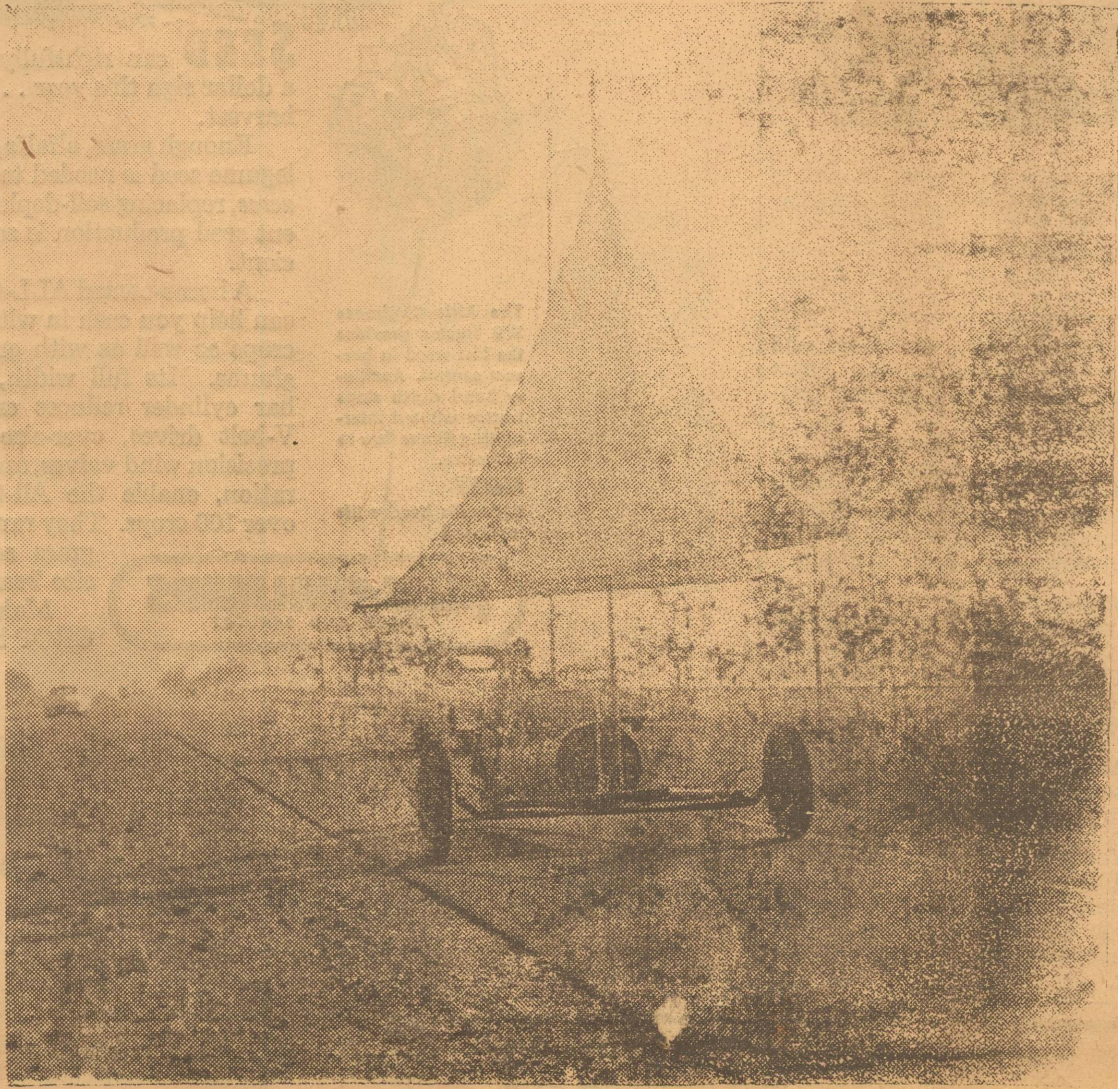

Sewer Regulations Outlined by City

Highlights from the sewer regulations inaugurated in Friona, and set forth in a legal notice elsewhere in this issue, are outlined as follows:

SECTION 7. Every person, firm and corporation whose premises are served or may hereafter be served by the sanitary sewerage system of the City of Friona, shall pay a sewer rental charge as follows:

(a) For each residence with four or less plumbing fixtures, the minimum shall be \$1.50 per month and a charge of 15c per month shall be added for each additional plumbing fixture over four.

(b) For each commercial user the minimum per month shall be \$1.50 per month plus 25 per cent of the amount of the water bill as charged by the water department for the same month.

Commercial users or customers are such establishments as hotels, drug stores, cafes, tourist courts, service stations, garages, cold storage plants, meat packing plants, slaughter houses, hospitals, laundries, schools, etc.

SECTION 16. The charges for each connection with the city sewer system shall be as follows: The depths and lengths of connections or services shall be as determined from the revised plans and specifications of said system.

For a 4" connection wity wye in lateral, up to and including 3' in depth and not over 10' in length to point of connection — \$12.50

For a 6" connection wity wye in lateral, up to and including 3' in depth and not over 10' in length to point of connection — \$17.50

For each additional foot or fraction thereof over 10' the rate shall be, for 4" \$1.50 per foot, and for 6", \$2.25 per foot.

Where no wye or toe or other connection is in the lateral it will be necessary to cut in a special wye for which the charge shall be for 4", \$3.50, and for 6", \$5.50.

Jimmie Gore, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. N. Gore, Friona, was awarded a \$5. cash prize for being the best all-round herdsman in the recent Parmer County Livestock Show.

This award was made possible by the Friona Farm Bureau. The honor went to Jimmie for his work toward making the show a success, and for his contribution toward keeping the stalls and building clean and attractive. In addition to this he cared for the dairy cattle at night, hauled straw for bedding, and helped other exhibitors build and arrange the facilities and arena for handling the grading and auction sale of the calves.

Gore, a 16 year old junior of Friona High School, was a member of the Senior Farm Demonstration FFA team that won 1st in the Three R's — Reed, Reed, and Redfeam. Accompanying their exhibit of registered Hereford heifers was a hooked rug with a Hereford head designed in the center and the three R's insignia on the sides.

This very original name plate attracted many visitors attention. The Three R's won first, a \$10 prize, for the highest average gain on pen to three beef calves.

BIGGEST SHOW TO DATE

Ribbon Honors Unusually High For County Showing

Parmer County club boys and girls, their parents, well-wishers, and little brothers and sisters turned all out for the County Livestock Show Friday and Saturday, joining in making it the outstanding show of its history. Even with the large crowds, and the successful auction... all this would have been futile had it not been for the extremely high grade of animals shown. Judges and spectators alike were profuse in their praise of the quality stock produced in Parmer County.

T. L. Leach, professor of agriculture, Texas Technological College, selected Noble Dainty Doll, exhibited by Lloyd Rector, as the grand champion Jersey female. Lloyd, 21 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. Foister Rector, Route 1 Friona, purchased the cow as one of the first in the local FFA dairyming program, started in 1944. The female, bred by Terra Blanca Farms, Canyon, earned similar honors here two years ago.

Frank Allen, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Allen, Friona, showed the grand champion barrow, Spotted Land China, 172 pounds, bred by F. L. Slinker. Frank, an FFA boy, never before had entered a show ring.

Walter Labay, supervisor of vocational agriculture, Area XI, assisted Leach in deciding the placements, Castor and Pete Cavinias, Clovis, NM, classified the beef calves for sale. Bill Flippin, Friona, conducted the sale.

Ribbons were awarded on the following basis: First place, blue; second, red, and third, white. Because entries were graded for merit, blue ribbons in some contests were not awarded.

Cash premiums in the swine show were: First place, \$3; second, \$2, and third, \$1. Individual premiums in the beef and dairy show ranged from \$5 for first place to \$1 for ninth. Cash awards for grade cattle were: Prime, \$5 a head; choice, \$3; good, \$2, and fair, \$1.

Bureau Registers Opposition To Socialized Medicine

Directors of the Parmer County Farm Bureau held their regular monthly meeting Monday night in the Friona Office.

From reasons obviously in keeping with the American Farmer's viewpoint, they registered opposition to so called compulsory health insurance, commonly known as Socialized Medicine. Though the Farm Bureau is not completely in accord with the American Medical Association, especially concerning independent Community Cooperative Hospitals, they are unanimously opposed to compulsion when it comes to the health insurance plan for their families.

America has at present, more doctors proportionate to population than any country that has adopted a system of Government medicine, and American health and medical care lead the world today. For less than ten cents a day, Americans can have medical and hospital insurance voluntarily, through group health plans. Considering other projects adopted by the Government, it is not reasonable to believe that it could lower the cost of medical care.

The directors also agreed to invite those interested in organizing rural roads promotion groups to join with Farm Bureau with its more than 40,000 members in Texas already working on this project for rural people.

A report on the March Membership Drive was referred to which showed that 135 memberships were sent in to the State Office this March, as compared to only 64 in March, 1949.

Those present at the meeting were, Roy Miller, County Farm Bureau President, Hadley Reeve Secretary - Treasurer, Ralph Smith and Alden Henderson directors, and Raymond Euler Service Representative.

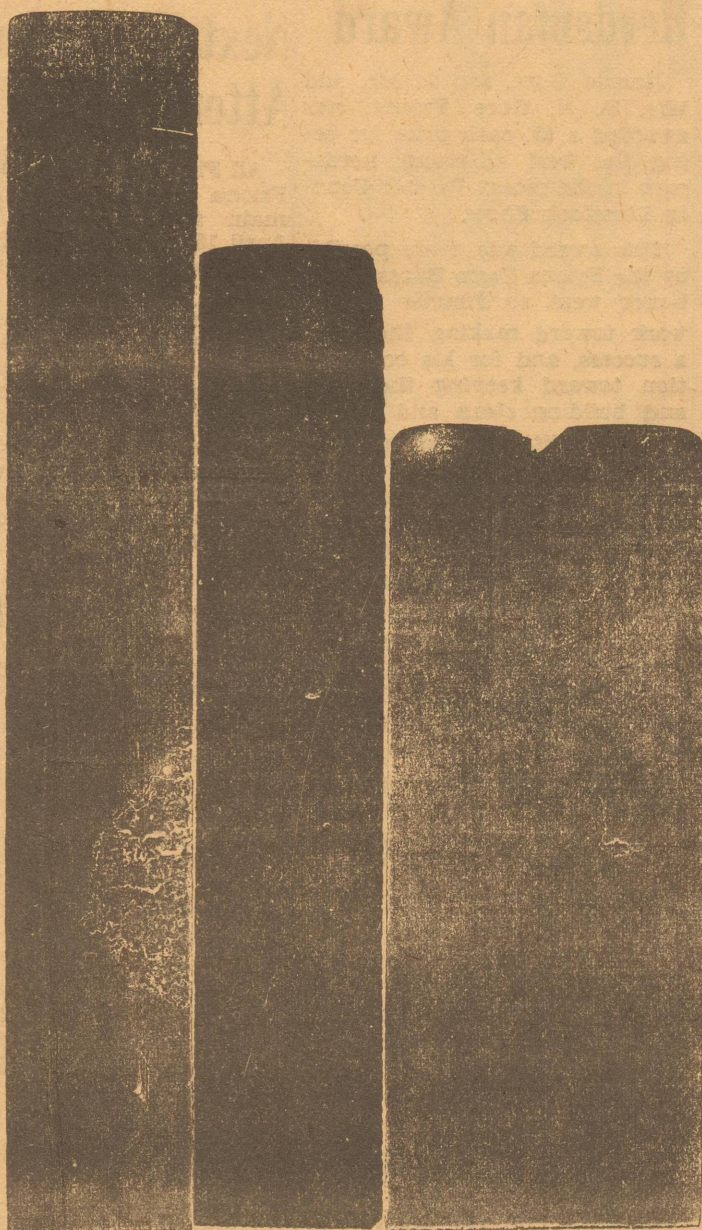

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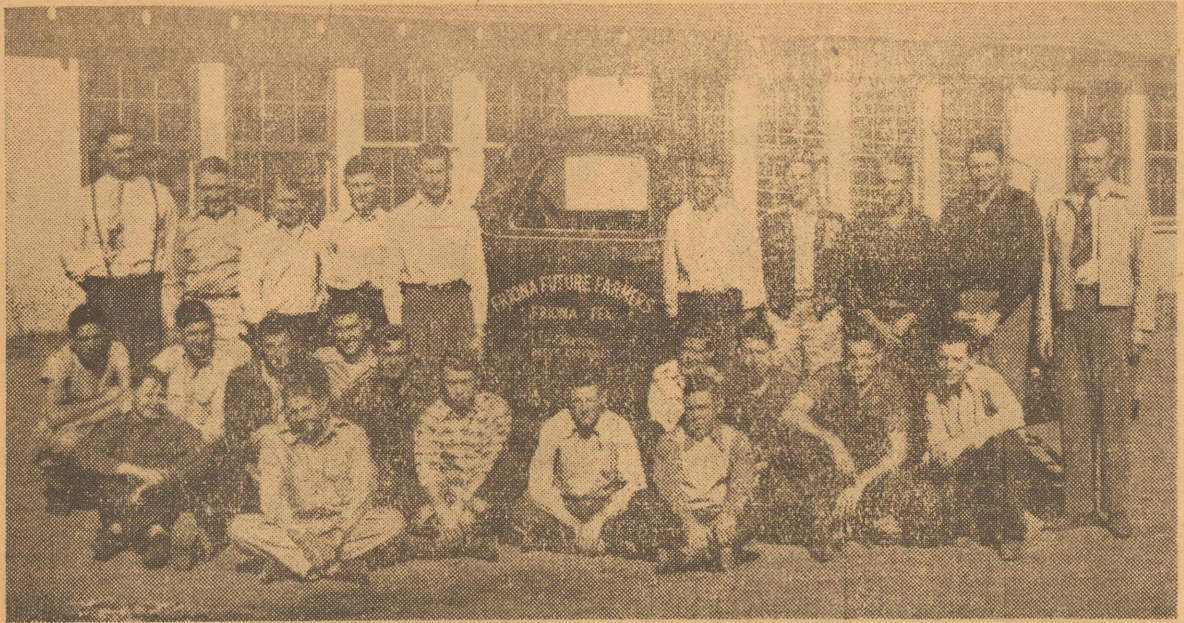

Heavy Infestation Insects Indicated In A & M Reports

County Agent Joe W. Jones states that Guy E. Carpenter, Associate County-Agent — Entomology, has released a statement that indications point toward a heavy infestation of insects for the year 1950. This is mainly due to a mild winter and a large number of overwintering eggs and adult insects. Whether this infestation materializes depends to a great extent on weather conditions, especially moisture.

This is not meant to alarm farmers, but to alert them so that if insects do appear, the proper control methods may be applied before too much damage is done. In 1950, watch for insects and use

the approved recommendation for their control. This information can be furnished by your local county agricultural agent.

Green bugs are developing in damaging numbers in some counties on the South Plains. Preliminary experiments indicate that the pest can be controlled but whether it is practical for large scale use has not been determined.

It may be a little early to start talking about grasshoppers, but

farmers and ranchmen are urged to be ready to stop them this year before they leave their egg beds. Once they begin moving out of the areas where they hatch, effective control becomes more difficult. Surveys show heavy infestation of grasshopper eggs in parts of West Texas.

Due to cotton allotments, it is more important than ever that you do not let insects destroy your crop. You should be on the lookout for insects as soon as the

cotton comes up. Thrip and aphid damage cotton in this stage, and there are possibilities of having one or both of these insects. The fleahopper does its damage after the cotton begins to square. Many people are familiar with this insect from their experience last year. Be sure to guard against the fleahopper before it does too much damage.

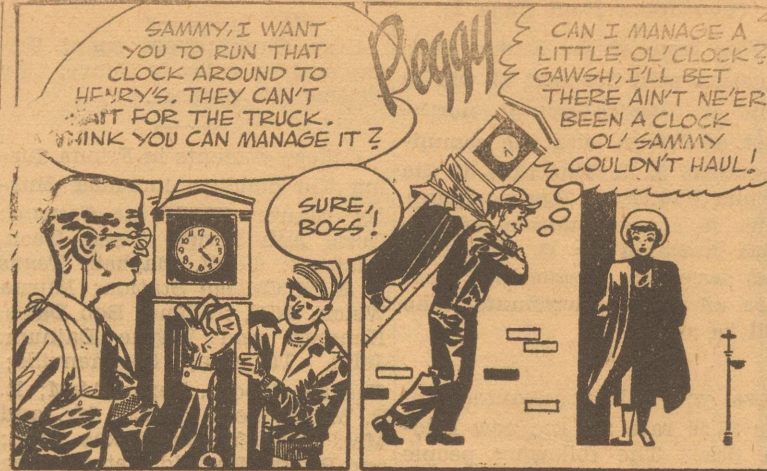

SOCIAL SECURITY

Questions - Answers

Q. When are Social Security Tax returns filed with the Collector of Internal Revenue?

A. Four times a year — at the close of each calendar quarter. The employer has the full month following the close of the quarter in which to file his return. The returns covering wages paid January, February and March must be filed on or before April 30th.

Q. What information is needed by an employer to enable him to file a complete and accurate Social Security Tax return?

A. Only three things: (1) the worker's full name; (2) the worker's social security number; and (3) the amount of wages paid during the quarter.

NOTE: The worker's name on a social security number should be copied directly from the social

security card instead of relying upon the memory of the worker for this information.

Q. What is the relationship between these reports of the employees and the retirement and death benefits paid under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of the social security act?

A. A record of each worker's wages is kept from the reports which employers send in with social security taxes four times a year. Since the benefits which a worker or his dependents will get are based on the worker's wage record, it is essential that his wages be correctly reported.

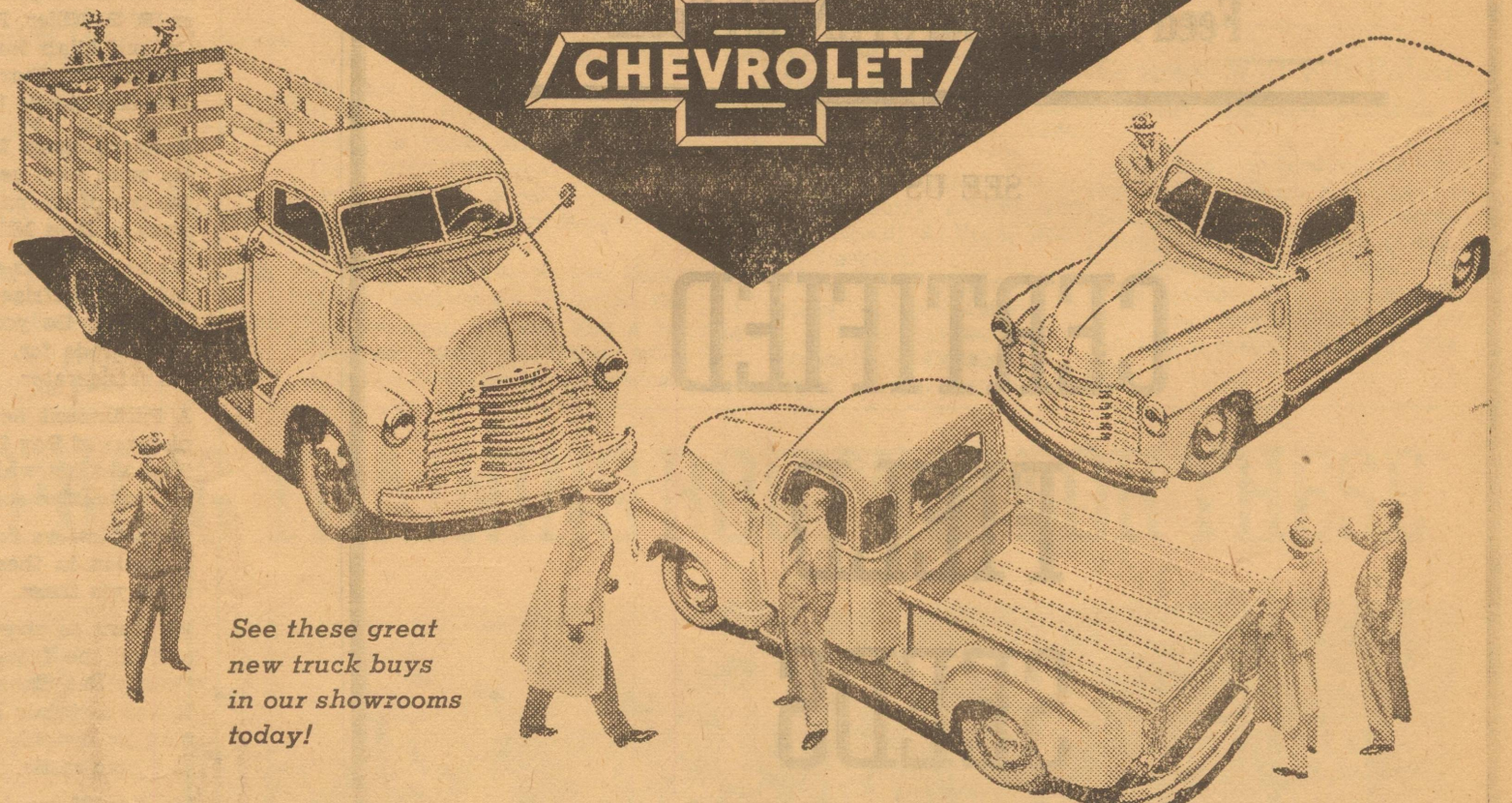

A recognition service for the new conference minister, the Rev. Royal J. Gibson, is to be held on Thursday evening May 4th.

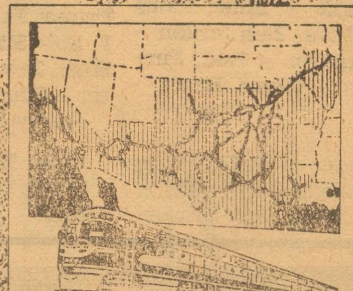

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Ben Guill, of Pampa, Announces For Congress

Ben Guill, 40 year old Navy Purple Heart veteran and Pampa businessman, has announced his candidacy for Congress in the special election on May 6. Guill is the only Republican in a field containing ten Democrats. The high man at the polls will be elected Congressman without a run-off.

Guill, who has lived in the Texas Panhandle for 31 years, is married to the former Marjorie Buckler, of Pampa. They have a nineteen month old son.

Why a Republican

Guill, a graduate of West Texas State College and a former teacher in the public school system in the Panhandle, said he was running as a Republican because "I am opposed to the Socialistic policies of the present administration and the only honest way I know of fighting the Socialistic theories of the Santa Claus boys is to join the other team. I have no intention of telling the people of the Panhandle that the Republican Party is perfect or all virtuous. It is nothing of the sort. I merely think there is more Americanism to the square inch in the Republican party today than among the Socialistic leaders who have cold-bloodedly stolen the party of Jackson, Jefferson, Calhoun, and Wilson away from the people."

Guill, who was an independent Democrat until now, is strongly in favor of reducing income taxes. He is bitterly opposed to socialized medicine. He wants the government to stop dictating to the farmer about what, and how much, he can raise, and he believes the Panhandle cotton farmer was given a "raw and headless deal" in the recent setting of quotas.

"I am the son of a farmer," Guill said. "I believe the farmer is the backbone of the national economy. I'm sick and tired of hearing pink little bureaucrats tell the farmer what he should do. It's high time the farmer tells Washington what ought to be done. The farm problem should be settled by the farmer himself and if I am sent to Washington as Congressman from the Panhandle I shall bring with me a farm program which embodies the wishes

and the ideas of the Panhandle farmers themselves."

Chances Good

Guill, who has thousands of friends and former students in the Panhandle, is given an excellent chance of winning the special election. With the votes split among ten Democrats, it is estimated that he will be elected if he receives as many votes as Frank T. O'Brien, the Republican candidate for Congress in 1946 received in his race against Gene Worley. If he gets half as many votes as Jack Porter, the Republican candidate for the Senate in 1948, received in the Panhandle he will be an easy winner.

Guill won the Purple Heart in combat in the Pacific. He went through seven amphibious landings and earned four battle stars. He is a member of St. Matthew's Protestant Episcopal Church in Pampa, is a director of the Pampa Rotary Club, the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars. He is waging one of the most vigorous campaigns in the history of Panhandle elections.

Altar bouquets of Easter lilies, stock, and snapdragons were flanked by baskets of palms.

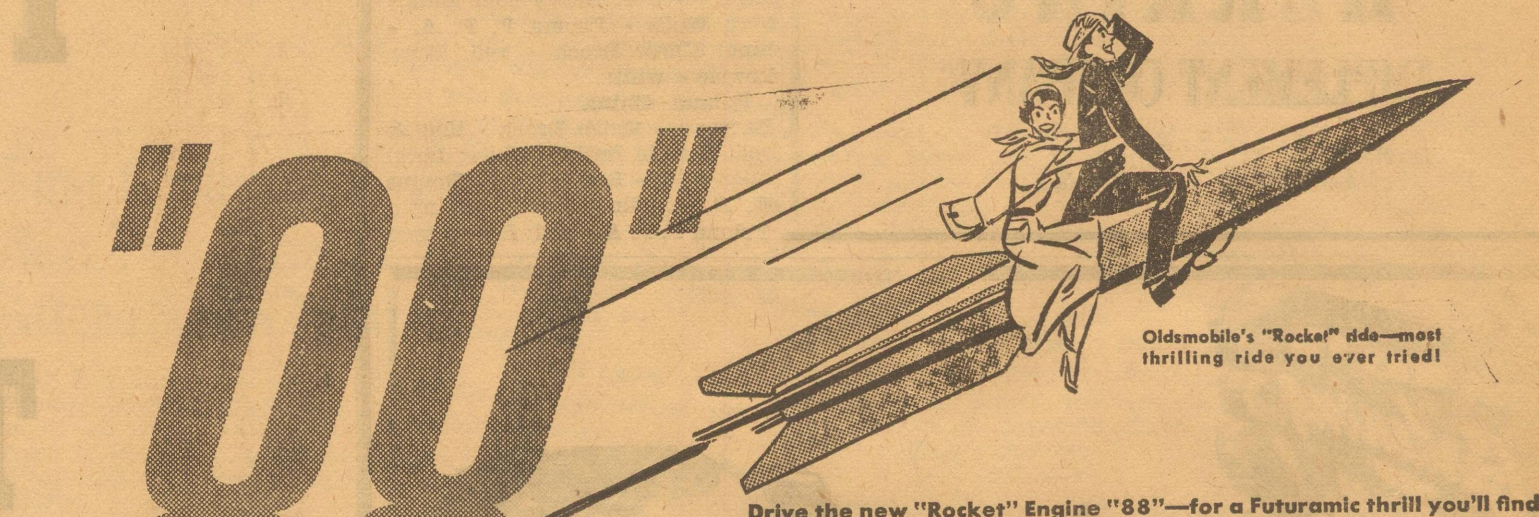

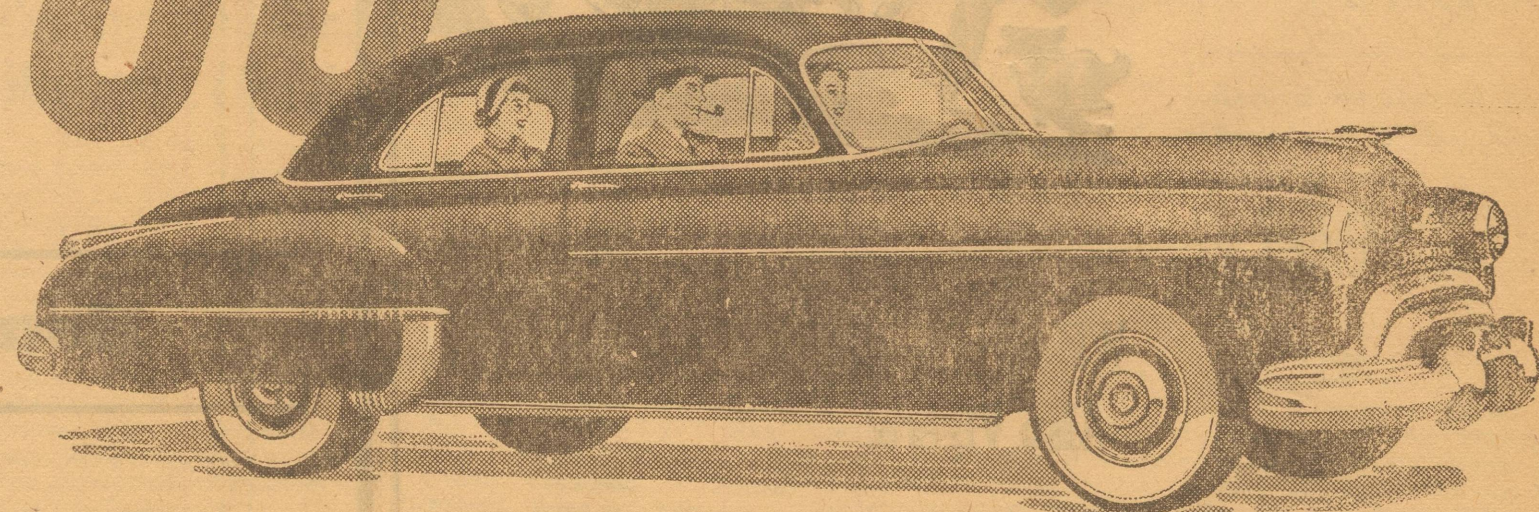
