El Paso, Texas, April 6.- Intimations in Washington that the Carranza government might soon indicate to the American government that the troops pursuing the bandit Villa were futilely following "a cold trail" and that the de facto government would welcome the return of the United States troops to their own country occasioned no surprise today in El Paso,

There has been insistent reports here that the de facto government looked with no favoring eye on a further pursuit of Villa because the presence of American troops on American soil was proving an embarrassment to the Carranzistas. These re-

Captain Lyon moved to Texas in 1876, locating at Sherman and laying the foundation of the large lumber business now carried on by his sons. Cecil A. Lyon and Dupont B. Cecil Lyon received his education at Austin College, Sherman which he attended during the sersions from 1882 to 1884, inclusive; at the A. & M. College, College Station, Texas, 1884 to 1886 and at the Pennsylvania Military College from 1886 to vania Military College from 1886 to 1890, graduating from that institution in the latter year with the degree o bachelor of arts in architecture, and being the ranking captain of the ca det corps. 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
