

Others have voiced their full approval of the circus showing on Sunday. And others have OK'd the day but condemned the idea of the money leaving town! So there are lots of view-

Back to the initial statement of "life getting tedious": Most of us are daily confronted with decisions in today's complicated scheme of things, wondering what is proper, and what is to be avoided. The radio, the daily newspaper, the seven day week of factory production workers, the television, the transportation program, all these bring into our homes problems of Sabbath observance.

I am attempting to make no decisions for any reader of this publication. But I will state some unalterable facts which can well be means in molding our decisions.

Here are the items for consideration as I see them was applied to the circus being brought to

First, the problem of the admission ticket money leaving town: Little can be done or should be done about this. Certainly there is insufficient home talent to produce a 3-ring circus with its wild animals here in Friona. I'm afraid hardly a freckle-faced boy in our entire area

And if the circus should by-pass Friont, there would be many and many more who would drive to Clovis or Amarillo to avail their children of the age-old thrill that only the circus affords. I remember times in my own childhood, don't you? Naturally it would be better for the circus to be sponsored by some local organization, whereby some money could be retained here; we hope this can be arranged be-

Second and paramount point for consideration: Sunday afternoon circus appearance:

In denying our children the sight of the circus, we cannot but blush, long and deep, at our own selfish indulgences in listening to the Sunday afternoon baseball games, attendance at any movie, a stop by the soda fountain or open ear to an entertaining disk being ground out on the juke-box, attendance at the home-town softball game, a picnic at the creek, a game of dominoes or canasta, or possibly even the reading of Earl Stanley Gardner's latest thriller Mind you, all these are forms of entertainment ranking side by side with the kiddies' circus in any tabulation. By all means, the observance of the Sabbath should be instilled into the lives of our children and practiced to the satisfaction of our own creed, but please, please, let's look at our own indulgences before we take up a crusade against the once-in-a-year of once-in-alifetime circus at a hometown site.

If you or myself prohibit our child's attendance at the circus, I sincerely hope that we will have the gumption, the sense of fair-play, and self control to turn that radio dial away from next week's big ball game.

Foes of Freedom Throughout the World Seek to Stop International Flow of Information via Newspapers

Newspaper readers and radio listeners the world over benefit by the free flow of information throughout the world. All totalitarian governments and some governments professing to be democratic believe they would be injured by the free flow of information. Governments of that turn of mind exercise their sovereign powers to restrict the publication of news and opinion which they consider damaging to their interests. They try to prevent such information from reaching other countries as well as prevent its publication within the area they con-

These governments do not stop there. They try to make people believe that such controls mak for "peace" and good relations between nations. They try to make people believe that those who insist on reporting what actually is going on instead of only what governments wish published are "warmongers," "monopolists" and 'fascists." If they can persuade enough people that controls and censorships promote peace and freedom of information breeds war they will shackle the press and radio of the countries in which it is still free as they have shackeled the press and radio of their own countries. If they


principles of governmental control of information into international law they will have a sanction for ther interferences with the free flow of news at present found only in their own

The foes of freedom operate on two levels in the international sphere. They are trying in the United Nations assembly to convert draft treaties which were intended to increase the flow of information into limitations of freedom. In the United Nations Subcommission on Freedom of Information they try to influence world public opinion against freedom and in favor of restrictions. In both the assembly and the Subcommission British Filipino, Dutch, Canadian, Scandinavian and other believers in freedom have worked with Americans to lower existing barriers to the free flow of information and to prevent the raising of new barriers.

Latterly the believers in freedom have had to devote so much effort to protecting such freedom as exists that it has not been possible to do much about widening the area of freedom.

Never in modern times has it been so dif ficult to report what is going on in so large a part of the world. Never has it been so important to know what is going on. Those of us who have assumed some responsibility for the advancement of freedom of information urgently need and solicit the support of readers and can prevail upon the United Nations to write the listeners everywhere for the cause we champion. **Maim Street**







Theirs is a precise task challenging with every new issue the best of skilled endeavor, the inventiveness, the will to excell, the willingness to work long and hard to produce a newspaper that is physically attractive, easy to read, a WANTED visitor in the home.

Your FRIONA STAR, as one of the many weeklies of free America, is striving to attain the stature that it has set as a goal. The publisher, mechanical workers, and reporters alike are ever cognizant of the sincerity, integrity, and pride of our trade that is our contribution to the scheme of things in making this or any community a better one. With your help, we will attain our goal.

Seriously, my job on a small weekly paper involves proficiency at all these crafts. Not only am I expected to be a production expert, week after week, but I am the machinist, too, repairing and constructing as needs arise. On weekends I do job printing, too, an art somwhat separate and apart from newspaper production. And yes, that's bound to be my picture at the upper left. You'll find me in this pose just any press day, feeding the big 31" by 44" sheets into the Babcock flatbed press. I need to know correct mechanical techniques, page make-up techniques, grades of paper, rules of form, etc . . . all part of the job that brings new challenges and new problems with each day. Which all means that you don't have to be nuts to be a newspaperman, but it helps!

TYPE - SETTER

Now, why did Bert list me as a type-setter? Sure, that's where you usually find me . . . at the keyboard of the linotype machine, but on a small weekly, I am compelled to draw on my decades of printing experience to function as fill-in or supervisor or worker in each and every department of the Star . . . from machinist to reporter to job printing estimates. Bert put my picture below in the position of "Atlas holding the world" because, franky, the typesetter is the base of all newspaper operation. All mechanical departments must wait on the slug of type for their initial steps. I must know my grammar and spelling and punctuation, too, because even the most careful of copywriters in the weekly field seldom have time to prepare stories in perfect form. Goodness knows, they would not have time to gather the facts and sell the ads and speak at the luncheon clubs if they spent all their time considering the correctness of copy submitted; I just have to plug along day after day correcting copy and riding herd on this Model 14 Linotype, being sure no lines comes out etaoin shrdlu.


