

We are more than glad to see the movement for a re-activiated Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture in Friona. Rather than congratulating the wide-awake leaders of this activity, or handing them bouquets, this editor believes the interest no more than should be expected. After all, any community worth living in is a community worth working for.





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
