Art showing a beautiful girl displaying a tray of paper cups made by a named manufacturer.

Could manufacturers and promoters understand that 99 per cent of this material is never used, they would realize that there is no way of getting "something for nothing," even in the free press.

Correction is made of a recent misprint stating vehicle license plates could be mounted between February 1 and March 1. The statement should have read, "between February 1 and March 31."

\$4,500 Official Salary Increase

Commissioners Approve Salary Budget Totaling \$35,905 Out of County Funds

Additional Employee Authorized for Office of County Clerk

Rising governmental expenditures struck close to home this week with salary increases being authorized for many county employees of Parmer County. The increases were announced after a meeting of the commissioners court in Farwell on Monday.

Increases in salary together

with the addition of one new salary will raise expenditures \$4,500.00 above the 1950 schedule, with the 1951 budget calling for a total of \$35,905 for the salaried employees. This is exclusive of the funds paid out of state resources to the county agent, county service officer, and the ex-officio school superintendent.

Salary of the sheriff was increased from \$4,000 to \$4,600 for 1951.

The county judge will receive \$3,000 as against \$2,600 for 1950, and he also will receive \$1,600 from state funds for his capacity with the school system.

Salary of the county clerk remained at \$3,800 from county sources and \$1,800 from the state for work as County Service officer. One deputy clerk was given an increase from \$2100 to \$2400, and a new clerk was authorized at a salary of \$1800.

Two office deputies in the sheriff's department were given raises from \$2400 to \$2700. Outside deputy salaries have not been set.

The county treasurer will receive \$2700 as against \$2400 in 1950.

Salary for the county attorney was upped from \$2500 to \$2700.

The jailer and caretaker will receive \$2520, an increase from \$2220.

Two justices of the peace will receive \$480, the same as previously.

Other salaries remaining the same include the county auditor at \$600; county health officer at \$525; secretary to the county agent, \$1500. The agent receives \$1992 from county funds and the bulk of his salary from state allotment.

Local Group Attends Waco Farm Bureau Meet

Attending the Farm Bureau meeting at Waco last week were Bruce Parr, president of the local county Farm Bureau organization; Alan Romich, chamber of commerce manager, and Carl Schlenker and Melvin Sachs.

The delegates reported that farm-to-market roads were discussed at length, with anticipation of possible increase of road funds by the legislature in Austin this year. It was pointed out that a road carrying 50 cars per day was estimated as the minimum requirement for sealed coated tops; there are 120,000 farmers in the state who are one mile off a hard-surfaced road, and the numbers at even further distances was a great deal larger.

Cotton was discussed at one of the meetings, with steps being emphasized to take care of the need for the war effort and increasing domestic needs. An increase of 60 per cent over the last year production is estimated as minimum requirements to take care of the evident need of 16.8 million bales in 1951, of which 10 million will be used for domestic consumption.

Pair Is Charged With Cattle Theft

The local charges came after investigation of thefts from Bert Chitwood, and Lovelace reports that both Kirk and Miller have signed statements admitting to stealing of eleven head of cattle here and several in the Sayre vicinity.

Better Pastures Program Swings Into Operation

The "Better Pastures" meeting held in Amarillo Tuesday was attended by Parmer County representatives including A. L. Black, Al Romich and County Agent Joe Jones.

This meeting was an initial step in the program recently announced by Governor Shivers whereby a program of pastureland research will be conducted on farms and ranches throughout the state. A ten-year program is planned for building better pasture and for preserving those now being grazed.

Twelve districts have been designated in the state with five men from each serving as board members. Twenty-three counties are embraced in the local district.

Responsibility of the program will rest with the county committeemen. No paid employees will be involved, county agricultural agents and the soil conservation service will make recommendations in an advisory capacity.

Pierce Captured In Bowie County Woods Hideout

Lloyd Hershel Pierce, son of Robert Pierce of Friona, and well known in this area, was apprehended yesterday and placed in jail at New Boston, Texas, where the sheriff reported murder charges would be filed today, charging him with murder of a 72-year-old New Boston resident as she sat in a rocking chair in the living room of her farm home there.

Pierce was driven from Bowie County woods where he had been hiding since the manhunt began. Reports released to the press services last night said that the 16-year-old Pierce had signed statements to the effect that he committed the murder simply because of a desire to kill.

Until his capture yesterday, the youth had been sought in the Friona vicinity where he was seen recently, and where relatives are now living.

Editorial

Though January has been designated as "Citizenship Month," the American people need to observe EVERY month as thirty days in which to practice good citizenship. Instead of the usual editorial this week, we are taking liberty to reprint a "Bill of Responsibilities" prepared by the American Citizenship Committee of the State Bar of Texas. Within it is set forth some of the many things that we, as individuals, can do for democracy, and not what democracy can do for us. It is worth reading!

Bill of Responsibilities

We who advocate Democracy as the best form of government for an enlightened and progressive people, enjoying as we do the blessings of liberty under the Constitution of the United States, do set forth his Bill of Responsibilities as a guide to all citizens for the preservation of individual freedom and democratic government.

I. It shall be the duty of every citizen to render undivided allegiance to the Constitution of the United States, to work for its betterment and perpetuation, to respect the sovereignty of the people's government, and to defend the nation against all its enemies whomsoever.

II. It shall be the duty of every citizen to be familiar with the Constitution of the United States and to be informed as to what rights and liberties are his, and to use these rights in such manner as is consistent with his own welfare and the welfare of his fellow citizens.

III. It shall be the duty of every citizen to defend with his life the rights and liberties granted to him, and to his fellow citizens by the Constitution, to obey the laws of the land and aid in their enforcement, and to oppose vigorously any persons whose intention is to transgress the law or to oppress the rights of others.

IV. It shall be the duty of every citizen to make honest, wise and courageous use of the free and secret ballot at every election; to exercise freedom of thought, speech, and worship; to protect the freedom of the press; to safeguard the right of trial by jury, and to render willing jury service when called upon; and to perform all other acts conducive to the perpetuation of the rights set forth in the Constitution.

V. It shall be the duty of every citizen to protect and sustain the unwritten liberties and

rights vested in him by custom and usage and to perpetuate the ideals of the equality and dignity of the individual, upon which the Constitution is founded.

VI. It shall be the duty of every citizen to be active in the political party of his choice, and to be vigilant of the public officers, to render all possible aid to them, and to serve in public office by appointment or election when qualified and when called upon to do so. It shall be his duty to strive for the selection of public officers of ability and upright character; and when holding public office, to serve in such manner as will subordinate private or minority interests to those of the people at large.

VII. It shall be the duty of every citizen to achieve the highest practicable level of education, and to work for the advancement of education by supporting and improving the public schools and by fostering the desire for education among his fellow citizens.

VIII. It shall be the duty of every citizen to instruct his children in the principles of freedom and to spread the ideals of democratic government at home and abroad.

IX. It shall be the duty of every citizen to defend the right to buy and sell, to own land and other property, to engage in commerce, and to work and earn a living wage, as a fundamental guarantee of the freedom and welfare of the nation.

X. It shall be the duty of every citizen to preserve an attitude of self-reliance, and to use all legitimate means to achieve financial independence and security, to practice thrift and economy in his own affairs and to require the same of local, state and federal government.

DO YOU KNOW whether or not it is a violation of the law for a person to make a long distance phone call and charge it to your phone without first getting your consent?

The practice of unauthorized persons making long distance phone calls over unattended business phones and charging the call to that phone has long been a problem to business men. In some instances large phone calls have been charged against a person entirely without his knowledge in this matter.

One way to stop this practice, might be to place a copy of the state statute making such an action a criminal offense in a prominent place near the phone. Probably many persons do not know that making long distance phone calls over a phone and charging the same to that phone without first securing the consent of the person in charge of the phone is a criminal offense. A reminder of this fact by posting a copy of the law near the phone probably would cause many persons to seek permission before making such a phone call. Weekly Book Review

"Kon-Tiki" Is Real-Life Story Proving There's Still Adventure on High Seas

RAND-McNALLY, \$4.00

"Kon-Tiki" by Thor Heyerdahl has been high in the best seller list for several weeks now and is a book that deserves the place. It is a fast moving adventure wherein six men on a raft sailed across the ocean from Peru to the South Sea Islands peopled by the Polynesians.

The current Coronet carries a special picture section using the illustrations found in this book. And newspapers all over the world carried items about the trip at the beginning and as the expedition was carried out.

The author was the instigator trying to prove a theory that the South Sea Island inhabitants once came from Peru. Since he was having trouble in placing a manuscript on this theory he with the aid of others interested set out to show that it could be done even in this day.

Following legends they had read and heard, they planned and built from a special wood, balsa, found in Peru. They were able in getting backing from interested people, and a number of governments wanted various articles tested, as well as equipment and food for army, navy and air departments.

Kon-Tiki was the name given to the raft after a former Sun Wing worshipped by earlier inhabitants of Peru and coinciding with a sun god worshipped in the islands. The raft was 40 feet long and sailed gallantly over calm and rough seas alike to make the 4,300 mile voyage.

The 101 day journey was never dull and not one man was ever bored. The story is built around the log kept by one man, a diary kept by another and the writer's own reactions and memories of the adventure.

They spent their time in studying the sea, the sky, the storms they encountered and the fish, and more fish. They saw many they had heard about or had seen before, but a number would have done anything that Walt Disney ever created says the author.

In conclusion he writes that his theory was not necessarily proved but that the expedition of the Kon-Tiki did prove that the South American balsa raft possessed qualities not previously known to scientists of our time. And that the Pacific Islands are located well within the range of prehistoric crafts sailing from Peru. Too, that the primitive people, if they desired or were pressed, are capable of taking long voyages over the open sea. Distance is not the de-

termining factor in the case of oceanic migrations but whether the wind and current have the same general course, day and night, the whole year round. Heyerdahl says too, that the trade winds and the Equatorial Currents are turned westward by the rotation of the earth, and that the rotation has never changed in all the history of mankind.

The expedition was not a dare devil or foolhardy thing but well planned with capable men each qualified to take a part. The author had studied the background for such for 10 years.

From the beginning of the preparations, to the building of the raft, and through all the dangerous and at times comic adventures on the sea, to the time they crash land on the islands, the reader will find himself spellbound by the wholesome adventure and escape from the world of today, in its reading, just as the men themselves did in making the journey.

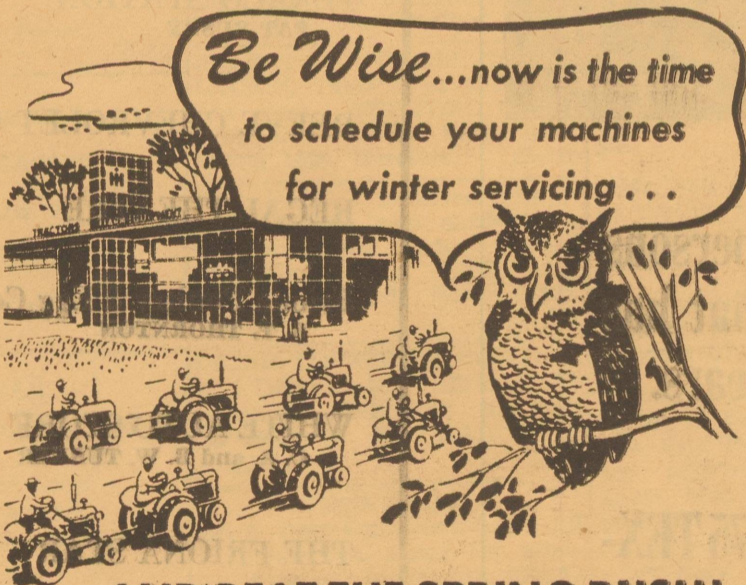

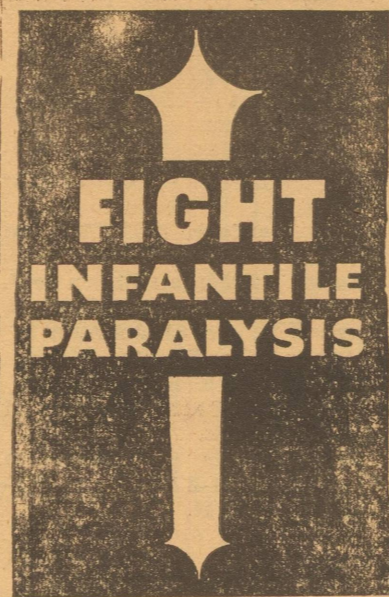

Hunting Information Also Posted There

Have you ever stopped to read the multitude of posters, placards, etc. posted on the postoffice bulletin board?

These postings each have a definite message, and many contain really beneficial information. Why, there is everything there from notices of local sales to solicitations for contributions, to say nothing of the civil service announcements. Just now there are posters appealing for contributions to the heart and cancer funds and the polio drive. Then there

are placards extolling the benefits of joining the payroll savings plan, helping the government and protecting yourself.

What about this contract issued June 13, 1947? Anybody know how it reads? It seemed that Friona had a mail route in town back in those days. This contract was issued to Robert Newton Gore to make a route six times a week. The length was one mile.

Anyone needing a job? Read your post office bulletin board. There's all kinds of civil service announcements of jobs in all lines, agriculturist, accountants, office machine operators and

supervisors, dietitian, training instructor, aviation subjects, radar instructors, educators, scientist, doctors and other lines.

Hunters take heed! Before leaving for that trip to the mountains secure all information so that you may save time. There is a poster of "Seasons for Migratory Game Birds of 1950-51". It gives the shooting hours, hunting methods, etc. Did you know that anyone shooting a bald eagle is subject to penalty for violation by fine or imprisonment or both.

Besides being just a place to mail your packages, letters and buying stamps, your post office and postmaster are messengers from the U. S. Government. Keep in contact, they will have information that will help you.

Suspension of Active Duty Orders in Naval Reserve Announced

A temporary suspension of active duty orders for naval reserve seaman recruits and seaman apprentices has been announced by Eighth Naval District headquarters here.

This paves the way once again for hundreds of reservists in the district who are on the road toward selective service induction.

Formerly reservists in these two pay grades could volunteer for active duty after they had received draft notices, provided they had enlisted before Sept. 1, 1950. This permitted them to serve in the navy instead of being inducted. The Navy cannot now take draftees.

The order was suspended Jan. 5 in order to avoid a bottleneck at recruit training centers. The Navy said the suspension was a precaution against bringing men into uniform faster than they can be accommodated, equipped and trained. The suspension will be lifted at such time as recruit training capacity is again available.

Reservists in the rates of seaman and fireman, and petty officers in certain ratings, still are being accepted as volunteers, the Navy pointed out.

"SMALL BUSINESS"

Here's a fact about the recent cigarette price boost that is receiving congressional attention.

The Marshall Plan has just given 1,650 metric tons of tobacco valued at \$1,600,000 to France; 4,640 tons valued at \$6,674,000 to Ireland, according to ECA Bulletin No. 1696. Tobacco gifts out of Marshall Plan expenditure of \$10 billion now total \$349,500,000.

Many Congressmen privately say, if they had known American tax dollars would be used to give luxuries such as tobacco and swank hotels to Europe, instead of the necessities to prevent starvation, they would have never voted for the Marshall Plan.

The gift of tobacco to Ireland seems to especially rankle. Many Congressmen share Winston Churchill's viewpoint that Ireland's refusal to let the Allies use her ports caused a great loss of life and cargoes in World War II.

Congressional decision to do nothing in an election year to revise corporation taxes upward to meet defense needs, apparently dooms all chance of cuts in the wartime excise taxes. Therefore, the 20% tax on baby powder, baby oils, will continue.

Says one colon, "my colleagues feel irritated babies may cry, but they won't vote for at least 20 years, while we must avoid irritating big campaign contributors whose donations are needed now."

at Frantschach, Austria, for modern machinery.

This company is the only paper mill in Austria... therefore, a monopoly. Lack of capital over the years eliminated independent American paper producers; eliminated competitive newsprint prices. Hence, the protest over this latest ECA action by independent American publishers.

From California reports are pouring into Washington of alleged profiteering that may set in motion a full scale investigation of the California oil industry, which is closely held and controlled by a few large combines to the virtual exclusion of independent concerns.

While the Department of Defense, since the start of the Korean War, is paying 8% more for needed supplies, on the West Coast, the government is paying 54.5% more for fuel oil, 12.4% more for gasoline, than paid in April... this means independent business must assume a still greater tax burden.

At the same time, a leading California broker specializing in oil stocks, released a report stating prior to Korea the California oil industry was plagued with a surplus of heavy fuel oil.

Now, the report states, the average daily refining of crude has jumped from 82 thousand barrels to 975 thousand barrels; crude oil inventories in California have dropped 2 million barrels.

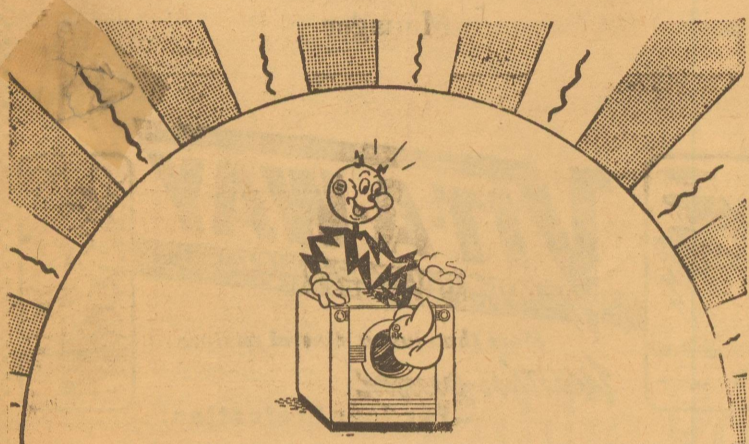

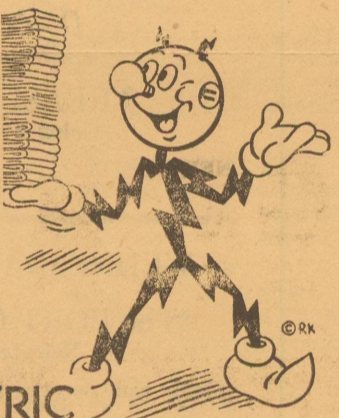
