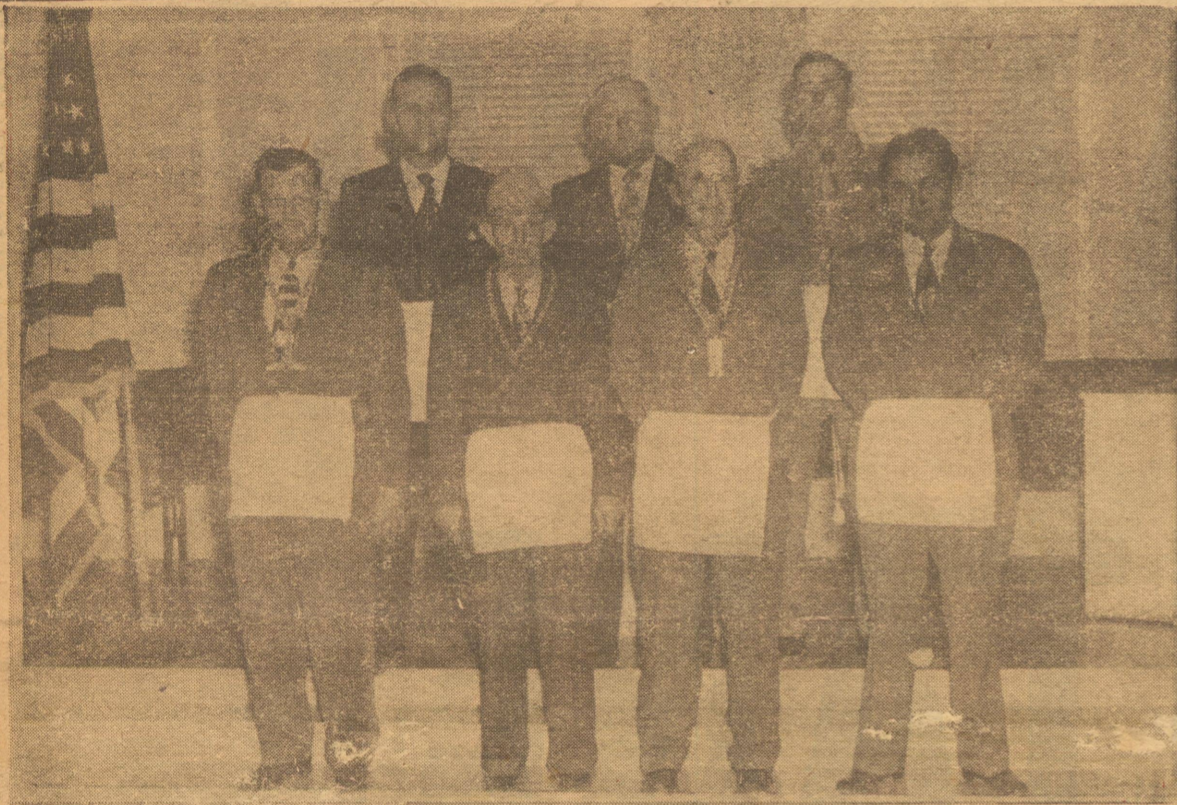

Arthur Drake and George Messenger will take their seats on the Friona School board as results of the election last Saturday when five names appeared on the ballot for two positions. The expiring terms of Jake Lamb and D O. Robason netted two vacancies, with neither incumbent seeking re-election.

Votes were tabulated as follows: Drake, 187; Messenger, 147; George Jones 139; Roy Miller, 135; and Leonard Haws, 70.

J. L. Schaffer was elected, uncontested on the ballot, to the county school board, with a total of 325 votes.

The Law & You

DO YAU KNOW what a "nuncupative" will is?

A "nuncupative will is an oral or spoken will. This oral will may not be made just at any time or place or under any conditions. The Statutes set out the specific situations and circumstances which will sustain a nuncupative will.

This type of will can only be made at the time of last illness, and approaching death of the individual. If over Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) is attempted to be willed in this manner, the Statutes require that three witnesses be present, and that the individual shall make known his wishes to them and tell them how his property is to be disposed of.

Nuncupative wills are effective only as to money and other personal property, they cannot dispose of land. Those hearing the oral will should commit to writing the matters declared to them by the person making the will within six (6) days after the will has been made to them, otherwise after six months from the date of the alleged oral will they will not be permitted to testify concerning the same. The statutes in regard to making and probating an oral will must be strictly followed; and this type of will is frowned upon by the Courts, and should not be resorted to except in extreme situations. A person should set his affairs in order well in advance so that such a will will not be necessary.

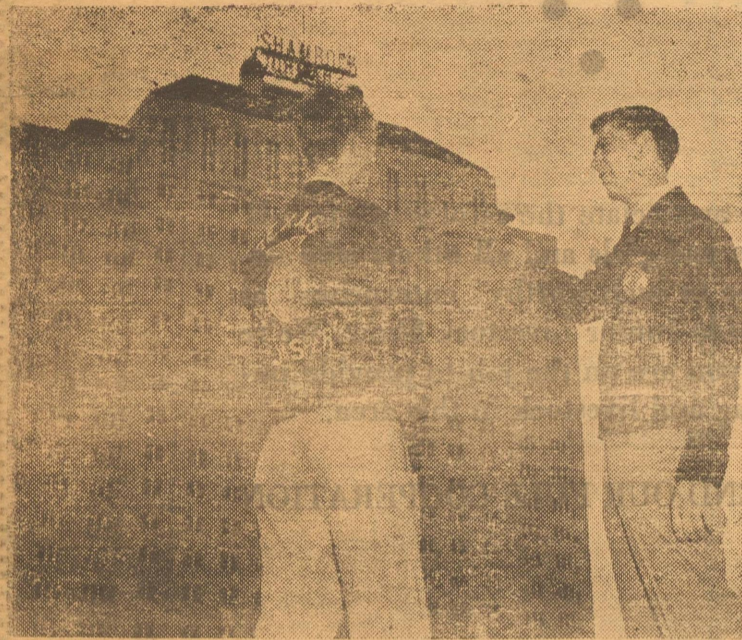

Each member of the church is invited to come and bring his friends. The services are at 10:00 a. m. and 8:00 a. m.

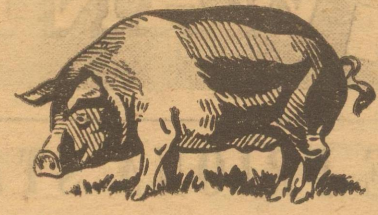

IRRIGATION FIELD DAY NEAR

Numerous Demonstrations Are Planned For County-Wide Field Day, April 26

Extension Service And SCS Sponsor Program

Announcements this week indicate a very comprehensive program planned for the county-wide Irrigation Field Day to be held Thursday, April 26, at the L. N. Tharp farm two meetings, to commence at 1:00 p.m., to commence at 1:00 o'clock, being sponsored jointly by the Parmer County Soil Conservation and the Extension Service.

County Agent Joe Jones stated this week that a good demonstration was anticipated, with the sponsors endeavoring to show the farmers items of real interest. The use of concrete pipe will be demonstrated as well as full explanation of its cost and installation. Visitors at the field day will have

a chance to see the system in action. Also the use of canvas hose; fire glass hose and gated metal pipe will be demonstrated.

Soil infiltration rate tests will be run, and the importance of this factor in conservation irrigation will be thoroughly emphasized.

The border machine Mr. Tharp built himself from plans furnished by the Soil Conservation Service will be in use that day. This machine borders and levels land in the same operation.

Another demonstration will be that of a tractor and equipment present to distribute anhydrous ammonia; this should be of special interest, the sponsors state, because of the wide local interest in this type fer-

tilizer. The Kind Fertilizer company of Muleshoe will furnish this equipment.

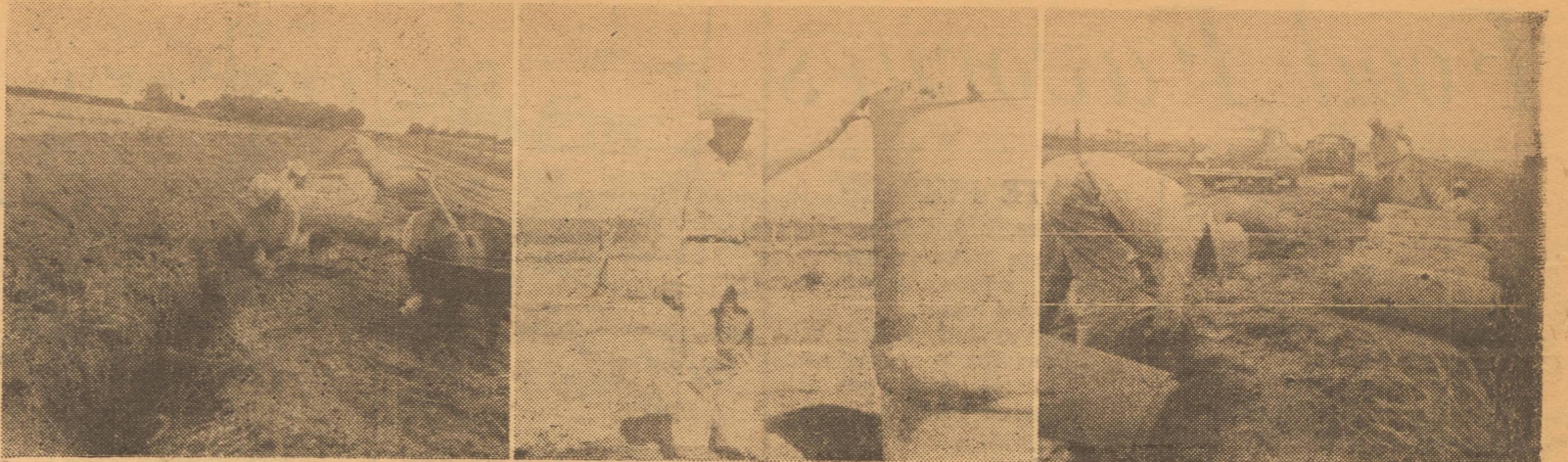
On display will be one of the Soil Conservation District's grass stenders and one of their land levels that they maintain for public use.

Officials of the Conservation Service and the Extension Service within the county will be present and two irrigation specialists, Miles Kelley of the SCS, and Bob Thurmond of the Extension Service.

GOOD HEALTH

Answer to Question No. 1:
1. Because of the improvement in medical treatment given at the aid stations in World War II, the effects of shock, loss of blood and infection were greatly counteracted. After that, the patient stood an excellent chance of recovery when he reached a hospital. According to the medical military record, 96 out of 100 men who reached hospitals were saved. In World War I, when a lower percentage of wounded reached hospitals, the number was 89 out of 100.

Answer to Question No. 2:
2. Yes, in infancy. When contracted at school age the disease is less dangerous if proper med-

ical care is given. Measles, since it takes epidemic form, runs in cycles with relatively few cases for several years and great number of cases in other years. For example in 1947 there were 221,100 cases whereas in 1949 there were 620,900 cases.

Answer to Question No. 3:
3. A 36-mile hike will take off just one pound of fat. In addition, the hiker would lose several pounds of water, which he would replace rapidly. Obviously, walking is not much of a solution for overweight. The age-old answer remains. Just don't eat so much of the wrong foods.

GUM DROP COOKIES

Mrs. Pat Sissell
Box 47 Gainesville, Mo.
1 cup sugar
1-2 cup shortening
1 egg well beaten
2 1-2 cups sifted flour
1-2 teaspoon baking soda
1-2 teaspoon salt
4 tablespoons milk
1-2 teaspoon vanilla
1-2 teaspoon lemon extract
1 cup diced gum drops
1-2 cup chopped nuts
Cream
Cream sugar and shortening together, add egg. Beat vigorously. Dredge gum drops with some of measured flour. Sift remaining flour baking soda, salt together add to creamed mixture, alternately with milk beat vigorously between each addition. Add gum drops, nuts, vanilla, lemon drop by teaspoon on oiled baking sheet, flatten with fork. Brush with cream. Bake at 400° oven about 10 minutes or until done.

LAST MINUTE FRUIT CAKE

(Doesn't have to be stored—eat fresh)
Mrs. Willard H. May
1 cup seedless raisins, chopped
1-2 cup cooked and stoned prunes
1-2 cup chopped dates
1-2 lb. pkg. mixed candied fruit
1-2 cup chopped walnuts
2 cups sifted flour
1-4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon baking powder
1-2 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
3 eggs
1-4 teaspoon nutmeg
1-2 teaspoon ginger
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1-4 cup orange juice
Sift flour, measure and sift with other dry ingredients except sugar. Sift over combined fruit and nuts. Blend well; cream shortening and gradually cream in sugar, then beat in eggs one at a time. Stir in flour mixture and add orange juice last. Bake in a large greased pan in a slow oven (300°) for 1-2 hours.
Place a pan of water on floor of oven while cooking cake and it will stay moist.

BARBECUED SPARERIBS

3 or 4 pounds meaty spareribs to serve six. Use kitchen scissors or sharp knife to cut meat in serving pieces for easy eating. Two ribs to each piece is a handy size. Turn the oven on now set at 450 degrees.
On each piece place a thin slice of onion and a slice of unpeeled lemon. Anchor with a toothpick. Place in shallow roasting pan, meaty side up. Roast the ribs in hot oven (450 degrees) 30 minutes, while you make the barbecue sauce.
Sauce is simple; 1 cup catsup, 1-3 cup worcestshire sauce, 1 teaspoon each chili powder and salt, 2 dashes Tabasco sauce, 2 cups water, heat to boiling.
Pour over ribs. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) until tender about 1 hour. Baste every 15 minutes. Remove the toothpicks.

2 1-4 cups cake flour
1-2 teaspoon salt
3 teaspoons double action baking powder

1-4 cup maraschino cherry juice.
16 maraschino cherries chopped
2 cup milk
1-2 to 2-3 cup egg whites, un-beaten
1-2 cup chopped California walnuts

KITCHEN MEMO

COMES the day when you're particularly busy, toss this recipe together to make a Skillet Dinner. Saves dishwashing, time and energy. Melt 2 tbsps. fat in skillet, add 1 cup chopped onion, 1/2 lb. ground beef. Cook until brown, about 10 mins. Add 1 cup sliced carrots, 4 ozs. med. noodles, 1 qt. water. Cover, simmer over low flame 45 mins. Add 2 tbsps. Worcestershire sauce, 1 tbsps. salt, 1/2 tsp. pepper. Mix lightly. Serves 4.

Timely check: The filter on your gas furnace is bound to clog with dust from the air. About twice a year remove the filter and replace it because a clogged filter cuts heating efficiency.

A clove of garlic in olive oil, mix in 1/2 tsp. paprika, let set for five minutes, then brush over thick steak. Slide into broiler 3" from flame. Out of this world for flavor and crusty finish!

If it's washday in your house and you need plenty of hot water, don't worry about the 15 gals. of hot water your man uses up for his morning shower because your automatic gas water heater immediately starts to replace hot water as it is used.

Gentle reminder: Tepid soapy water and a cloth wipe up spilled food in your gas refrigerator more easily than if you wait for the food to harden.

Butterscotch toast: Spread toast with butter or margarine, spin with brown sugar. Keep under broiler about 4" from the flame until it bubbles.

CRACKER TORTE PIE

3 egg whites
3-4 cup graham cracker rolled fine
1-2 cup finely chopped nuts
1 teaspoon baking powder

Bake in moderate oven until firm. Bake about 350 degrees temperature.

DATE LOAF CANDY

2 cups sugar
1 cup rich milk
1 pkg. dates (cut fine)
1-2 cup candied cherries (chopped)
1 cup nuts (chopped)

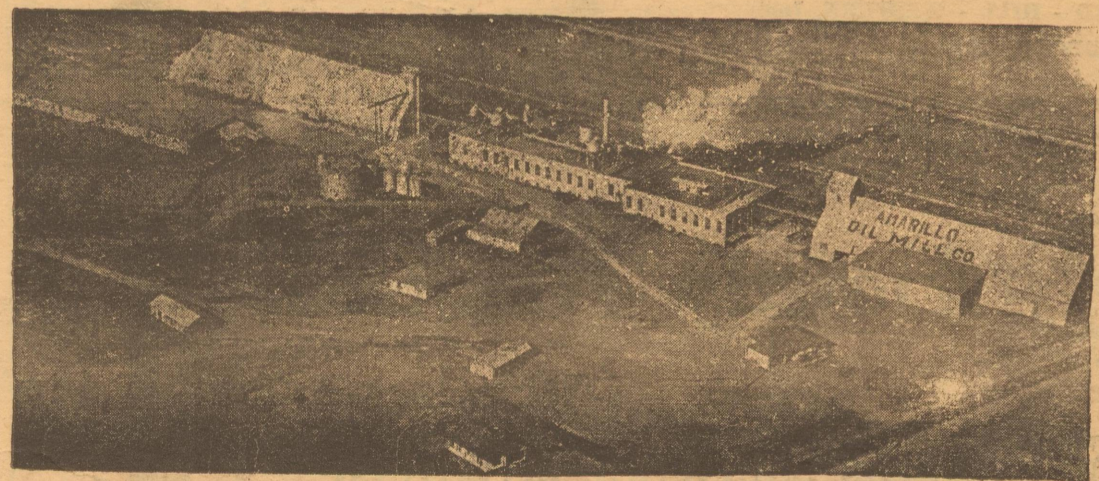

Examinations Called For State Employees

Chas. S. Gardiner, director of the Merit System Council, stated today that the state agencies served by the Council are in need of trained and capable workers. There is a continuing need, he declared, for ambitious and capable workers to carry on the work in these agencies.

Gardiner announced that the Merit System is giving competitive examination for Field Workers, child welfare Workers, Junior Stenographers, Clerks, clerks and intake receptionists in the State welfare department. There is an especially great need for stenographers, he added. Examinations will also be given for key punch operator II, tabulating machine operator II, and Maintenance mechanic in the Texas Employment Commission.

These examinations will be held in up to 45 cities over the state on May 12. Gardiner warned, however, that applications must be sent in before midnight, April 21.

Qualifications for these positions range from high school graduation to college graduation. Appropriate experience may be submitted for the education in most cases.

Gardiner called attention to the special advantages of working under the Merit System. These include liberal vacation and sick leave, permanency of work, and promotion based upon quality of work performed.

Gardiner particularly urged high school or college seniors to apply for these positions, declaring that in this way they could get started on a career of profitable, interesting and useful work.

Application blanks for the examinations may be obtained at the local offices of the Texas Employment Commission and the State Department of Public Welfare, or by writing to the Merit System Council, 1000 San Antonio street, Austin, Texas.

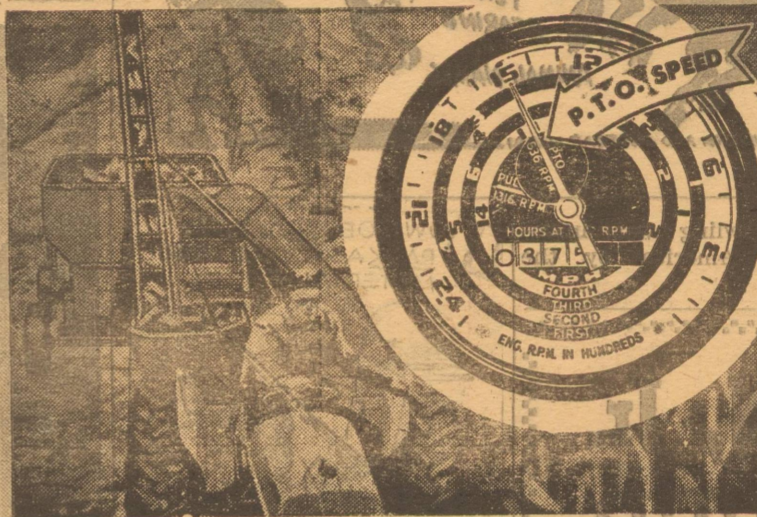

Domestic Help Must Have Social Security Cards, Says Agency

"Maids, cooks and other household workers whose jobs now entitle them to old-age and survivors insurance protection, will need account number cards," John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo social security office said today.

Covered by the new law are domestics who work in one home on at least 24 days and earn as much as 50 in a calendar quarter. A maid, for example, who works two days a week for one employer, is covered if her cash pay is as much as \$50 per calendar quarter.

"Applications for social security cards, or for duplicates of lost cards, may be obtained at our office in Amarillo or at any post office," Sanderson stated.






Lawrence Sullivan Ross, one of the most colorful figures in early Texas, did much to establish the A. and M. College of Texas as a ranking educational institution, and put it on the way to the position it holds today. "Little Sul," as he was affectionately known to Texans of the '90s, had made his reputation as an Indian fighter, Texas Ranger, sheriff, soldier and statesman, before he came to the presidency of A. and M. Among his more noted exploits had been the recapture of Cynthia Ann Parker, his rise in the Confederate Army from private to General in four years and his effective term as Governor of the state. In the eight years from his inauguration in 1890 to his death, he enhanced the popularity and the stature of the college tremendously. The Sul Ross statue in the center of the campus is today a college shrine, while the Ross Volunteers, oldest student honor organization in the state, serve as a constant reminder of his place in the story of Texas A. and M.

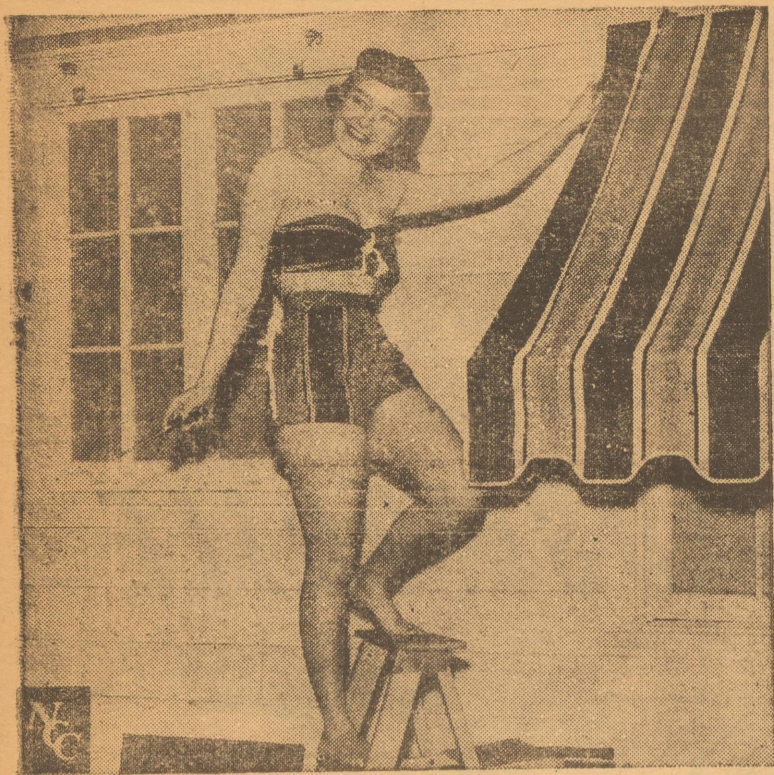

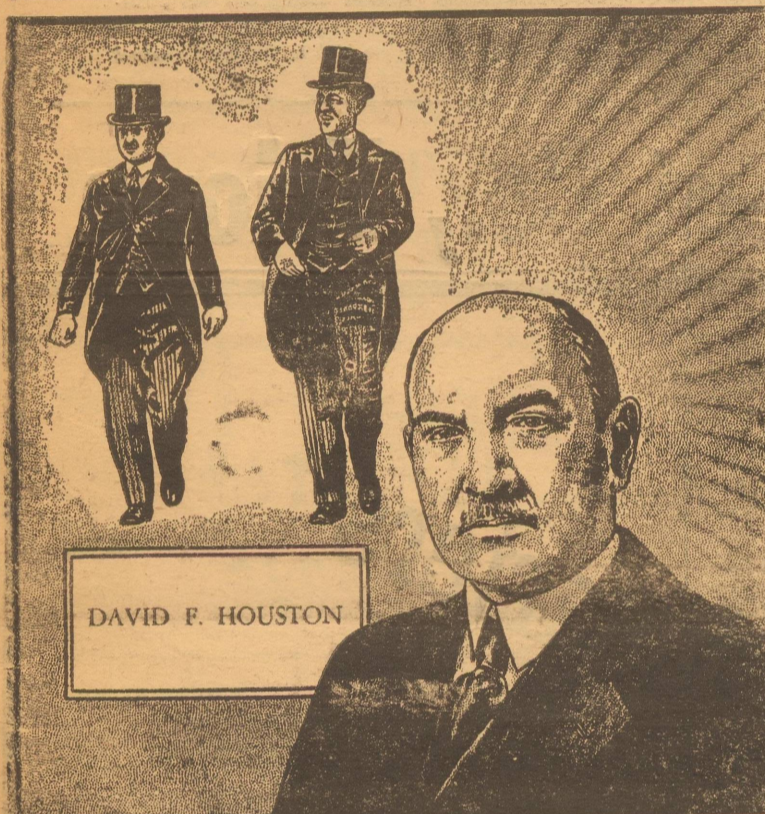

The man who first saw the true mission of the A. and M. College of Texas as a major technological institution and raised the scholarship level of the faculty and entrance requirements for students to real college level was Dr. David Franklin Houston, president of the college from 1902 until 1905. In his short time as president, Dr. Houston changed the entire course of the college's history. In 1905 he left Texas A. and M. to become the president of the University of Texas, and later became president of the University of Maryland. During the administration of Woodrow Wilson he served with distinction first Secretary of Agriculture and later as Secretary of the Treasury.

"SMALL BUSINESS"

Many government officials say present national inflation is caused, in part, by too much money being in circulation. But another set of officials took a different action to solve Norway's inflation, according to ECA Bulletin #1956.

Marshall Plan gives Norway \$129 million to combat inflationary pressures resulting from the excessive amount of money pumped into the nation's economy during the war.

In other countries American taxpayers' dollars have been given to fight deflation.

"It is hoped," observers remark, "that if any city is bombed defense officials will agree."

"Otherwise some will order water poured on the blaze; others will order gasoline pumped on the flames."

"I shall expect the Federal Trade Commission to be alert and vigorous in enforcement," Pres. Truman says, the anti-trust bill designed to plug a gap in anti-trust law.

But small business leaders will like even just more "service," as Wendell Berge, former head of the Dept. of Justice Anti-Trust Division, labeled an "anti-trust" endorsement for the past 35 years before a Congressional committee.

Small-trust laws endorsement, protecting the public is the responsibility of the Justice Department and the Federal Trade Commission.

Commission. There is great concern over the work of the FTC.

Congress has never, despite requests from organized small business, given the FTC enough money to do a job. During the present session, organized small business will again urge Congress to act.

Simultaneously, Congress will also scrutinize the entire FTC organization to see if the money will be properly spent, as a horse led to water cannot be made to drink. This probe has already started. A report just released by the House Small Business Committee spotlights glaring deficiencies in the FTC.

The report states internal strife and office politics pervade the agency. The report also refers to a "prejudice placed on inter-office deals, interstate differences," etc.

Investigation by Congressmen also found that the FTC is split into small cliques with every division jealous of any powers given any other division.

The House Small Business Committee also accuses the act of jumping on a horse and galloping off in all directions.

Investigation found the FTC failed to follow up on many cases. When Congressmen are determined to find out, next week there'll be more facts.

Everybody knows small business are plagued with a shortage of newsprint, also exorbitant newsprint prices.

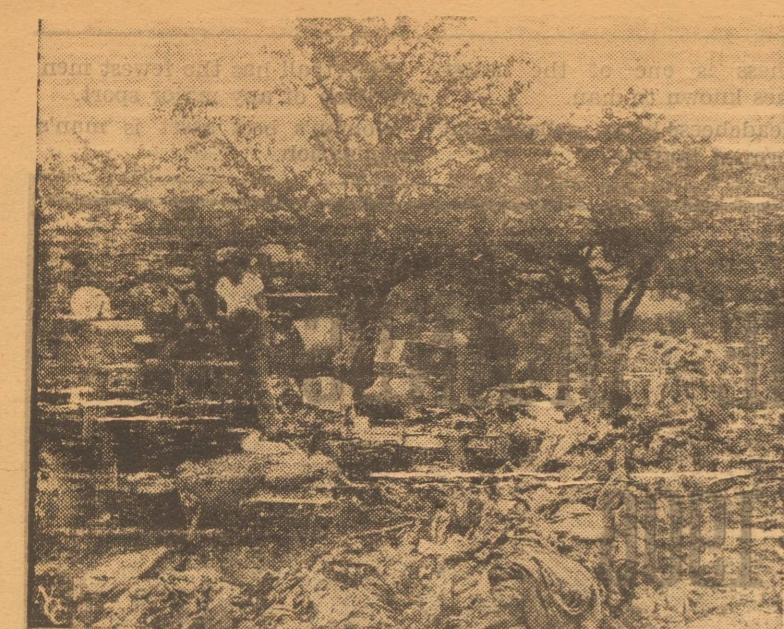

New Foundation Forms Link Between Education and Industry

NEW YORK—To promote understanding of the principles of democracy and freedom of opportunity in our free enterprise system, the Samuel Bronfman Foundation, established by the affiliated Seagram American companies with an initial contribution of one million dollars, entered into an agreement with the Graduate School of Business at Columbia University to provide funds annually for the following:

1. Establishment of the Samuel Bronfman Professorship in Democratic Business Enterprise; and an assistant professorship.
2. Establishment of the Bronfman Fellowships.
3. Research in the essential characteristics of democratic business enterprise.
4. Research which will create a better understanding of democratic business enterprise on the part of students, teachers and business executives.
5. A reference center, publications and other means of disseminating information about democratic business enterprise.

The Samuel Bronfman Foundation was established as a tribute to Mr. Bronfman who is president of the parent company, Distillers Corporation—Seagram Limited. The program at Columbia University was accepted by Dr. Grayson L. Kirk, vice president and provost, who said that the agreement between the University and the Foundation was a new milestone in industry-education cooperation. He also expressed his pleasure in "this further evidence of the common goals of the United States and Canada." Mr. Bronfman is a Canadian.

"Time will, I am confident, confirm our conviction that the founders of the Samuel Bronfman Foundation, by embarking on this project with Columbia University, have created a means of furthering democratic ideals," he said. "Never in our history was there a greater need for an understanding of democracy."

Mr. Bronfman, in his response, asserted:

"I am particularly pleased that one of the first dispositions of this foundation is to be for the establishment at Columbia University of a department devoted to the study of the system of democratic opportunity under which we live its advantages, its humane philosophy and its creative purpose, its superiority over all other systems of government or economic organization.

"For here at this great center of learning, students will be trained to participate in the march of progress which our system fosters. Here research will be undertaken so that whatever is improvable, whether in our policies or our technique, may be improved. Here leaders of industry and men eminent in their fields will be heard giving of their experience and their knowledge. Here the people of this country and this continent will be shown in striking detail what they already know and feel in general outline—the blessing that stem from our system; and hence will issue to all corners of the globe the truth, the magnetic and compelling truth about our way of life."

The Bronfman Foundation's objectives in establishing the program are as follows:

1. To study and teach the essential characteristics and techniques of democratic business activity and to promote and disseminate such knowledge to the maximum number of present and future students, teachers, and business executives.
2. To study the problems of overall management of business and of the administrative processes which facilitate innovation and growth.
3. To make a significant contribution to the progress of industry, to advance the thinking of the community as a whole; and to make it clear to an enlarged section of the free world that individual enterprise plays a vital role in the modern economy.

Dean Philip Young said the Bronfman Professor of Democratic Business Enterprise would be named shortly and would assume his post on July 1. The program as a whole will be instituted next fall.

The details of the Bronfman Fellowships have not yet been determined.

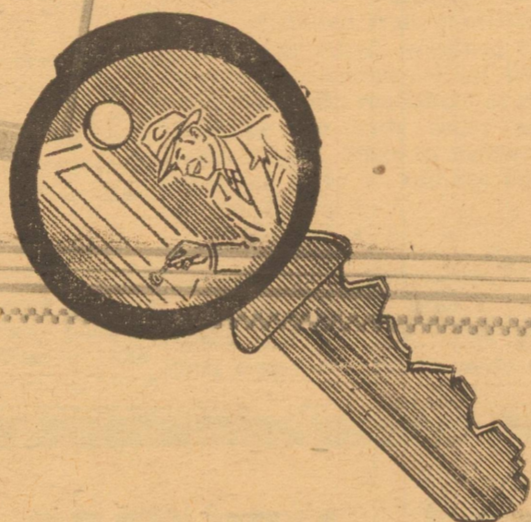

Farm Equipment Made Available by Priority Order of Government

A government order, M-55, assuring farmers continuing supplies of equipment for essential production of farm products has been issued, according to Ernest L. Tull, regional director, U. S. Department of Commerce-National Production Authority for Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

NPA order M-55 provides that manufacturers of farm equipment of most every type may apply ratings on their own certification to obtain materials or equal to the average monthly consumption in the first half of 1950. The new order applies to requirements for the month of June 1951, it was explained.

Manufacturers are permitted to extend DO ratings, to obtain materials, and components, only to their own regular suppliers during the past two years. Suppliers also are authorized to extend the orders where necessary.

Persons applying or extending ratings will attach the following certification: "Certified under NPA Order M-55 and Regulation 2."

SOMETHING NEW IN MEALS

MEALS FROM MARSHALL PLAN COUNTRIES OFFERED AS VARIETY

The Star has for some weeks published favorite recipes from the cooks of this area. We are re-printing many of them this week because of the wide circulation of this issue, making them available to even a larger number of housewives. In the near future these and others will be published in an attractive book, announcement of which will be made in the Star.

As an added feature, we are this week carrying some recipes from outside Parmer County—from Europe in fact! Whether they can be tried in the local ovens is only up to you, as the ingredients are obtainable in local markets.

The particular European dishes listed are from the Marshall Plan countries. These famous native dishes are selected because of their reported "down-right goodness" and also with a view to timeliness and availability of ingredients in American markets. We hope this feature will prove interesting and its results delicious!

MEALS TO REMEMBER

Variety is not only the spice of life; it is without question a necessity when it comes to food. With a sense of culinary imagination, a new twist can be given to a favorite dish that will lift it right out of the doldrums. This is especially true if you prepare it as they do in one of the European countries. The Europeans, you know, are famous for their good food as well as for their churches, museums and other places of interest. A novel way of cooking, too, not only makes things taste delicious, but conversation as well as appetites are stimulated as the food is enjoyed. You will want to go abroad to see for yourself the delightful cities and countryside and to get to know the people.

Take Austria, for instance with beautiful mountains, picturesque villages and Vienna, city of music and gaiety. Here native cooks transform many simple foods into delectable dishes

They have a way of frying chicken, called Backhuhn, that will melt in your mouth. (Recipe below). With this they are very apt to serve what they call a mixed salad but it is not in the least like the American idea of a mixed salad. It is served with or after the main course and consists of several individual dishes, four or six different ones. They are vegetables in season.

For example, the Austrians particularly like cooked peas in mayonnaise, diced carrots, also in mayonnaise, celery roots or sliced cucumber in oil and vinegar with a dash of sugar. Cooked kidney beans are delicious this way, too. Make a dressing of oil, vinegar, a dash of mustard, sugar, chili sauce, chives or onion salt. Let beans marinate in refrigerator for several hours and then serve at room temperature. This is a marvelous way to get the family to eat their quota of vegetables, especially the men folks who often don't care too much for vegetables, or salads either.

And for a delicious dessert, the Austrians work wonders with a simple rice pudding which they call Wiener Reis-Auflauf. Try these recipes some

time soon and you will find you have assembled a meal that will be long remembered.

BACKHUHN

Fried Chicken, Vienna Style

For 6 persons allow 2 young frying chickens, disjoint, remove skin and coat with seasoned flour, beaten eggs and fine bread crumbs. Fry in deep boiling fat until golden brown, drain and serve with new parsley-potatoes, green peas and Viennese mixed salad.

WIENER REIS-AUFLAUF

Rice Pudding, Vienna Style

2 cups milk
1-4 cup sugar
1-2 cup washed and cleaned rice
grated rind and juice of 1-4 lemon

pinch salt
2 tbsps butter or margarine
2 egg yolks
2 stiffly beaten egg whites
Stewed apricots or sliced, sweetened apples

Cook rice in milk, adding pinch of salt. When rice is very soft, cool and stir in egg-yolks, sugar, lemon juice, grated rind, butter and the stiffly beaten egg-whites. Divide into 2 equal parts. Butter bottom and sides of a baking dish, sprinkle with sugar and pour in half of prepared rice. Place a thick layer of stewed fruit, preferably apricots or sliced, sweetened apples or a combination of both and cover with remainder of rice. Sprinkle top with sugar and melted butter. Bake in moderate oven for 30 to 40 minutes until brown. Serves 4.

2 cups hot water
1 pkg. Lemon Pie filling
1-2 cup sugar
2 egg yolks
Cook this mixture until thickened. Beat two egg whites and 4 teaspoons sugar stiff. Fold into thickened pudding. Then fold in 1 cup whipped cream. Top with vanilla wafer crumbs.

OATMEAL DROP COOKIES

Cream 1-4 cup melted butter and 1-4 cups sugar blend in 2 eggs, 6 tablespoons molasses, add 1 3-4 cups flour sifted with 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon soda and 1-4 teaspoon salt, 2 cups quick cooking oatmeal, 1-2 cup chopped nuts, 1 cup chopped raisins, mix all ingredients thoroughly. Drop by spoonfuls on cookie sheet, bake in moderate oven 8 to 10 minutes, makes 5 dozen cookies.

HOT CAKES

Mrs. Spencer Hough

2 cup clabber milk
1 teaspoon soda
1 egg
2 tablespoon melted shortening.
1 cup flour
1-2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon baking powder
1-4 cup cornmeal.
Combine milk, soda and egg beat well. Add melted shortening. Add sifted dry ingredients and stir until just mixed. Cook on hot griddle.

WHIPPED CREAM CAKE

Mrs. J. T. Gee

1 cup whipping cream
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 1-2 cup cake flour
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 teaspoon baking powder
1-2 teaspoon salt
Whip cream until firm, drop in eggs and beat until light and fluffy, add vanilla, sift flour before measuring, then sift again with salt and baking powder, stir in flour, add sugar and beat, bake at 375 degrees temperature for about 20 minutes. Bake in a long cake pan.

FILLING FOR WHIPPED CREAM CAKE

Mrs. J. T. Gee

Melt 1 cup brown sugar, 2 tablespoons cream, 1 tablespoon butter, spread over cake which is in pan in which it was cooked. Sprinkle with nuts and coconut and set under broiler until filling bubbles and crusts over.

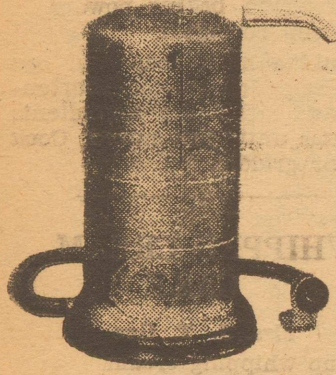

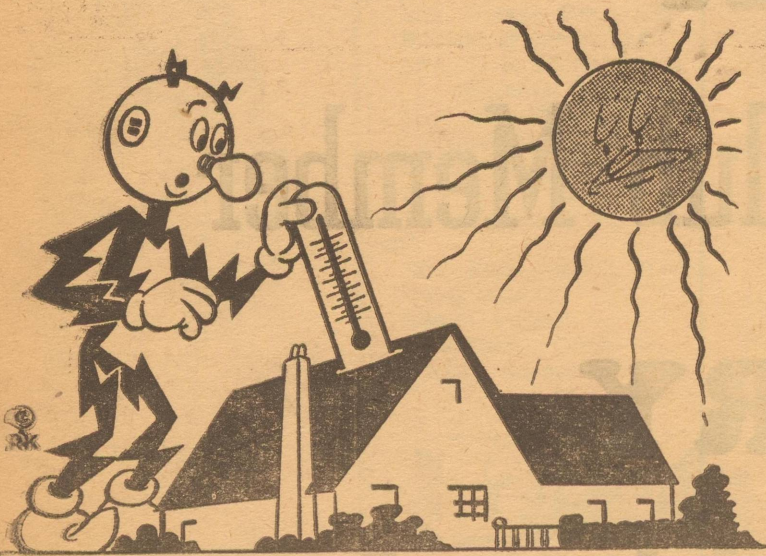

VETERINARIANS SAY MANY ANIMALS LACK PHOSPHORUS

Stockmen in some parts of
the country are losing thou-
sands of dollars a year—without
knowing it—because of "bor-
derline" phosphorus deficiency,
according to the American
Veterinary Medical Association.

Some cases are traceable to
over-emphasis on feeding cal-
cium. Quite a few stockmen
apparently do not know that
when they feel extra calcium,
more phosphorus and sufficient
vitamin D are needed to allow
proper utilization of the cal-
cium, the AVMA points out.

Many cases are seen toward
the end of the winter, when
animals are not on pasture.
Stiffness and swollen joints are
characteristic of advanced phos-
phorus deficiency, but borderline
cases are not easy to recognize

and can drain away the herd's
vigor without arousing suspicion.
Loss of weight, slow development
of calves, low milk production
and a small calf crop all may
be traceable to borderline lack
of this essential mineral.

Drouth conditions also favor
the development of phosphorus
deficiency because pastures do
not absorb their usual supply
of minerals when the soil lacks
moisture.

Feeding of steamed bonemeal,
which is fairly rich in phosphor-

us, is recommended by the vet-
erinary medical organization as
a routine precaution against bor-
derline phosphorus deficiency.
Best results are obtained when
it is mixed with free-choice salt,
provided the cattle eat enough
salt. High-protein supplements
such as cottonseed oil meal, also
are rich in phosphorus and
should be fed in addition to
steamed bonemeal in areas of
severe phosphorus deficiency.

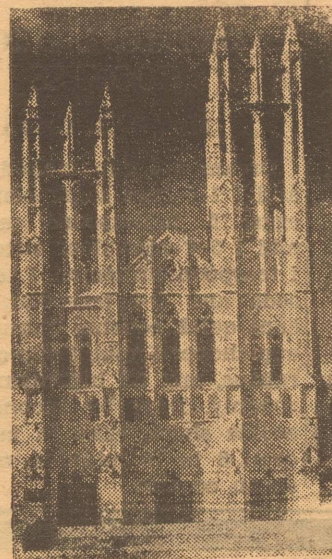

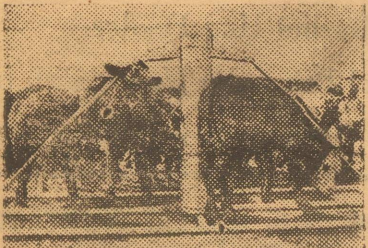

 1 Fleischmann's yeast cake
 1 teaspoon salt
 2-3 cup sugar
 Flour to make very stiff dough
 1 heaping tablespoon Crisco or other shortening
 Heat milk to boiling point, dissolve Crisco, sugar and salt in milk. Let stand until lukewarm. Dissolve yeast cake in 1-4 cup luke warm water, pour into milk mixture. Add flour enough for a very stiff dough. Let rise, roll and cut as for rolls and butter and let rise for about 1 1/2 hours longer. Cook at about 400 degrees temperature for 15 to 20 minutes.

Watch Animals Now for Vitamin A Deficiency

More cases of vitamin A deficiency show up in farm animals during March and April than at any other time of the year. The reason is lack of this vitamin in winter feeds.

Many farmers who think that have been feeding adequate rations learn too late that driving and storage have reduced the vitamin A content to a dangerous level. As soon as affected animals are turned out to spring pasture, they start to build up their vitamin A reserves again, since green plants are rich in this element. If the deficiency was mild and of short duration, they will snap back without permanent ill effects. But a severe and prolonged lack of vitamin A already will have taken its toll.

Lowered resistance to infectious diseases, night blindness and other eye infections, and reproductive troubles are among the conditions traceable to vitamin A deficiency.

Farmers who make it a point to provide plenty of green feed throughout the year rarely run into this problem. Bright green, leafy, legume hay supplies cattle and sheep with adequate amounts of vitamin A, while green alfalfa hay or meal is best for pigs. Fish oils are recommended for poultry, since they contain vitamin A as well as vitamin D.

DON'T FEED DOG ICE COLD FOOD

Don't blame your dog if it urns up its nose at food offered right out of the refrigerator.

In fact, it's a sensible dog that will refuse to eat it that way.

Indigestion, vomiting, and diarrhea often result from eating cold "left-overs," veterinarians said in a recent canine nutrition survey.

The veterinarians explained that dogs gulp their food so that it does not get warmed much on the way down to the stomach. Digestive trouble is touched off when the chilled food hits the warm stomach lining.

It is all right—and necessary—to store the remainder of a can of dog food in the icebox. But it should be warmed to room temperature just before the next feeding.

Drugs are being used successfully in treating anaplasmosis, a malaria-like infection of cattle, but no drug yet tested prevents recovered animals from being carriers of the disease.

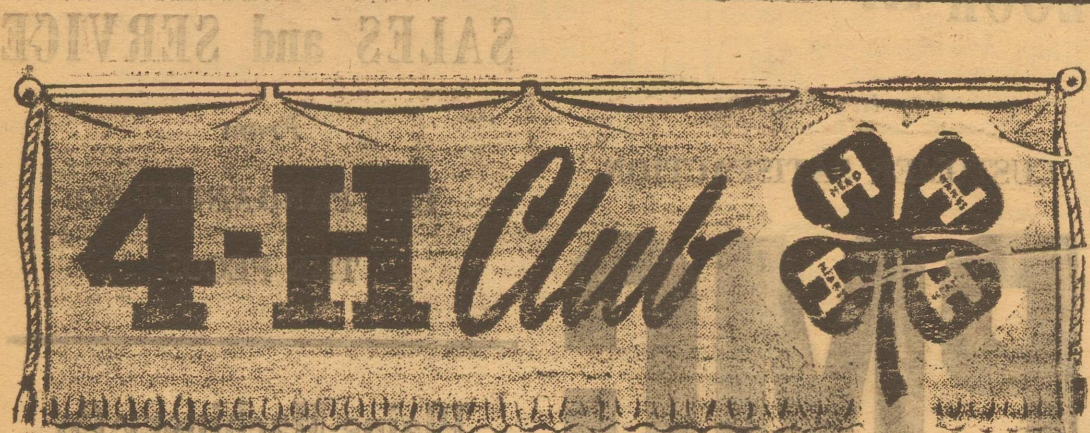

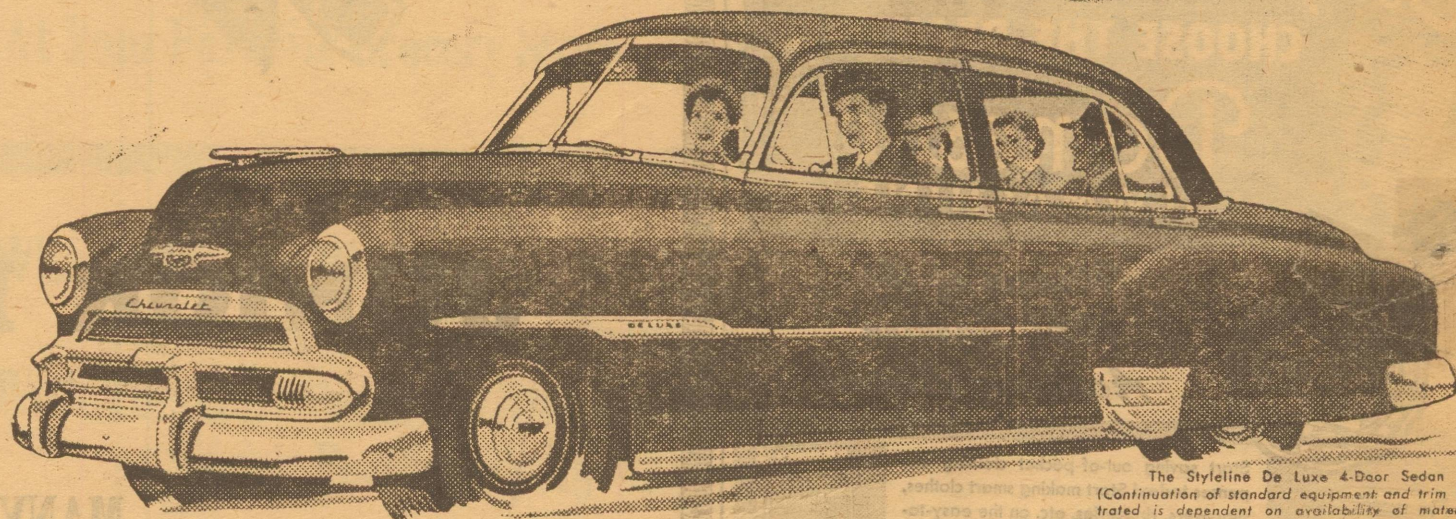
