The contest, set for 2 p. m., Thursday, at Bovina, brings together two undefeated squads. Bovina went through district play undefeated for the second straight year, then beat Gruver 52-16 last week in bi-district play to become the champions of district one and two.

Paint Creek also completed the regular season without a loss, followed by a 2-14 win last week over Patton for the championship of districts three and

Bovina won the district without being scored upon in 1949 but dropped their bi-district to Gruver 20-23. The Mustangs are coached by Clovis Ratliff.

Paint Creek, located in Haskell county, is directed by head coach Delbert Preston.

## County Water Conservation Bodies Receive Call for Mobilization in Fight For Locally Controlled Water Program

### Fortenberry Scores Committee Reports

Official spokesmen for the High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association charged today that the preliminary report of the Texas Water Code Committee, if adopted would in effect "throw out the present underground water conservation law and vest control in the state.

W. O. Fortenberry of Monroe, president of the organization of irrigation farmers and other users in 14 High Plains counties, said the association would do everything in its power to head off adoption of those portions of the Code committee's recommendations which will affect underground water use.

The association sent out a call to all of its members to mobilize county organizations "with men and money to protect our present private ownership of ground water." Members throughout the High Plains were urged to contact their county associations for instructions.

"If we can head off adoption of these recommendations, we may save ourselves a bigger fight later on, Fortenberry said.

The well users' group will be represented, he said, at the Code committee's public hearing in Austin December 11, which the committee has scheduled before making its final report to the governor and 52nd Legislature.

In Littlefield, Arthur P. Duggan, jr., chief attorney for the High Plains association, declared that "this committee was originally created to study surface water laws and their revision exclusively, but their pre-

### Site Is Selected For City Offices And Fire Station

Notices were posted and published this week announcing December 15, 1950 as last day for submission of bids for the Waterworks Improvement program in Friona as recently authorized in a special bond election.

The sealed proposals should be received at the office of Roy Wilson, city clerk, by 2:00 p. m. on the specified day, and are to include all necessary materials, machinery, equipment, superintendence and labor for constructing the lines. Principal items of work in the project include approximately 3195 feet of 8-inch mains and 3640 feet of 6-inch mains, including necessary valves, fire hydrants and fittings; and the removal of about 1540 feet of 4-inch mains and 1925 feet of 2-inch mains.

City engineer "Red" Smith has been in Friona frequently since passage of the bonds, working to get all phases of the city improvements underway at earliest possible dates. The waterworks of necessity took precedence over the paving program, as all underground work should be completed before any topping is laid.

### Building Site Named

Studies and drawings of the city hall-fire station needs are now being made, and early action is expected on that program. Mayor Mack Bainum said Tuesday that negotiations were underway whereby the city would purchase the corner lots just south of the Consumers on Main street, just north of the park, for building site. The Consumers organization is reported to have offered these lots at a special reduced price to the city for civic use.

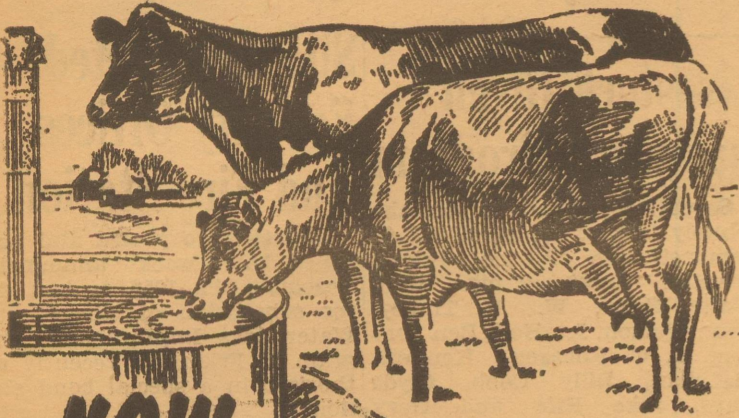
Guests included all members of the third grade who came in costumes dating back to 1621—representing such historical characters as Squanto, Massachusetts, Pilgrim maids, Gov.

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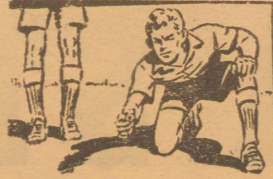

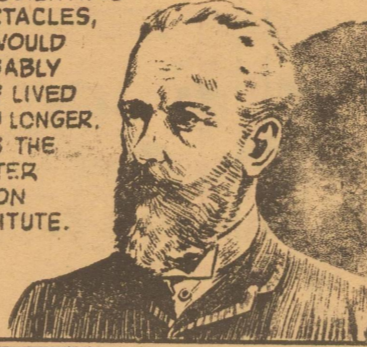

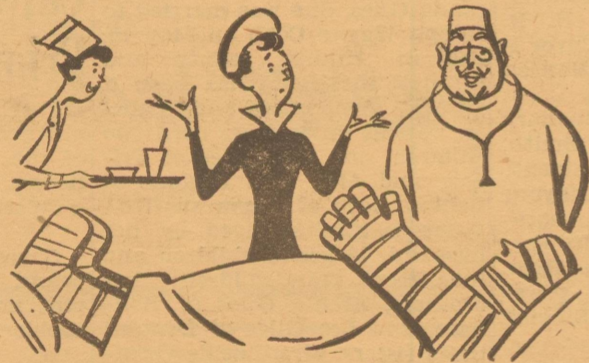

**ARE YOU FIREPROOF?**



Many deaths and injuries to both children and adults by fire are caused by the speed with which their clothing burns after being ignited by party candles, matches, bonfires, etc.

As far as the children are concerned . . . many of these deaths can be prevented by keeping matches out of their reach, keeping the children away from bonfires, and avoiding use of lighted candles during games. Further safety can be had by avoiding use of light flimsy materials in children's dresses, or by flameproofing these materials.

**CLIP THIS — Keep it for Reference: FLAME PROOFING FORMULA**

Cotton and rayons can be flame-proofed easily and cheaply with a borax-boric acid solution mixed right at home. Prepare the solution by dissolving 9 oz. of borax and 4 oz. boric acid in one gallon of water. Dip the dresses in this solution.

The solution can be used on adult costumes, on curtains, drapes, or other open-weave fabrics. It is safe to use on any material that can be put in water, but should be re-applied each time the garment is washed.

When the solution was used on the dress of one of two dolls, it prevented the dress from flaring up after a match was applied to it. Instead, it charred slightly, not spreading the flame to any other part of the dress. The other doll was a blackened mass when her dress and hat caught fire, showing how impossible it would be for a child to get the clothes off before they burned to a crisp.

**Fire Losses Shown To Increase During Winter Months**

Winter is fire's favorite season, the National Board of Fire Underwriters warns.

Fire losses usually rise when the temperature falls, the organization points out, in urging home owners to take special care with their heating systems in preparation for the cold months ahead.

Where possible, thorough inspection and cleaning of the entire heating system is advisable during the early Fall, before it is placed in full daily operation. Frequently defects

which developed during the Spring and Summer can be remedied easily but if neglected might lead to a serious blaze.

"Forcing" a heater which is giving insufficient heat is a dangerous habit, the engineers of the National Board observe. Often a check-up by a competent repairman will reveal that some repair is needed to make the device give better service, and to "force" it may cause a fire.

The engineers also offered these safety tips:

1. Keep a metal screen in front of your fireplace.

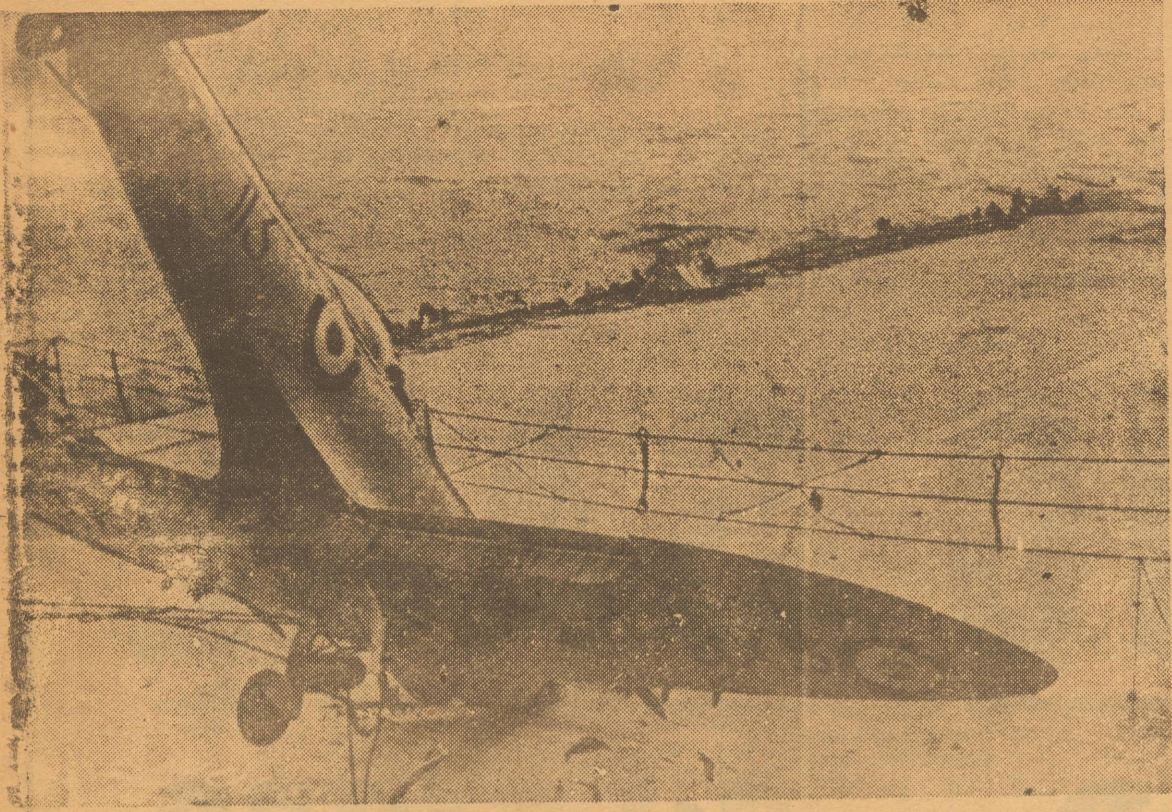

# The Law & You Personals

By Robt. (Bob) Kirk

*Do you know what the effect of a ninety-day commitment to a State hospital is?*

To gain admittance by Court order to a State hospital for those mentally ill, there must be one of two types of proceedings. One proceeding is for a "permanent" commitment and requires a jury trial and a finding that the person is of unsound mind, and would be dangerous if left at large.

The other type of order is a 90-day commitment. One sent to a State hospital on a 90-day commitment is not adjudged to be of unsound mind. He is sent to the hospital for a period not to exceed 90 days for "observation and treatment." He may be released at any time the doctors of the hospital deem that his condition justifies the same prior to the 90 days. He loses none of his civil rights, and a new trial to find that he is restored to his right mind is not necessary. He can return to his business, and carry on the same

as if he had never been sent to an institution. For further information on this subject, see your local attorney.

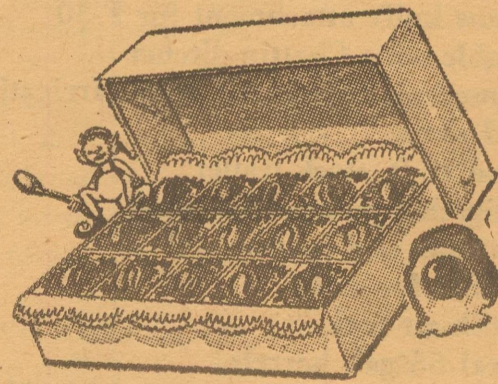

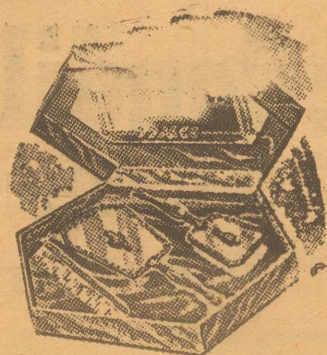
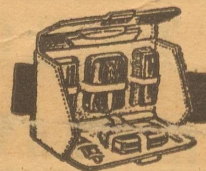

# EDITORIAL

## Oriental Conflagration and Global Confusion Behooves Americans Collectively and Individually to Take Stand

*Editor's Note—We like to leave the national problems and even area happenstances for comment by the periodicals, the airwave news analysts, devoting our own columns to the little but vital situations of more direct bearing to Frionans and Parmer County neighbors. But we have followed with such intense interest the world-wide and nation-wide steps toward a war that would affect you and ourselves to an extent heretofore unknown, that we likely will refer in these columns from time to time to these incidents as we interpret them. Though making no apologies, we do call to your attention this deviation from our pre-determined policies suitable to small town journalism.*

Bluntly, the tentacles of world-wide warfare are slithering into every recess of a confused world as the blessed Christmas season, 1950, is inaugurated.

This, we believe, is the stark realism that a bewildered American people must recognize, not next month, not even tomorrow, but today. These assertions are made, not in a sudden impulsive reaction to the gory enemy thrusts of the last two days, but rather they are expressed because for months we have seen no antidote advanced for checking the cancerous spread of the war germs. The Tuesday dramatics were not of recent inception, but rather were a startling milestone on a road long travelled, long engineered. Even they may not be the last milestone; we do not name them as the grand entry into World War III, but we say without hesitation that they are one of the factors that cannot mean else whether the global wardogs are unleashed tomorrow, next month, or next generation.

Some months ago this columnist wrote quite frankly of our opinion of Russian ambitions, also scoring dilly-dallying and small thinking among our leaders. Several readers

commented that we used about as strong language as could be printed. We meant it too; and we will continue to call spades by their true hues; there is nothing "nice" about war or warmongers or war-provoking actions, either. There is nothing clean about rape and murder, as now being waged by the thousands of Orientals against our brothers and sisters and all our fighting forces of the Far East.

The solution? Maybe there is no manmade cure. But believe me, God gave Americans some mighty good tools to work with, some reasonable brains, and now is the time, if ever, to make full use of our every God-given faculty. Our rich heritage, so often referred to during the recent Thanksgiving hours, demands some drastic protection, now as never before. Whether it is use of atomic weapons, mobilization to the man, or complete, all-out military preparedness, Americans should demand action now. Certainly, we have made every peace move, and more, that a self-respecting man or nation could sanction. Let's show the world, and ourselves, that Uncle Sam still has GUTS. Our boys in Korea are doing just that at painful and terrific price.

## Weekly Book Review

### "This Land I Hold" Is Absorbing Novel By Virginia Meyers; Characterization, Convincing Plot Make for Good Reading

"This Land I Hold" by Virginia Meyers is hauntingly reminiscent of the well known "Ramona" by Helen Hunt Jackson, yet it is entirely different. The locale, California during the days of the Spanish dons, probably is what stirs the memory rather than the tale itself.

Beautiful Magdalena was a woman in a thousand in that she knew what she wanted and if there was a conflict, she knew what she wanted most and what to sacrifice to gain it.

And of course with this characteristic she was ambitious and had the courage to fight for her aspirations. Consequently she was a formidable power.

Arriving home after 15 years in a Mexican convent where she had been placed by her god-parents she was at once involved in a number of fast moving incidents as soon as she reached California. Her family wanted to meet her and she had no idea what a change time had brought about to her loved ones.

She was both shocked and resentful of the things she found and determined then and there to do something about it. At the age of 19 she was young enough to be unafraid to face whatever was to befall her family and herself as a result of such a decision.

Hardest to understand and the most difficult to influence was her proud, charming and ill-mannered brother, Santos. To make matters worse she blamed him for the conditions in which she found her mother and younger sister living. Her father had died while she was away and Santos left at the head of the family had been "taken in" by the incoming American from the east and he had lost all the family possessions.

There was no broad acres, no fine house. All these had disappeared and she found her family living in a hovel. Her dreams were gone but she made up her mind she would stay there nor be handicapped by such a family and their way of life.

In California she could break away because there were many men and few women. With her beauty, education and charm it was not long until Santos had three offers for her hand in marriage. Quickly she checked the ones off that had what she considered the least to give her and decided in favor of an older man of some wealth and distinction.

One was an Indian of high rank, whose beauty set her blood to singing; another was a Protestant American, but she chose the middle-aged pure Spaniard, master of a large ranch. Unhesitatingly she made her choice though she knew the road ahead was not going to be easy and that she would have to fight for her place every step of the way.

Because of the historical background, the convincing plot and fine characterization the novel is an absorbing one.

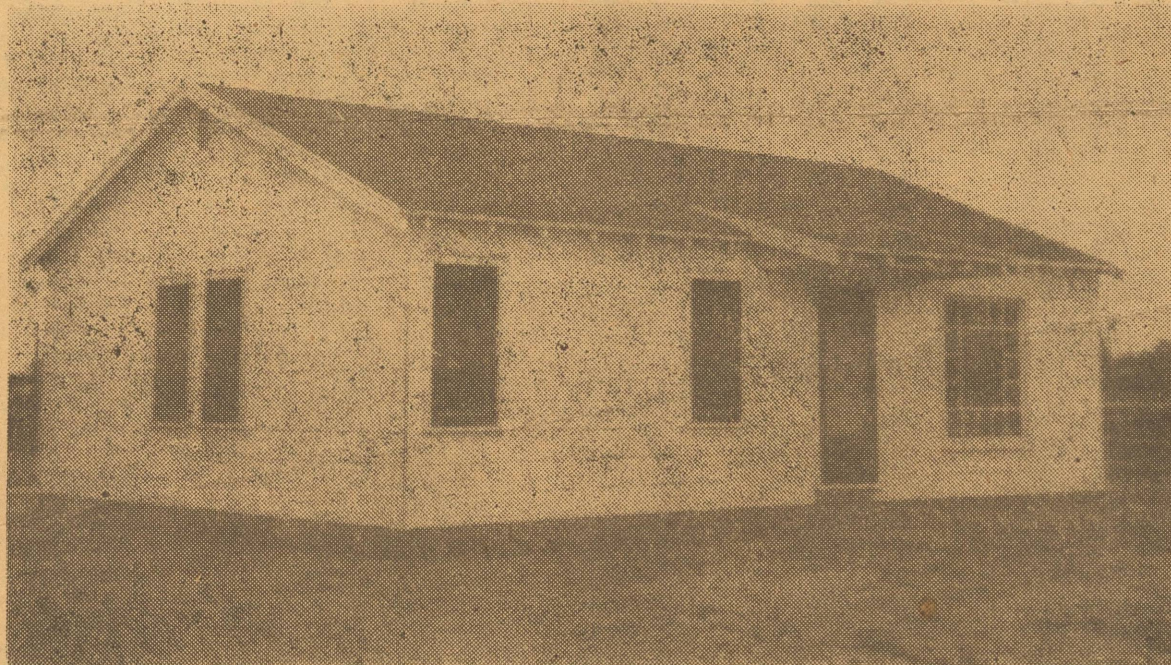

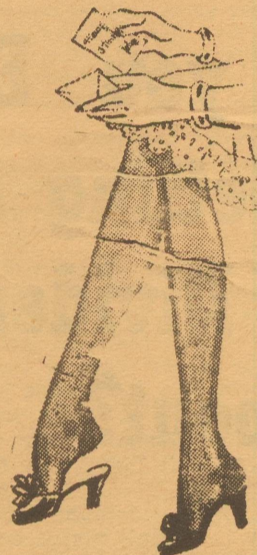

### Texas Farm Bureau Members Hear Noted Speakers at Mineral Wells Meet

Three Delegates Attend  
From Farmer Bureau

"Whether the recent decisions of the Secretary of Agriculture were intended to work hardships on farmers, or whether they were because of his lack of agricultural background, I am afraid Charles Brannan is a luxury we American farmers can't afford to keep," said J. Walter Hammond, Texas Farm Bureau president in his annual message to the assembly of the 17th annual convention in Mineral Wells last week, attended by Raymond Euler, Ralph Smith and Billy Sudderth of Parmer County.

Hammond was referring specifically to Brannan's recent cut in export quotas for cotton that resulted in serious farm profit losses while increasing profit margins for manufacturing interests.

Texas' senior senator, Tom Connally said, "We're going to give those boys in Washington the works who think the only way to cut government costs is to cut farm incomes. I helped enact the REA and we're going to take care of your rural phone needs, too. You're going to get improved rural road aid—keep working on that in your organization and help us convince other legislators of your needs and rights. I see your resolutions calling for parity prices for agricultural products and livestock and I am supporting that, too. I also see you have a resolution asking for initiative supports for those products the Secretary of Agriculture declares short in this emergency period. The only thing I see wrong with that is I don't think the Secretary of Agriculture knows everything he ought to know. I'm gonna work on him."

Congressman Albert Gore of Tennessee, guest speaker at the annual banquet said, "I'm joining Senator Tom Connally in working on Charles Brannan." Congressman Gore also pointed out that in the last 17 years farm income has increased 268 percent—but in the same period, non-farm income has increased 315 per cent. Said Gore, "You people have read in the papers and heard on the radio that farm supports are the cause of our high cost of government. But did you know that since inauguration of the cotton supports the U. S. government has

made 200 million dollars on the cotton it has bought from you?" Then he added, "Secretary Brannan and his kind should thank their lucky stars, and American Farm Bureau that they have fought and kept his proposed plan out of existence or we wouldn't have, nor be able to produce enough food and clothing in an emergency like this."

Over 800 farmers and ranchers registered and participated in the formation of new policies for legislative and local service programs. The delegation voted to raise annual membership dues to enable the organization to represent the members more adequately.

Parmer County was represented by three voting delegates. Parmer County Farm Bureau has over 350 members. All those interested in parity prices and other advantages for agriculture are invited to join and make suggestions for improvement. Annual dues until December 1 are \$5.00.

**Quail Season Will Begin Tomorrow In Texas, Ends Jan. 16**

Quail hunters in most of the state may look forward to improved quail hunting this fall, states the executive secretary commission.

The quail hunting season for the Game, Fish and Oyster state is from December 1 through January 16, both days inclusive, with a bag limit of 12 per day or thirty-six per week. However, in the 28 county area of the Panhandle, only 10 birds per day may be taken with a possession limit of 20. West of the Pecos the season is open only during December and the daily bag limit is 12, with not more than 24 in possession.

The executive secretary explains that many counties have special quail laws and urges hunters to check the local regulations before they go hunting.

Wildlife biologists of the Game department are conducting studies of quail populations through examination of quail wings again this year. The department requests hunters to cooperate in this work by sending one wing from each bird they kill to the Game, Fish and Oyster commission in Austin. A study of quail wings will show the percent of young birds and indicate the production and survival for the year.

To facilitate mailing of wing collections, the commission will supply special business reply envelopes on request. The provide space for recording pertinent data and require no postage from the hunter. The active help of hunting clubs and other groups is being solicited.
