American troops have reached Colonia Dublan, near Casas Grandes, in Mexico, where the two columns have formed a junc-

A serious crisis was probably averted when the expeditionary force was instructed from Washington not to occupy Mexican towns, Carranza troops having been instructed to resist any attempts at occupation.

The American troops have so far not fired a single shot, nor have they been fired upon.

Villa has been located, with some degree of certainty, in the mountainous country about 100 miles south of Casas Grandes. Mexican officials do not believe he will attempt to give battle to the United States troops.

The internal situation in Mexico has some disquieting features, but the general outlook is considered encouraging. The trouble at Tampico appears to have come to an end.

General Obregon, Mexican minister of war, has issued a decree declaring the invaders of Columbus to be outside the law, giving any citizen of Mexico the right to kill or capture them.

General Funston has asked for permission from the Carranza government to use Mexican railways to transport troops; refusal of this permission is anticipated.

Besides providing employment for the soldiers and sailors, the committee points out the advantages of the plan for the development of the agriculture of the country.

"Tht demoblization of the navy and army at the close of the war will afford a unique opportunity of developing agriculture in this country," says its report. "It is of the utmost importance to the welfare of the nation that this opportunity should be setzed and turned to the greatest possible advantage.
