## **NEW EFFORTS BY GERMANS AROUND** DEAD MAN'S HILL

PARIS REPORTS REPULSE OF INCREASE IN VIOLENCE OF AR. TILLERY BOMBARDMENT

#### SINK AUSTRIAN BOAT

Vessel Described as Passenger Steam Torpedoed Without Warning In Adricatic, According to Official Report From Berlin

The Associated Press summarizes European war operations as follows: Hard fighting has been resumed in the vicinity of Dead Man's Hill, on the Verdun front, the Germans making another attempt to dislodge the French from positions on the slope of the hill, the capture of which on May 10 was reported by the Paris war of fice. Two attacks in quick succession were delivered last night but both were repulsed by the French fire.


