

MAKE THE MAJORITY FOR THE BONDS BIGGER THAN BEFORE

WICHITANS ARE URGED TO VOTE BONDS

COMMITTEE STRESSES IMPORTANCE OF ALL GOING TO POLLS AND VOTING FOR NEW COURT HOUSE TOMORROW

MAKING APPEALS

Those Not Qualified To Vote Still Have Time to Do So—Hope to Carry Bond Issue By Larger Majority Than Before

Personal appeals to all Wichitans to go to the polls tomorrow and register for their approval of the bond issue for the court house are being made today to taxpayers, and every effort is being put forth by the citizens' committee, headed by C. W. Bean, to secure a majority that will exceed that in the former election. It is believed that if every Wichitan who favors the bonds will vote that way tomorrow, the majority will be far in excess of that registered previously, and the importance of going to the polls is being urged today.

There will be two polling places in the city, one at the city hall and the other at the court house. Those in the city hall precinct will vote at the city hall, while voters in the other city boxes vote at the court house. The citizens' committee is endeavoring to make it understood that ownership of real estate is not necessary to qualify one to vote tomorrow.

"If you are assessed for any amount of personal property," says a statement issued by the committee, "in any sum, whether it be for a watch, musical instrument, furniture or anything, you are entitled to cast your ballot. If you have not been assessed and would like to vote for this much needed improvement, kindly advise us at Bloom & Anderson Building, or phone No. 358."

The committee points out that if a voter renders property valued at \$5, his tax for the court house would be two cents. Attention is called to the fact that a last year's poll tax is necessary for voters. It is understood that there will be no opposition in the country, as there was before, but there are reasons for believing that there will be more support, in proportion than there was in the earlier election. There is little cause to doubt that there will be sufficient opposition to make it all possible for every resident of Wichita Falls who favors the bonds to go to the polls and vote. Many Wichitans who were not qualified before have since qualified themselves and their vote will probably result in a larger vote in the city, but the attitude of a great majority of the county voters is such that it is clearly up to Wichita Falls to do her utmost and poll the largest vote possible.

It is a matter of regret to many Wichitans that opposition should be so pronounced in the country, it being felt that the bond issue is deserving of the support of the entire county. The fact that Wichita Falls pays such an overwhelming proportion of the county's taxes, however, is considered as amply justifying the determination of this city to carry the bonds.

Some votes have been made for the bonds as a result of juries being kept overnight in the present court house during the recent cold spell. The jurors thus confined experienced extreme discomfort, and some had to wear their overcoats in the jury box to keep from suffering. Those conditions would be remedied in a new court house.

VICTORY FOR BRITISH FORCES IN THAT THEATRE IS REPORTED TODAY

TURKS ARE RETIRING

Have Fallen Back to Within Six Miles of Kut el Amara, Statement Declares

London, Jan. 17.—Announcement was made in the House of Commons today that the Turkish forces in Mesopotamia have fallen back to within six miles of Kut el Amara.

The announcement was made by J. Austen Chamberlain, secretary for India, who said that the Turks had retreated as the result of another British victory. The Turkish position at Wadi, he said, were varied Saturday by the British.

Retreat apparently is in sight for the British force under Gen. Townshend that has been in a precarious position at Kut el Amara in Mesopotamia for some time since it was compelled to fall back from the vicinity of Baghdad.

It was officially announced in London that the other British divisions, Avonmore proceeding to the Tigris river had inflicted a defeat on the Turks who have been driven out of their positions at Wadi had fallen back to within six miles of Kut el Amara. They had been beaten previously at Erbil, 27 miles down the Tigris from Kut el Amara, according to a British official announcement yesterday.

In the Caucasus, the offensive by the Russians with strong reinforcement columns along a 100-mile front appears to be gaining force. The Turks evidently have a determined resistance, one side of the declaration that their position was only after they had held strong Russian forces in check for a week.

Vigo, Spain, Jan. 17.—Wireless calls for help were received yesterday from the steamer Talle which was reported afloat in the Gulf of Biscay.

New York, Jan. 17.—Edward W. Kelly, J. J. Connelley, Max Jacobson and Richard Wambert, accused in a federal indictment of conspiracy to obstruct justice and to defame the government in violation of the Espionage laws, pleaded guilty today in New York.

NEW CONSERVATION MEASURE IS PASSED

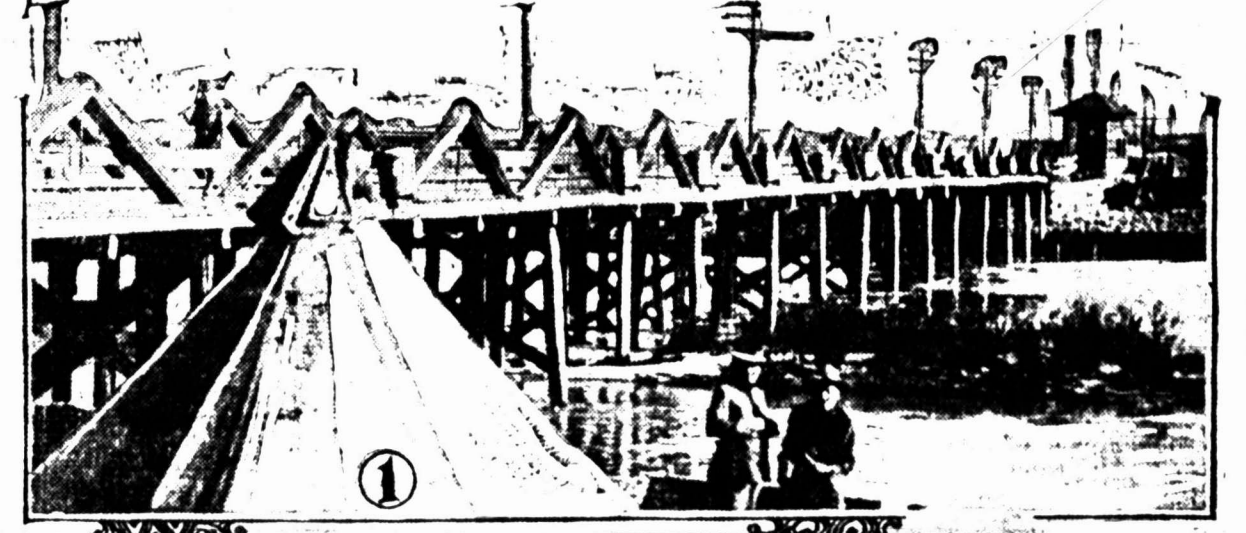
Relief for Oil Men Whose Lands the Government Took Is Among the Features

Washington, January 17.—The second of the administration conservation measures, which passed Saturday in the House was the bill under which more than 700,000,000 acres of public land will be thrown for lease for private interests, passed the House today after a roll call. Immediate action after the 60-acre homestead bill was taken up with a prospect that it would be passed early next week. Opposition to the land lease bill was confined principally to four western representatives, as in the case of the water power leasing bill passed last week. Lead by Representative Mondell of Wyoming a group of members from the western states opposed particularly the provision under which the best oil resources on public lands in California and Wyoming would be developed under federal leases. They contend that each state should be permitted to regulate such development within its borders.

GARMENT WORKERS ARE NOW ON STRIKE

About 6,000 Out in Philadelphia For Higher Wages and Better Conditions

Philadelphia, Jan. 17.—Garment workers numbering about 6,000 struck here today for higher wages and better conditions. About 250 factories are closed. The operators say several thousand non-union workers will join them. Most of the strikers are women and girls. All the factories are picketed. The demands of the strikers are for a 50-hour week a maximum of four hours a night when working nights, a fifteen per cent increase in wages, a minimum of six dollars per week for women and eight dollars for men; the appointment of grievance and arbitration committees and the supplying by employers of all materials used.

MRS. PANKHURST IS ALLOWED ENTRANCE

President is Opposed to Exclusion of Suffragist Leader From This Country

Washington, Jan. 17.—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the suffragist leader, now on parole in New York under the immigration authorities will formally be admitted to the United States soon after the papers in her case reach Washington. President Wilson is opposed to her exclusion. Mrs. Pankhurst is working in behalf of the Serbian relief movement.

INSURANCE INSTITUTIONS SUBSCRIBES TO ITALIAN NOTE

Rome, Jan. 17.—The Stephani Agency announces that 27,000,000 lire has been subscribed to the new national note by the national insurance institutions.

ZERO WEATHER IN EASTERN SECTION

Freezing Belt Extends to Gulf Coast—Continued Cold is Predicted

Washington, Jan. 17.—The cold wave spreading over the country and of the Mississippi today had reached the freezing line down to the Gulf coast and the line of zero temperature as far south as the Ohio river. Rain and snows mostly slight prevailed over the east and south and sleet has been experienced as far south as Mobile. Continued cold is promised for tonight and Tuesday in the Atlantic states with a cold wave in the south extending into central Florida.

FOOD SHORTAGE CAUSING DISTRESS TO BULGARIANS

Paris, Jan. 17.—Bulgarians at Gagra and Odessa are suffering greatly from the lack of food, according to information published by the newspaper Patria of Athens and forwarded by the Hava correspondent. They are obliged to transport provisions from Velez to Gagra by mule or on foot.

NEW YORK TO HAVE \$3,000,000 CHURCH

New York, Jan. 17.—This city is to have a new \$3,000,000 church edifice. Plans for a new building for St. Bartholomew Episcopal parish were made today today; they provide for one of the finest churches of the city to be erected at Park Avenue and 50th street.

SERBIAN OFFICIALS TO STAY IN ITALY

Members of Government and Diplomatic Corps Have Arrived at Brindisi

Rome, Jan. 17.—Forty members of the Serbian government have arrived here from Scutari accompanied by diplomats of the allied powers accredited to Serbia.

SERBIANS TO REMAIN IN ITALY FOR SOME TIME

Rome, Jan. 17.—The Italian National news the Serbian government will have headquarters at Brindisi for some time. Premier Pachitch and a number of other government officials are at Brindisi.

SPECIAL SESSION OPENS IN OKLAHOMA

Several Matters Are to Come Before Legislature, Convened by Governor Williams

Oklahoma City, Okla., Jan. 17.—An extraordinary session of the Oklahoma legislature which was convened by Governor R. L. Williams January 6th, was to meet here today. The governor in his call urgently expressed the hope that the session may not extend more than thirty days. While he has not specified what measures are to be considered it is expected the rates of interest, industries at the state prisons and amending the election laws are to be on the calendar.

Resolution for Strip to Be Guarded Jointly by U. S. and Carranza Introduced

Washington, January 17.—Evidence collected at El Paso by state department agents indicates that Carranza authorities at Chihuahua assured C. R. Watson, head of the party of Americans killed near Santa Isabel that no escort was necessary. In that opinion many of the Americans agreed, though they had suggested to the authorities advisability of sending troops with the party.

The advisers further stated that the Carranza government had given Watson a personal passport and that the Carranza immigration authorities in Juarez gave a general passport for the whole Watson party. These developments are taken to point to responsibility of the Carranza government for not adequately protecting the Americans. Establishment of a neutral zone in northern Mexico, to be policed jointly by the governments of Mexico and the United States unless Mexican disorder is speedily controlled is proposed in a resolution introduced today by Senator Gurnea.

The Gurnea resolution, referred to the foreign relations committee would authorize the president to enter into an agreement with Gen. Carranza to use troops to restore and make life secure in that portion of Mexico adjacent to the United States. There was no discussion on the proposal.

AMERICANS CONCENTRATING

Concentration of Americans at Torreon and other points where Carranza troops can afford them greater protection was reported to the state department today by Consul Hanna at Monterrey. He said an American and others employed near Matamoros north of Torreon had arrived safely at Monterrey. With them were a few from Asako, Americans who have been in the Laguna district are at Torreon and Lerdo, a suburb. A report from Durango was received today by the receipt of a state department dispatch regarding whom inquiries had been made, safe at Durango.

PLACING BLAME FOR MONTENEGRO'S FATE

Member of Italian Cabinet Says All of Allies Are at Fault in Matter

Rome, Jan. 17.—Signor Vissani, cabinet minister without portfolio, speaking apparently for the government here yesterday, declared it was useless to attribute to Italy responsibility for the taking of Lovcen and the Montenegro disaster. As in the case of the loss of Serbia he said, the blame was collective and the result of the allies' ineffective program.

ASSOCIATION OF CITY EDITORS IS ORGANIZED

Indianapolis, Jan. 17.—As an outgrowth of the second annual meeting of the Indiana City Editors Association, city editors all over the United States today are being asked to affiliate with the National City Editors Association which was formed here. H. T. Sullivan of Richmond, Ind., is president of the new organization.

ANNUAL "BUNDLE DAY" OBSERVED IN CHICAGO

Chicago, Jan. 17.—Today is Chicago's annual "bundle day." Charitable organizations are cooperating in a widely advertised campaign to obtain bundles of old clothing for the needy. It is estimated that about 150,000 bundles will have been received by nightfall.

GIVES UP STRUGGLE

Count Tizza Makes Official Announcement of Outcome Before Hungarian Parliament Causes Much Rejoicing in Vienna.

Berlin, Jan. 17.—The Overseas News Agency says Count Tizza, the Hungarian parliament that Montenegro has asked for peace. Montenegro was asked unconditionally to lay down her arms and she accepted, the premier declared, according to the News Agency's report, which is as follows: "Montenegro asks for peace, stated Count Tizza in the Hungarian parliament. The proceedings under the first paragraph of the order of the day had just been completed when Count Tizza asked permission to interrupt the discussion. He stated that the king and government of Montenegro had asked the inauguration of peace negotiations. The announcement caused a great commotion in parliament. "We asked that beforehand Montenegro unconditionally lay down her arms" continued the premier. Joyful shouts followed this statement.

Just at this moment continued the prime minister, the news has arrived that the unconditional laying down of arms has been accepted. Since the preliminary conditions have been fulfilled, peace negotiations will be entered into immediately."

SOUTHWESTERN FRUIT DEALERS MEET AT MEMPHIS

Memphis, Jan. 17.—Wholesale fruit and produce dealers from the more than 100 cities and shipping centers in the United States and Canada attended the opening session here today of the annual convention of the Southwestern Fruit Association of America. The address of the president, William H. Grube of Hutchinson, Iowa, was a feature of the program today. Officers will be elected and the 1917 convention city named Wednesday.

FLOODS THREATENING DAMAGE IN ARKANSAS

Little Rock, Ark., Jan. 17.—A force of 600 men was dispatched from Helena to McClelland on White river to assist in the fight there against threatening floods, according to reports received here today. Reports from Georgetown and McClelland tell of great uneasiness among the residents there. The water at McClelland now is within two feet of the top of the levee.

TWELVE ABOVE ZERO AT SNYDER, TEXAS TODAY

Snyder, Texas, Jan. 17.—The coldest weather of the winter set in here Sunday and today the thermometer registers twelve degrees above zero with considerable snow.

TURKS FORCED TO FALL BACK IN CAUCASUS

Berlin, January 17.—After delaying for a week the advance of strong Russian forces in the Caucasus, the Turks have withdrawn their advance posts at some points, according to the Turkish official statement of today, received here from Constantinople.

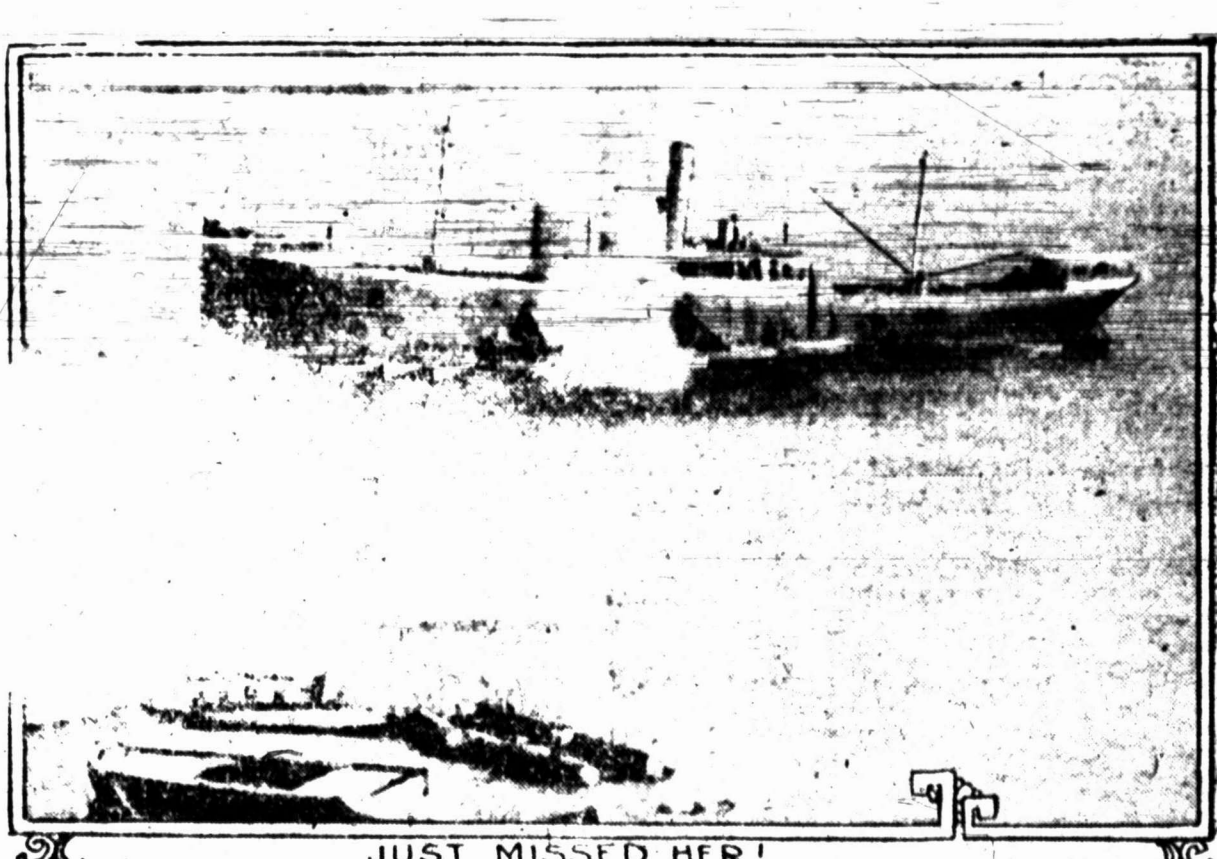

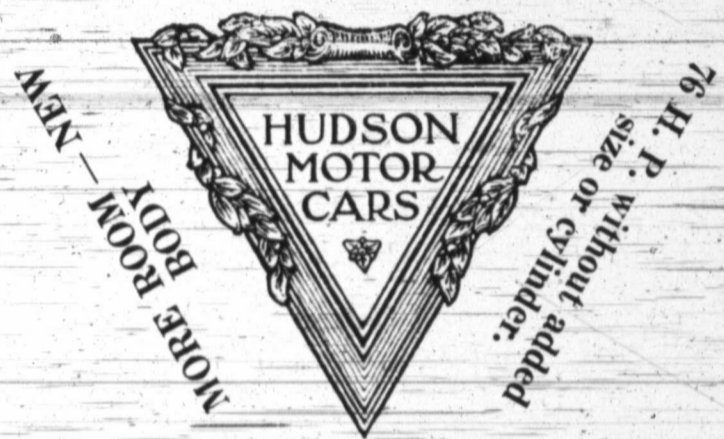

Sports Of All Sorts

By Associated Press. New York, Jan. 15.—According to Percy Haughton, the Harvard football coach, the success of the Crimson eleven on the gridiron in recent years has been due almost entirely to the use of common sense and thorough efficiency in the training, coaching and campaigning of the players as individuals and the eleven as a unit. In describing the system Haughton said: "Our offensive and defensive methods were based upon an application of the German system of salesmanship. As I understand it, the Germans never try to sell in a new territory whatever they happen to have on hand. Instead, they ascertain what is needed and manufacture exactly what is wanted, and of course more cheaply than their competitors. "So with our football problem, we learned in a general way what our opponents were going to do on the offense and we met it with different defenses. Each of these defenses was planned to meet a certain kind of play under certain conditions and the team was so thoroughly versed in what to expect from its opponents that in the great majority of cases it used the proper defense against any given play. "On the offense we studied our opponents' defensive methods and proceeded against their weakest point, varying this principle by pretending to attack the weak spot and developing toward what, without the fake, was theoretically a strong territory. "Each year we have found it necessary to change the crux of our offense to meet existing conditions. Now these methods are not simply the result of what we have learned during the past eight years. On the contrary, they are the accumulations of Harvard football brains stretching back to the time of Lew and Bert Waters. From them we learned that to beat Yale it was necessary to outfight them. From Cam Forbes, who coached in '97 and '98 we learned that in order to outfight them it was necessary to have eleven well men to do it; and from Bill Reid, who coached in 1901, 1902 and 1903, we learned the invaluable lesson of paying strict attention to the smallest detail."

The inability of Scotty Allen to reach Nome, Alaska, in time to participate in the famous Nome to Canada to Nome dog race will rob that far northern sports classic of one of the most picturesque characters of the annual event. Allen has just returned from France where he delivered more than four hundred sleigh dogs to the French army for use in winter warfare. In order to reach Nome in time for the race scheduled for April it would be necessary for Allen to make a dog team trip of more than fifteen miles, in zero temperature with the possibility of being delayed indefinitely by heavy snow storms which sometimes rage for days on a strictly Arctic trail. Allen has always been a factor in the annual All Alaska Sweepstakes, the biggest dog race of the year, having repeatedly won or finished among the first three. When his team won the race in 1909 the prize money and wagers netted him more than \$100,000. A year later John Johnson, driving a team of Siberian wolf dogs, set a new record for the 412 mile course of 71 hours 14 minutes and 29 seconds, and these figures still stand. Although Allen won the 1912 event he was unable to lower the time due to the blinding snow storms which prevailed during the race.

The change in ownership of the Chicago National League Baseball Club which will be completed on January 20 when Charles W. Weeghman and his associates pay to Charles T. Taft \$400,000 balance due on the \$1,000,000 transaction marks an epoch in the history of one of the famous clubs of professional baseball. Since the Chicago club was organized in 1876 it has always held a prominent place in the profession. During its existence of 40 years many championship pennants have been nailed to its flagpole. Probably no other club in the senior major league has been so fortunate financially, as money or the lack of it has never troubled the Chicago management. At all times the owners of this organization have endeavored to secure the services of the greatest players regardless of cost as the roster shows and this has been one of the strongest factors in the club's success. In forty years only six men have held the majority stock in the club, the recent deal having transferred control into the hands of Charles W. Weeghman, who, with William A. Hubert and the late Albert G. Spalding organized the team in 1876. Later James A. Hart purchased a controlling interest from Spalding and held it for fourteen years. Then in 1905, James Charles Murphy from Cincinnati with \$125,000 and 10 boys got Hart's interest. The club passed into the joint possession of Murphy and Charles P. Taft. Frank Chance was made manager in 1906. During the ensuing five years Chicago gathered together the greatest team it ever had, winning four pennants and two world's series. Chance resigned in 1912 but after an experience of nearly two seasons with the New York Americans, the Californian, who was regarded as one of the greatest leaders in the national game, quit major league baseball and returned to his orange groves in California. Johnny Evers succeeded Chance in Chicago as manager but after a wrangle with Murphy was traded to Boston. Then Hank O'Day, the veteran umpire, became the Cubs' pilot but after a single season's handling of the steering wheel was deposed and Roger Bresnahan was placed in charge to be followed in all probability, by Joe Tinker next season.

Americans interested in sport, returning from Japan, report that the Japanese are rapidly assimilating Occidental sports in general, just as they did baseball following its introduction into the Land of Nippon. Golf and tennis and motoring are all gaining devotees by the hundreds and some of the Japanese players are showing a proficiency on the court and links that promises to make them formidable opponents in the course of a few years. Dr. T. S. Clyce of Sherman Discusses Needs of Presbyterian Institutions.

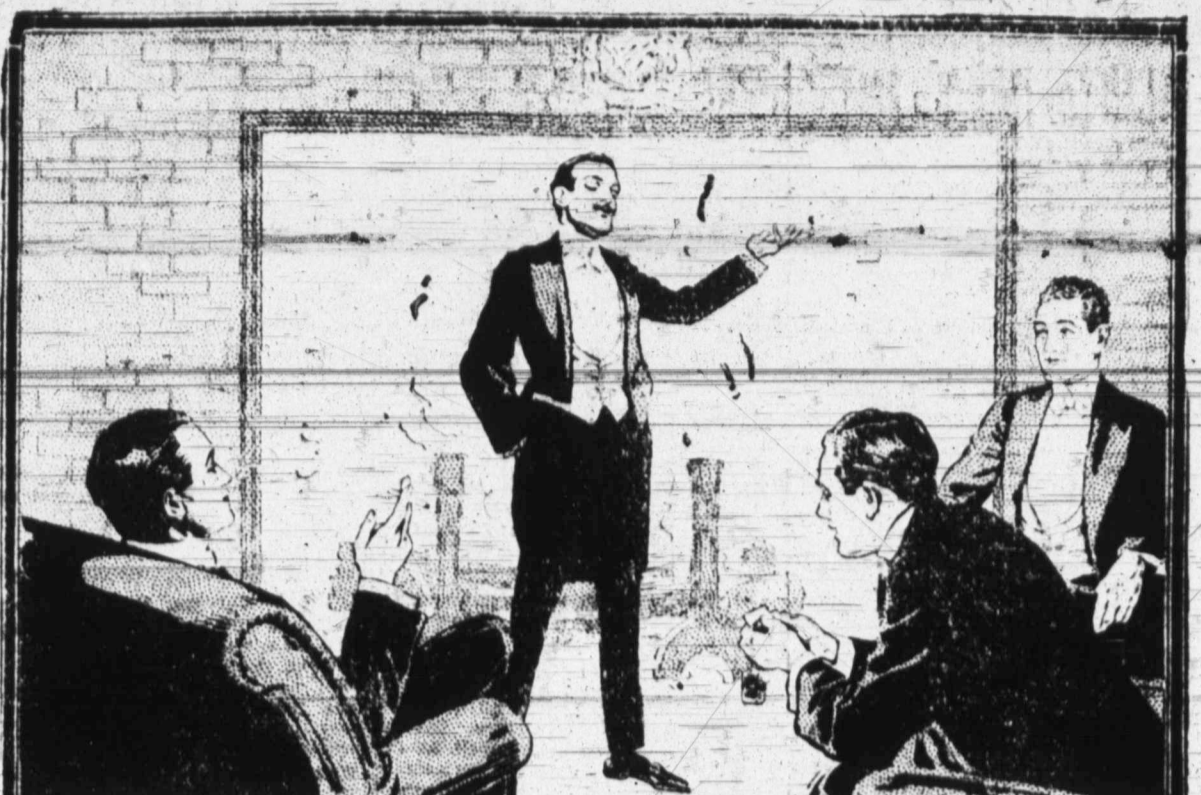

S. Clyce of Dallas. Dr. Clyce was here in the interests of the million-dollar campaign and spoke at both morning and evening services at the church. Owing to the weather, the attendance on these meetings were limited but the appeal for subscriptions in the evening met with a response that promises well for the success of the campaign. The church educational institutions at the evening service, telling of the growth of these institutions since 1900. In 1900 the church had approximately \$200,000 invested in schools. HEART DISEASE, TUBERCULOSIS AND PNEUMONIA CAUSING MOST DEATHS

Washington, Jan. 17.—According to a preliminary announcement with reference to mortality in 1914, issued by Director Sam L. Rogers, of the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce, and compiled by Richard C. Lappin, chief statistician for vital statistics, more than 20 per cent of the 588,659 deaths reported for that year in the registration area, which contained about two-thirds of the population of the entire United States, were due to three causes—heart diseases, tuberculosis and pneumonia—and more than 60 per cent to eleven causes—the three just named, together with Bright's disease and nephritis, cancer, diarrhoea and enteritis, apoplexy, arterial diseases, diphtheria, diabetes typhoid fever.

STOMACH AND LIVER. THE DEATH RATE FROM CANCER HAS RISEN FROM 62 PER 100,000 IN 1906 TO 79.4 IN 1914.

The increase has been almost continuous, there having been but two years, 1906 and 1911, which showed a decline as compared with the years immediately preceding. It is possible that at least a part of this indicated increase is due to more accurate diagnosis and greater care on the part of physicians in making reports to registration officials.

DIARRHOEA AND ENTERITIS CAUSED 52,497 DEATHS IN 1914, OR 79.4 PER 100,000.

This rate shows a marked falling off as compared with the rate for the preceding year 90.2 and a very pronounced decline as compared with that for 1909, which was 122.2. Nearly five-sixths of the total number of deaths charged to these causes in 1914 were of infants under 2 years of age.

APPOXY WAS THE CAUSE OF 51,272 DEATHS, OR 77.7 PER 100,000.

The rate from this malady has increased gradually, with occasional slight declines, since 1906, when it stood at 37.5. Acute diseases of various kinds—diphtheria, aneurism, etc.—caused 15,044 deaths, or 22.8 per 100,000, in the registration area.

NO EPIDEMIC DISEASE PRODUCED A LEATH RATE AS HIGH AS 18 PER 100,000 IN 1914.

The fatal cases of diphtheria and erup—which are classed together in the statistics, but practically all of which are of diphtheria—numbered 14,786 or 17.9 per 100,000, in that year, the rate having fallen from 43.3 in 1909. This decline of nearly 59 per cent is relatively greater than that shown by any other epidemic cause of death. The rate has not fallen continuously, but has fluctuated somewhat from year to year.

DIABETES WAS THE CAUSE OF 19,666 DEATHS, OR 16.2 PER 100,000.

The rate from this disease has risen almost continuously from year to year since 1900, when it was 9.7 per 100,000. The mortality rate from typhoid fever has shown a most gratifying decline since 1906, having decreased from 35.9 per 100,000 in that year to 15.4 in 1914, or by 57 per cent.

MORE THAN 100 AUTOMOBILES IN THIS CITY CAME TO GRIET LAST WEEK WHEN THE NEAR-ZERO WEATHER ARRIVED, AND AS A RESULT GARAGE PROPRIETORS HAVE HAD A BUSY TIME OF IT MAKING REPAIRS TO BURSTED CYLINDERS AND WATER JACKETS.

Failure to drain the radiators, and inefficiency of mixtures designed to prevent the water freezing, caused the damage. In most cases where auto owners had mixed the water with alcohol or glycerine in sufficient quantity, there was no damage, but in some machines where a considerable proportion of alcohol had been mixed with the water, freezing nevertheless resulted.

WHILE IT IS CONSIDERED ADVISABLE TO TURN THE CAR OVER TO THE REPAIR SHOP WHEN THE WATER FREEZES, FIRST AID TREATMENT MAY BE RENDERED AT HOME BY PUTTING THE CAR IN QUARTERS WHERE THE TEMPERATURE IS GRADUALLY RISING.

The temperature at first should be only a few degrees above freezing, one authority informs The Times, and should be increased very slowly to 45 or 50 degrees in about an hour, permitting the water to thaw gradually.

TRIAL OF NEGRO ON CHARGE OF MURDER

Case of Ed Strong, Accused of Killing Isiah Johnson, Is Called Today

Ed Strong, negro, was placed on trial in the 30th district court today on a charge of murder in connection with the killing of Isiah Johnson, another negro, on Christmas day, Johnson died from a knife stab through the heart. Strong will plead self defense. He gave himself up several days after the killing bearing cuts on his face and neck which he said were inflicted by Johnson.

When the case was called by Judge Bonner this morning the state asked for a delay of several hours before announcing as it desired to learn whether it could bring Cal Horton, a negro, the state's principal witness here from Tipton, Okla., in time for the trial. Horton was reached by telephone and came in on the south-bound Wichita Falls & Northwestern passenger train at noon. After hearing from Horton the state announced ready as did also the defense.

A special venire of 80 talesmen had been summoned for the jury. Some of these did not appear and a number of others were excused and talesmen to fill up the panel were ordered summoned to be in court at 1 o'clock this afternoon when the work of selecting a jury was taken up.

Judge Bonner did not call the docket this morning but announced he would do so next Monday morning.

WILSON ASKS DATA ON DEFENSE PLANS

Industrial as Well as Military Mobilization Is Being Considered

Washington, Jan. 17.—President Wilson has been working to put into operation the plan he outlined in his last message to Congress preparing the nation's manufacturing, railroad and other business resources for quick mobilization in case of emergency. It became known that he has written to the heads of all the principal engineering organizations, asking that they appoint representatives to collect data for use in organizing business for national defense in time of danger.

The letters, one of which was made public in New York by W. L. Saunders, president of the American Institute of Mining Engineers, went also to the presidents of the American Society of Civil Engineers, the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, the American Institute of Electrical Engineers and American Chemical Society.

The work of collecting the data will be carried on by the representatives of these organizations in conjunction with the civilian naval consulting board. When the plans tentatively drawn up by the president and his advisers are complete, machinery will be set going which is expected to place in the hands of the government complete information regarding business and industrial sources which would have to be called to the assistance of the army and navy in time of war.

When the president addresses the Railroad Business Association in New York, Jan. 27, he is expected to refer to the advisability of having the railroads and concerns which manufacture railroad supplies co-operate in the general mobilization plans.

Heater Causes Blaze On Car Belonging To Frisco Official Today

The fire department was called out at about ten o'clock this morning to put out a blaze in a car on belated passenger train No. 3, which had just arrived. An effort was first made to put out the blaze with chemicals but it was found necessary to turn on a stream of water.

The car was the private car of Receiver Schleyer of the Frisco who was on his way to Vernon and Quanah. Efforts had been made to extinguish the blaze before the train reached here and the car was badly chipped. It was not so badly damaged, however, that it could not be used and continued as part of the train out of here.

INVESTIGATION OF CARRYING OF MAIL

By Associated Press.

Washington, Jan. 17.—Publication today of First Assistant Postmaster General report before the postoffice committee concerning the results of a federal investigation showed that he had declared that restrictions placed by surety companies on bidders for wagon transport work in postal service is costing the government an enormous amount of money unnecessarily.

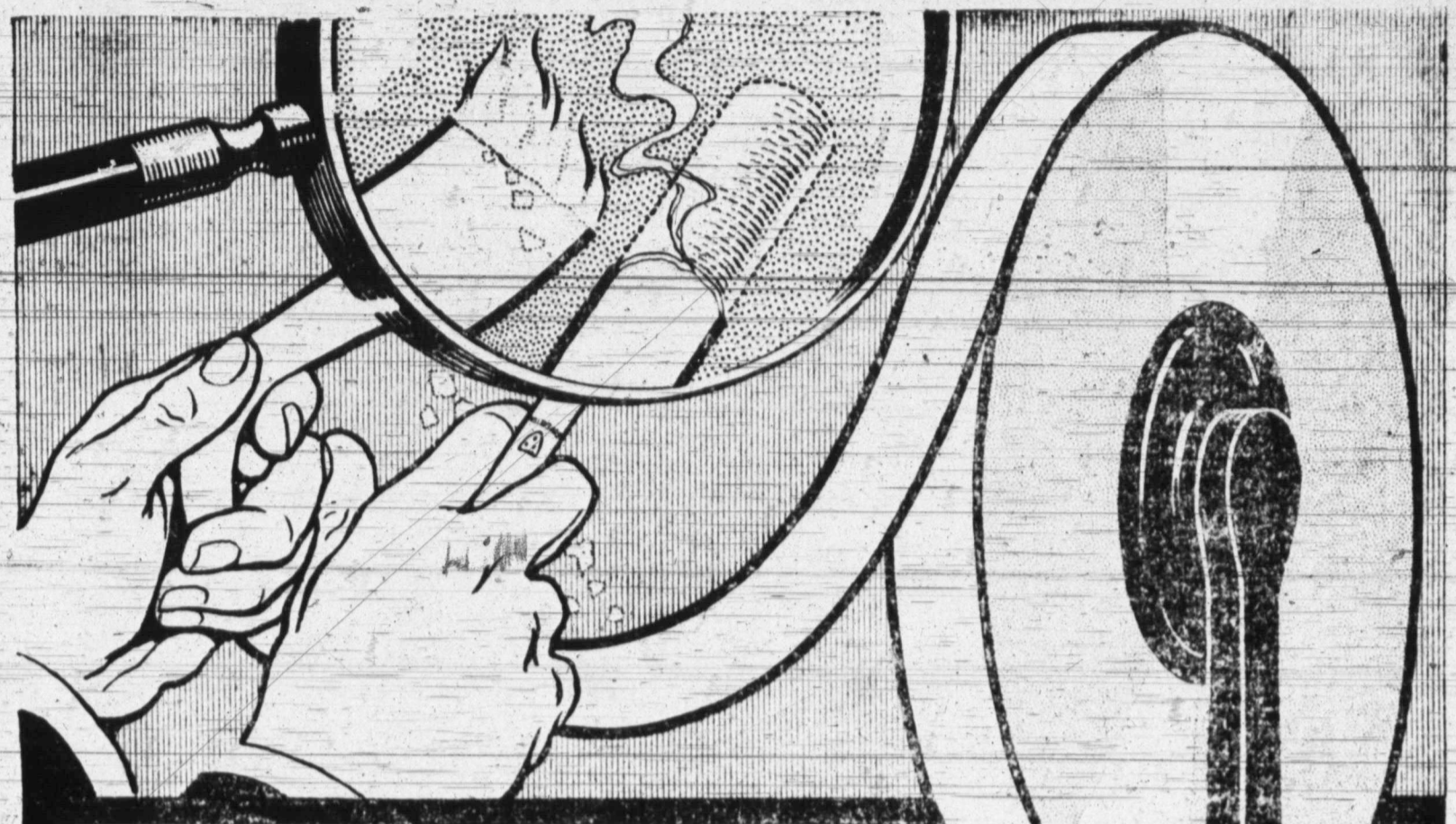

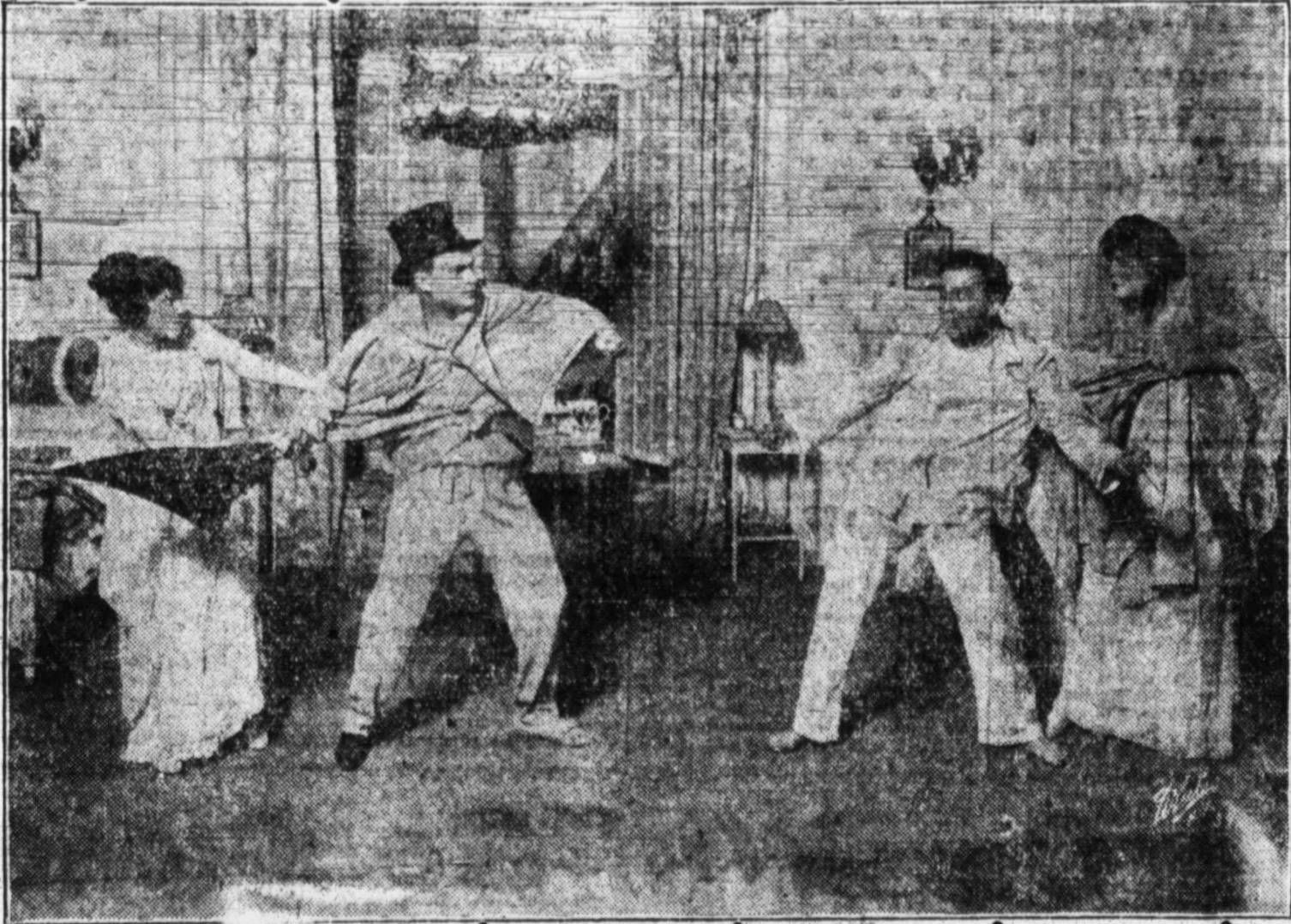

SAYS OPPRESSION CAUSED DISORDER

Carranza Analyzes Recent Disturbances in Mexico—Blames Ex-President Diaz.

By Associated Press. Queretaro, Mex., January 17.—General Venustiano Carranza's explanation of the recent state of chaos in Mexico which the nearly six years of fractional war has brought to a climax is "three centuries of oppression." The first chief was speaking recently at one of the numerous banquets tendered him at this temporary capital when he outlined the history of his unhappy nation for the three hundred years since the settlement of Mexico down to the fall of Diaz. Diaz' administration as president was likened to the conquest of Augustus, Caesar and Napoleon. He characterized the two and one-half years of revolution as the beginning of a great task of reconstruction and settlement of economic problems.

"The break in economic conditions," said General Carranza "affects us worse because we are living fictitiously. After having issued a money in order to maintain the army there are many who call attention to the fact that our money fluctuates daily. But we did not issue this money with the purpose of exchanging it for gold in some other part of the land. We created it to meet a necessity because it is the readiest medium of exchange and would spread the expense of the revolution over the entire population. 'The peso' of the revolution we will sustain and everybody ought to help the government in this task."

GROSS RECEIPTS TAX AFFECTS 2,500 CONCERNS

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, January 17.—Approximately 2,500 corporations doing business in Texas are subject to payment of the gross receipts tax to the state quarterly. The comptroller's department has just finished sending out blanks for these corporations to fill out together with the tax payment blanks for the quarter which ended December 31. While the tax is paid into the treasury department the report must be made to the comptroller. The state gets about \$500,000 annually from this source and the corporations have thirty days in which to pay their tax. After that a penalty of ten per cent attaches.

CABINET MINISTERS MAY CUT SALARIES

Suggested That They Set the Nation Good Example in Economy

By Associated Press. London, (By Mail)—After the cabinet ministers made an earnest appeal to the nation—congress to defer demands for increased wages until after the war on the ground of national economy, the suggestion came from the unions that the ministers themselves might set an example in economy by giving up part of their salaries, which in some offices are princely. It was indicated in parliament that such a movement was contemplated by the ministers. But now a leading liberal paper makes an ingenious defense of the old scale of salaries.

"It is an old saying," the paper argues, "that a minister who gives his whole attention to the nation's affairs has little time for his own, and in the case of some cabinet ministers a sudden drop of a third to a half of their income would create private financial problems, and therefore some distraction of mind. Ministers are expected to be of importance to the nation's business, and distraction of mind is therefore a thing to be avoided. It is not at all unlikely this consideration may prevail."
