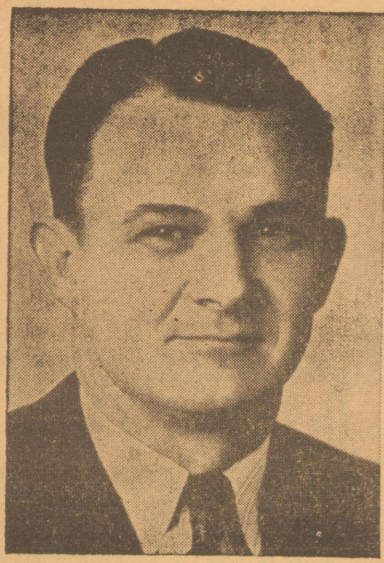

Five Year Suspended Sentence Levied In Humphries Trial Closing Wednesday

Hollingsworth And Goss Found Guilty In Counts

Verdict of 5 years suspended sentence was handed down Wednesday night in Farwell in the case charging Audie L. Humphries as an accomplice in an assault allegedly committed by Gordon Thurman, involving Miss Florence Sadler.

After deliberating... and a half, the jury returned verdict of guilty Wednesday night, recommended that sentence be suspended. Judge E. A. Bills complied.

Soil Conservation Service In Demand, Varied Practices Conducted During First Year Tenure of Local Operation

Mrs. Reynolds Asks For Election As County Treasurer

Announcements made in this issue of the candidacy of Mrs. H. T. (Mabel) Reynolds for the office of County Treasurer. Mrs. Reynolds, who lives six miles northwest of Bovina, is well known throughout the county, as she has taught schools in various districts for a number of years.

Says Mrs. Reynolds, "I should like to announce as a candidate for County Treasurer of Parmer County subject to the action of the Democratic Primary Election in July."

I am a graduate of West Texas State Teachers' College, and have taught school in Parmer County fourteen years.

I have been a property owner and legal voter since 1926. Your vote and influence are earnestly solicited."

Engineering Assistance Free to Cooperators

With the procurement of a land plane, the Parmer County Soil Conservation District No. 146, has added another service available to farmers of this area.

According to W. L. Edelman, chairman of the district board of supervisors, this plane will be available at a charge of \$10.00 per day for every day the farmer keeps the plane. A list of users is now being made at the SCS office. A deposit of \$100.00 will be required when receiving the plane, this deposit refundable at time of return of plane. A. L. Black Friona secretary of the board of supervisors will handle the business of leasing this equipment.

This instrument is specially equipped for high speed road travel, and may be easily towed behind a pickup, and it can be pulled by any type farm tractor.

Edelman states that other equipment may be purchased if the need demands.

The board of supervisors met Monday afternoon, and completed approval of some thirty-five working agreements between Parmer County farmers and the Soil Conservation Service.

The district, formed last April lists among its services the availability of the seven local technicians who plan programs for the cooperating farmers according to practices recommended by the board of supervisors. Practices include contour farming, cover cropping, crop residue management, range and pasture seeding and improvement, farm and ranch ponds, terraces, field diversion, irrigation land preparation, improved water application, water facilities, and collective terrace outlets.

The farmer receives this free engineering assistance, including plotting of a contour map of his individual farm; and he in turn supplies his own labor or work contractor. There is absolutely no cost to the cooperator except compliance and rental of any equipment. Contracts are signed for a five year period, with privilege of renewal by mutual agreement.

The Soil Conservation District stated Walter W. Smith, Work Conservationist, cooperates with the PMA program allowing the farmer and rancher to draw payments through the PMA program.

National Figure To Address Local Congregationalists

The Program of the spring institute of the Central South Conference of Congregational Christian Churches which is to be held in the Friona Congregational Church on Friday, May 12th, has been changed slightly. The original plan called for a church dinner in the evening. The dinner will be held at noon, instead. It will be for the members and friends of the church and their families. It will be addressed by Paul Reynolds of the national staff of the General Council of Congregational Churches.

The Rev. Royal J. Gibson the conference minister will be off the institute program as will Miss Lila Lind.

The opening session of the institute will be at 10:00 A. M. There is to be an afternoon session following the church dinner.

The host pastor is the Rev. George E. Meyer; the chairman in charge of local arrangements is Otho Whitefield, superintendent of the Congregational Sunday School.

More Honors Accorded Local Choir With Winning of Sweepstake Award

Eighty Groups Vie For League Ratings

Senior Choir Judged On Singing, Sight Reading

Winning all first division ratings at the Regional Interscholastic League Meet Friday netted for the Friona Senior Girls Choir a sweepstakes award. This honor carried with it the receiving of a beautiful silver plaque.

Some 80 Panhandle and South Plains senior and junior choirs were present for the annual affair at which senior groups are rated on both concert singing and sight reading. While junior choirs are judged on the singing only.

Friona, Borger, Brownfield and Amarillo were the only senior choir sweepstakes winners in all the 40 some odd competing sen-

ior choirs. These included male choirs, all girl groups, and mixed choruses.

The 28 Friona high school girls in the winning group received the highest type compliments from the judges. Concert singing judges were D. W. Morton, John Tarleton College, Stephenville, Texas; Carl Jacobs, Oklahoma A & M, Stillwater, Okla.; Dr. Roy Johnson, East Texas State College. Their comments were "Excellent", "inspiring", "to be commended", "This small group is one of the highlights of the day", "Congratulations." All three judges gave the Friona senior choir first division ratings — this corresponds to a grade to 95 — 100. Judges of the sight reading was Dr. A. Jones, head of the Texas University music department. He said after rating them tops in sight-reading, "That is the best sight-reading I have heard all day."

The sight reading rating depends on how well the group sings a new song which they are given at the contest, never hav-

ing seen the music prior to that time. — Junior Choir was given a 2nd division by all three judges. Corr. 90 — 95.

Tape recordings were made of both groups' performances at the League meet. Later records of these will be available to the public.

Glenn Cunningham, director of the sweepstakes award winning group has been here for two years. Cunningham, 23 years old, is from Denver City, Texas. A 1948 graduate of NTSC at Denton, he has a Bachelor of Music degree in both Instruments and Voice. He plans to write his thesis this summer to complete his Masters Degree. Hishobby is flying.

Cunningham says, "My main interest is in producing for Friona the best choirs and bands possible from the material available." His interest in that achievement is evidenced by his whole-hearted support of his department. His groups quite often contribute to community affairs such as PTA open house; the recent Easter sun-rise service; club programs; Lions Club and other community gatherings.

Well-Rounded Program Prepares Boys of Plains Boys Ranch for Vocations

When it comes time for a mane-trimming session at Boy's Ranch in Amarillo, Texas, the job usually falls to one of the boys in tonsorial department of the Ranch vocational school.

Several of the older boys are learning the barbering trade, and with over 120 victims to practice on, they are becoming proficient. Only the art of shaving is neglected at present because no staff member is willing to risk an ear or Adam's apple.

In addition to barbering, the boys at Boy's Ranch have the opportunity to learn carpentry, automobile mechanics and shoe repair. The list of trades being taught now is small, but it is hoped that a vocational school future where 12 or 14 trades can be built in the very near be taught.

With a properly - equipped vocational school, each of the more-than 100 boys can learn a valuable trade he will be able to use when he leaves the Ranch. This will give him the chance to step into a good job and make real head.

The boys also have their own grade and high school with seven teachers, a full sport program that includes football, softball, basketball and wrestling, and plenty of opportunity fishing, swimming and riding.

But it's not all school and play. The boys raise much of their

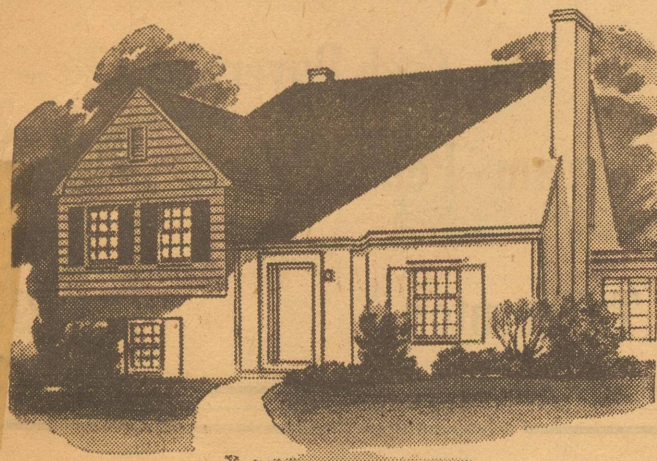

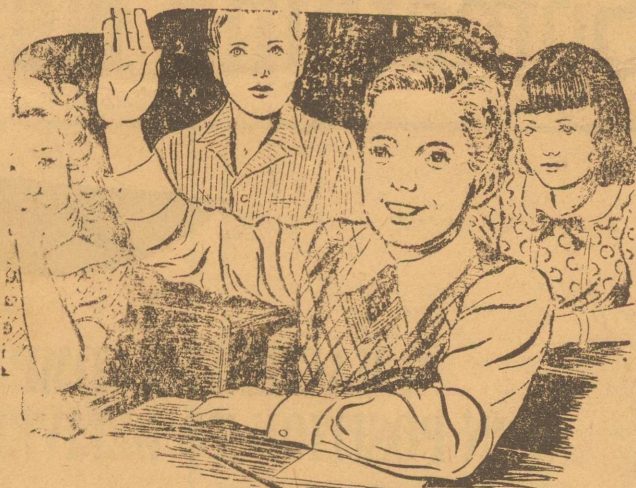
