



HOW PENNSYLVANIA MAN BUILT UP HIS DAIRY

Editor The Times: The enclosed clipping, taken from Hourd's Dairyman, same being writ so forcibly to the situation applies you to reproduce same, as I think you will furnish food for thought for many farmers who are now either engaged in or contemplating engaging in dairy farming.

The clipping follows: In 1909 we went into the dairy business on a small scale although we have been dairying all our lives after a fashion. We had four cows and bought twelve more. cows were all colors and all breeds. We milked them a couple of years, of two years, we found on figuring that we had been just about even, but with threshing and other outside work we made enough money to pay for the twelve cows and we had the manure as pro-

In talking with our banker I said

that we were working for nothing. whereupon he said that cows ought to pay a profit. He suggested that we buy a pure bred bull, get a milk scale, weigh the milk from each cow and raise the heifer calves from the best cows. This we did, and, take my word for it, we found that we were harboring 10 to 12 cows that did not give milk enough to pay for their board. commenced to sell nice fat cows to the butcher, buying others to put into their places, however, until we found we could not buy good cows, as those that are of-fered for sale by farmers are generally the rulls. So we did the best Wreck On The Denver calves from the best cows and our bred Holstein bull. We now have 12 cows and 6 beifers coming helfers and 4 helfer calves. While they are only grade Holsteins. we have some mighty good young cows. Although we separate milk to feed use, our milk check averages more than it did before we commenced to keep tab and weigh milk. We expect to buy two pure bred cows this spring and I firmly believe that inside of 4 years we can have a herd

NEW EFFORT TO SAVE THOMPSON

REHEARING TO BE ASKED IN CASE OF LOCAL NEGRO, FAC-ING DEATH PENALTY

Sustains States Main Contention Bu Does Not Consider Several

Motion for a rehearing in the case case the death penalty was returned on a charge of murder in connection with the death of Pearl Bransford, a negro woman, will be filed by attor-neys for the negro, Ralph Mathis and Wayne Summerville before May 24 in the court of criminal appeals which recently affirmed the death sentence. Every legal expedient will be used in an effort to save the negro's life and in the event rehearing is denied, strong effort to have the sentence commuted will be made.

commuted will be made.

The decision affirming the sentence was unanimous, there being no dissent as at first reported. The opinion, according to attorneys on both sides of the case, does not take up a number of the bilis of exception presented by the defense. It does however, sustain the state's chief contention, that the testimony of those who saw the wounded negress nod her head when asked if "Charley did it" was admissible. The opinion fol-

Dr. Mackechney testified to being called to see the woman; that he nad her carried to the sanitarium and that the wounds she received were the cause of her death. He says he told Mr. Nelson and his wife that he thought it was useless to attempt to do anything for her, but at their request he treated her. That in his opinion the woman was conscious and he furthermore testified that he informed the woman she was going to die and that she wanted to tell the truth. Mrs. Nelson says the woman was informed that she was going to die, and the doctor thought she was dying.

Nelson's testimony would be admissible both under the rea gestate rule and as dying declarations. While the statements made to the undertaker were some time after the statements were made to the doctor, yet his tes-tiony would tend strongly to show that she was conscious, and his tes timony would be admissible as a dying declaration.

There are a number of bills ohjecting to testimony wherein when asked who did it, she would answer Thompson, and to others would nod her head in the affirmative when asked the question. It is true that witnesses for appellant testified they did not think she was conscious, but this would not render the testimon inadmissible, but go to the weight to be given it by the jury. YEARS GIVEN WILSON CASE

CLAY COUNTY YOUTH IS FOUND GUILTY OF MURDER OF SCHOOL TEACHER

Boy Receives Verdict Almost With Indifference Claims He Fired in Self Defense

Twenty-five years in the penitentiary is the punishment facing Jay Wilson eventeen year old Clay county school boy, for the killing of Prof. J. G. Wright of Newport last January. A verdict of guilty, fixing that term of imprisonment, was returned by the jury in the case at Henrietta Saturday

The boy heard the verdct read with unflinching stoicism, not seeming to realize what it meant, but his parents were heart broken.

Wright was killed in the school room at Newport, Clay county, as he was advancing toward the boy to rebuke him for a remark the youth had made. Wilson, according to the testimony, warned the teacher not to come nearer him, then drew the pistol. snapped it at Wright, and the latter grappled with him The weapon was hen discharged.

The plea was self defense Wilson testifying that he had heard of threats alleged to have been made by the teacher. He said he had taken the gun to school to trade it. The shooting followed the discovery by the teacher that the boy had turned in an exam-ination paper not in his own hand-writing. He reproved the boy, and threatened to inform Wilson's par-ents. The boy replied that "he didn't guess anybody would care," whereupon Wright, telling him "not to get too smart" advanced toward him Then came the shooting.

Wilson was represented by R. E. Taylor of Henrietta and H. F. Weldon Bowie. District Attorney Leslie Humphrey and Attorneys Wantland and Parrish of Henrietta conducted the prosecution; the case was one of the hardest fought that Clay coun ty has seen in some time

Steps for a new trial were at once inaugurated by the defense, and the case will be taken to the higher court. While it is pending there the boy must remain in jail, as appeal bond cannot be made where the sentence exceeds fifteen years. Wilson's people are prominent residents of the southern part of Clay county.


