Salisbury, N. C., an alleged owner of one of the

moonshine distilleries. James L. Smith, Atlanta, Ga., and Will Smith of Fort Smith.

The indictments against the men resulted from the operations of the J. C. Brewbaker distillery in this city. This distillery, according to the government's allegations, operated without a license from the middle of March, 1914, to the latter part of April, 1915, after the revenue department had placed its official seals upon the doors. Without the official knowledge of the government, this distillery bought great quantities of supplies, water, gas, machinery and power and turned out thousands of gallons of liquor without paying a government tax, according to indictments. The illicit product, the government avers, was shipped to a distilling concern in Kansas City, whence it was distributed to the wholesale and retail trade of the Southwestern states.

The United States grand jury returned indictments against more than a score of persons on charges of being connected with the fraud and at the October term of the United States District Court here, John T. Casper of Kansas City, the broker of the conspiracy and four other pleaded guilty and were sentenced to terms ranging from one to nine years in Leavenworth prison. Casper drew the most severe sentence—nine years in prison and a fine of \$33,000. The men now are in prison.

One of the leaders in the conspiracy—Knox Booth—died three days after his former associates in the conspiracy had pleaded guilty and government detectives still are investigating the circumstances of his death. Booth was superintendent of the Tennessee revenue district. According to his own confession, any government officials, he took bribes from the "moonshiners." Booth is said to have aided the government in bringing the principals in the conspiracy to trial. He was in Fort Smith in October ready to testify against the conspirators, but the plans of guilty made this unnecessary.

When Booth left Fort Smith the day after the sentence of Casper and the four other men, he is said to have told friends he feared for his personal safety. Three days later he died suddenly in Memphis, Tenn., while returning home from Fort Smith. His body was exhumed and an analysis made of his stomach.

Booth was under indictment on charges of conspiracy and of accepting bribes from Casper and from Guy L. Harman of Kansas City. Harman, alleged to have been Casper's business associate, was arrested but permitted a \$25,000 bond in Kansas City and now is said to be in Mexico.

Surber, Grider, Spradling, Thomas and James Smith, are defendants in an indictment charging thirty-four men, including the four named above, with operating a distillery here from July 1, 1912, to April 23, 1915; a year before the government alleged the Brewbaker distillery operated illegally.

The Brewbaker plant in the gas form, occupied by the firm's distillers, the alleged owners, J. C. Brewbaker of Kansas City, against whom a number of indictments were returned, is

located on the north side of the city. The plant, valued at \$100,000, was removed without payment of the customary tax of \$1,000 a year.

## JURY IS UNABLE TO AGREE AFTER BEING OUT 30 HOURS

No Agreement in Case of Men Alleged to Have Tried to Hold Up Sheriff

After being out about thirty hours the jury in the case of Leo Morgan and Jim Jenkins charged with highway robbery was discharged late Sunday afternoon its members being unable to agree on a verdict. When the jury stood eleven to one for a verdict of guilty, the men were ordered to have attempted to hold up Sheriff George Hawkins.

The twelve jurors, it is understood, was willing to vote for a verdict of guilty, but insisted on a suspended sentence, which the officers were unwilling to grant. There was no change after the first ballot.

The alleged attempt to hold up the sheriff was made one Sunday night last November. A man accused of highway robbery and voluntary manslaughter was taken to a place where he could get a drink. He led the sheriff to the alley between Indiana and Ohio on 11th street, where two other men appeared. One of them, according to the testimony, continued to hold up the sheriff, but failed to pull his gun. George did not get the latter got the drop on them. The man who started him to the place got away.

## FIRST NATIONAL DEPOSITS

### GAIN 125 PER CENT IN 1915

Are \$60,000 More Than Figures Published in The Times of Sunday Morning

Deposits of the First National Bank on December 31st, were \$1,288,115.50, which is \$60,000.00 more than the figure appearing in The Times of Sunday relative to the total bank deposits. The error being made in copying the figures. The state bank, referring to the deposits of the City National Bank gives the figures announced by that bank at close of business January 6th, and not for December 31, the date of the last call by the Federal Controller. The First National's deposits on December 31, 1915 were \$283,336.61, the gain during the year being \$704,278.89, an increase of nearly 125 per cent.

## Woman Medical Worker in Serbia Wears "Teddy Bear" Costume to Avoid Infection




MRS. STOBART IN HER "TEDDY BEAR" SUIT.

STATE ZOOLOGICAL AND BOTANICAL GARDEN PLANNED

By Associated Press.

Austin, Texas, Jan. 10.—Establishment of a state zoological and botanical garden is to be urged at the next regular session of the state legislature. The idea was suggested by a citizen of Austin to the Chamber of Commerce which will draft an appropriation bill for that purpose.
