

Ben Guill Reports:

COTTON
The Bill H. R. 8969 reported today by the House Committee on Agriculture pertains mostly to cotton. However, there are two sections of it relating to wheat and these, of course, are of interest to wheat growers in the Panhandle area. I am going to make two reports on this bill which I will send to both cotton and wheat growing counties for the information of those who will be vitally interested.

To the cotton growers the following report is given:

It looks as if the cotton acreage allotment for 1951 will be the same as it was for 1950. I make this statement because of a reported estimate from the Department of Agriculture. The estimated carry-over as of August 1, 1950 will be seven million bales and the estimated harvest is 10 million bales. This total of 17 million bales is within the estimated marketing quota of 17 million. To give you some idea of how they arrived at this figure I quote the following figures: By using the domestic and export consumption and adding 30 percent of this total the department arrives at the marketing quota figures.

The Bill H. R. 8969 is not a perfect bill, nor did the sub-committee on cotton report it as such, but after six months of conference, discussion, arguments and sometimes heatedly, the sub-committee reported this bill to the full committee June 28 and it was unanimously approved. I personally attended several of the sub-committee meetings and listened to the many pro's and con's and on

every problem, and even though I was not a member of the sub-committee nor a member of the Agriculture Committee at that time, I was allowed to ask some questions and present some of the problems of my District. My main suggestion was that I felt that the State Committeemen and the County Committeemen should have unlimited discretion within their respective States and the Counties. This bill gives to the State and the County more home rule than any cotton bill ever written has given.

The State Committee is allowed to retain as much as 10 per cent of the total acreage in the State for adjustments in County allotments for trends, for abnormal conditions, for incomplete or inaccurate basic county cotton data, and upon the proper showing by the county committee, that they have inequitable county allotments, and for new farms, small farms, and for farms adversely affected by abnormal conditions affecting plantings, (for example, drought, and for adjustments by the county committees who do not have enough reserve to sufficiently provide for equitable farm allotments.

The County Committee can withhold 15 per cent of their County allotment for distribution for the same as given to the State and I repeat this, they can obtain from the State additional acreage if their 15 per cent reserve is insufficient to provide equitable farm allotments.

Now this bill sets up a three year temporary program for the years 1951, 1952 and 1953. At the end of the three years the cotton allotment will start on a straight history basis. This is fundamentally the rules of the Cotton Bill and today I am sending out to all of the P. M. A. County Committeemen copies of H. R. 8969 for their study.

Texas, as well as the other states, will get her proportionate share of the National allot-

ment and as I have stated, it will probably be the same allotment that we got in 1950. It is up to the State Committeemen and the County Committeemen to iron out their own local problems and I think it a wonderful idea to deal with these problems at home rather than be told what to do from the Capital at Washington, D. C. (You must bear this in mind, with the State allotment and with the reserves withheld by the State and the County committeemen, that if cotton acreage is given to one it must be taken away from someone else, but I feel that we at home can iron out our difficulties practicing the Golden Rule and be much better off rather than be dictated to by bureaucrats in Washington.

WHEAT

The first provision, which is Section VI of the bill, relates to wheat acreage allotments and provides that the 1951 wheat acreage allotments for any county shall not be reduced below the 1950 allotments for the county by more than the percentage by which the national acreage allotment for 1951 is reduced, plus

five percent. Whatever extra acreage may be necessary to provide this minimum county allotment is to be in addition to the national acreage allotment. It is expected that this provision will apply principally in the newer wheat growing sections in the Great Plains area, and that probably not more than fifty counties in all will be affected. It takes the place of what is

known as the Summer Fallow allotment which was contained in Public Law 272 of the 81st Congress, which was passed last year.

Section VII of the bill restores the penalty of fifty percent of the support price on all wheat marketed above quotas when marketing quotas are in effect. This provision has been in the law for years but was inadvertently eliminated in the Agricultural Act of 1949. This merely restores the old provision.

This penalty will not be in effect for the years 1950 and 1951, because there have been no marketing quotas announced, however, in future years, if marketing quotas are fixed the penalty becomes the rule.

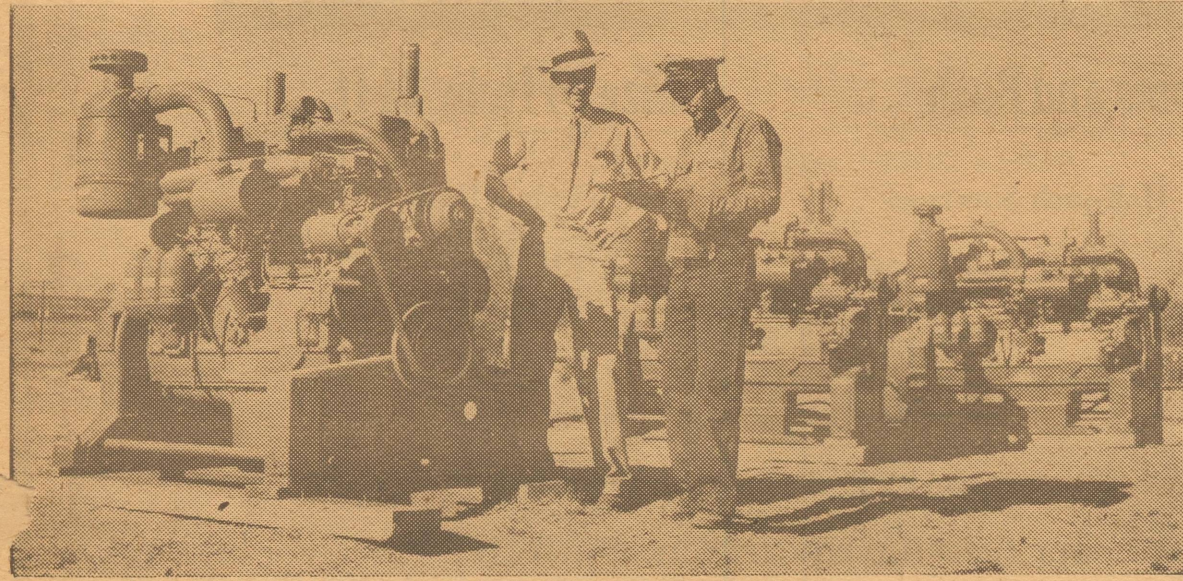
