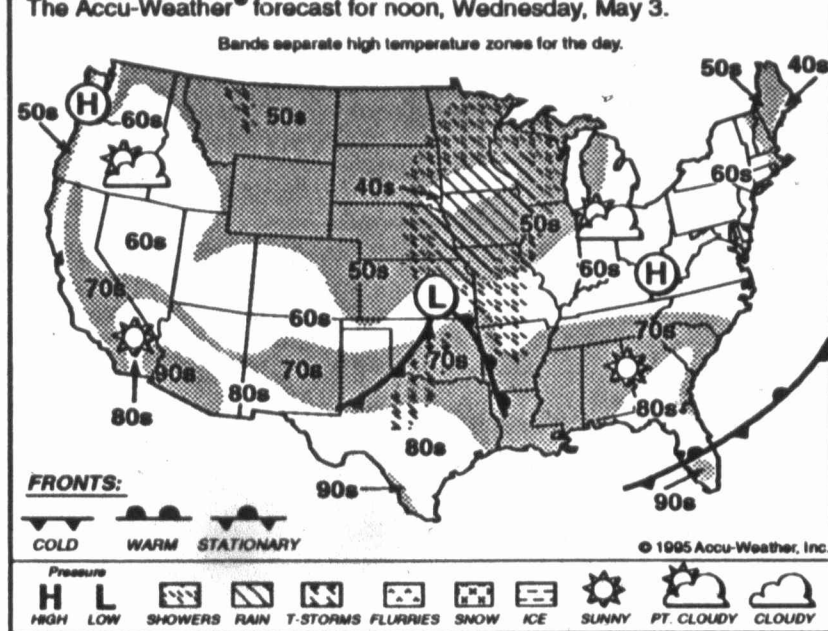

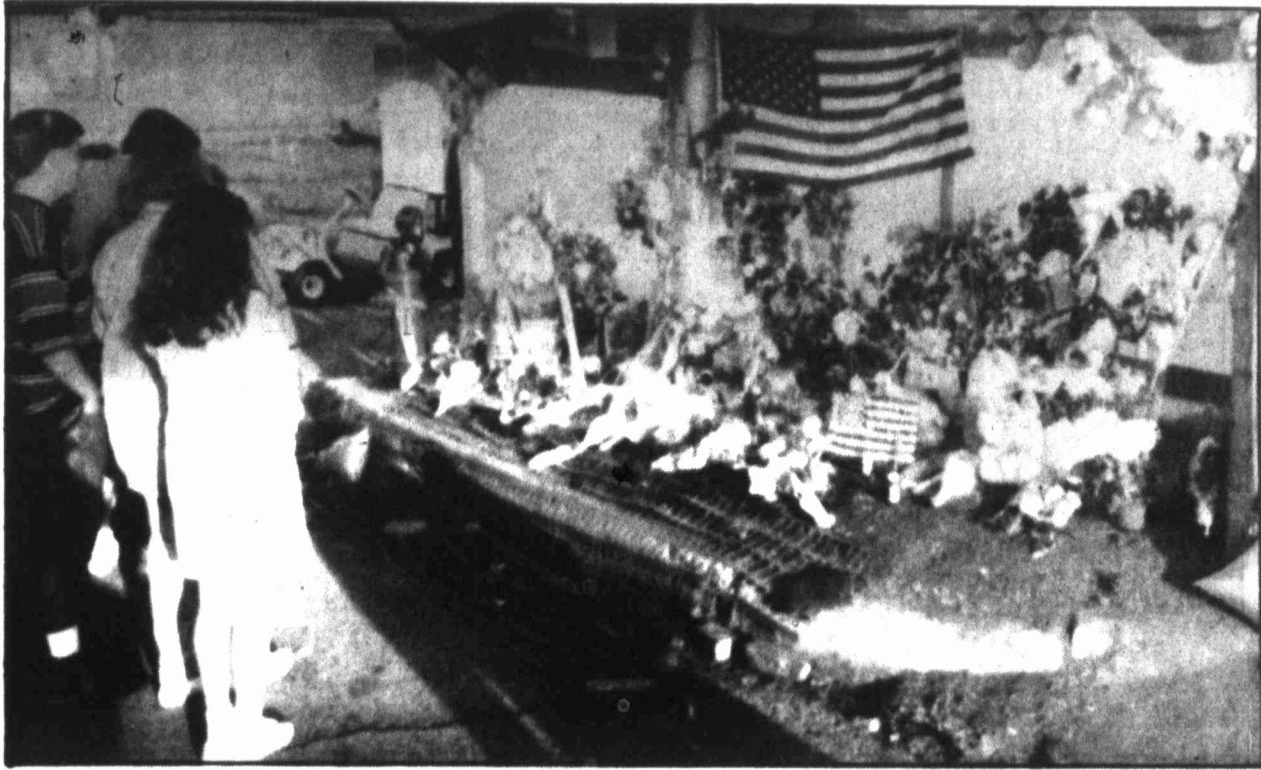

# Elderly fight holding action as aging conference begins

WASHINGTON (AP) — The idea of official White House conferences on aging is to meet every decade, measure the progress and push for more. This one is shaping up as a defensive action merely to hold ground.

The reality that congressional GOP budget-cutters are not exempting America's graying population has robbed this conference of the headiness of earlier times, when federal programs for the elderly were on the march.

On the eve of today's official opening of the meeting, dozens of delegates warmed up by standing to denounce Republican plans to save money from Medicare, subsidized housing, welfare and other programs — "a breach of contract with the American people," as one called it.

The conference, the fourth of its kind since 1961, offered a

"speak out" session that gave people a chance to let off steam on any topic. But it became a drumbeat against "cuts that never heal."

"This is America, folks, and a 92-year-old lady with no relatives and no funds had no place to live," said Elsie Frank of Boston, describing how federal support put that woman and eight others in a refurbished Victorian home.

"We cannot let them emasculate the subsidies," she said Tuesday. "We cannot abide it."

Even as the more than 2,000 delegates gathered, Republicans and Democrats tussled in Congress over GOP plans to cut as much as \$300 billion from Medicare, the federal health insurance program for the elderly.

Bentley Lipscomb, secretary of the Florida Department of Elder Affairs, said the push for federal budget savings comes as

his state struggles to care for some 340,000 people with Alzheimer's or related diseases in an elderly population of 3.3 million.

"We simply cannot afford \$300 billion in cuts in the Medicare program," he said.

For all the rear guard motion, organizers were still bringing an ambitious agenda to the table over the next three days: dozens of draft resolutions urging expanded health coverage, Social Security, affordable housing and more.

But there has been little conviction Washington will follow up to the extent it did in the past, even as the population grows older — with one in four Americans expected to be 65 or older by 2040.

Past conferences helped set the stage for Medicare, Medicaid, Meals on Wheels and cost of living increases in Social Security benefits.

## Exhibit personalizes World War II experiences

WASHINGTON (AP) — Smiling photos of Navy Firemen Wesley and Edward Heidt personalize World War II in a new National Archives exhibit. A few feet past copies of their letters home, reality intrudes: A somber telegram tells their mother her two sons were lost Dec. 7, 1941.

Four years and half a world away, Army Lt. Howard M. Randall won a Silver Star after fighting in Europe left him with a wounded leg.

"I do know that I am not quite as anxious to pull off a 'Charge of the Light Brigade' stunt as I once was," he wrote his mother in Champaign, Ill.

The new exhibit includes letters, diaries and artifacts from such luminaries as Gen. Dwight Eisenhower, President Franklin D. Roosevelt, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill and German Field Marshal Erwin Rommel.

But the human and inhuman faces of war become real in the letters from the soldiers, sailors and Marines who did the fighting and dying. "World War II, Personal Accounts" is their exhibit.

The exhibit, which opens Saturday, "lets the parties in the war tell their own story," curator Chris Rudy Smith explained. "It's human drama, it's real,

it's what happened," said curator Gary A. Yarrington of the Lyndon B. Johnson Library in Austin, Texas, who created the exhibit after appealing for letters in magazines for veterans and retirees starting in 1989.

Reality is Wesley Heidt's letter reassuring his mother in Los Angeles that, serving on the USS Arizona at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii: "I am safer here on this battleboat than I would be driving back and forth to work if I was home."

And it is Navy Radioman Raymond M. Tufteland writing a few days later to his family in Lemon Grove, Calif.: "Our force entered Pearl to witness a ghast-

ly sight of sunken ships — oil-covered water — wreckage and ruins."

A few yards away is a telegram from the War Department to Heidt's mother, informing her that two of her sons — Wesley and Edward — had died in battle Dec. 7, 1941.

A distant dad's concern for his little daughter comes through in a Sept. 19, 1941, letter from Army Maj. George S. Fisher of Plumville, Pa., who was stationed in the Philippines.

"I miss you very much. Lets pretend tonight that I'm there to get a good night hug and kiss from you. Remember me in your prayers," he wrote.

## NYPD Blues

### Corruption probe eyes 24 officers

NEW YORK (AP) — The 48th Precinct has become the city's latest rogues' gallery.

About two dozen police officers have been implicated in a yearlong investigation that uncovered evidence of officers shaking down drug dealers, busting into apartments without warrants and ignoring corruption, law enforcement sources said.

Six officers from the Bronx precinct were arrested at their homes Tuesday night, and 10 more were to be arrested today, said a source who spoke on condition of

anonymity. Indictments were to be unsealed today.

About seven officers were expected to be suspended for ignoring the corruption, the source said.

Neither a police department spokesman nor a spokeswoman for the Bronx District Attorney's office would comment.

There has been a string of police corruption scandals in New York City's other boroughs, and citizen complaints against officers citywide, are at record levels. More than 30 arrests have been made.

# \$500,000 not enough bail for Edmondson

While bail is the right of every person accused of a crime, there are times when bail should be denied or set high enough to satisfy the needs of the community and the accused.

District Judge Bob Moore has set bail for Levy Lee Edmondson, who is charged with the murder of Department of Public Safety Trooper Troy Hogue, at \$500,000.

This is a rather small amount of bail when considering the crime with which Edmondson has been charged. All that is needed for release is \$50,000 - 10 percent of the full amount.

It can be argued that Edmondson is only accused, not yet convicted, and therefore should not have to remain in jail throughout his trial. It can also be argued the amount is fair.

The Constitution of the United States guarantees us the right to a fair and speedy trial. The Edmondson process has moved right along. The road to the O.J. Simpson trial is also a case point for the justice system moving along at a fair clip. And, during all this time, Simpson has remained in jail without

bond. Several factors need to be considered including flight risk and safety of the accused.

The crime with which he is charged stirred this community. It has touched the hearts of people who considered Hogue more than a trooper, but a friend as well.

It is conceivable that Edmondson's safety might be jeopardized by someone who has not forgotten what happened. At least in jail, he has the protection of the Sheriff's Office deputies and jailers, whereas outside of the protective confines of the jail, he doesn't.

As for flight, when faced with the choice of living on the run or living in prison, possibly facing a death penalty, it could be an easy choice.

This is a capital offense - murder. Bail should reflect the heinousness of the crime. \$500,000 does not.



## Keeping the Pyle flame burning

Evelyn Hobson's kind and measured voice evokes Indiana cornfields and wide porches populated by regular folk. It helps make her perfect for the job of keeping Ernie Pyle's memory alive.

For the past 17 years Evelyn has been curator of the Ernie Pyle State Historical Site in Dana, Ind., Pyle's hometown. For 11 of those years she lived upstairs in the museum, his childhood home.

Evelyn was the logical person to accept Ernie's posthumous Purple Heart, and she made the first airplane trip of her life on official Pyle business: the dedication of a memorial in South Carolina. For nearly two decades she has lived and breathed Pyle, acting in the most selfless determined fashion I have ever witnessed. Too bad Ernie's not alive to write about her.

I'll never forget the day Evelyn let me rummage the cuffed Pyle had with him when he died. I sat on the floor of her cramped quarters, campfire-

style, nervous as a lizard about handling Pyle's things. A cloth cap was there among the other belongings, folded up for rainy day use, just the way Pyle had left it. I held it a long time and felt blessed.

Evelyn lived there amongst Ernie's papers and personal effects for all those years, and I think it changed her life. It's made her fiercely loyal to a dead man, I know that.

Before she went to work for the museum, Evelyn Hobson only had a glancing interest in Pyle; she knew he was a famous war correspondent from Indiana, that's about it. "All you have to do is read one or two columns and you're hooked," she says. At least that's what happened to her.

For 16 years she's pushed for publication of Pyle's early aviation columns, "because there's so much important aviation history there, told by the person who could tell it best," she insists.

In April, her fondest dream comes true with the release of the book "On a Wing and a Prayer: The Aviation Columns of Ernie Pyle." Pyle wrote the columns for the Washington Daily News between 1928 and 1932. Because they were not syndicated, a relative few have read Pyle's apt description of aviation pioneers Jimmy Doolittle, Amelia Earhart, Charles Lindbergh and others.

Ohio newspaper columnist Mike Harden helped Evelyn edit the columns, which she

painstakingly transcribed from badly blurred copies finally located in the Library of Congress. To her the big box of words was precious.

"If I were a blues aficionado, this would be like finding the missing song of Robert Johnson," Harden says. "It's a piece. It's up to the public to judge how important a piece, but this makes the bookcase complete."

Ernie's inimitable, economic style was emerging: "They call him 'Hard Luck' Bates. Some fliers won't let him ride with them, and a few of the more superstitious won't even let him touch their planes. He just naturally brings bad luck to flying men, they say. ... Bates walked into the hangar, covered with mud and grease and carrying a bent propeller over his shoulder."

Pyle wrote about the early and daring Air Mail pilots and landing by the lights of the Capitol dome. He wrote about the playboy forced to land inside a prison grounds. He was not as good as he would get, but he was Pyle.

## Chess team from tough town looking for respect

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill. (AP) — A.M. Jackson Elementary School, a haven for gifted students in one of America's poorest cities, is looking for respect as a chess contender.

Eight members of the chess team will test their skills against 1,000 players May 12-14 at the National Junior High Chess Championships. To get there, Jackson had to defeat five other local public schools, two private schools and plenty of stereotypes.

"Coming out of East St. Louis, people don't want to recognize us as being as good as we really are," said 13-year-old Jason Russell. "We are really the best team in Illinois and Missouri, but no one wants to accept that."

Jason, considered the team's top player with 12 wins and two losses in league play this year, spends two hours a day practicing the game with about 36 classmates.

Their school is considered the district's math and science academy for about 370 gifted students. Children study Latin, trigonometry and pre-algebra, but the computer lab is closed because of a teacher shortage.

In a district so broke the state took it over, the best chess-

boards available are worn-out plastic sheets.

"They do have some problems here in the district and the city, but we try to get around that with something positive," said James Grady Jr., who has been the team's volunteer coach for two years. "Chess keeps their mind focused on something positive. It starts them out early and that way they don't want to hit the streets."

Grady also keeps tabs on their school work, and players have called him several times at home with chess questions.

For 9-year-old Richard Mann, the drive to win is personal. He recalls a white player refusing to shake his hand after being defeated.

"It made me feel mad, because I won a match and I should get the respect of a handshake," said Richard, who is black and has been on the team three years. "I think it's determined me to be better."

Respect is a goal shared by most of the team.

"I think a lot of times we go into places and they underestimate us because we come from East St. Louis," said 12-year-old Mikah Dortch, who dreams of becoming a musician, nuclear

physicist or pediatrician. "We want to show everybody what we can do if they give us a chance."

The Jackson school stands as an exception to the city's overwhelming urban blight. Dilapidated homes and empty, overgrown lots strewn with garbage surround the brick school building.

"I suppose you could say that it would be unusual for them to do as well as they do because of their environment," said Charles Zeller, the chess league's executive secretary. "But chess is an equalizer. You sit across the board from somebody, and it doesn't matter what economic background or culture they're from."

The team almost didn't make it to the national competition in Dearborn, Mich. With only two weeks to go, Grady was \$1,500 short of the \$2,500 needed to send six players, a chaperon and himself.

The district managed to find about \$1,000, a funeral home chipped in \$800 and a hospital another \$200. Together with private donations and \$1,000 from the Casino Queen riverboat, \$3,500 has been raised — enough to take eight players.

## Chain gangs return to Alabama

ELKMONT, Ala. (AP) — The governor's get-tough policy on inmates took a step into the past today as Alabama became the first state to reinstitute chain gangs.

Inmates wearing white uniforms imprinted with "chain gang" got off five buses, then knelt in groups of five on the wet, dew-covered grass as guards placed the shiny steel shackles around their ankles.

Soon scores were shuffling amid the jingling of the legirons along the roadside at the Interstate 65 exit near Elkmont, several miles from the Tennessee line, bringing back an earlier prison era.

Critics charge that shackling men together and making them pick up trash on heavily traveled highways is inhumane and will cause problems in the state's 18 prisons, which hold nearly 20,000 prisoners.

But almost 400 inmates from Limestone Correctional Facility were assigned to the chain gang duty today.

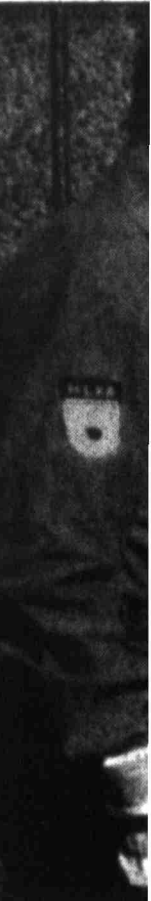
The inmates held a trash bag, swing blade or shovel with one hand and the chain with the other as they began making their way along the roadside in groups of five. Guards toting guns watched them. Guard dogs barked from nearby prison pickup trucks.

# U.S., Iraq differ on prisoners' condition

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — One of the two Americans imprisoned in Iraq was hospitalized for tests but discharged and returned to his cell after no problems were found, the Iraqi government said today.

The statement by Information Minister Hamed Yousef Humadi contradicted a U.S. State Department announcement Tuesday that both David Daliberti and William Barloon had been hospitalized with chest pains.

"Only one of the prisoners was admitted to the hospital for medical tests and not two," Humadi said in a statement.

"He is receiving very good medical care. He has been taken back from the hospital in very good condition and the doctors have found no problem."

Humadi did not say which of the two men was hospitalized or

give the exact nature of his ailment. Daliberti is known to have a heart condition.

Humadi added that the men's wives, Linda Barloon and Kathy Daliberti, who are in Iraq pleading for their freedom, "can visit the prisoners any time and daily as long as they stay in Baghdad." No further details

were given.

Earlier, diplomats said Daliberti, 41, and Barloon, 39, were hospitalized after complaining they felt ill during a meeting Monday in the Abu Ghraib prison with their wives.

"We believe that on medical grounds alone there is every reason to release these two guys," State Department spokesman Nicholas Burns said Tuesday in Washington.

The United States asked a Polish diplomat who looks after U.S. interests in Baghdad to visit the hospital immediately, Burns said.

The Polish diplomat, Ryszard Krystosik, who represents the United States in the Iraqi capital in the absence of U.S.-Iraq diplomatic relations, has been denied access to the prisoners for the past three weeks without reason.

## Serbs shell Croatian capital in retaliation for offensive

ZAGREB, Croatia (AP) — Explosions resounded through downtown Zagreb today, a day after Serbs targeted the capital with rocket-propelled cluster bombs that killed five people. Some injuries were reported and authorities announced a general alert.

Tuesday's attacks by Serbs shocked the Croatian capital, which has been relatively removed from the carnage and suffering occurring elsewhere in the former Yugoslavia.

At least five explosions, two loud ones and three smaller ones, were audible shortly after noon today.

Independent radio 101 quoted

officials as saying three projectiles had landed, one on a suburb and two in the city center. There was no confirmation of the report.

Ambulances and fire engines raced through the city center, and people deserted cars and trams to scurry for cover in shelters and doorways.

Witnesses driving past the Academy for Dramatic Arts near the National Theater downtown said the academy appeared damaged and one or two people were injured.

The main hospital said wounded had begun to arrive, but gave no figures.

It was not immediately clear

whether the city was once more under Serb attack in retaliation for a Croat offensive that began Monday.

The Croatian offensive, the largest since 1991, aimed to seize a section of the key Zagreb-Belgrade highway and isolate one of the four large chunks of territory held by Serb rebels.

Croatian troops entered Okucani, a Serb stronghold on the highway, sending Serbs streaming into Bosnia. A Croatian statement Tuesday said Serb rebels had "stopped giving organized resistance" around the highway.

U.N. officials reported that,

amid the confusion, fourteen Nepalese peacekeepers were still missing.

Six hundred Serb soldiers surrendered Tuesday following talks that ended after nightfall in the nearby town of Pakrac. Their commander promised to turn in all their heavy weaponry by tonight and all other arms within five days.

But the immediate price the Croats paid for their military success was high. Croatian Serb gunners just 30 miles from Zagreb turned their rocket launchers on the city.

Authorities said 11 rocket-propelled cluster bombs hit the city and its outskirts Tuesday. Six of

the rockets slammed into downtown streets filled with shoppers and a park where people were taking a mid-morning stroll. Another five missiles landed close to the airport, south of the city.

Five people were killed and more than 120 wounded in downtown Zagreb. Another six civilians were killed by Serb shellfire elsewhere in Croatia. The number of Serb casualties was not known.

The Zagreb rocket attacks were "tantamount to a declaration of full-scale war" by the Serbs, said the American Ambassador to Croatia, Peter Galbraith.

**Emissions testing company sues state**

AUSTIN (AP) — The company previously commissioned to inspect millions of Texas vehicles under a centralized emissions testing program has sued the state for more than \$150 million for scrapping the project.

In a lawsuit filed Tuesday in Travis County state court, Tejas Testing Technology says it may not be able to stay in business. The suit alleges the state breached a 7-year contract under which the company was to test vehicles in Houston, Dallas-Fort Worth and Beaumont-Port Arthur.

The suit names as defendants the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission; its chairman, John Hall; board members Pam Reed and Peggy Garner; executive director Dan Pearson and state Attorney General Dan Morales.

**Wal-Mart spares Larry Lobster**

CLEBURNE (AP) — Larry, a 15-pound lobster who was promised as a prize to the winner of a Wal-Mart promotion, instead flew to retirement Tuesday off the Maine coast.

"I knew he was old, I knew he wouldn't make a good meal, and he had a name," explained Sandy Wheeler, the secretary who called Wal-Mart manager Gary Smith and asked him to spare Larry.

Wheeler also called People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals. The Washington-based animal-rights organization offered to pay Larry's air fare to Portsmouth, N.H. A Portsmouth woman volunteered to transport Larry and release him into the ocean near Kennebunkport, Maine.

Based upon his size, Larry is at least 105 years old, said Tracy Reiman, a PETA spokesman.

Winners in the Wal-Mart promotion will get smaller, unnamed lobsters instead.

**Bill to include whistleblower funds**

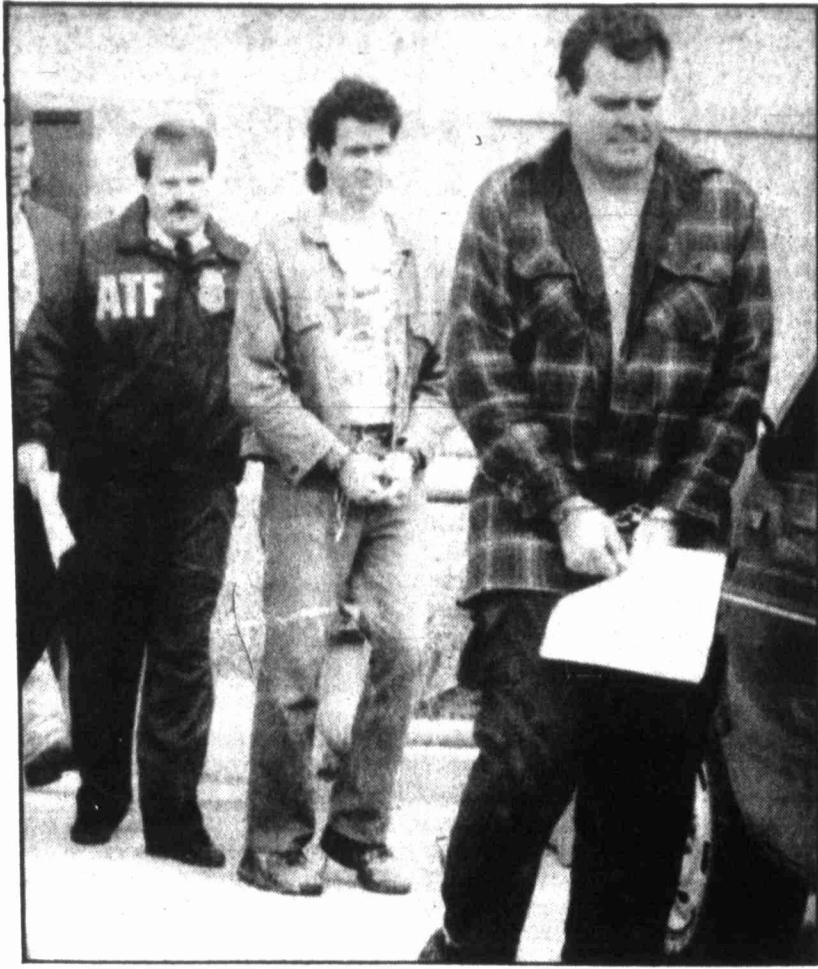
AUSTIN (AP) — A former state employee awarded \$13.5 million by a jury in 1991 under the Texas Whistleblower Act finally may be paid, state lawmakers say.

Sen. John Montford, D-Lubbock, and Rep. Rob Junell, D-San Angelo, who chair the Legislature's appropriations committees, said Tuesday a bill is being drafted that will include money for George Green, a former Department of Human Services worker.

"If the state were to pay me, and I firmly believe they will, they will have met the minimum standards of their obligation," Green said. "It would mean that civil justice is available and honored by the courts and the state for all of us."

The DHS fired Green, 47, in December 1989 from his \$36,000-a-year safety officer job overseeing renovation projects. His dismissal came after he threatened to report alleged kickbacks and other violations surrounding agency contracts.

**House sends gun bill back to Senate**

AUSTIN (AP) — The House and Senate may be headed for a shootout over the concealed gun bill.

The House gave final approval Tuesday to legislation that would allow Texans to vote on the issue. But the bill's author vowed to remove the referendum or fight to kill his own legislation.

"I would not be supportive of the bill if it had a referendum," Sen. Jerry Patterson, R-Pasadena, said after the House returned the bill to the Senate on a voice vote.

Patterson said he would reject House changes and call for a House-Senate conference committee to work out differences.

"You don't have referendums on the First Amendment, the Second Amendment, the Fourth Amendment or the Fifth Amendment," Patterson said. "It's not subject to a popularity contest."

The bill, which would allow Texans to be licensed to carry concealed guns, easily passed the Senate in March but faced a tougher time in the House.

The measure was amended during an almost nine-hour debate Monday to make it more restrictive and to allow Texans to vote on the issue in November.

The statewide referendum would be nonbinding, meaning it would not affect the bill's implementation should it become law.

However, some have suggested that lawmakers would have no choice but to overturn the law if voters were to reject the gun bill in such a referendum.

"This is about as disingenuous as you can get," Patterson said. "Many of the folks who voted for that referendum are folks who didn't have the courage just to vote 'no' on

final passage because of fear of political repercussions, so they're trying to give themselves some cover.

"That's not the way to do business," he said.

Rep. Sherri Greenberg, who sponsored the referendum amendment, said opinion polls have shown the public is divided on the issue and that voters, therefore, should be able to vote on it.

She acknowledged that a vote against the gun bill — even in a nonbinding referendum — could carry the weight needed to change lawmakers' minds.

"I think at that time, it would just be up to those in leadership positions ... to decide what they thought would be in the best interest," said Ms. Greenberg, D-Austin. "I think that the opinion of the people is meaningful."

There's no way to tell whether House and Senate conferees will approve the referendum, which was narrowly adopted by the House, 74-70.

**Woman killed, mom injured in attack**

PARIS, Texas (AP) — A 49-year-old woman was killed and her mother critically injured in an attack at their residence Tuesday morning, authorities said.

A neighbor, Weldon Slaton, said he called 911 when a passerby reported a fire at the residence across the street where Sherry Kay Jones lived with her mother, Edith Jones.

Slaton said when he ran to help, he was met at the door by

the mother, who told him, "Sherrrie Kay's dead inside." He and the passerby, identified as Pat Murphy, entered the house, but had trouble finding the body because of the smoke.

Slaton said the older woman told him she heard their dog barking, and a man forced his way into the home from the back yard. She said she offered him money and their car not to hurt her or her daughter, the neighbor said.

"He cut both their throats with a knife. ... It was horrible," Slaton said.

Sherrrie Kay Jones had been employed a little more than a year as a mortgage loan originator for a bank.

"The older Mrs. Jones made it through surgery, but is in critical condition," said Lisa Hughes, a Paris Police Department dispatcher.

Police in Paris said they had no suspect in custody Tuesday.

**Officers survive fall off interstate**

DALLAS (AP) — Observers said it was unbelievable that two police officers were not more seriously injured when their vehicle shot off a ramp on Interstate 45 and landed upside down 30 feet below.

Rookie officer Denise Akers, 24, and Senior Cpl. Richard F. Wilson, 32, a seven-year veteran, were taken by helicopter for medical treatment.

Akers, who was pinned inside the mangled patrol car for about half an hour, suffered only cuts and scrapes. She was taken to Methodist Medical Center. Wilson suffered a head gash and broken facial bones and was taken to Baylor University Medical Center.

The accident occurred shortly before 5 p.m. Tuesday at the Overton exit on I-45, about four miles southeast of downtown Dallas.

The incident began about 4:45 p.m. Tuesday when two officers were flagged down by an apartment complex resident who reported a nearby domestic disturbance.

Soon after, an unidentified man ran from behind the complex and jumped into a Ford Mustang. Policewoman R.W. Hills said that as she tried to stop the man and question him, he drove up a curb and attempted to run her down.

A southbound chase on I-45 began minutes later. Akers and Wilson were in pursuit when it appeared the driver was about to take the Overton exit, but he instead darted back onto the interstate, witnesses said.

The officers, going between 80 mph and 90 mph, couldn't cut back in time, hit an abutment and plummeted off the ramp.

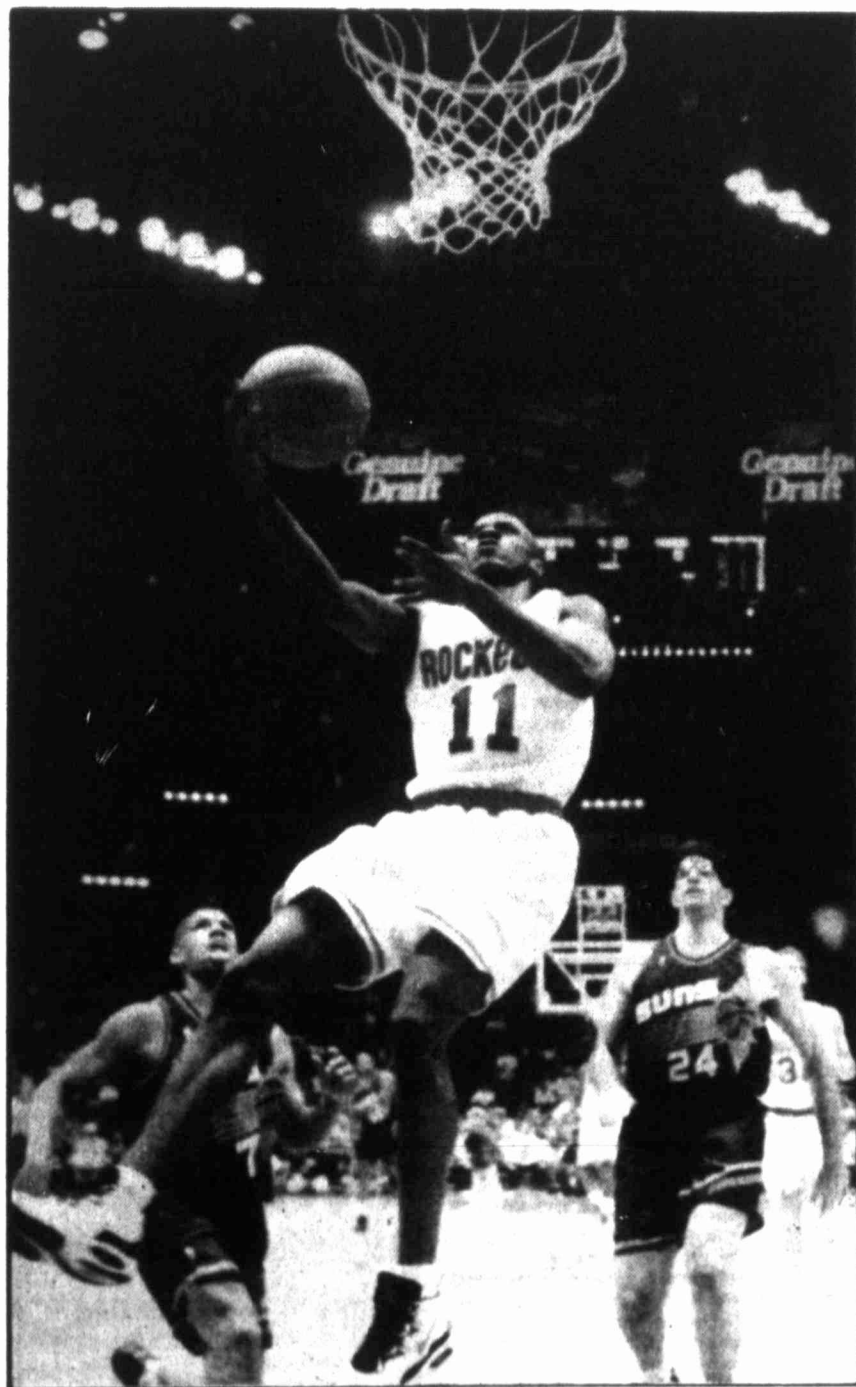

## 'Mad Max' out for season

HOUSTON (AP) — He was a key reason the Houston Rockets won the NBA title, a streaky but devastating gunner who could turn a game around with his clutch 3-point shooting.

But that was last season and now Vernon Maxwell's season of controversy is over.

The Rockets admitted they were uncomfortable in doing so, but they placed the disgruntled guard on an indefinite leave of absence Tuesday, ending a season that included a 10-game suspension for charging a fan at

Portland.

Maxwell's final controversy came in Salt Lake City after he played only 16 minutes in Thursday's 102-100 loss to Utah in Game 1 of their first round playoff series.

Maxwell took the final shot of that game, an errant 3-pointer and he later feuded with coach Rudy Tomjanovich. On Friday, Maxwell complained of having a hamstring injury.

He was sent back to Houston for treatment Saturday, just before the Rockets' Game 2 win.

# The Steers are in

One bad pitch — and a pretty good hitter — has put the Big Spring Steers back into the state baseball playoffs.

Lake View starting pitcher Sterlin Gilbert held Big Spring in check for most of the day until he hung a curve ball to Trey Terrazas. Terrazas, the Steers' senior first baseman, pounced on the mistake, hitting a two-run home run and giving Big Spring a 2-1 victory over Lake View at Steer Park Tuesday afternoon.

The win puts Big Spring (16-11-1 overall, 6-4 in District 4-4A play) into the state playoffs for the fifth straight year. The Steers, 4-4A runner-up, will play District 3-4A champion El Paso Jefferson (14-8, 5-0) in a one-game bi-district playoff at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday at Sul Ross State University in Alpine.

For five innings, both Gilbert and Big Spring starter Zac Leslie engaged in a pitchers' duel before both teams struck for all their offensive damage in the sixth.

Lake View (11-12, 4-6) struck first in the inning. With two

outs, Kevin Smetana reached on an infield single off Leslie's ankle, then went to second on a passed ball. Smetana then came home when Brady Gilbert laced a single to center field.

That one run looked as if it might be enough, because the Steers generated little against Gilbert — who limited Big Spring to four hits — and wasted their best scoring opportunity before the sixth.

The Steers put runners on the corners with no outs in the fifth on a single by catcher Rogelio Cervantes and an error by Lake View shortstop Beau Kiser. One out later, the Steers attempted a suicide squeeze, but Mike Sizenbach missed on the bunt attempt and Manuel Cervantes — running for his brother Rogelio — was dead at the plate. Gilbert then forced Leslie Adkins to foul out to the catcher to end the inning.

Having failed to score by

guile in the fifth, the Steers decided on a more direct approach in the sixth. Leslie led off with a single up the middle, then Terrazas laid into Gilbert's first pitch, crushing it over the left-field fence for the game-winner.

The homer, Terrazas' fifth of the year, defied a stiff cross-wind on its way out of the park, and surprised even the first baseman.

"In batting practice, me and (second baseman John Oliva) have hit some shots ... but Lord, I didn't know it was going to do that."

"I had an inkling in my mind to bunt," BSHS coach Bobby Doe said. "But anytime, they can hit it out, so I let him swing away ... It was a great pitchers' duel, a great defensive game."

Doe had worried that the Steers' blown scoring chance in the fifth was the turning point in the game, especially after Lake View came back in the top of the sixth to take the lead. That, combined with Gilbert's performance, had the coach feeling gloomy.

"You've got to be concerned when they've got a one-run lead and you're hitting into a cross-wind. And Gilbert

pitched a great game," Doe said. "For a sophomore, I was really impressed with him. I wish we had him."

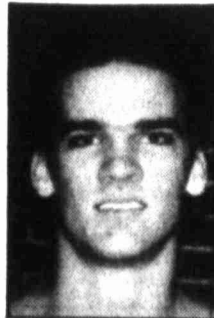
As good as Gilbert was, however, Leslie was even better. The junior right hander allowed only one more hit than Gilbert — five — and struck out 10 while walking four. Aside from Smetana in the sixth, Leslie did not allow a Lake View runner past second base the entire game.

"Going in before the game, I was nervous, but once I threw that first pitch, the butterflies were all gone," Leslie said.

If the Steers had lost to Lake View, they would have probably ended the season in a three-way tie with the Chiefs and Pecos for second, forcing at least one extra district game to determine the playoff representative.

"We knew we could still lose and make the playoffs, but we didn't want to get in that way," Leslie said. "We wanted to earn our way in."

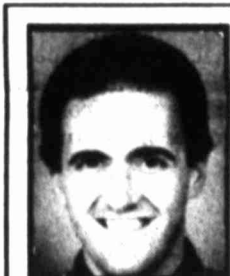

Monster in left field, no one starting celebrating more than Big Spring pitcher Zac Leslie.

Leslie had pitched a heck of a game Tuesday, but up until Terrazas' heroics, he looked like he'd be overshadowed by Lake View's Sterlin Gilbert.

Gilbert also had pitched a fine game, shutting out Big Spring through five innings. His curve ball was snapping, while his fastball was moving all over the place.

Then came the sixth, and a pitch Gilbert desperately wishes he could have back. It was a pitcher's worst nightmare: a curve ball that didn't curve. Instead, it came over the plate fat and lazy, as if begging Terrazas to take it for a ride.

Terrazas obliged. The quickest bat in the Big Spring lineup pounced on the ball, and within an instant everyone in Steer Park knew — Terrazas, Gilbert, the Steers, the fans — that the lead had just changed hands.

It seemed cruelly unfair to Gilbert, until you realized that it would be unfair for either him or Leslie to get tagged with the loss.

It is not a stretch to say the Steers will go just as far this season as Leslie's arm will take them. Head coach Bobby Doe has been singularly unsuccessful finding a consistent second or third starter this season, meaning Leslie has been — and will continue

to be — the man.

He has pitched the vast majority of Big Spring's games so far — nothing 10 of the Steers' 16 wins — and will probably start all the Steers' playoff games.

Coaches have an option in the state playoffs to have each series either a one-game situation or a best-of-three affair. Doe, as he did in 1992, has said the Steers will hinge their hopes on one-game playoffs.

That means they are going to ride Leslie's arm as far as they can.

"I know I'll carry a lot of the load," Leslie said. "But it doesn't bother me. I've played under pressure before."

## Mariners pound Rangers with 8-run eighth; Astros win at Wrigley Field

ARLINGTON (AP) — Tino Martinez's two-run single triggered a 13-run barrage in the final two innings as the Seattle Mariners beat the Texas Rangers 15-3 Tuesday night.

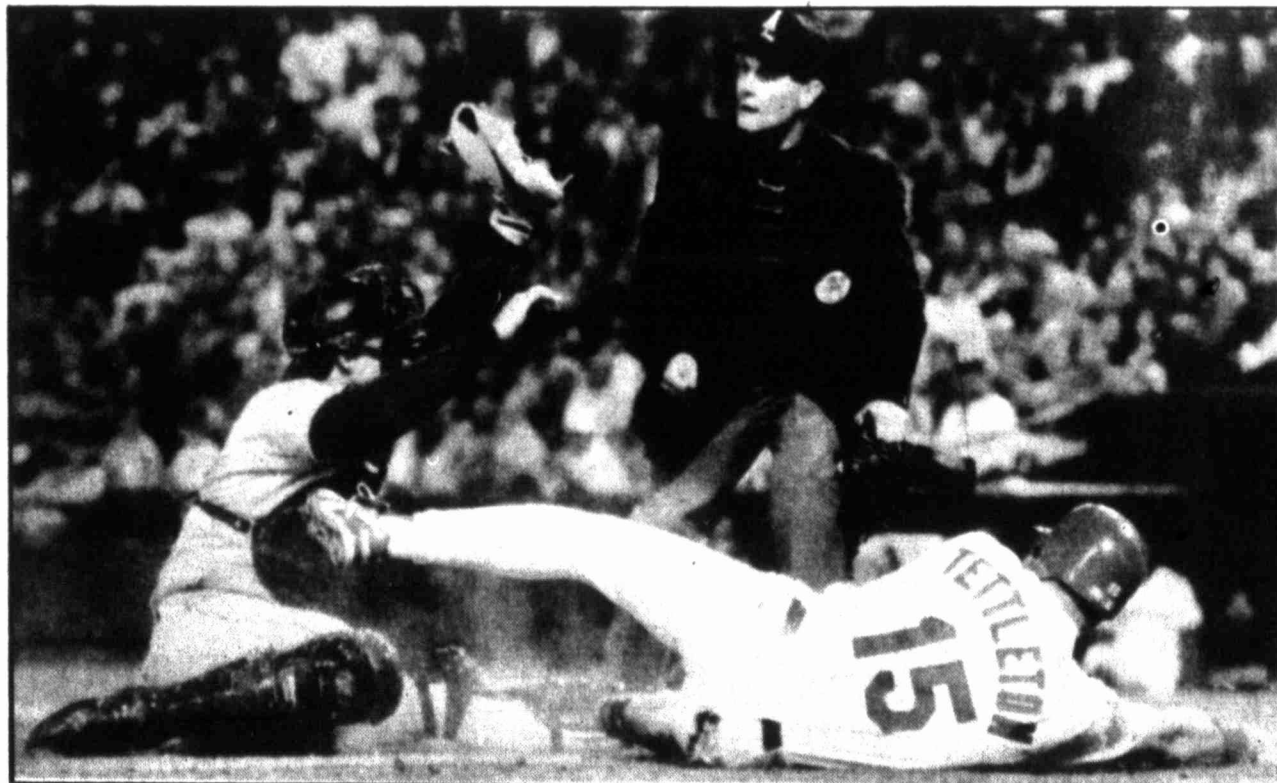
Jim Dougherty (1-0) threw one pitch and got one out for the win. Todd Jones pitched two

Pitcher Doug Drabek gave up seven hits in 5 2-3 innings, walking five and striking out two.

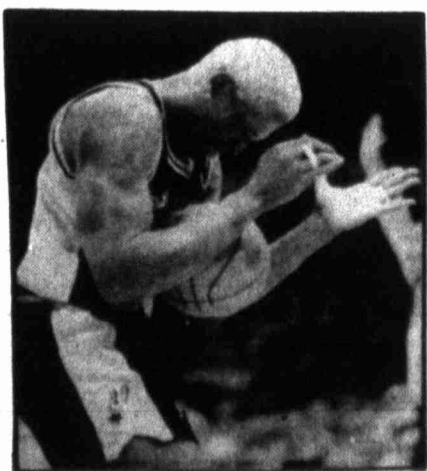

# Lady Steer senior saves her best leap for regional meet

Leave it to Kathy Smith to go out in style.

Smith, a senior long jumper at Big Spring High School, is in the final weeks of her fabulous high school athletic career, and what better way to finish than taking another trip to the state track finals in Austin? Smith finished seventh in state last season but slid out of the spotlight this season.

Why? Smith's season-best long jump of 16 feet, 3 inches wasn't close to the 17-9 3/4 she leaped last season to win the Region 1-4A championship. In fact, in the days before this year's regional meet - Friday and Saturday in San Angelo - Smith said her best chance for another trip to Austin would be in the relays, not the long jump.

Perhaps Smith was trying to lull her opponents to sleep.

Friday she smashed her season-best mark, leaping 17-10 to take runner-up among Region 1-4A long jumpers - good enough for a state berth.

Smith, who is also an all-district volleyball player, seems to do her best when she absolutely has to. Friday Lake View's Tonya Allen had jumped 17-9, and Smith needed to beat that to make the state finals.

"I had just seen Tonya Allen go 17-9, and I remember looking at her mark and thinking, 'That's not that far.' And then I jumped it.

"Last year I had a better pre-season - pre-regional, I guess you'd say - than I did this year, and I didn't really expect to go in the long jump. When I found out I jumped 17-10 it was a surprise to me."

Smith is the only senior on



this season's Lady Steer track team. In one sense that bodes well for the future, since the rest of the Lady Steers should return next season. However, Smith's value seems to go far beyond her relay splits and long-jump distances. Ask any of the underclassmen on the team, and they'll tell you.

Smith will be missed after she graduates. "I thank Kathy Smith for this season," said sophomore Kandi Cline not long after running the winning anchor leg on the 1,600-meter relay Saturday night. "She's pushed me to be where I am."

Smith has led by example all season, and that example has led all the way to Austin. Smith, freshman shot putter Nadia Cole and the 1,600 relay of Rita Casillas, Keesha Lott, Mari Carnero and Cline will all be there, and Smith will have one last lesson to teach. Don't forget - she's performed at Austin before, and the others haven't.

Smith's looking to improve on last year's seventh-place finish. "I don't know what I'll do differently this year - just practice harder," Smith said. "Last year I was kind of surprised to be going to state, and I thought getting that far was good enough. This year, I'm going to practice really hard."

## Cookbook celebrates mealtimes, memories

Thelma Carlile talked about writing a book for 10 years.

"I had always wanted to do a cookbook," she said. "I'm sure everybody got tired of hearing me talk about it."

But the local resident, who grew up on a Michigan farm, also had a lot of memories she wanted to share with others.

When she finally got around to writing the book, she found a way to combine the two. The end result is "Mealtimes and Memories," a self-published cookbook filled with personal remembrances and packed with more than 550 recipes.

"Writing it was a lot of work, a lot more than I thought," Carlile said. To get ready, she took a computer course at Howard College to learn more about her PC.

Her book was printed by a company in Memphis, Tenn. and the cover was designed by Carlile's nephew, a graphic artist in Indiana.

To sell the book, Carlile has placed it at several local businesses, and always carries around with her.

"I keep them in my trunk," she said. "I try never to be without one. You never know when someone will be interested."

Her book includes recipes

from all categories including main dishes, snacks and appetizers, desserts, bread and vegetables. Many of the recipes were given to her by family and friends, and she's tried them all.

Although it's not a health food cookbook, Carlile said it includes ways to lighten recipes by cutting fat, salt and sugar. It also includes her tips on meal planning, hospitality and stocking your kitchen.

Carlile should know about food. She cooks homemade, from-scratch meals every day and has for many years. She owns more than 100 cookbooks.

"I've always loved food," she said, describing the "restaurants" she used to play as a child.

"We made hamburger patties out of mud mixed with sawdust," she said. "We used big leaves for the buns."

One of the first dishes she cooked was cornbread, and Carlile still has the old pan she used. Later came cakes, including chiffon cakes of all kinds, which are still a favorite of Carlile's husband, Cleo.

The author said she likes all the recipes in the book, but has a few favorites. Some of those are Zucchini, Rice and Beans; Tapioca Pudding; and Zucchini Fudge Cake -- which won the author a prize at the Howard County Fair.

## Be prepared with summer projects

Even though summers seem to get shorter and busier every year, time still drags for many school-age children.

Parents can help by getting kids started on a summer project to fill their time off.

One project useful to the whole family is a home inventory. A home inventory is a record of everything you own. It is a valuable

aid in case of a fire, theft, or other loss of property.

It provides a basis for estimating lost value and establishing insurance claims. In addition, a home inventory can help your family determine the amount of insurance you need to cover your possessions.

For kids, creating a home inventory is helpful for other reasons. It makes them aware of the value of items in their home. It gives them a chance to find out the history of family heirlooms or antiques that have been passed from genera-

tion to generation. And it provides a source of fun and pride through taking pictures and producing a useful project.

Equip your children with camera and film, pens, loose-leaf paper and a notebook binder. On each sheet of paper, your child or children will place a picture of one item in your home and a description of the item.

The description should include information such as the manufacturer, model and serial number. For some items, like appliances or electronics, your child may be able to find a current newspaper or magazine advertisement showing a similar item. That ad can be added to the inventory page to represent replacement value of the item.

Review the inventory with the children periodically and discuss the items they have listed. You may be able to add information about when the item was purchased, how much it cost, or how long it has been in the family.

Remember to include items stored in the attic, garage, drawers and closets as well as easily overlooked items such as furniture and wall hangings.

As the children conduct the inventory, consider having

## Marfa celebrates 40th anniversary of 'Giant' with reunion

MARFA (AP) — Forty years ago, the small town of Marfa was invaded by Hollywood and together they created a "Giant."

Elizabeth Taylor, James Dean and Rock Hudson took Marfa by storm during the summer of 1955 to film "Giant," the sweeping Texas saga of cattle and oil.

The movie will have a return engagement May 27, when some of the cast and crew members and the film's aficionados return to Marfa for the film's 40th reunion.

"The cast and crew literally took over the entire town. Everyone was working for Warner Bros. that summer," Kirby Warnock of the Big Bend

Quarterly, told The Odessa American.

In addition to the Chamber of Commerce, The Big Bend Quarterly and the Cibolo Creek Ranch are sponsoring the event.

Warnock said the movie crew rented the entire Paisano hotel, ranchland and several houses for three months. "People think that the shooting of 'Lonesome Dove' was something. 'Giant' took over the town."

"Lonesome Dove," a television miniseries based on Larry McMurtry's novel, was shot in Alpine, Fort Davis and Marfa area.

"It was the last days of the old Hollywood studios,"

Warnock said. "Warner Bros. had a plane parked at the Marfa airport to fly the film to Hollywood every night. They processed the film overnight

and flew it back into Marfa the next morning."

A 7 p.m. screening of "Giant" will include a roundtable discussion afterward. Panelists will include Robert Hinkle, a western actor who was the dialogue and roping coach for Dean and other members of the cast, and Fran Bennett, who played Judy Benedict, Hudson and Taylor's daughter.

"Giant," based on the Edna Ferber novel, was one of the first movies that didn't define its heroes heroically, a la John Wayne in the Alamo or other typical westerns of the period.

Nor did it focus on the traditional cowboy but on the new breed of West Texan: the oilman.

The logistics of the film's screening have been a little difficult because Marfa hasn't had a movie theater in 20 years. And the first proposed screening site, Marfa City Hall, burned down earlier this spring.

Now "Giant" will be shown in the small town's high school auditorium.

## Death row inmate pleads his case in cyberspace

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — Girvies Davis is on death row for murder — and on the Internet asking for clemency.

Tap into the Internet and there he is: pictures of him, stories about the case, a copy of his clemency petition and a recording of him saying he's "not a murderer."

"It's mind boggling," said Ronald Rotunda, a law professor at the University of Illinois at Champaign. "It is appropriate for people to express their view to the governor, and the Internet is the late-20th-century way of doing it."

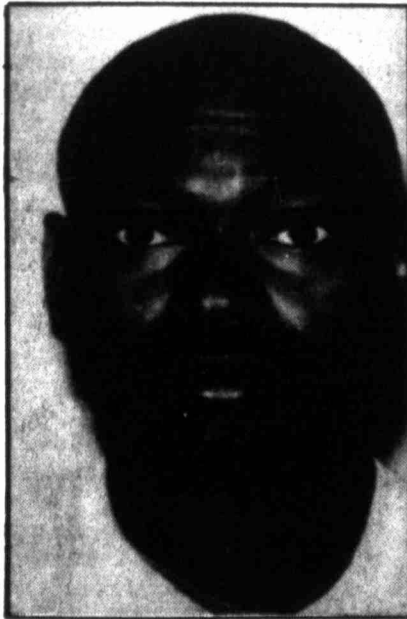
Davis, 37, is on death row for the Dec. 22, 1978, murder of Charles Biebel in Biebel's mobile home near Belleville, Ill., about eight miles east of St. Louis.

Davis, who has maintained his innocence after initially confessing, is scheduled to die May 17.

His attorneys, from the high-powered Chicago law firm of Jenner & Block, filed a petition for clemency last week with the Prisoner Review Board and also put the case on the Internet.

They say Davis was coerced by police into confessing to the Biebel murder and other crimes; they also say that the confessions are worthless because Davis is illiterate.

He has been convicted of three other murders and is

serving two 80-year sentences for two of them. He was sentenced to death for the third, the 1980 killing of an 83-year-old blind woman, but the sentence was overturned on appeal and he has not been resentenced.

Aside from the Biebel confession, no evidence links him to

the crime scene or a murder weapon, his attorneys say.

"We firmly believe the facts demonstrate that he's not guilty," said Brian Murphy, one of Davis' attorneys.

They decided to turn to cyberspace because "death penalty cases have become so run-of-the-mill that it's not necessarily a big story anymore that someone's being executed," Murphy said.

It may be working.

Within five days of being posted, about 20,000 people in the United States, Canada, Great Britain and Australia logged on the Internet and read about the case, Davis' attorneys say.

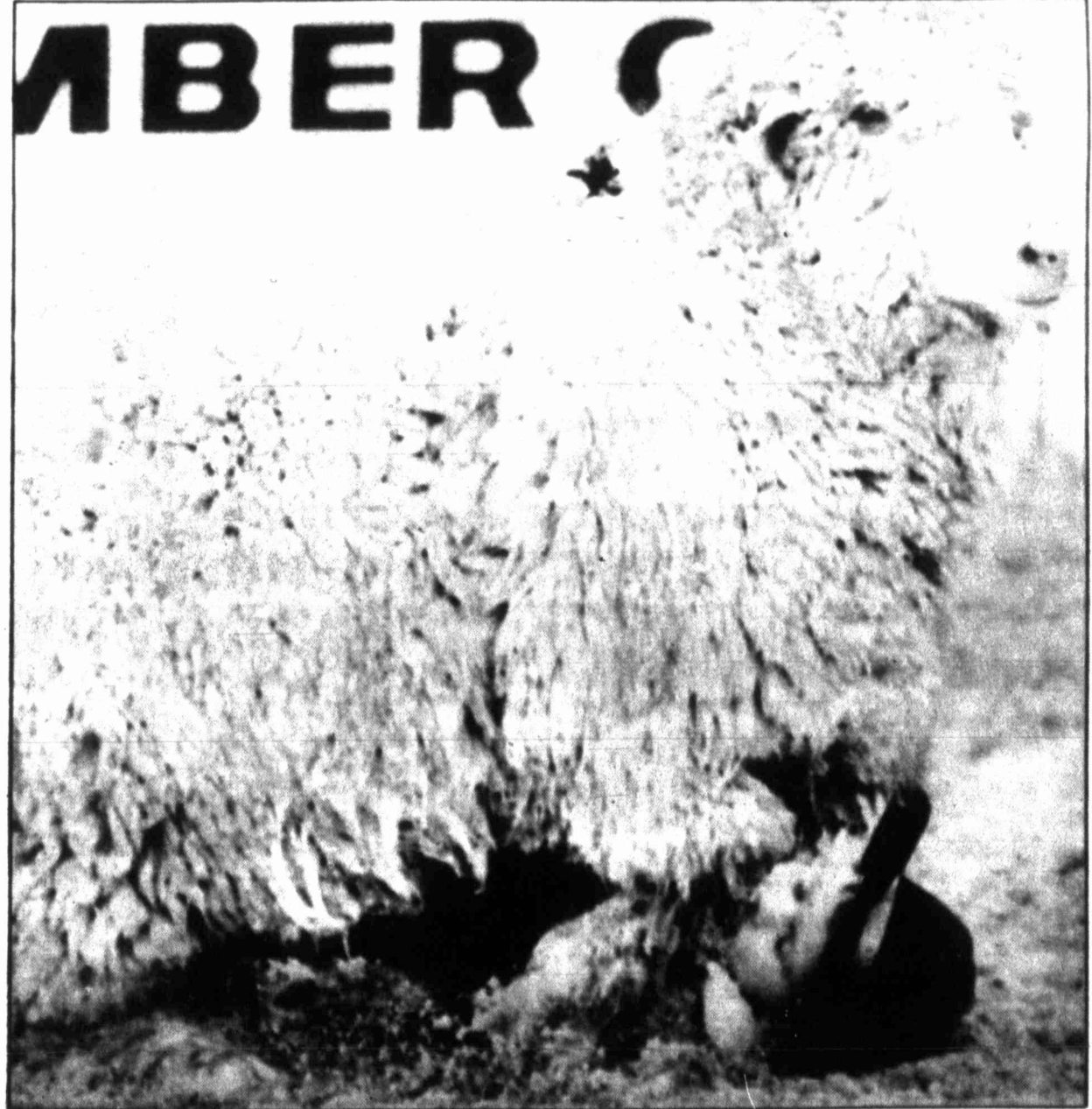
In the message, Davis asks readers to send a message to Gov. Jim Edgar. Within four days, about 200 e-mail messages had been received by the governor, said spokesman Dan Egler.

Ray Schroeder, an associate professor who teaches Internet courses at Springfield-based Sangamon State University, said he'd never seen the Internet used in a death penalty case.

"I would see this as a way that inmates or their attorneys could reach millions of people in a short period of time to try to put pressure on a governor or a parole board," he said.

Officials say pressure via e-mail won't have much effect on a decision for clemency.

**Recreating Indian-style crafts**

WACO — Walking into Lee Bryan's teepee, you may think they've stepped back in time. When setting up his teepee, Bryan tries to re-create an authentic campsite using the materials and methods the Cheyenne tribe, among others, employed. He made many of the Indian-style artifacts he displays inside his teepee at festivals and rendezvous. Bryan said his teepee is constructed of canvas, although those in the Old West were often made of buffalo hide. Today, the buffalo is so rare that a hide costs as much as \$1,000, Bryan said. He said his 18-foot lodge is about the average size of a teepee used by Indians in the

1850s. However, especially wealthy or important members of the tribe would live in larger structures, often up to 30 feet tall. "The more horses and wives they owned, the wealthier they were considered," Bryan said. Religious symbols adorn Bryan's canvas structure. Near its door are the Cheyenne symbols for dragonflies. The birds on the design represent bright prospects, and the buffalo are thought to bring times of plenty. Bear track symbols are put there for courage, and the butterfly represents happiness. The design features deer running from east to west, which signifies good hunting. The canvas draping the pole frame is actually two pieces: an outer liner that stops about four inches above the ground surface and an inner liner that

goes to the ground and extends a few feet upward. It is designed so air goes from the inner liner, causing an updraft that will blow the smoke from the fire at the center of the interior up to the hole in the top of the tent. With the campfire blazing inside, Bryan said, the teepee is as warm as a Dutch oven. He said he's been in the teepee when it was 28 degrees outside, but the fire kept him comfortable. Outside the teepee is a pole on which hangs a buffalo skull painted bright yellow. It is painted with symbols for the raven, deer track and medicine wheels to protect the owner of the lodge. "The Indian was a deeply religious person," Bryan said.

**Small-town faces mean a lot**

I still live in the same small town where I was born. Here, we share knowledge of certain things. During the summer we all know where the wild raspberries grow. During the winter we know which intersections are the most treacherous. During the year we know who is cheating on his wife, who is having financial difficulties, who has a serious illness, and whose unmarried daughter is delivery room bound. Living in your neighbor's back pocket can give you a strong sense of community. It can also make you seriously crazy. I doubt if there's anyone in my hometown who hasn't considered hammering a "FOR SALE" sign on the front lawn and heading for parts unknown. A place where nobody knows their name, or their phone number, or their personal business. There are times when we grow weary of seeing the same old faces, and then there are times when we come to realize just how much those faces mean to us. On Palm Sunday our fire whistle blew, and our volunteer firefighters responded to a report of a house fire in a neighboring town. Just

moments later the whistle blew again. On a hilly, twisting back road, right outside of town, our fire truck had overturned. According to first reports some of the men were trapped inside, others lay on the road. They were broken, bloodied and in terrible pain. I thought of all the times the fire whistle would blow in the dead of night, and I'd curse it for waking me. I'd have the common decency to feel a brief pang of guilt before going back to sleep. After all, it wasn't my sorry butt that would be climbing out of a warm bed to help a neighbor in distress. At the fire hall and in our homes, the vigil began. Soon we would discover that the fire the men had been rushing to was a false alarm — a child's prank. Eventually we learned the names of the injured. I knew those names. I knew those faces. Some of them I had grown up with, some I had watched grow up. Some of those men had fought a fire at my home, a decade ago. The upstairs was gutted, but they saved my house. Because they were willing to put their lives on the line I still had a roof over my head. How grateful I was to those beautiful, soot-blackened faces. I've seen those faces, nearly frozen, as the men directed traffic on ice covered roads, helping me to get home safely. These were the faces that watched over my children every Halloween night. They had nothing better to do than patrol the streets so all the town's kids could go trick or treating without fear.

These faces were the first ones I saw at my parent's house the night my father, a founder of the fire company, had a heart attack. I had looked into these faces almost every day throughout my life and never once recognized them as the faces of heroes. A sign in front of the fire hall now reads, "WE MAY BE DOWN, BUT WE'RE NOT OUT." All of the injured men are recovering, thank God. We wait for them to return to their town, their homes and their families. We wait to once more see their beautiful faces, the ones we will never again take for granted.

**IN THE BAG**

Morel-hunters have their eyes cast downward these days, as they tiptoe through the woodland, seeking their prized mushroom-of-choice.

If foraging for wild mushrooms is not among your hobbies, then there's still hope for a morel meal.

American Spoon Foods in Petoskey, Mich., ships fresh morels, as available, and sells dried morels, too. Call 1-800-222-5886 for more information as the morel crop comes on.

Fresh morels are nutty-tasting, but very mild and delicate; it's the waffled caps that provide a unique mushroom experience.

American Spoon Foods ships the fresh morels overnight in a cooler with dry ice. The market price is not yet set. The American Spoon catalog offers dried morels — with more pronounced flavor — for \$18.95 an ounce.

After they're reconstituted, an ounce goes a long way in stuffing or wine sauce.

Spring means ants will eventually show up at picnics, and tiny flying insects may fly out of kitchen cupboards. The second plague is harder to handle.

A word to those trying to save grocery money by buying cereals, dry pet food and other grain products in bulk. Large sizes often lead to bugs hatching out or landing in open containers because it takes time to use up the food.

The best policy is to store whole-wheat flour, cornmeal and oats in the freezer. Buy smaller quantities of less-used grain products so they're consumed before causing a kitchen invasion.

The May issue of Martha Stewart Living magazine touts roasted asparagus: Heat oven to 500 degrees. Rinse asparagus well, cut off woody ends and line up on a parchment paper-lined baking sheet. Roast the uncovered asparagus 10-12 minutes or just until the tips start to brown. Serve on a platter with balsamic vinegar and freshly ground black pepper.

Readers who've tried it say they like it. But some chefs don't want the tips browned, so they recommend 8 minutes in the hot oven.

Heated buildings sap moisture from our skin, and heavy-duty sports call for quenching thirst with plenty of water. It's not just a concern during sultry summer weather.

According to the International Bottled Water Association, by the time you experience thirst, you have lost about 1 percent of your body weight. For a 150-pound person, that's about 3 cups of water.

**Trucker buddy brings the world to students**

CHARLESTON, W.Va. — Jackson Powell sees the country from the front seat of an 18-wheeler, and he's sharing his experiences with two groups of schoolchildren.

Powell, 29, is part of a national program called Trucker Buddy International that

matches students with truckers. He lives in Princeton, W.Va., but he drives all over the country and into Canada and Mexico for M.S. Carriers.

He has two classes he stays in touch with, a kindergarten class where his son Joshua goes to school, and a fourth-grade class at Elk Elementary Center near Charleston.

The Elk Elementary fourth-

graders call him "Wally," which is part of his CB handle, Wally Gator. During a recent visit, they crowded around him, asking questions and seeking a lift up into the cab of the truck.

"As you can tell, I've got friends," he said.

Trucker Buddy International is a non-profit program started in 1992 by longtime trucker

Gary King, who now lives in Arizona City, Ariz. After he began corresponding with a class, he encouraged others. Now 3,500 truckers participate in the program, King said.

The purpose of the program is to improve the image of the trucking industry and to encourage education, he said.

Elk Elementary teacher Kathy Johnson said she signed

up for the program after reading about it in a teaching magazine. Around Christmas, the students began communicating with Powell.

"I thought it would be good for the kids to have a role model in business," she said.

The postcards he sends encourages the students to study geography, she said.
